SENATE TO EXERT PRESSURE TO GET TREATY COMPLETE

Leaders of Both Political Parties Dissatisfied Over Present Situation.
RESERVATIONISTS ARE RELYING ON MR. LODGE
Senate Leader Informed that Time Has Come for Parting Company of Foes.

Washington, Dec. 27.—Dissatisfied with the progress made toward solution of the peace treaty tangle, Senators of both political parties moved today to bring greater pressure on their party leaders for a compromise to insure ratification promptly on the assembling of congress early in January.

The mild reservation group of Republicans notifying their party leader, Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, that in their opinion the time had come to part company with the intractable foe of the treaty, declared that unless compromise negotiations of more whole-hearted support came from the Republican side they were preparing to act independently for an agreement with the Democrats.

Among the Democrats the movement was not so well defined, but criticism of the course of President Wilson and Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, the acting Democratic leader, reached proportions where some predicted that it would be given tangible form. One prominent Democratic Senator was said to have told the Republicans that more than thirty of the forty-seven on that side would join a movement to ratify the treaty at once on the best terms they could get.

The effect was a scrambled situation in both party organizations, which which the leaders seemed confident they could straighten out, but which the compromise advocates predicted would greatly strengthened the movement for a bipartisan conference of those determined to ratify the treaty at expense of material concessions on both sides.

The feeling among the those who are ready to go ahead without their leaders seemed to be that the treaty deadlock already had been prolonged unnecessarily by too much no-compromise talk, and that both sides had overplayed a waiting game in the hope that a break would come in the opposition.

After their conference Sunday with Senator Lodge, the mild reservation Republicans seemed confident that he would take the initiative if necessary carrying the compromise negotiations forward. On Monday he saw Senator Underwood, of Alabama, a prominent Democratic advocate of a compromise, but it was said today that their talk got no where.

Meantime it became known that the irreconcilable group of Republicans had been bringing pressure to bear to induce the party leader not to consent to any compromise proposals which did not meet their approval. Senator Johnson, of California, one of the leaders of this group, telegraphed today that he would change his plans and return to the Capital from his home next week.

GERMAN CABINET DISCUSSES LAST NOTE FROM ENTENTE

Berlin, Dec. 27.—The cabinet briefly discussed the entente's last note demanding signing of the protocol. Officials circles regard the note as evidence that the supreme council is playing politics.

REVOLUTIONARY SOCIALISTS FORM GOVERNMENT IN SIBERIA

Paris, Dec. 27.—Revolutionary socialists have formed a committee government in Irkutsk, Siberia, where the All-Russian government of Admiral Kolchak established its headquarters after being driven from Omsk, according to news from French officials circles. The revolutionists took possession of Irkutsk railway station.

MANY PITTSBURGH CONCERNS SELLING FOODS FOR COSTS

Employees in Hundreds Industries Enjoying Liberality of Employers.
HIGH COST OF LIVING REDUCED IN MANY WAYS
Big Manufacturing Plants Buy Necessaries and Sell to Their Workmen.

Pittsburgh, Dec. 27.—A number of important manufacturing concerns in this city are selling food and clothing at cost to their employees, in an effort to meet the advancing price of commodities.

One company buys for its workmen every two weeks a carload of flams and bacon. This is shipped direct from the packer to the mill, and there sold to the men at cost, plus the transportation charge. The president of the company endorses it as one of the best things he has ever done for his men.

Another concern has been supplying many of its mill and office employees with canned goods, wearing apparel, including overcoats and shoes, and even children's shoes. The saving was such as to make the wage earners enthusiastic.

Employees of another big manufacturing plant rented a store, stocked it with groceries, bought through use of the company's credit, and in a few weeks were doing a business of \$2,000 a day. Only employees of the company buy in the store. The price to the buyer is first cost plus rent, light, clerk hire and freight.

"We started with groceries," said the manager looking over his well kept stock with pride, "but lately we added such clothing as the men wear while working."

