TOURS TO PANAMA, JAMAICA AND CUBA.

The Evangeline Will Make Eight Trips Through the Tropics.

The Atlantic Coast Line announces that in connection with its splendid through Pullman service to Key West the Peninsular and Occidental Steamship company will operate 8 personally conducted tours with the new steel twin-screw steamship "Evangeline" from that point to Colon, Panama Canal Zone, Kingston, Jamaica, and Havana, Cuba.

The Evangeline is a brand new and modern, up-to-date ship in every particular. She is 364 feet long, 46 foot beam, has 5,650 tons register, 262 state-rooms, equipped throughout with electric lights and fans and has a speed of eighteen knots.

This splendid ship will leave Key West on the morning on arrival of the Atlantic Coast Line-Florida East Coast "Over-Sea" train from the North, on January 7 and 21, February 4 and 18, March 4 and 18 and April 1 and 15, sailing direct to Colon, where a stop of two days will be made, which will give passengers ample opportunity to inspect the Panama Canal, the greatest piece of engineering or other construction work known to mankind. On the return trip two days stop will be made at Kingston, where quaint and tropical Jamaica may be explored, and will be fully enjoyed.
