

WOMAN SUFFRAGE
MEETS DEFEAT IN
DELAWARE SENATE

Mrs. Chapman Says Suffrage Will Now Look to Governor Bickett for Aid

AMENDMENTS DISPOSED
WITHIN TWELVE MINUTES

Grandstand Play of Luke-warm Supporters Fails to Produce Effect.

State House, Dover, Del., April 1.—Delaware, tiniest State in everything except area and production of powder, has decidedly turned down its chance to become the thirty-sixth and last State needed to ratify the suffrage amendment to the Federal constitution which, when ratified, will give women throughout the United States the right to vote as men do.

Action came in the lower branch of the Delaware legislature this afternoon when 25 of a possible 34 members voted to reject the resolution of ratification sponsored by Assemblyman Hart. A moment later "Bull" McNabb, leader of the bi-partisan opposition, moved re-consideration of the vote by which the resolution failed to pass and after obtaining a majority called for a second vote on the ratification resolution. This time all 34 members of the House voted to reject it.

It does not mean the end of the fight here, according to representatives of the National Women's Party. Assemblyman Lyons, who has been championing the fight in the lower branch, says that it will be brought up again next week.

Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, representative here, while not admitting final defeat of the amendment in Delaware, said this afternoon that the guns of the suffragists will be trained at once on Governor Bickett in the hope that he may reconsider his former statement relative to calling an extra session. Early action by the Governor of North Carolina, with ratification considered practically certain, would give to the Democratic party the credit for making it possible for the women to participate in the coming presidential primaries.

It required just twelve minutes this afternoon to dispose of the amendment, the vote coming as a climax to nine days' hard work by both the "antislavery" and the suffragists. Every effort had been made by local suffragists to bring the rebels in the lower branch around, but the delay had only served to stiffen the opposition. In some quarters National Committeeman Dupont has been accused of insincerity in urging his Republican following in the legislature to ratify the amendment. It was broadly hinted today that Dupont is not at all sorry the amendment failed of ratification.

A grandstand attempt of the lukewarm supporters of suffrage to bring Alfred I. Dupont, the real boss of the Sussex county Republicans, whose opposition made passage of the resolution impossible, to Dover today fell flat. Although he announced two years ago his retirement from active political life, it is well known that he directs the wing of the party for which Dan Layton, State Chairman, is the whip. Layton has steadfastly opposed ratification because of personal antagonism to the governor, in spite of the fact that his father, Delaware's lone member in the lower house of congress, has apparently sought to use his influence in behalf of ratification.

CLERGYMAN, THIEF AND
INCENDIARY ARRESTED

Vienna, April 2.—A clergyman, Thos. Pfefferkorn, alleged to be the leader of a band of 25 thieves and incendiaries, has been arrested with his followers at the town Mittersell, according to the Salzburger Volksblatt. Pfefferkorn, the papers say, recruited his followers from among persons of some standing in the town of Mittersell, including the postmaster and the postmistress, and the letter carrier. They are alleged to have burglarized the Inn and then set fire to it and to have practiced blackmail on a number of prominent citizens.

NEGOTIATIONS FOR
WAGE AGREEMENTS
BROUGHT TO CLOSE

Railway Representatives Decided to Await Sentiment of the Public.

CONTROVERSY WILL BE
CONCLUDED BY BOARD

Demands Go Into Billion Dollars which Public Would Have to Pay.

Washington, April 1.—Wage negotiations between the conference committees representing the railroads and the unions were broken off tonight when the railroad representatives declined to continue consideration of demands which have been estimated to total \$1,000,000,000 unless the public was given a voice in the proceedings.

Under the provisions of the transportation act, the wage controversy now will be referred to the railroad labor board, which is yet to be appointed by President Wilson. The law provides for three representatives of the public on this board.

E. T. Whiter, chairman of the railway executives conference committee, announced the decision in a statement which said the two sides were in disagreement as to the provisions of the transportation act. The union representatives were said to hold that the law contemplated an agreement between the railroads and the employees prior to any opportunity for participation by the representatives of the public.

