

TWO WARSHIPS OF PACIFIC COAST ARE ON WAY TO MEXICO

Vessels Ordered to Mexican Waters to Protect American Interests.

TWO PACIFIC CITIES AS FOR PROTECTION

Warships Dispatched at Urgent Request of State Department Officials.

Washington, April 23.—Two warships from the Pacific fleet were en route tonight to Mexican waters to protect American citizens and interests at Mazatlan and Topolobampo.

A similar request came from the government agent at Frontera, on the Gulf Coast, but was not acted upon pending further investigation of the situation there.

The exact situation at Mazatlan and Topolobampo was not known here. There had been no report of disturbances at either place and latest advices said a federal force of 50 men and two cannon had arrived at Mazatlan.

Sonora state forces in rebellion against the Carranza government are known to be pushing on toward Mazatlan, the most important Mexican gateway on the Pacific.

At the navy department, it was said that the cruiser Salem, and destroyer No. 276, the ships ordered to Mexico, were under instructions to investigate the situation.

The cruiser Sacramento was at Frontera on April 19 and remained for a short time.

George T. Summerlin, American Charge d'Affaires, at Mexico City, who has been consulting with Secretary Colby at the State Department left tonight for Mexico City and it was understood that his departure had been hastened because of the situation in Mexico.

In official circles today it was reported that Gen. Arnulfo Gomez, former Federal commander at Tuxpam, Mexico and Gen. Manuel Palaz, who for several years has commanded rebel forces in the Mexican oil fields had joined forces against the Carranza government.

CHARTER GRANTED TO FIRST FOREIGN BANKING MEDIUMS

Federal Reserve Board Grants First Charter to New York Institution.

TO PROTECT INTERESTS IN FOREIGN TERRITORIES

Purpose of Bank Will be to Study Credit Problems in Every Section.

New York, April 24.—The first charter for a foreign banking association, formed under the provisions of the Edge bill and intended to enable American manufacturers to compete in foreign markets on a credit basis, has been granted by the Federal Reserve Board to the First Federal Foreign Banking Association of New York.

As the purpose of the bank is to build up an expert organization to study foreign credit problems, it was decided, the announcement says, to limit its shareholders to banks, manufacturers and others interested in foreign trade.

AMERICAN CONSUL ASKS PROTECTION IN MEXICAN ZONES

Representatives Ask Government to Dispatch Warships Immediately.

PACIFIC COAST CITIES DESIRE FULL PROTECTION

Growing Ferment Reported Among Factional Forces of Many Districts.

Washington, April 23.—American government representatives in Mexico have asked for the dispatch of warships to that country to protect American citizens and their property.

The requests came from Mazatlan and Topolobampo, on the Pacific coast and Frontera, on the Gulf coast. Officials of the state, war and navy departments are investigating the requests, explaining that in times of disturbances in the southern republic is not unusual to receive requests for warships when there is no need for them.

Details as to the requests of the American agents were not made public. Advice today said that 350 Mexican federal troops with two cannon had arrived at Mazatlan, but there have been no reports of disturbances or at the other two ports.

Other reports received today, however, indicated a growing ferment which was described as rapidly approaching an acute stage and it was said that it was clear that communications with various points in Mexico was being interfered with.

Grouping of troops of the Carranza and Sonora state governments at concentration and strategic points for the campaign brought on by the assumption by Sonora of a revolutionary status continued today.

CONVEYS BLESSING OF POPE UPON ALL JAPAN CATHOLICS

Petro Fumasoni Expresses High Consideration for Japanese Nation.

Tokio, April 24.—Archbishop Petro Fumasoni, who has just arrived in Tokio, has conveyed the Pope's blessing upon all Catholics here and expressed his high consideration for the Japanese nation.

The first was Cardinal O'Connell, of Boston and the second Archbishop Petrelli who presented to the Emperor the Pope's congratulations upon his accession to the Throne.

Archbishop Fumasoni will stay about three years in Japan and may remain permanently as Apostolic Delegate if the Japanese government extends to him the recognition extended by civil governments, the Vatican being willing, it is said to reciprocate by inviting a permanent Japanese representative to the Holy See.

The archbishop comes from India where he held the post of Apostolic Delegate for the past few years. Referring to the Catholic inhabitants of the Carolines and the Marianas islands who have been without clergy since the German missionaries were repatriated, Archbishop Fumasoni said that these islands are now under the jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Sydney.

ARMENIAN PEOPLE GAIN INDEPENDENCE BY LATE DECISION

Boundaries of New Independent Country Will be Fixed by Commission.

ITALIAN PREMIER ENTERS PROTEST AGAINST TURKEY

Premier Nitti Feels That Turkish Agreement is Important to People.

San Francisco, April 23.—Armenia is to be created an independent state. This decision was reached by the Supreme Council of the Allies today because neither the United States nor any other power was willing to accept a mandate over the country.

