Dress Problem of Early Fall—Fancy Silk Waists in Demand—Heliolite a Popular Tint.

Though the white waists are unquestionably a demandable all year round garment, when early Fall brings with it a hint of cooler weather, there comes the natural demand for some thing a little heavier. At this time the many fancy silk waists are greatly in demand.

An advance showing favors heliolite rope tints in both plain and figured silks. These with little narrow bands trimmings of creamy lace are very smart. The new sleeves are a little wider than the ordinary style and are not as pretty.

A novelty is a sort of puff or cap, which years ago was favored by our mothers. I do not think this will win a general popularity, for unless the puffs are made with great skill they have a tendency to distort the arm.

Tucked sleeves which follow the contour of the upper arm and spread out at the elbow are dressy especially when finished with a lace frill.

There is a slight tendency in these silk waists to make them a little more snugly fitting. This does not mean a real tightness, but less of the blouse effect.

The use of narrow ribbon velvet promises to be popular. The favorite style is to follow some design on the front of the waist and the sleeves. Any handy woman who has an idea of form in lattice work designs can baste on these narrow stripes and later sew them into a firm shape.

The collars of the silk waists show great height, sometimes even augmented by an extra frill or runching.

Some necks are finished with a regular stock ending in a rosette in the back. This is a revival of a style that was always popular because so becoming, therefore it will be welcomed.

To make the back of the collar look neat is something that comparatively few women achieve and the well made, yet fluffy rosette is a god-send in covering any gap which even three beauty pins cannot always hide.

Later in the season corduroy promises to be the dependable material

for the work-a-day waist. But its warmth will prohibit its use until days get sufficiently cool to demand something heavier than silk.