Mr. Whiter's statement said in part: "The representatives of the railroads take the position that they could not assume the responsibility of adding a burden to the costs of transportation, which are necessarily borne by the public, without the full knowledge and consent of the public, through its representatives and that they must therefore decline the requests and let the entire matter be disposed of as provided in the transportation act."

STATE JEWRY WILL
APPEAR FOR FUNDS
FOR WAR DISTRICT

Funds Will be Collected for Sufferers in Eastern Part of Europe.

PROMINENT STATE JEWS
WILL DIRECT CAMPAIGN

Report from Foreign Committee Tells of Acute Suffering Among People.

Greensboro, April 2.—As a Passover gift for the aid of their suffering people in Eastern Europe, who are beginning their sixth year of starvation and misery as a result of the war, North Carolina Jewry under the leadership of E. Sternberger of Greensboro, will make an appeal for relief funds April 4th to 10th.

Passover, the great Jewish holiday of feasting, comes during these dates, and Mr. Sternberger and other leading Jews of the state considered it most appropriate that while they are enjoying the bounties of a prosperous country, it would be fitting to aid as within their means, the 6,000,000 Jews in Eastern Europe, who have been facing death by starvation and disease for so many years.

Last year North Carolina, with Lionel Well of Goldsboro, as State chairman, raised over \$170,000 for Jewish relief, which was one of the best proportionate showings of any state. Henry H. Rosenfelt, director of the American Jewish Relief Committee, declared Mr. Well was unable to serve as state chairman this year, owing to illness in his family, but Mr. Sternberger volunteered to head the state organization and attempt to duplicate the splendid record made by North Carolina last year.

In appealing to prominent Jews throughout the state asking them to serve as chairman in their cities, Mr. Sternberger said:

"Conditions in Eastern Europe are far worse now than they have ever been before. Six million Jews, including over 1,000,000 children are enduring terrible suffering and are facing

BURGLAR RIDDLED
WITH SHOT WHILE
ENTERING STORE

William Rush, Colored, Shot Watchman While Robbing Grimesland Store.

While attempting to rob the store of Clark Bros. in Grimesland early this morning, William Rush, colored, was shot by Mr. Sam Holliday.

Rush accompanied by a white man, an expert safe blower, has been causing a great deal of trouble in this territory. Last evening they entered several stores in Grimesland prior to entering Clark Bros. Mr. Holliday, who was guarding the store, hid in a secluded part of the building, and saw the negro enter, leaving the white man on the outside. As he approached the cash drawer, Mr. Holliday shot, with the result of 17 or 18 buckshot taking effect in the right thigh. The wounded man was brought to Greenville, and upon searching him, about twenty rings were found tied up in his shirt.

The white man made his escape and it is believed that he left Grimesland on the early morning train.

Rush is resting very well, and physicians are confident that he will recover.

CITY ALDERMEN IN
MONTHLY MEETING
HERE LAST NIGHT

Several Important Matters in City's Interest Taken Up During the Session

EXTENSION OF SEWER IN
MANY SECTIONS GRANTED

Enlargement of Cemetery Considered, and Investigation Ordered.

The board of aldermen met in regular session last night, with every member present, being presided over by Mayor Clark.

Attorney James Erans appeared before the board in reference to the extension of Tenth street, ceding to the down this street as extended through the property of Forbes and Gilbert, and asked that sewer and water lines be run through this extension. It was decided that these lines be not laid until Forbes and Gilbert have filed, either in the office of the town clerk or the court house, a map of this ceded annex. Mr. J. E. Winslow appeared before the board, asking that the side of Clark street be paved to Dickinson avenue, or to his property line, so far as the board saw fit. The request was granted.

