HON. OSCAR W. UNDERWOOD REPORTS:

The Farmers' Free List bill, passed by the House, would have saved the people \$390,000,000 annually. This bill removed the duty from agricultural implements, of which \$165,000,000 worth were imported during the last fiscal year; sewing machines, fence wire, bagging and cotton ties, lumber, laths, shingles, flour, salt, leather, shoes, etc.

Under our tariff law a barrel of flour valued at \$4 abroad is taxed 25 per cent ad valorem at our ports, or \$1 on the barrel. This bill removed the entire tax.

Beef valued at \$5.30 per 100 pounds abroad pays a tariff tax equivalent to 25.88 per cent or \$150 per 100 pounds. This bill proposed to remove this entire tax.

The Democratic wool bill proposed to reduce the average rate of duty on wool manufactures from 90.10 per cent to \$48.36 per cent. President Taft's veto of this measure means that the American people will pay \$50,000,000 more for their clothes this year than they would have if President Taft had signed it.

A wool hat valued at \$1 abroad and taxed 78 cents upon its entry into the United States, under the present tariff law, would have been taxed only 49 cents.

Flannel underwear valued at \$27 per dozen suits is taxed under the present law at the equivalent ad valorem rate of about 106 per cent. The Democratic bill proposed to reduce this to 49 per cent. A suit of ready-made woollen clothing worth in Europe \$10 is taxed under the present law at the equivalent ad valorem rate of 75 per cent, or \$7.50. The Democratic bill proposed to reduce this tax from 75 to 49 per cent and save the consumer \$2.60 per suit.

The cotton bill reduced the duties on cotton manufactures from 48.12 per cent to 27.06 per cent, a reduction of the tariff burdens under this schedule from not less than \$200,000,000 to about \$112,000,000 for a year, or a saving of about \$88,000,000 for a twelve month period.

Governor Wilson says he had rather get a good night's sleep on the night of election than to sit up and hear the election news. That is a safe preference to express, for he knows in advance that it is going to be good news.

You just can't please everybody. Some who wanted the state executive committee to modify the ruling as to eligibility to vote in the senatorial primary, are now kicking about it. They even claim that it will let down the bars for Republicans to vote in the primary. The ruling of the committee not only shuts out Republicans, but if a Democrat in scratching his ticket puts a Republican in the place of the one marked off, he can't vote in the primary.

Do not let the campaign make you lose your head. All will need to be doing business together after the election and there are other things as important as politics.

The Charlotte Chronicle is worrying because the equinoxeal storm does not come along. Just wait a few days. The Republicans will find one on November 5th.

If the Republicans ever do get another chance in North Carolina, how they will make use of the abuse Democrats have been throwing at each other.

The people have been getting much food for thought out of this campaign, but they have been looking more to the newspapers for it than to the speakers.

The Greensboro News says the senatorial contest will not go to the tenth inning. Certainly not, it will be called at the close of the 5th.

WALTER CLARK TO THE PEOPLE OF NORTH CAROLINA

My Friends and Fellow Citizens: Your choice of your United States Senator will deeply affect your welfare. It ought not to be procured by agencies employed to control your votes.

The increase in the production of wealth has been marvelous, indeed nearly double that of ten years ago. National legislation, controlled by the Special Interests, has transferred the wealth created by you to a few so that there are now over one thousand men in this country who possess from ten millions up to one thousand million each and 3 per cent of our population own more than the other 97 per cent.

Not only this but the same legislation has transferred the wealth created in the South, which has been retarded in its development by the discrimination, to the enrichment of other sections. The discrimination in freight rates against North Carolina amounts to \$12,000,000 annually. The tobacco tax takes from the farmers 8 cents on every pound they raise and deprives this State of \$7,000,000 a year, while twenty-five States pay no tobacco tax whatever. The war contribution of \$5,000,000 yearly for Federal pensions, almost none of which comes back to us, ought to cease now that it is nearly half a century since the war. The contribution by each State for pensions should be returned to that State to be distributed by it among its own citizens and their widows.

Neither of my competitors during the twelve years each of them served in Congress has done anything for the relief of the people of this State from the above annual burdens of \$22,000,000. Each of you pays your part to this tribute. Do you wish it stopped?

