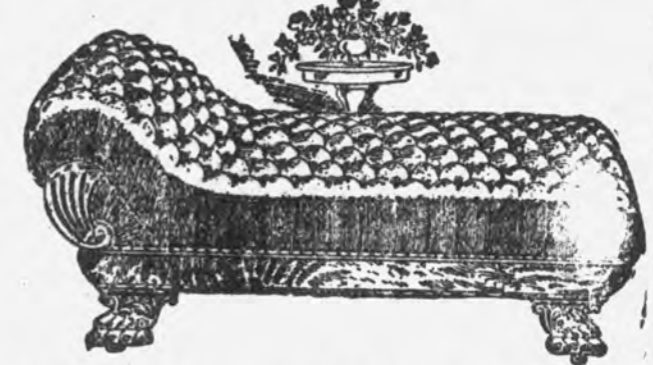

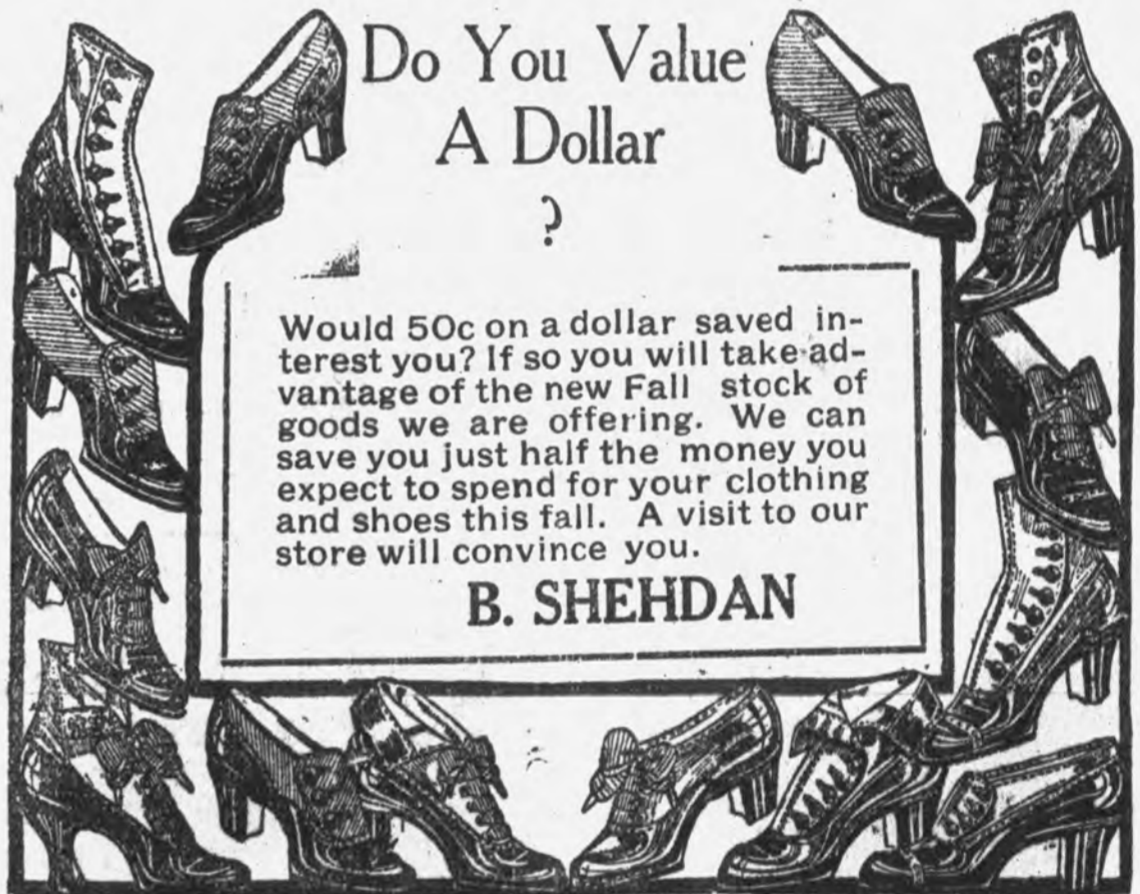

RALEIGH.—At the State Department of Agriculture it is estimated that the tobacco crop in this state was about 160,000 acres, and that the yield was around 450 pounds to the acre, compared with 215,000 acres and 600 pounds to the acre last year. Very dry conditions at the planting season and continuing far into the period of cultivation cut down greatly both acreage and the yield to the acre.