The boundaries of Armenia have not yet been defined and the new republic will probably be rather contracted, as it is believed that the smaller the country, the more easily can it take care of itself, because if too many Turks are left within its confines they might overthrow the government.

The comment of those in close relation with the council is that the League of Nations had been rather slightly treated respectation Armenia. The council sent a somewhat vague letter to the league asking it to take the mandate. The league executive at a meeting in Paris replied favorably, but called attention to the fact that it had no funds and no staff, suggesting that the council should authorize an international loan guaranteed by the powers composing the council.

It was pointed out that the new states ought not be burdened with a large debt to begin with and the council was also requested to eject the Turkish forces from the borders of the new State. These proposals have not been accepted by the council, which thus declines to avail itself of the league as a suitable mandatory.

The council leaves Smyrna under the suzerainty of Turkey, but places the city and province under the administration of Greece.

The Turkish treaty has been almost finished by the council. Premier Nitti gave his opinion of the treaty in the remarks he made to the council, saying "I am constrained to tell you that this treaty, to my mind is a more imperfect production than anything the peace conference has done."

In its discussion over relations with Russia, it is understood the council will not treat the subject as an allied question. It has already been decided that as the allies were not at war with Russia, each ally is free to have such intercourse or non-intercourse as it may deem fit.

Attorney General Palmer, Georgia's avowed presidential preference, appears to be on the gain in other elections too if reports are true, but then, there's never any telling how many votes are going to run until election day, when many aspirants will suffer depression of the heart.

Cameron Morrison is not in favor of negro women voting, according to extracts from a recent address of the gubernatorial candidate before a Wilson audience, although he does favor woman suffrage. The statement no doubt will mean votes for the candidate from the west, and a goodly number of them from the east too, if we see right.

Irish potatoes have been removed from the menus of thirty Atlanta hotels and cafes prices become more normal, according to reports received from that district. But what we want to know, what in the mischief will replace the "spud" so essential to the happiness of thousands of people not only in Atlanta, but throughout the south.

## COMMERCE AND COLLEGES.

How can Southern Colleges fit their students for foreign trade? This is the question which will be taken up at the Educational Conference of the South Atlantic States Association to be held at Chapel Hill, N. C., April 27.

Matthew Hale, president of the association and representatives of the bureau of education of Department of Interior will meet with representatives of all of the Southern Colleges to outline plans which will enable the educational institutions of the South to keep pace with the commercial development. One of the questions to be considered at this conference will be a plan for adapting the existing university courses to the present demand for training for foreign trade. Plans will also be made by which the commercial organizations will aid the educational institutions in introducing further courses in port and harbor development, water transportation, surveys of natural resources, commercial surveys, studies of foreign markets etc.

Among the colleges of the South Atlantic States which will be represented at the conference are: In North Carolina, Belmont Abbey College, Davidson College, Trinity College, Elon College, Guilford College, Lenoir College, Wake Forest College, N. C. State College of Agriculture and Engineering, University of North Carolina; in South Carolina, Firman University, Anderson College, Wofford College, Newberry College, Erskine College, Clemson Agricultural College, College of Charleston and University of South Carolina; in Georgia, Emory University, Oglethorpe University, Mercer University, Piedmont College, North Georgia Agricultural College,

Georgia School of Technology, in Florida, John B. Stetson University, Southern College, Rollins College and the University of Florida.

It is gratifying to note that members of the Grand jury of the recent session of Pitt county superior court approved efforts of the county board of education in consolidation of certain school districts because it goes to show that representative citizens of practically every section are becoming more impressed with the advisability of this new endeavor of increasing the efficiency of public schools. It is to be hoped the statement of the jurors will be given proper consideration by people who are not fully informed with the movement for consolidation of schools as it is now unquestionably certain that the consolidated plan of teaching will be a vital issue to Pitt county and every other section of the state within a short time. Many territories already have given the plan extensive service and in every case it has been successful. This fact is indisputable evidence of the prevailing popularity of an essential in school work and the quicker each community and its people awake and assist wherever there is room for such, the quicker North Carolina will rank among the first educational centers of the country.

Prohibition agents in Washington appear to think physicians and druggists are too free in dispensing of whiskey through prescription, but we have not heard of a single instance where the patients entered any complaint over the amount issued. Of course there are very few real good prohibitionists who like the idea of selling the intoxicant for any purpose

but there are times when it is absolutely essential. Some physicians claim that it is not of any direct value in sickness. In fact one of the leading doctor of the state recently made this statement, but this does not prove conclusively that it is so. The sale of the beverage certainly must be restricted, and these restrictions may be quite severe, but regardless of prohibition or the most exacting laws these times when it is necessary for medicinal use and should be given under such circumstances.

**FRENCH SENATORS**

**CONVICT CALLIAUX OF GROSS NEGLIGENCE**

Paris, April 23.—Joseph Calliaux former Primer of France, and twice Minister of Finance, stands tonight convicted to having placed his personal political ambition during the war higher than the interest of the country that honored him and gave him birth. Calliaux while escaping conviction for high treason, was found to have been recklessly impudent and very close to treasonable ambitions, for such is the interpretation of the verdict of "Guilty of commerce and correspondence with the enemy" which was rendered today against him by the French Senate.

