THE EXPERIMENTAL ROAD.

Mr. R. W. King, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, took us out for a drive Thursday afternoon to inspect the experimental sand-clay road which the county is having constructed under the supervision of a government road builder. The section of road is first drained, then given an oval grade and covered with a proper mixture of sand and clay. A FAMOUS DEBATE.

How Lincoln Forced Douglas Into the A Scavenger That Is Highly Esteemed Open at Freeport.

ries of all American history—that teemed, and the natives regard it as of the forensic contest between a very unfortunate event should one Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. be killed. Douglas in Illinois fifty years ago-is told in the Century by Frederick Trevor Hill. In the following extract he describes the meeting and the audience at Freeport:

In this part of the state (Freeport) Lincoln was almost a stranger, and his uncouth appearance and slouchy bearing were not offset by any direct knowledge of his professional attainments. On this occasion, however, he speedily dispelled all doubts of his ability by advancing boldly to the attack. Reminding his auditors that Douglas had seen fit to cross examine him at their last meeting, he announced that he was prepared to answer the seven questions which had been put to him provided his adversary would reply to questions from him not exceeding the same number. "I give him an opportunity to respond," he announced and, turning to Douglas, paused for his reply.

In an instant the vast audience was hushed. Even the fakers and venders at the outskirts of the crowd ceased plying their trades and strove to catch a glimpse of the platform. It was a dramatic moment and an unequaled opportunity for Douglas. But he merely shook his head and smiled. "The judge remains silent," continued Lincoln. "I now say that I will answer his interrogatories whether he answers mine or not."

No more effective challenge was ever uttered, and the audience, quick to recognize its courage and fairness, responded in a fashion that must have disconcerted and nettled Lincoln's cautious adversary. Certainly Douglas was in no amiable mood when he rose to make reply, and the interruptions of the audience speedily worked him into a passion. Again and again he assailed his hearers as "black Republicans," characterizing their questions as vulgar and blackguard interruptions, shaking his fist in their faces and defying them as a mob. More than once Mr. Turner, the Republican moderator, was drawn into the fray by the speaker's aggressive tactics, and the whole meeting was occasionally on the verge of tumult, Lincoln's closing address, however, had a calming effect, and when his time expired the audience quietly dispersed to spread the news throughout the countryside that this unknown lawyer was actually outmaneuvering his distinguished adversary and forcing him into the open, beyond reach of cover or possibility of retreat.

The Alaska raven is a fine looking bird, as large as a turkey and upon closer acquaintance a real handsome fellow. His coat is indeed black, but of a black glossier and more rich than silk and softer than velvet, while in a semishade the feathers are tinged with that peculiar color so often seen on well preserved blue black bronze.

It is very funny to see these birds holding, as it were, a conclave. Ten or a dozen alight on the ground and walk to the meeting place with a stately, erect step, their every movement cool and assured.

Then an old bird steps gravely into the middle, and the meeting begins with a series of guttural and harsh croaks, which gradually swell in volume until the entire lot of birds have joined in the debate.

Along comes a dog, and for him they scatter, resuming their positions when he passes, until the meeting again terminates, and they fly off to the beach and hills.

If you examine the bills of these ravens the peculiar construction is remarkable. They are a combination of a chisel, scissors, dagger and

The bill forms an important factor in the raven's existence, for he has to dig on the beach for clams, bore the hard shell by repeated chipping, and again in pure mis-

eye lights upon. Just as soon as the bright sunlight appears the ravens leave their roosting places on the hilltops for the beach line, and over the village and shores of the bay they fly and wander until sundown invites them

The raven is a fine flier. On the wing his movements are well under command. With strong, decided beats he winnows the air fast or slow, never seeming in a hurry. But if occasion requires the raven can travel at express speed, and, when he sees another bird feasting on some delicate morsel of offal, down he comes from midair with his discordant caw, ready to share or steal the prize.

The same characteristics are visible all along the southern coast of Alaska to Sitka. The natives from Yahutat bay through the network of islands as far as British Columbia have an ancient legend that the raven was the bird that brought light from darkness when the world was created. On this account they venerate it, and the totem of a raven is regarded as denoting the most illustrious descended family.

The raven does not appear to migrate, as the residents all over that portion of Alaska where the birds are found state that they remain throughout the winter.-St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

LAND OF THE CROSSBOW.

The Deadly Poisoned Arrows of the Lissoo Sharpshooters.

On the wild frontier between China and British Burma is a barbarous tribe which has no civilized supervision. George Forrest, an English traveler, thus describes the chief weapon of these people: "If I had to suggest a title for a book on the upper Salwin I should call it 'The Land of the Crossbow.' which is the characteristic weapon of the country and the Lissoo tribe. Every Lissoo with any pretensions to chic possesses at least two of these weapons-one for everyday use in hunting, the other for war. The little children play with miniature crossbows. The men never leave their buts for any purpose whatever without their crossbows. When they go to sleep the 'nukung' is hung over their heads, and when they die it is hung over their graves. The largest crossbows have a span of fully five feet and require a pull of fully thirty-five pounds to string tracts or parcels of land to wit; them. The bow is made of a species of The first tract situated in Greenville wild plum wood. The string is of plaited hemp and the trigger of bone. The arrow, of sixteen to eighteen The actual point is bare for a quarter to one-third of an inch, then for fully an inch the arrow is stripped to half its thickness, and on this portion poison is

placed. "The poison is invariably a decoction expressed from the tubers of a species of aconitum which grows on those or some vegetable gum to the consistency of putty and is then smeared on the notched point. The 'feather' is supplied by a strip of bamboo leaf folded into a triangular form and tied in a notch at the end of the arrow, with the point of the angle outward. The reduction in thickness of the arrow where the poison is placed causes the point to break off in the body of any one whom it strikes, and, as each carries enough poison to kill a cart horse, a wound is invariably fatal. Free and immediate incision is the usual remedy when wounded on a limb or fleshy part of the body, but at Chengka the uncle of the Laowo chief showed us a preparation which resembled opium dross

An arrow from a war bow will pierce a deal board an inch thick at seventy or eighty yards. Some of the Tsekou natives were so expert that they could hit a mark four inches in diameter repeatedly at sixty to eighty yards. As no one goes anywhere without his crossbow and his bearskin quiver full of poisoned arrows and as every village is at fewd with every other village" mutual suspicion is inevitable. 
