CABRERA TALKS PARTLY FOR CARRANZA CABINET

Several Questions of International Interest Are Up For Discussion.

(By The Associated Press.) Mexico City, Aug. 25.-The highest at issue between the Mexican and American governments with the view of reaching arrangements satisfactory ment of Mexican national interests and Mexican sovereignty, according to declarations made Saturday night by Luis Cabrera, Secretary of the Treasury, and one of the leading members of the cabinet.

These points, as contained in a statement by Senor Cabrera Friday night on the necessity for a reciprocal border-guard service, are petroleum, legislative indemnifications, frontier vigilance and guarantees for the safety of foreigner and foreign interests in Mexico.

With three or four days according to Senor Cabrera the government officials will begin giving out to the Mexican press statements regarding the government standpoint on the questions at issue and the means which Mexican rightfully adopt to meet for declarations of the secretary are some what of an indirect reply to critics of necessary preliminary to meeting the present international problems

Farmers are urged to be pre- Quinerty have returned from Virginia pared to meet the attack as soon as they detect the young worms. A shaking of the plant will reveal their presence and the farmers are advised to examine their beans every few days for the presence of the worms. This brood can be exterminated in some fields and no serious injury will result if the beans are sprayed or dusted in time. Most of the real injury is done by worms which are half grown or older and the careful farmer who is interested in saving his beans will be on the watchout for the first sign of

Mr. Leiby believes that this brood will be heavy enough to completely defoliate beans within a shorter period of time than the last brood and that the beans will suffer more, because most varieties will not be putting out new foliage as they did following the at-