GERMANY GRAVELY CONCERNED ABOUT MILITARY AFFAIRS

German Delegates to Present Views Preparatory to Settling Issue.

Berlin, Dec. 27.—Germany is gravely concerned over the military demonstrations which attend the recent arrival in Berlin of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg when he came to testify before the committee of the national assembly.

The pan-German newspapers loudly rejoice and are gleeful over the fact that an honor company of the national defence troops was called out to stand guard around the railway station when Hindenburg entered the city. They tell with joy how Hindenburg and Ludendorff received the company and how the crowd pressed around the two former military leaders kissing their hands and clothing.

On the other hand the Vorwarts, the socialist newspaper, denounces the whole affair as a political demonstration with a Pan-German coloring. The paper blamed Major General Reinhardt, commander of the Berlin troops for executing this trick and criticised the government for allowing him to do so. General Reinhardt has since been ordered to retire from the army.

Baron Von Richthofen, addressing the democratic assembly at Lankwitz, said: "The latest events in Berlin have increased abroad the belief in Germany's democracy and the stability of the new German republic. The military demonstrations cannot possibly induce the English and especially the French to leave us the docks and railways which we need for the reconstruction of our economic life."

PEACE TREATY TO BE CONSIDERED IN FINAL CONFERENCE

Recent Arrival of Von Hindenburg in Berlin Causes Much Speculation.

Paris, Dec. 27.—Conference will begin here early next week between allied and German delegates on measures preparatory to putting the peace treaty in effect. It was announced today. The sessions will be held under the presidency of General Lerond, a member of the French delegation.

Herr von Simson will head the German delegation. British and Italian delegations will arrive here Monday to take part in the deliberations.

The supreme council did not hold session today but announced a meeting for tomorrow.

The allied reply to the latest German note regarding the peace treaty protocol was published here today.

The first paragraph of the reply expresses satisfaction that the German government shares the view of the allies that the dispositions of the treaty of peace are applicable from the moment of the treaty's entry into force, whether ratification by the United States has or has not occurred. The allies take note that Germany admits a principle that no contracting party to defer to the non-participation of the United States in the first disposal of ratification documents as a ground for questioning any stipulation of the treaty.

The third paragraph expresses the determination of the allies to insist upon demanding the signing of the protocol with the provision regarding compensation for the sinking of the German warships in Scapa Flow unchanged.

TWELVE NEGROES ARE CONVICTED OF MURDER IN ELAINE

Sentenced to Die as Result of Participation in Insurrection.
SIXTY-THREE ARE GIVEN LONG SENTENCES IN JAIL
Executions Will Occur Today and Early in the Month of January.

Little Rock, Ark., Dec. 27.—Twelve negroes were convicted of murder in connection with the insurrection near Elaine, Ark., early in October. Six were ordered to be executed on January 2, and the remaining six on January 3.

Five white men were killed and red were wounded in the outbreak. Those killed were W. A. Adkins, James A. Tappan, Clinton Lee, R. H. Lilly and Corporal Luther Earle. The number of negroes killed has been estimated at 15 to 25. The negroes sentenced to death were Ed. Chapman, Frank Hicks, Joe Fox, William Wood, Albert Giles, Ed Hicks, Frank Moore, Joe E. Knox, John Martin, Paul Hall, Alfred Banks, Jr., and Ed. Ware. In addition 63 were given sentences in prison ranging from 1 to 21 years.

The disorder had its beginning on the night of September 30 last, when 100 or more armed negroes gathered in a small church at Hoop Spur, Ark., at night to discuss ways of restoring to the hands of the white people of the community.

Negro sentries stationed about the church fired upon a deputy sheriff's automobile killing W. A. Adkins. This precipitated the "insurrection" which the negroes had planned to start a few days later.

