"THIS IS MY 73rd BIRTHDAY," Bishop Gabriels.

Rt. Rev. Henry Gabriels, Roman Catholic bishop of Ogdensburg, N. Y., who recently celebrated the golden jubilee anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood, was born in Wanegem, Belgium, October 6, 1838. His early education was received in the public schools of his native place. Later he attended academies in Audenarde and Ghent, and completed his studies at the celebrated theological school of Louvain, from which he was graduated in 1864. The same year he came to America to accept a place on the faculty of St. Joseph's Seminary at Troy, N. Y. Here he remained as a professor theology until 1871. In that year he became president of the seminary and continued to direct its affairs until 1892, when he was chosen bishop of Ogdensburg. Bishop Gabriels is the author of a book on Publics and of a well-known translation of "Rudiments of Hebrew."

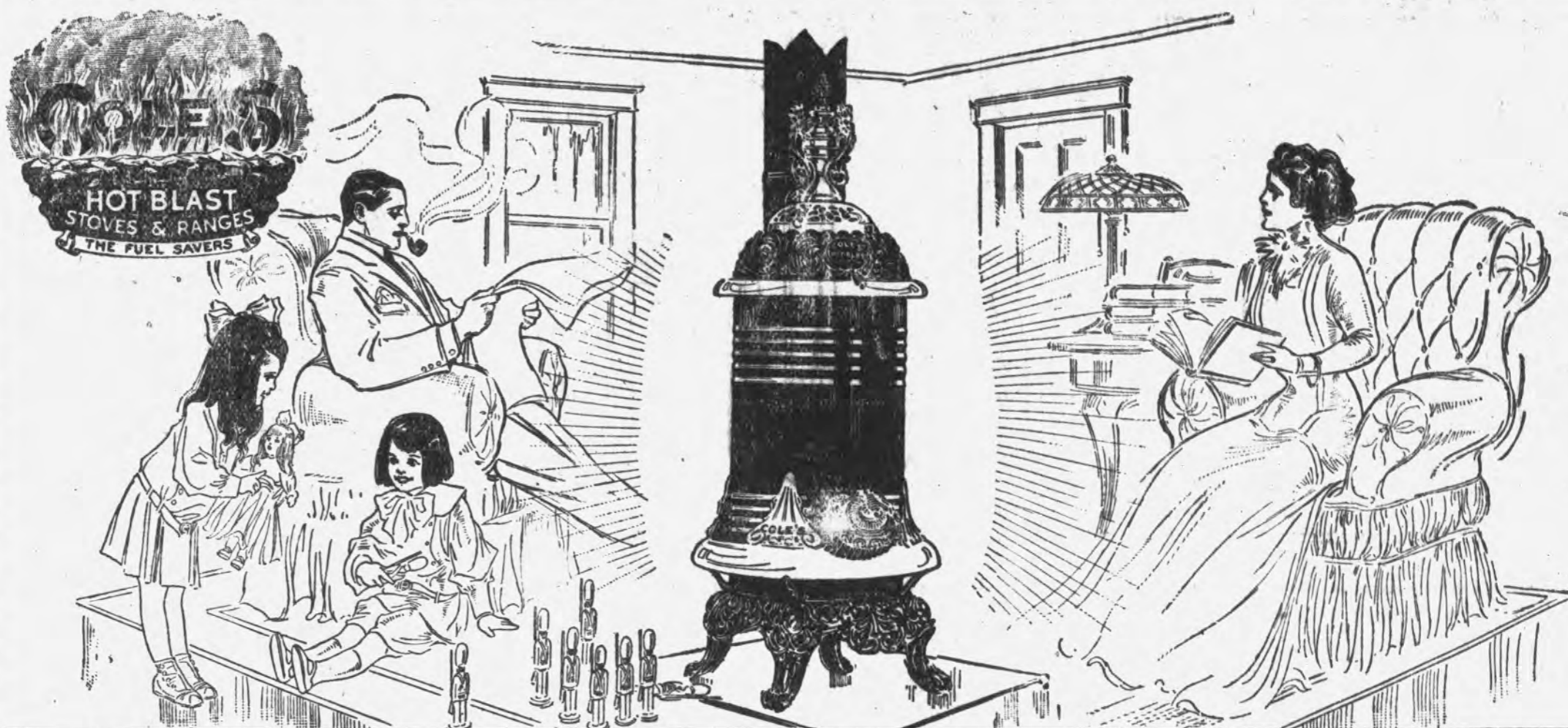