Dr. Thigpen asked for a sewer. It was ordered that sewer be run up Fourth street, easterly to the line of the corporate limits of the town. Mrs. F. V. Johnston appeared before the board asking for relief of existing conditions existing between Gorman & Gentry's warehouses and Johnston & Foxhall's warehouse, stating that the street as it now stands turns all drainage on his property. The street committee reported this matter without recommendation, and asked that a body be appointed to review the situation. A civil engineer is to be sent to have that street graded properly and all property owners are to be required to remove superfluous matter. Engineer is to report at the next meeting. Mr. Johnston then asked for a drain at warehouse No. 2, stating that the cost would not be over \$40. This matter

REPUBLICAN PARTY
PUTS FINAL TOUCH
ON PLAN OF PEACE

Effort Will be Made to Put Measure Through House During Next Week.

CUMMINGS PLUNGES INTO
AFFAIRS OF REPUBLICANS

Democratic Chairman Says Moral Capacity of Party at Low Standard.

Washington, April 1.—Republican leaders in the house completed today their plans to put through a week from tomorrow a resolution declaring the state of war with Germany at an end. The measure was favorably reported today by the foreign affairs committee and will be taken up next Thursday under a nine-hour debate rule which will bring the vote on Friday.

Action of the Republicans drew the fire tonight of Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the Democratic National committee. In a statement to press representatives he said it marked "about the lowest point of moral capacity to which Republican leadership has descended." It was an attempt, he added, to use the treaty of Versailles "without first accepting it" and probably would lead to international complications, "the seriousness of which bit is difficult at this time to conjecture."

The resolution was reported on a strict party vote by the foreign affairs committee. Representative Huddleston, Democrat, Alabama, refused to vote, but his colleagues on the committee all opposed the report.

Later Republican leaders revised their plan to call the measure up Monday because of the probable absence of members on that day and before the holidays. They had no doubt that it would be adopted, although the Democrats were lining up against it, but were not equally confident that the necessary two-thirds to carry it over a Presidential veto could be obtained.

In that connection Mr. Cummings said he did not think "for one moment" that the President would sign such a resolution. He said the House was attempting to exercise powers it did not possess.

Discussing the general political situation, Mr. Cummings indicated that the Democratic leaders expected to have the aid of the President in the coming campaign.

"I hope that the President will be able to participate actively in the campaign, he said. "He is improved in health and while he may not be able to take the stump, he can still write and he can always be heard through his writings."

He said he had not discussed this phase lately with the President, but that he had had "little difficulty in ascertaining the President's position on questions which I deem crucial."

Asked for the Democratic view of the announcement of Herbert Hoover as a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, Mr. Cummings said: "It is always a bad thing to see an essential Democrat attempt to oil-balance a stand-pat party. Suppose we let that stand."

Mr. Cummings said he assumed that the question of a more liberal construction of the Volstead prohibition enforcement act would be before the San Francisco convention and also the Chicago convention.

STEEL MILLS ELIMINATE
FEAR OF NAIL SHORTAGE

Pittsburg, April 2.—By increasing the production of nails 15 percent, steel mills in the Pittsburgh district have eliminated fear of a shortage.

Building booms in New York, Chicago, Detroit and a number of other cities have drawn heavily upon the supply of nails on hand, and builders had begun to fear for the immediate future of their work. Pittsburgh contractors took up the question with the mills, and full speed ahead was ordered, with the result that production soon overtook consumption, and authorities now say there is enough nails for all building projects in sight.

KOREAN TAXI IS A WOMAN



Bearing "Jiggs" Strapped To Her Shoulders, She Transports Loads.

When an American wants to travel, he telephones for a taxicab. But in Korea the taxis are "jiggs,"—baskets of wood and bamboo. The front view of the "jiggs" gives the impression of a spreading fan, but in the rear is a platform on which the trunks or other baggage are placed. The children are piled on top of the boxes and the strange moving van bobs away.

Perhaps a boy only fifteen or sixteen years old will play the part of beast of burden, but it is generally a Korean woman who tests her strength to the breaking point as she carries a steamer trunk down the street.

The condition of women and children in foreign lands is a problem to which the new Interchurch World Movement, in which America's Protestant bodies are cooperating, has been asked to give special attention. To this end, schools and social centers are to be established at various points throughout Korea, while a central union college also is to be staffed and equipped at the expense of the churches of America.

