GOVERNMENT WILL SOON FIX DEFINITE PRICES FOR FUELS

Order for Coal Strike Still Stands Without Few Changes in Any Part

FOOD CONTROLL MEASURE TO BE FULLY ENFORCED

Government Declares That Coal Strike Was Called in an Illegal Manner.

Washington, Oct. 30.—The government will establish the "illegality" of the strike of coal miners "without in any way impairing the general right to strike" as the "general right to strike" is not in issue in any sense whatever in the present situation. It was declared in a statement issued tonight after a conference in the office of Attorney General Palmer, at which he discussed the situation with Secretary Wilson, Director General Hines, Secretary Tumulty and Assistant Attorneys General Ames and Curran.

The statement which it was said fully represents the attitude of the government, declared that the impending coal strike "was ordered in a manner, for a purpose and with a necessary effect, which taken together, put it outside the pale of the law."

The government will act in the strike under the provision of the Lever food control act, enacted as a war measure but still in force.

The position of the government on the impending coal strike was announced tonight by Attorney General Palmer as follows:

Inspection Of Meats Urged In All Towns

Health Consideration Not Being Given Proper Thought, Specialist Says.

MUCH MEAT GETS BY WITHOUT INSPECTION

Over Third of Nation's Supply Is Not Federally Inspected in Every Way.

New Orleans, Oct. 30.—Health considerations alone have failed to cause American cities to the importance of clean meat from sound animals and proper inspection of meat establishments, Dr. John R. Mohler, chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the Department of Agriculture declared today in an address before the American Public Health Association.

Approximately one-third of the meat consumed in the United States is not federally inspected, he declared, because it is sold within the state where it is slaughtered. The federal government has authority to regulate the handling of meat only when it is prepared for interstate shipment or export.

CITY PROPERTY IS SELLING FOR GOOD FIGURE IN COUNTY

Both City and Farm Property Changing Hands Rapidly in Many Sections.

Berlin Funds Being Drained Unmercifully

Workless Support Bonus of Germany Being Drawn Thousands of People

IDLENESS SLOWLY BUT SURELY KILLING SPIRIT

Bonus Is No High in Many Cases That Unskilled Workmen Quit Work

Berlin, Oct. 30.—The "workless support" bonus that thousands upon thousands of men and women now are drawing in Berlin and Germany is proving a heavy drain on the treasury—and it is charged that the bonus is so high that many men who in peace times were unskilled workmen now receive more pay for idleness than if they went back to their labor.

Begun under the streets of the revolution and with the intention of temporarily alleviating distress, complaint is made that this system has become a deeply sucking millions that can ill afford.

The number of unemployed in Berlin during the month of October is estimated to be over a million.

Labor Conference Formally Opens in Washington to Consider Labor.

ORGANIZATION FORMED BY VERSAILLES TREATY

Washington, Oct. 30.—The first meeting of the International Labor Conference, which formally opened here today, is to take steps to obtain the participation of the United States in the conference, although the United States has declared against the organization since the Versailles treaty.

On Monday the United States will be asked to ratify the Versailles treaty.

Helgoland Resuming.

The islanders, forced to migrate the mainland during the war, have come back to Helgoland, and the smallest nation in the world, as the Helgolanders like to call themselves, is hoping that by another season the island will again be a popular summer resort. The thought that most disturbs them is the possibility that the demolition of the fortifications by the entente commission which is presently to arrive for that purpose may work some injury to the natural beauties of Helgoland. A correspondent who went there to have a last look at the German engineering which will soon be demolished, reports a state of general satisfaction among the islanders, and finds that Prussianism seems to have left no impress on the civil population. The feeling is everywhere that the future looks full of promise, and that the past is well got rid of.

Better Stories to Be Told.

