## Ottoman Rule in Europe Doomed With Surrender of Monastir Fort

ORDURATE FIGHT IN WHICH BOTH SIDES LOSE HEAVILY. THOUSANDS OF TURKISH SOL-BUBES LAY DOWN THEIR ARMS.

#### CHOIFRA IN TURKISH BANKS COM PLETES DEFEAT

BHIGRADE, Nov. 18 .- The Turkish fertress of Monastir surrendered this afternoon to the Servian troops.

Fifty thousand Turkish soldiers and three generals laid down their arms.

Constantinople, Nov. 18, 9:45 a. m. -No firing was audible this morning from the direction of the Tachatalja lines. It is thought probable, however, that the great battle begun yesterday continues, but that the direction of the wind prevents the roar of the cannon being heard here.

WITH A SERIES OF APPROPRIA-TIONS TOTALLING \$300,000,000 AMERICA WILL SEE PANAMA CANAL FINALLY OPENED BR-TWEEN ATLANTIC AND PACEF. IC OCEANS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 .- Some time next summer or fall, no exact date being specified, a vessel will pass from the Atlantic to the Pacific acress what is now the Isthmus of Panama, which consequently must d'sappear from the world's geopraphy and by the same human agency the Western Hemisphere will be divided into two continents.

The vessel will not be the Oregon be one of the many small water craft in daily use by the canal builders, and probably the only passengers will be Col. George W. Goethals and the staff of American engineers, who for the past eight years have been carrying on the greatest enineering work the world has ever seen.