SALVATION ARMY WORK.

That the Salvation Army never deserts the flag but stays on the job as long as there is an American soldier on duty wherever that may be is shown by the fact that five Salvation Army centers are still in operation for the American forces on the Rhine, according to Major Walter B. Mabee, of the Salvation Army, who has just returned from occupied Germany.

So popular are these clubs with the doughboys, says Major Mabee, that the American military authorities have issued orders that they remain closed until 1 o'clock each day as the doughboys are required to work during the mornings. From opening time until midnight, however, the clubs are running full blast and all of the mere always crowde dto the limit.

"At the Soldiers' club and cafeteria in Coblenz," says Major Mabee, "we take care of about 2,000 men a day, and say we turn out the best cocoa, coffee, doughnuts and pies in Germany."

Buenos Aires, 1st. — Interchange of news between North and South America through connection of the South American newspapers with the news agencies and newspapers of the United States has brought about "a zetter and more thorough feeling of commercial and social brotherhood in every nation than would have been possible in anything less than decades under other conditions," Don Jorge Mitre, director of La Nacion told members of the American Club, of Buenos Aires, at a luncheon recently. Speaking as a published Mr. Mitre, said, "I consider this to be one of the great missions of journalism."

"After all," he asserted, "the greatest service a newspaper or a news agency can render to the country in which it is located, in particular, and to the world in general, is to spread informative items that will assist prospective investors, merchants, bankers or any other person interested in obtaining a definite and true knowledge of conditions in a country where their future may lie."

Mr. Mitre said the ideals and duties of the newspapers in the upper and lower halves of the western hemisphere were the same. "The methods of newspaper making are different," he added, "and even these differences are becoming smaller and smaller."

Several prominent politicians have declined to have their names placed as possible candidates for the presidency, which, considering the great number of those desiring such honors, is slightly out of the ordinary.

General Wood, in counting prospective votes, possibly doesn't mean to be equivocal in the least, but still he causes one to believe he has practically all states in his favor. However, we may learn better later.

Probably now that the 27 per cent wage increase has been granted bituminous miners in this country we will be able to keep the coal bin better supplied. But there are several months intervening between now and the winter, and another increase may be required by that time.

Joint resolutions have been introduced in the house declaring the state of war between the United States and Germany at an end. How can peace be declared when the treaty remains unsigned. It may be one kind of peace, but not the unmistakable kind which people of this country so ardently desire.

It is to be hoped every person in town will assist public organizations in making the week April 5th a real clean-up week sure enough. The Boy Scouts surely will do their part in making the city a fit place in which to live, and if public-spirited co-operation should be in evidence pleasing results will be visible early in the campaign. Mothers, teachers and preachers should keep the occasion in the minds of all persons with whom they come in contact during the next few days, because if this should be done the week will be one or more than usual significance in every section of town. Let "clean-up" be the dominant slogan for April.

ERADICATE THE TICK.

The importance of tick eradication has not yet been fully realized by stock growers in this county for the destruction of several vats through dynamiting process has occurred several times recently, showing plainly that certain classes of farmers are not fully cognizant of the splendid future before them should the vats be used for their intended purpose instead of being destroyed. The following editorial comment from the Shreveport, (La.), Times dealing with the question will be read with no little interest, as the article unequivocally tells of the success of eradication work in that state, which would have been made impossible if cattle raisers had not co-operated with government and county officers in this important matter.

"The late cattle census as issued by the United States crop estimate report, shows some interesting and valuable data for the Louisiana stock raiser. It is well to ponder over and digest these facts in figures because it spells possibilities yet to be had in a country that is by its natural resources coming to the front as a livestock state.