HERO WANTED FOR STEALING \$15,000 IN FEDERAL BANK

Arthur Abbott, War Hero, Makes Away With Money But Captured Later
RELEASED ON PROBATION BY THE WAR DEPARTMENT
High Recommendations From General Petain Bring About His Release

Doston, Dec. 27.—How Arthur E. Abbott, long wanted as a fugitive from justice for the theft of \$15,000 from the Federal Trust company of this city, enlisted in the marines and as Sergeant Wm. H. Haskell and was cited for brilliant war service was disclosed today when it was announced that he had been set free on probation by the district attorney and that he had received the Croix de Guerre officially under his right name.

Abbott, who was employed as a bank bookkeeper at \$20 a week, disappeared in the fall of 1917 after the bank loss was known and it was learned that he had been living like a man of wealth and leisure away from his family. He evaded a nation-wide search and enlisted in the marine corps at New Orleans as Haskell and served overseas with the sixth regiment. He was one of the forty-four men left the famous thirteen hundred marines who went through the Argonne. He was cited for bravery after capturing machine gun and nine prisoners near Vaux-la-Petite on July 19, 1918.

After receiving an honorable discharge last January he immediately enlisted, again as Haskell. He was stationed aboard the United States ship Dolphin in July and ordered to Portsmouth, N. H., where he was re-enlisted and arrested. District Attorney (Continued on page four.)

FRANCE TO START THE NEW YEAR IN SPLENDID SPIRITS

Nation Looking Forward to Future With Greater Confidence than Ever
RECENT ELECTION ELATE THOUSANDS OF PERSONS
People Inspired to Grapple With Problems Through Radical Changes.

Paris, Dec. 27.—France will begin the new year with far greater confidence than the last. This is in spite of formidable handicaps such as the balance of trade running against her at the rate of about 1,500,000,000 francs a month, about 50 percent depreciation of the exchange value of the franc and the consequent difficulty of procuring raw materials and machines, urgently needed for reconstruction.

France's renewed confidence is derived directly from the result of the recent elections. These are regarded here as having definitely stabilized internal politics, ended all danger of revolutionary agitation for some time to come and brought about a better attitude by capital and labor toward the immense effort before France.

Money is forthcoming for investments in anything that promises stability. While investments in short-term treasury bonds are continuing at the rate of nearly 2,000,000,000 of francs a month, there is plenty of money for industrial and commercial enterprises and long-term loans. The 600,000,000 franc loan to provide immediate resources for indemnifying victims of the invasion was oversubscribed before the official opening of the subscriptions. Important banks and industrial companies have lately increased their capital to an aggregate of 1,000,000,000 francs.

MACHINISTS NOT IN FAVOR OF RECENT STRIKE PROVISIONS

Declare They Will Not Submit to Provisions of Bill Against Strikes.
PRESIDENT SERVES FULL NOTICE TO CONGRESSMEN
Voted Month Ago for Immediate Walkout if Issue Proved Successful.

Washington, Dec. 27.—Organized railway machinists through their president, served notice on congress today that they would not submit to enactment of the Cummins railroad bill, with its drastic anti-strike provision.

Voting more than a month ago, 98 per cent of the 125,000 members of the union favored an immediate walkout in event of the bill's passage by both houses of the congress but the result was not made known through fear that the brotherhoods might appear in the light of attempting to coerce the law making branch of the government.

The machinists, according to William H. Johnston, president of the international association, are the only railway employees who have taken a strike vote but the heads of all the brotherhoods, fourteen in all, have been summoned to meet here Monday to consider pending railway legislation and define precisely their position on the clause in the Cummins bill which would prevent strikes and put strikers in jail.

The call for the conference was issued by Senator Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, but Mr. Gompers and other labor leaders refused to discuss probable action by the Brotherhood leaders. President Wilson's Christmas eve announcement that the roads would be handed back to their owners March 1 was a distinct appointment to labor leaders, who had been pleading for a two-year extension of government control. They agreed, however, that if the roads were to go back it was a good thing to let it be known.

