BOOKS FOR EVERYBODY.

Sixty million persons in the United States today, more than half the population, are practically or wholly without library service. For a large proportion of the other 40 per cent. libraries are not readily accessible. Opportunities for self-education through the best books are therefore limited to a relatively small number.

In order to overcome this situation, the American Library Association has launched a "Books for Everybody" movement with the ultimate aim of

bringing to every man, woman and child in the country free and easy access to the best reading and opportunity for self-instruction.

Recent investigations by the U. S. Bureau of Education show that a very small percentage of the counties in the nation have any one library with 5,000 volumes or more; that thirty states serve less than 50 per cent of their population and one serves less than 2 per cent. By promoting library service wherever needed, and in co-operation with existing library agencies the Association plans to set aside this

condition and open up every avenue of self-education for those now deprived of facilities.

In the knowledge that better books make for better citizenship, the Association will encourage the translation of the best reading into the various

foreign tongues for the benefit of the hamlet, village and town. To carry out this broad program a fund of \$2,000,000 will be obtained not through an intensive drive, but by individual efforts of librarians, library trustees and friends of libraries.

FORTY CASES ARE HEARD IN SUPERIOR COURT THIS WEEK

Atlantic Coast Line railroad, the court returned a verdict providing that the plaintiff receive nothing for mashing his thumb in the door of one of the passenger trains operating in this district. Compromise proceedings were granted in the case of J. R. Smith & Brother vs. Eddie Edwards. Compromise proceedings were also taken in the case of Luke Willoughby vs. Norfolk & Southern railroad, the agreement providing that the defense pay the plaintiff the sum of \$250 for damage to woodland on his premises. Similar action was also taken in the case of Norman Willoughby vs. Norfolk & Southern railroad, the terms of agreement being practically the same of the above case.
