If negro delegates to the Republican convention are satisfied with Mr. Harding's attitude, as they have expressed, it looks like the rest of the boys ought to feel the same way about it. The truth is, Mr. Harding has straddled the platform completely, leaving little room for doubt as to his sincerity to those interested.

Hi Johnson, as other men aspiring for nomination for the presidency by the Republican party, went to Chicago with the special intention of warming up the convention with a few words of wisdom, but from appearances he only succeeded in intensifying the heat by provoking the displeasure of the "bosses" of the convention.

Some members of the Republican party have been gracious enough to hope that the next president will be a Democrat so that the party will be compelled to bear the responsibility of reconstruction. Such an assertion certainly sounds strange and out of the ordinary, but it hits the issue squarely, sounding a note that has been silent in the past. The fact is, the platform of the Republican party cannot possibly meet demands of the future any more than a plank from the coming Democratic platform would fit the Republican. The American future is as much dependent upon democratic government as the party is upon the clear-minded people of the nation, for this is not an era for methods of the reactionist, and radical element, but in other words it is a time when plain common-sense, impartiality and fair-mindedness must be in supremacy so disturbed conditions following the war may be amicably settled with consideration for every force constituting the government. It is not out of the ordinary that even a member of the Republican party should express fear of the future under opposite party control, because only the principles of democracy can restore the country to the state of peace and tranquility prevailing in pre-war days.

NORTH CAROLINA'S OPPORTUNITY.

The following editorial from Sunday's edition of the Raleigh News and Observer no doubt will appeal to many people in this section who have been following the active stand of woman suffrage for the league of nations, and as it directly conveys the real state of affairs in their significant meaning to the country, it should be profitable as well as interesting.

"A great opportunity may be coming to the State to save absolutely the honor and integrity of the country. It is seldom that a single State has been placed in the enviable and desirable position of a pivotal State to decide a question whose decision profoundly affects the moral life of the Nation. But the opportunity of the Old North State, if it comes, will be world-wide.

"Thirty-five States have ratified the woman suffrage amendment—only one State more is needed—and there the progress of ratification has halted and who halted it? Why the Republican party, of course, has halted it to fortify its position of opposition to the league of nations and the Versailles treaty.

"There are millions of women in this country whose attention is now or will be seriously arrested by the discussion of this great moral question drawn by the Republican party. Many of these women are not free to vote and the fear of their action has kept the Republican States of Delaware, Connecticut and Vermont from ratifying the amendment.

"Only the Southern Democratic States of Louisiana and North Carolina could now ratify the amendment in time to permit this woman vote to be cast in the coming election. The Louisiana Senate has voted the amendment down.

"The national Democratic party now perceiving the necessity of enfranchising these millions of women for league voters must look to North Carolina. Through ratification of the amendment North Carolina can clinch the victory of the party and save the league."

BULGARIA DESIRES ADEQUATE OUTLET IN AEGEAN WATERS

sequences to Bulgaria and to the peace of the whole Balkan Peninsula.

(Bulgaria ceded western Thrace under the peace treaty and the peace conference awarded it to Greece. This cut Bulgaria off from its former port of Dedegitch, on the Aegean sea; but the Allies promised her the league of nations would give her an outlet on the Aegean).

The former Prime Minister, who was educated in England and who is leader of the strong Nationalist Party, then discussed what he termed "the Allies' flagrant betrayal of the principle of nationality." We were stunned," said M. Gueshoff, "when we heard that Bulgaria was condemned to lose districts the Bulgarian character of which was never contested and that while for certain disputed German regions the plebiscite was permitted, the principle of self-determination was refused the Bulgarian populations which were awarded to Serbia and Greece.

"In order to explain this flagrant betrayal of the principle of nationality," M. Gueshoff continue, "it was alleged that the Bulgarians deserved to be punished, first, because they had fought against the entente and then because they had committed atrocities. The Bulgarian people were against the war. A faithless klag had betrayed them into it.

"Had the entente landed troops at Saloniki before the Bulgarian mobilization of 1915, as I then insisted, had Bulgaria the geographical situation of Greece, the Bulgarians would have done what the Greeks did in 1917 and Bulgaria would never have gone with the Central Empires.
