Six years ago less than 3,000 horsepower from Niagara Falls was sold in Canada. Now sales amount to about 100,-000 horsepower while one of the three companies in the fieud announces that by 1913 it will have ready two addihorsepower each to meet the increasing demands of its Canadian business. There is a limit to this growth. It