"Let me write the songs of the nation and I care not who makes the laws," was the idea of a luncheon given recently by T. Tokonami, minister of home affairs, at his official residence to story tellers and singers from the cheaper amusement halls of Tokio. Japan has hundreds of story-telling halls, which vie with the cinemas in attracting throngs unable to attend more expensive entertainments. Tokonami said that the songs and stories of the people have a great influence on the character of the Japanese community, and he urged his guests to give the public only that which will elevate the mind and character, as well as prove interesting and artistic.—From the Japan Society Bulletin.

New Zealand's Trade With Japs.

Japan's imports into New Zealand are increasing rapidly, and they consist almost entirely of manufactured goods. During the war period large quantities of Japanese goods flooded this market, some of which were of a fairly good quality, but some were very shoddy. The shoddy goods were imported chiefly during 1916 and 1917, since which time the quality of the Japanese manufactures has greatly improved.

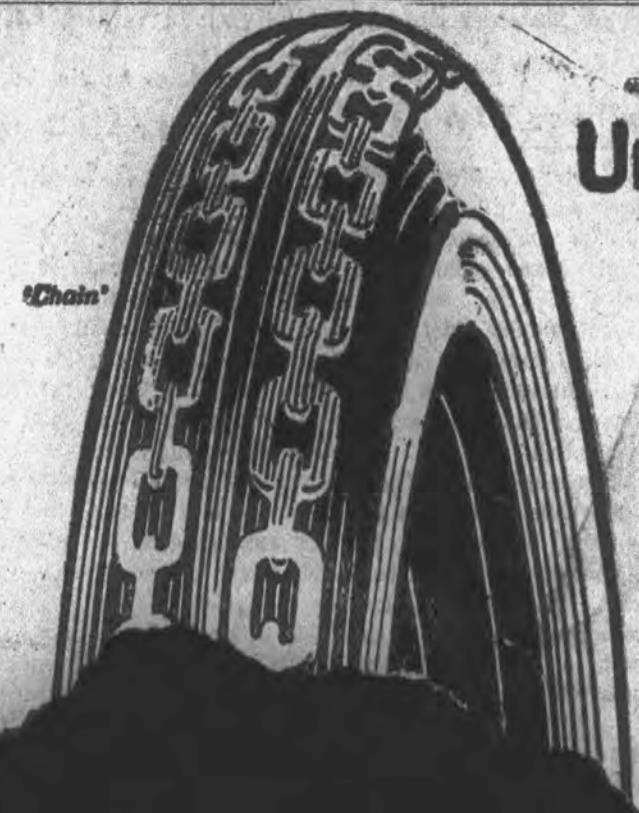

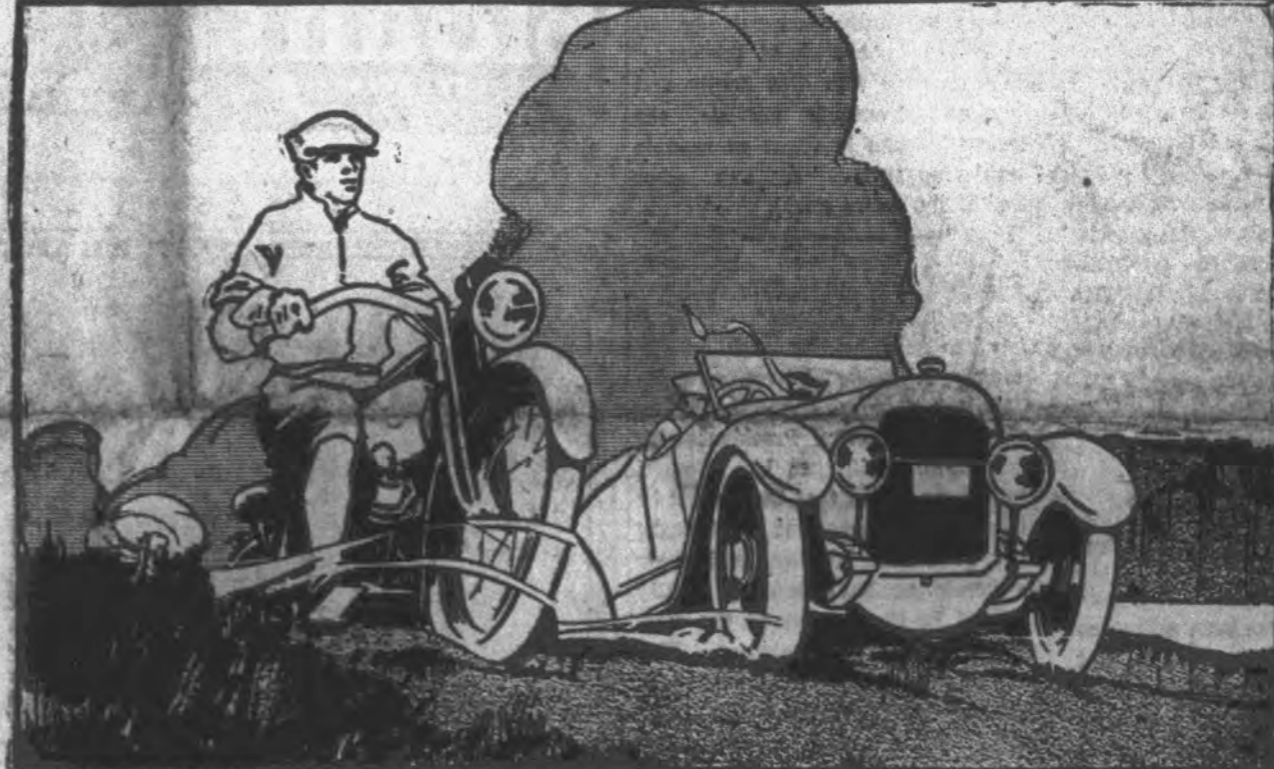

American women have accomplished much during the past several months when their efforts were absolutely necessary in the absence of the country's manhood, and the splendid manner in which they responded to the call of the time and the almost superhuman energy instilled in every endeavor causes us to have faith in establishing that which is absolutely necessary to future peaceful negotiations between countries of the south. Mexico must be won over finally and surely, and if such is possible, the American woman is about as capable of achieving success as any other source of the entire world.