"In the year 1918 we had 930,000 cattle at a valuation of \$30,855,000, that was the year the state wide tick eradication law became in force. The eradication of the tick naturally enhanced the weight, consequently the value of the cattle induced a better sire, better stock, campaign. In two years of systematic dipping building up of our native cattle, the importation of approximately 5,000 head of purebred and high grade males and approximately 13,000 purebred dairy cows and heifers within the past 10 months has contributed materially to the 1920 census of 1,103,000 head at a valuation of \$46,568,000. This increases the state's assets in cattle \$15,713,000, in the period of two years, since tick eradication began. Adding to this let us take in consideration that losses by death from tick fever is reduced to a minimum and where ticks have been totally eradicated it is all coming in and nothing going out.

"Does tick eradication pay? We say it does, don't you?"

Relief funds are being used to fight the terrible epidemic, but owing to lack of medicines and clothing as well as to the undernourished condition of the people, it is almost impossible to combat it and the report states that it threatens all of Eastern Europe.

WOULD PROSECUTE LABOR'S NON-PARTISAN CAMPAIGN

Washington, April 2. — Steps to mobilize 150,000 workers into 50,000 committees to prosecute labor's non-partisan political campaign were taken today by the campaign executive committee, composed of Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison and James O'Connell. Requests were sent to 40,000 local unions, asking immediate appointment of a committee of three by each to act in conjunction with 10,000 other committees named by city central bodies and other organizations, "all working in harmony under a carefully worked-out scheme of co-operation," according to announcement by American Federation of Labor headquarters.

"In 1906 the American Federation of Labor non-partisan political campaign was carried on with striking success by 1,450,000 members," the executives committee's letters to the local unions said. "In February 1920 there were \$4,079,770. By unity and solidarity we have made this wonderful progress. With an increased membership and the same unity and solidarity, what can stand in our way to greater triumphs?"

State conventions have been called by organized labor in West Virginia and New Jersey to make plans for carrying on a vigorous campaign. Organization work in the various states is being supplemented, it was said, by publication of thousands of pieces of literature and the supply of political news regularly to 300 labor journals and magazines.

PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE

BESIEGED BY WOMEN

London, April 2. — Premier Lloyd George has been besieged at his official residence, 10 Downing Street, by a large number of would-be housekeepers attracted there as the result of a joke with a moral perpetrated by an organization of women clerks and secretaries.

Hundreds of members of the organization have been dismissed of employment offices as post-war activities have ceased. They have protested vigorously through delegates who have tried unsuccessfully to interview Mr. Lloyd George. In answer to their last communication the Premier had the following addressed to them:

"The Prime Minister says there can't be very much in this talk of women

finding it hard to find employment. He has been trying for some time to get a housekeeper for No. 10, and he can't find one who wants the situation."

Dorothy Evans, secretary of the organization, immediately called several employment agencies by telephone. The proposition appealed to many applicants at the agencies for it isn't every day that a woman gets a chance to work at the famous No. 10. Soon the austere doorman at the official residence was opening the door not to higher-hatted politicians but to a number of women in all stations of life brought by servitude.

The doorman reported to a secretary, the secretary to the Prime Minister and in a short time the secretary was on the telephone telling the agencies to call off applicants. And the Prime Minister has not yet obtained a suitable housekeeper.

PRESBYTERIANS DOING

GREAT WORK ABROAD

Chattanooga, Tenn., April 2. The Southern Presbyterian church, with a membership of 98,000, is responsible for the Christian teaching of 32,000,000 people in foreign lands, according to the Rev. Egbert W. Smith, executive secretary of the church's committee on foreign missions.

This means that every communicant in fifteen southern states has taken upon himself indirectly the carrying of the gospel of Christ to 87 men, women and children.

The whole foreign mission field has been divided off and certain sections apportioned to each protestant church in order that there might be no duplication of effort. "In the territory assigned to us," said Dr. Smith, "there are tens of thousands of villages filled with friendly-faced men, women and children, not one of whom has ever heard the name of Christ. They will crowd any building and listen as long as the missionary has strength to speak, if only we can furnish them the missionary."