There was no meeting today of house and senate conferees who have been assigned the task framing a new railroad bill out of the Esch and Cummins measures. This work, however, will begin next week, in the hope of final enactment of railroad legislation sometime in the next two months. The anti-strike section is known to be the main point of difference, and while it was left intact in the bill passed by the senate, house leaders frankly expressed doubt today whether the house would accept it.

HERTFORD GRIMES SHOT AND KILLED OVER LOVE AFFAIR

Brother Also Injured by Fernando Stancill When the Latter is Attacked.

Last night a few miles from town on the north side of the river Fernando Stancill, colored, shot and killed Hertford Grimes, colored, and seriously wounded Grimes' brother. From all reports the shooting was the result of a love affair, one of the Grimes men being jealous of Stancill. Early in the evening the two brothers, armed, went to the home of the girl and there awaited the arrival of Stancill. After waiting for quite awhile, in which time their victim did not show up, they went out in search of him, with the intention, it is believed, of killing him, just as they reached the home of Mr. Pink Pollard the three men met, and after exchanging a few words, Stancill in some mysterious way managed to take Hertford Grimes' gun away from him and also his brother's, with above results. Sheriff Dudley was immediately notified and he at once went to the scene of the murder. Stancill, feeling that he had shot in self defense, did not make any attempt to get away, and was brought to this city and placed in jail. Upon searching the dead man \$20 with a few other personal belongings were found, while the wounded man only had about \$2.50. He is in a serious condition this morning, and it is hard to ascertain the extent of his injuries.

FURTHER PROTESTS ARE MADE AGAINST SIBERIAN OPERATIONS

Mexico City, Dec. 27.—The Mexican foreign office has announced that it has had no further advices from Mazatlan where two American sailors recently were imprisoned, following an alleged attack upon Mexicans. The foreign office has received formal representations from Washington.

POLICE BEGIN INVESTIGATION INTO BAD WHISKEY TRAFFIC

New York, Dec. 27.—Federal agents, health authorities and police officials in many eastern cities were stirred into action today against the traffic in whiskey made of wood alcohol, following a wave of death and blindness from this cause in Massachusetts and Connecticut. The death list in these states totals more than thirty today. Arrests are expected here today in connection with deaths in New England.

EXPORTS AND IMPORTS GAIN

The marks set by both exports and imports in November were the second highest in the history of American foreign trade, according to an announcement made today by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, department of commerce.

The value of exports for the month was \$741,000,000 as compared with \$632,000,000 for October, and \$522,000,000 for November of the previous year. For the 11 months ended with November, the total value of exports was \$7,242,000,000, against \$5,583,000,000 for the corresponding period of 1918.

Imports in November amounted to \$420,000,000, against \$402,000,000 in October of this year, and \$251,000,000 in November of last year. For the 11 months of this year, imports were \$3,528,000,000, compared with \$2,820,000,000 in the first 11 months of last year. If the foreign trade continues in December at the same rate as in November, the imports for the calendar year will approach \$4,000,000,000 in value and the exports \$8,000,000,000.

The excess of exports in November amounted to \$312,000,000 and for the 11 months to \$3,714,000,000, nearly \$1,000,000,000 more than in the 11 months of 1918.

of nearly 500,000,000,000 francs.

Transactions on the Paris bourse which still are confined to cash deals have exceeded on certain days records of pre-war trading when futures entered largely into the totals. The upward movement of all industrial which began before the signature of the treaty at Versailles has been unchecked by successive liquidations. This is regarded by keen observers here as a sure sign of economic recovery.

Employers say the labor situation is improved and that the last strikes developed symptoms that the workers themselves were becoming weary of long continued disturbances of business, industry and transportation. They see a tendency against frivolous strikes

and an indication that only real grievances will induce the wage earners to quit work hereafter.

Later, seventy-five negroes were gathered together and on the following day some of their number were upon a crowd of white people gathered at the scene of the Adkins killing. The negroes then scattered in the swamps but were rounded up and captured by federal troops. One group of the negroes attempted to take a machine-gun manned by regulars and kill but one of the negroes was killed.