This is the first verdict of the sort rendered in any of the allied countries since the war began—"commerce" as interpreted by the Senators who were the judges not meaning financial trading, but this particular case is employed in the sense of association.

The Senators entered Luxembourg palace this afternoon with the determination to have finished with the affair, which has taken up their time during the past three months. They began the discussion in a vigorous business like manner, presenting a strange contrast to their bored attitude during the closing days of the trial. No one, however, took seriously the prediction that the verdict would be reached this evening. But after the court had disposed of the high treason charge and that of "intelligence with the enemy," and had declared its own sovereignty in less than four hours, word was passed

to the Luxembourg Gardens and Luxembourg Gardens were filled to overflowing in the neighborhood of the palace by dense crowds and police reserves had to be called out.

The ballots followed one another with great rapidity. The partisans of the former Primer were thrilled with joy and hope when the treason charge was so promptly eliminated, confidently predicted acquittal and began to appear among themselves the portfolios in the cabinet which Calliaux was expected to form within six months after his release.

When they attempted to have the Senate refrain from establishing itself as the highest constitutional authority with power to find the accused not guilty as charged, but guilty of a lesser offense, their enthusiasm waned.

The doors of the deliberation chamber were closed, almost sealed. Two ushers stood by each for the purpose of apparently warding off inquisitive newspaper men. But occasional a disheveled, perspiring Senator would rush out of the chamber and make a direct line for the senate bar, where he was immediately surrounded by correspondents offering to purchase for him the best vintages in France if only he would talk.

At times the noise—shouts and the ringing of bells—heard within the Chamber was deafening. It seemed on several occasions as though the deliberations might degenerate into a free-for-all fight. It was a stormy scene, a juror's room in a criminal court building multiplied by twenty.

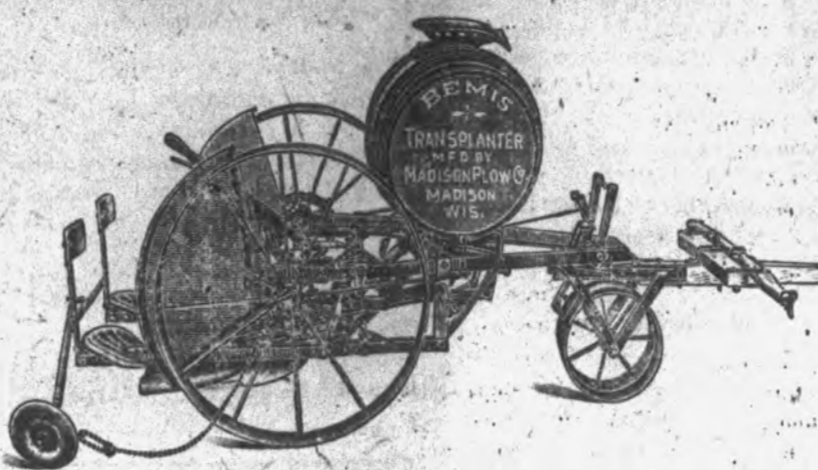

national troops left Buena Vista, near Mexico City, for the north Sunday night, papers received from the capital said. More than 1,000 Mayos were en route to join as many more Mayos and Yaquis already in this district. Presence of the Yaquis and Mayos in eastern Sonora was said to indicate the state government expected its hardest battle in this section.

The Indians are described as the best fighters in Mexico. All are veterans of hard campaigns and many of them fought in the last revolution which raised President Carranza to power.

The proclamation of General P. Elias Calles, commander-in-chief of the Sonora army, announced he would issue today, was awaited with some interest. He said upon his arrival here

last night that the Sonora movement had resulted in establishment of a new party in Mexico, "the new party of progress," and that his statement would be issued in behalf of it and Sonora.

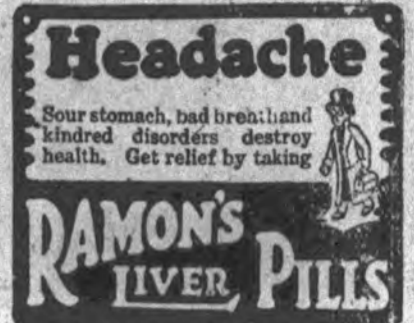

their funds be kept liquid, and that credits issued by them be for a short term only. The Edge Bill in effect provides for the establishment of a new kind of bank which shall obtain this working capital from the investors of the country through the sale of the

bank's obligations or through the use of its guarantee in connection with the paper of American manufacturers and exporters, based in turn upon the credit of their foreign customers.

"While at the moment the great majority of manufacturers have more domestic business than they can handle, nevertheless the time will come when markets for our surplus capacity will be a necessity, and when this time comes, our manufacturers will find themselves without foreign markets unless efforts are made to maintain, so far as possible, their present position in these markets."