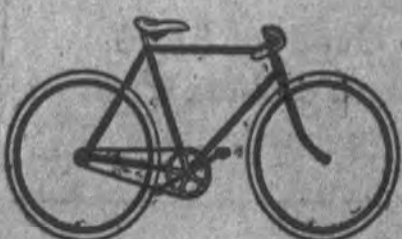

MEXICO DECLARED TO BE RICHEST OF MINERAL SECTIONS

Enormous Wealth of Nation is
Set Forth in Recent Geographical Bulletin

HAS SMALL TERRITORIAL
EXPANSE, BUT WEALTHY

Timely Facts Set Forth Showing
Size and Subdivided
Districts of Nation.

Washington, March 31.—Pertinent geographical facts about Mexico are given in the following bulletin of the National Geographical Society:

"Prior to 1836, Mexico, as a Spanish colony, and the United States covered approximately equal areas of North America, but the Texas secession and the result of the Mexican war added nearly a million square miles to our territory, and the extent of Mexico now is less than one-fourth that of continental United States," says the bulletin, which is based on several communications to the society.

"But our neighbor republic still has territorial expanse equal to the aggregate of Austria, Hungary, Germany, France, Great Britain and Ireland.

"The total area of the republic of Mexico (767,000 square miles) is less than that of our five largest states—Texas, California, Montana, New Mexico and Arizona—combined, all of these, except Montana, having been a part of New Spain 75 years ago. None of the 31 political subdivisions of our neighbor is a larger as any of the five states named, but four Mexican states contiguous to the United States aggregate an extent greater than that of Texas.

"Chihuahua, the largest Mexican state, approximates in area (87,000 square miles) that of Utah, Sonora (77,000 square miles) of Nebraska, Coahuila (63,000 square miles) of Georgia and Durango (40,000 square miles) of Kentucky. Nine subdivisions of the United States (excluding Alaska) are larger than Chihuahua, 15 of greater magnitude than Sonora, 32 larger than Durango. The rugged and desert character of the Mexican border states support sparse populations except where mining exploitation and cities resulting therefrom have concentrated settlement.

"The melting snows from the San Juan and Sangre de Cristo ranges of the Rocky mountains in Southern Colorado from the genesis of the Rio Grande, which, after flowing south through New Mexico, bends southeast at the western extremity of Texas, courses between it and Mexico for a distance equal to that of Saint Louis from New York and descends 1,100 miles from an elevation of 4,500 feet to sea level at the Gulf of Mexico.

UNITED STATE ASKED

TO WITHDRAW TROOPS

Panama, April 1.—The United States government has been asked through diplomatic channels immediately to withdraw from the Panama province of Chiriqui a detachment of 20 men of the 33 infantry under the command of Major Herbert E. Pace. The troops have been stationed there owing to the litigations American land owners have pending in the provincial courts. Residents of the province are very much disturbed by their presence.

Justice Alfaro, government secretary, commenting on the affair to The Associated Press correspondent said:

"Panama is more friendly to the United States than any other republic south of the Rio Grande and we cannot understand why armed occupation is necessary here when the United States administration does not find it necessary to intervene in Mexico where women are being violated and men are being murdered and mutilated every day."

NEW YORK SOCIALISTS ARE

EXPELLED FROM ASSEMBLY

Albany, April 1.—Five socialist members of the New York senate assembly were expelled today after the debate continued all night, cramed with fiery oratory. Separate votes were taken for each of the expelled members but forty votes as the maximum failed to muster defense of any of them. The vote to expel ranged from 104 to 116.

FIRE FROM BURNING BRUSH CAUSES BIG LOSS IN MD.

Cumberland, Md., April 1.—Fire from burning brush and leaves, destroyed the assembly house, summer hotel and six other structure at Mountain Lake Park.

CITY ALDERMEN IN MONTHLY MEETING HERE LAST NIGHT

In as much as state and county authorities for listing taxes, Aldermen Hearne, Tunstall and Hooker, already having been appointed a committee, were instructed to secure the services of some one, Miss W. Moore being suggested to finish taking the list for the town where D. S. Spain, Jr., left off.