While we have given only ordinary attention to the "liquor question" which has been holding such an important part in senate controversies for the past several days, the action of senators in voting President Wilson's veto insignificant has brought us to the conclusion that there must be some slight disagreement of thought among prominent members and those who heretofore have been so vitally interested in the success of the wartime prohibition amendment. This makes two times that both the senate and house have overridden the president's vetoes, and while, of course, according to law, it is their prerogative, it nevertheless shows inharmonious which may eventually bring about disparagement upon the efforts of some men who might otherwise occupy the enviable position they so ardently desire. Perhaps a short "wet spell" might be objectionable to many people at this time, but as much as we detest the whiskey traffic, it is certain that more good might have resulted from the veto which would have only continued until January when the nation dry enforcement act will be completely effective. Time alone must answer this question, and it is to be hoped the veto will be everything which the broad-visioned senators have anticipated.

Queen Mary's Companion.

Lady Ampthill, who has been a member of the royal household for six years, is a close friend of the queen, and was in attendance upon her majesty during the recent royal visit to the west of England, writes a correspondent. A sister of the present earl of Beauchamp, her ladyship has spent much of her married life abroad, especially in India, where Lord Ampthill was for a period governor of Madras. She proved an exceedingly popular "governor's wife," and when her husband was called upon to take up the role of acting viceroy she assisted him to fill the position with dignity and honor.

Among her personal treasures Lady Ampthill values none more highly than the gold medal of the Kaiser-i-Hind, which was awarded to her in recognition of her public services in India. In Bedfordshire, where her beautiful home at Milton Ernest is situated, Lady Ampthill takes an active part in patriotic and charitable work.

Violin Has Cylindrical Body.

