Each one consists of several seats, which are really, though not apparently, detached, and they look easy and comfortable. In this case appearances are deceitful, for should one occupant of any one seat lean forward while "nidnid nodding" over he goes on the floor. The seat is so constructed as to easily tip over when any weight is placed on its outer or front edge and was so designed to prevent people from going to sleep in church.