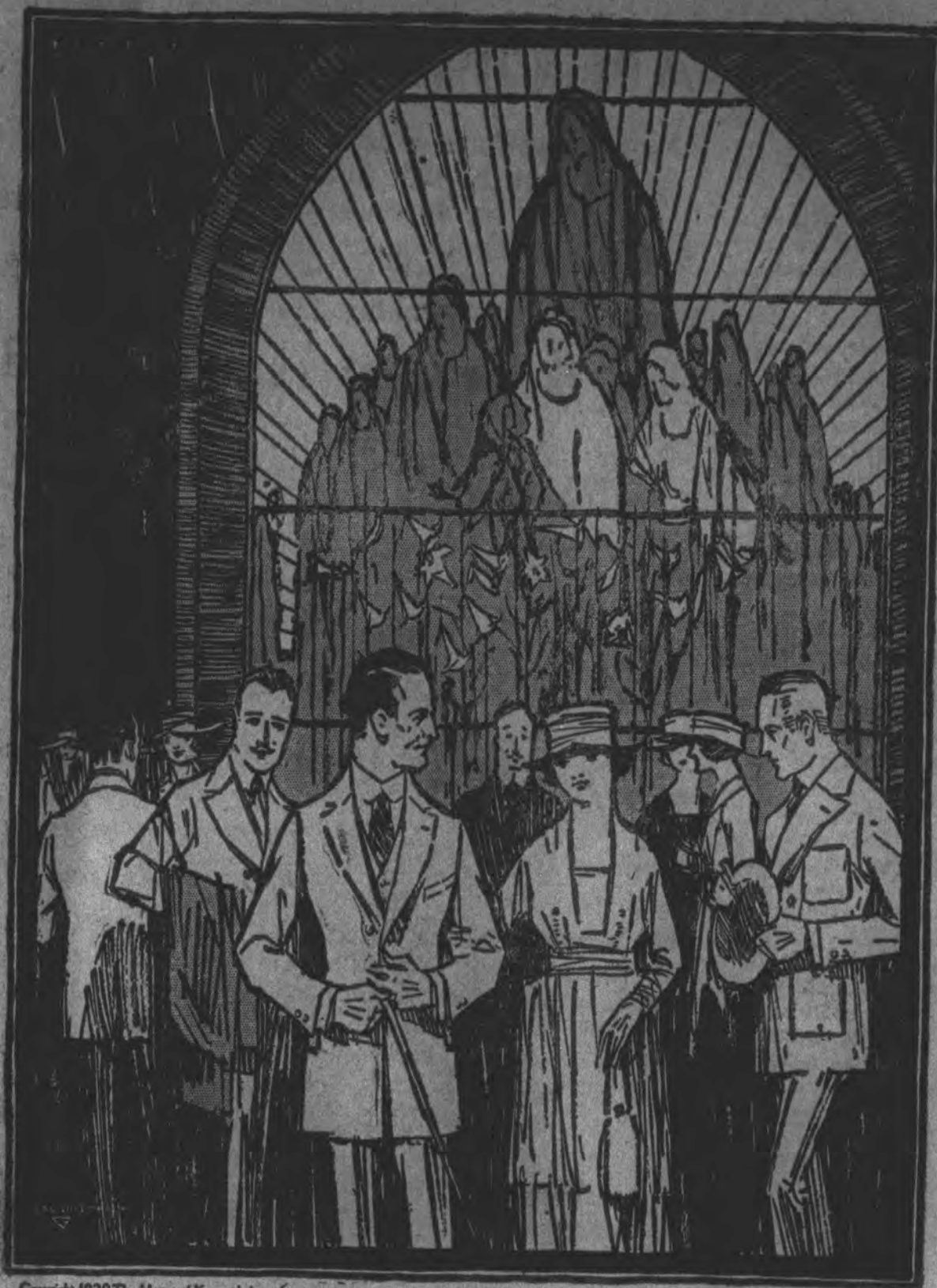