An entire departure from the conventional lines of violin construction has been made in an instrument for which patents have recently been granted to an Illinois inventor, Robert L. Yeakey. The body of the violin is cylindrical in form. However, the sound post and bass-bar in a modified form are necessarily retained. The instrument is provided with a chin rest, so shaped as to be extended laterally while in use and of folding against the instrument when not in use.

The appearance of the violin is most extraordinary, but it is said that the quality and volume of tone is the equal of that found in hand-made violins of conventional construction. The peculiar form involves a simplification in the mode of manufacture and admits of instruments being made almost wholly by machinery, while still possessing excellent tone quality.

Scarlet Fever Serum.

Announcement was made recently at a meeting of the Swedish Medical society by Dr. Carl Kling, bacteriologist at the Carolinian institute of the discovery of a serum for the treatment of scarlet fever.

It was stated that the use of the serum had reduced the mortality in the most severe cases to 17.8-5 per cent as compared with a mortality of over 70 per cent in equally severe cases which were not treated with the serum.

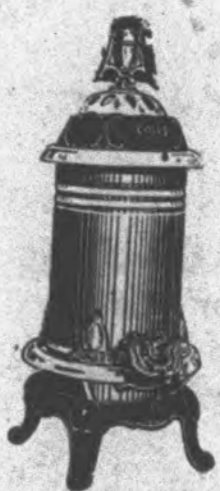

CULTURE HERE BEFORE 1492

Did Civilization Come From Egypt to America? Is the Question Now to Be Decided.

Prof. Elliot Smith has been recently developing in an extraordinary interesting manner the thesis that the pre-Columbian civilizations of America—or at least many important features in those civilizations—were not truly aboriginal, but came in a cultural wave from Asia across the Pacific ocean, the original starting point of the most remarkable characteristics being Egypt, observes a writer in Science Progress.

Professor Smith believes that the extremely peculiar culture of Egypt was spread eastwards by mariners, mainly Phoenicians, for several centuries after B. C. 800. To quote the author's own words, he thinks that "the essential elements of the ancient civilizations of India (the pre-Aryan civilizations), Further India, the Malay archipelago, Oceania and America were brought in succession to each of these places by mariners, whose Oriental migrations began as trading intercourse between the eastern Mediterranean and India some time after 800 B. C., and that the highly complex and artificial culture which they spread abroad was derived largely from Egypt (not earlier than the twenty-first dynasty), but also included many important accretions" from other sources, and that after traversing Asia and Oceania, and becoming modified on the way, the stream finally "continued for many centuries to play upon the Pacific littoral of America, where it was responsible for planting the germs of the remarkable pre-Columbian civilization."

SUMMER CAPITAL OF INDIA

Simla, the Most English City From London to Melbourne, Increases in Population During Year.

The British empire never gives the sun a chance to set on it, but of all the cities from London to Melbourne that fly the Union Jack, the most English is Simla, summer capital of India. It is more English than anything in England, as though the English in India were stirred to a more aggressive Anglicism by their distance from home.

Simla has been pictured to all the world in Kipling's "Plain Tales," states a writer, but it has changed a good deal since the era set forth in those sketches. The railroad from Kalka was completed years ago and the long journey from the rail head to Simla in the tonga, or native cart, which was one of the unforgettable experiences of the visitor in the early days, is hardly a memory now. The sailing time from the Indian ports to Europe has been cut in half since Kipling wrote and, altogether, Simla is much more a part of the world. Yet it keeps its characteristic flavor in spite of modern improvements.

It is a summer city. In winter there are perhaps 15,000 people there, most of them natives. In the hot weather the population goes up to 40,000 or more. Most of the newcomers are officers of some importance in the Indian world—men on leave from a hundred scattered districts, men from lonely frontier posts and fever smitten southern provinces, men who act as official advisers to the kings of semi-independent native states, meeting their own people in numbers for the first time in a twelvemonth.