On 13 May, 1910, Mr. Simmons voted against a bill to prohibit freight discrimination and to send the matter back to the Interstate Commerce Commission which had heretofore done nothing for our relief, and which has done nothing since, and about the same time the tax on tobacco was raised from 6 to 8 cents a pound—an annual addition of \$2,000,000 yearly on our tobacco raisers.

The tobacco tax maintains the existence of the Tobacco Trust by preventing farmers and others from manufacturing tobacco just as the Protective Tariff creates the other Trusts.

In the Senate I shall stand firmly for the removal of the above and other burdens upon our people. The sharp contention between the friends of my two opponents render it unadvisable for the party to nominate either of them.

The great contest between the people and the Special Interests must be fought out in the U. S. Senate and there can do fifty times as much for your good as in the position which I now hold by your good will.

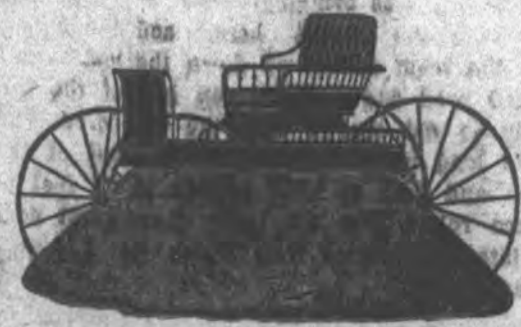

HON. THOMAS SETTLE AND LOCAL OPTION.

The Hon. Thomas Settle, in his speech at Greenville, advocated giving small communities, as villages and townships, the privilege of voting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, just as the majority sees proper to do. He forgets that the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, is a crime per se and the basic principle of all good government, is the extirpation of crime and no majority can make a crime legal, or justifiable. Carry his principle out and we would have no more government than the Beduin Arabs who make no progress in arts and science and but very little in population. He claims to be a Republican but he is far from being one, in principle. He writer voted the ticket and aided with his small ability in framing the platform, one plank of which, was strongly for the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of liquor, another principle was that laws affecting all the people should be uniform throughout the state and nation. These principles have never been changed and our advice to Mr. Settle is to put himself in harmony with the party or get out of it, for there is no hope of ever carrying the state with that kind of leadership. He claimed that prohibition increases crime. But statistics are against him, many of the jails in Maine, the stand by prohibition state, are empty and the percent of crime is much less and taxes much over than in the most favored whiskey states. The same is true of all the other prohibition states, in proportion to the time that has elapsed since they became dry. He claimed that perjury had greatly increased in our state. If this is true and he knows it, as a good citizen, he ought to have the perjurers all arrested, tried, convicted and sentenced to the chain gang and made work upon the roads. If he does not exaggerate the extent of the evil, it would solve the question and we would have good roads in a very few months, throughout the state. We know of no case of the kind or we would report it to the proper officers at once. He

claims that it drains our own state of money to enrich others. We know whiskey men are not as patriotic as they ought to be and do send money to the liquor houses in other states as when we had saloons, for much the greater part of what they sold, came from other states and as more was then used than now, the tax was much greater than at present, hence we are gaining many thousands of dollars as it is. We expect to have a law passed forbidding the shipment of liquor into dry territory very soon and that will greatly increase our gain. He argued that local option would decrease the consumption of liquor and blot out the blind tigers, greased pigs, joints, and other illicit places with equally euphonious names. But again the facts are against him. There are more of these fearful places in local option than in prohibition territory. We once lived in a county of which the county seat had local option and a small majority licensed the twenty saloons in the place. Yet there were more places where it was sold on the sly than were licensed and almost every merchant kept the vile stuff in his store to treat his liberal customers and sell him a supply if he desired. The remainder of the county had prohibition and no places where liquor was sold clandestinely. We are glad to record that since that time the county seat has voted dry to the great benefit of the place. Local option has been a very disgraceful failure wherever tried. We have individual option and if the purplish tinge in the complexion of the would be governor do not commit perjury, he has decided in favor of its use and has carried it out in practice. We feel sure that he is mistaken when he accuses his opponents of taking up a great moral question to call away the attention of the people from their blunders on other questions and holding the intelligent and moral people in the party, for the best element in his own party favored and voted for the law.
