DECLARES WILSON
CAUSED NOMINEES
TO ACCEPT LEAGUE

Republican Presidential Candidate Replies After Roosevelt's Announcement

Marion, Ohio, July 13. — Senator Harding charged in a statement tonight that President Wilson had forced the Democratic presidential and vice presidential and vice presidential nominees to accept his view that the league of nations should become the dominant issue. The President's one concern, the Senator said, is the "vindication of his foreign policy" and he insists upon "his issue regardless of costs of consequences."

"The Republican party and candidates gladly accept the challenge," the statement said. "We are more than willing to make the election a national referendum on the question whether we shall have four years more of the Democratic readiness to surrender this republic."

The statement resulted from the announcement of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the vice presidential candidate, following his conference yesterday with Governor Cox, that his campaign would be made chiefly on the league issue.

The statement follows:

"Columbus dispatches describing the conference between the Democratic nominees for president and vice president on Monday say that Gov. Cox left it to the vice presidential nominee to make known the conclusions reached. And, thus authorized to speak for both of them, the vice presidential nominee stated that he considered the league of nations one of the dominant issues of the campaign, not only in the East but in the West. He expected to make his campaign chiefly on the league of nations."

"So we have the complete proof that President Wilson has won, and forced acceptance of his paramount issue. The party machinery has been taken over by the Tammanyites of New York, New Jersey, and Indiana."

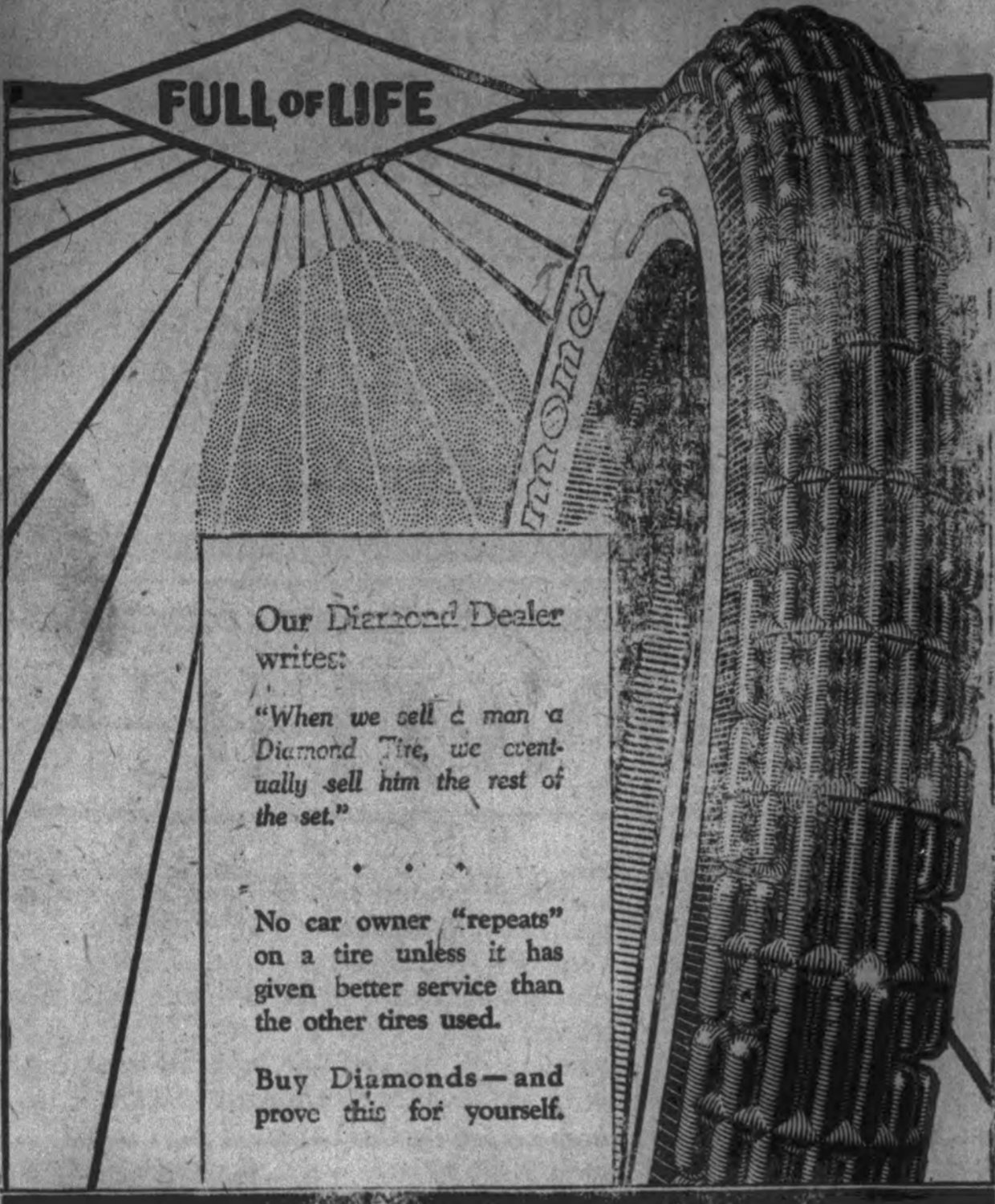

SAYS DEMOCRATS MAY GET CONTROL OF U. S. CONGRESS

Congressman Flood Thinks Prospects for Victory Quite Encouraging

Washington, July 13. — With such strong men as Cox and Roosevelt at the head of the ticket the Democrats will defeat enough Republican Senators and Representatives in November to place control of congress again back in the hands of the Democrats. It was confidently predicted today by Representative Hal D. Flood, of Virginia, chairman of the Democratic National congressional committee.

"The Cox and Roosevelt ticket named by the San Francisco convention is a strong one looking at it from any angle," said Chairman Flood who returned to Washington today from San Francisco. "Governor James M. Cox, of Ohio, and Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York, is a ticket that will appeal to the mass of the voters who are looking this fall to elect men for President and vice president with clean and progressive records—men who have served as clean, wise and fearless executives and will guide the nation safely in future."

"I served with Governor Cox in the House of Representatives and esteem him very highly. I have carefully watched his career since he left the House and am deeply gratified that he is now our presidential candidate."

"With the country not yet firmly back on its feet after the upheaval of the World war the United States must have a man of clear vision and courage at the head of the government to guide the way to continue in the peace and prosperity," continued Chairman Flood. "Governor Cox and Mr. Roosevelt constitute that kind of a ticket."

"On my way back from California and since arriving here I have met Democrats everywhere enthusiastic over the prospects for success in November for both our presidential and congressional tickets. The Republicans have become very gloomy over the outlook judging from reports that come to me from various sections."

Reports coming to the Democratic National Congressional committee head quarters here from the men having the campaign in charge in the different districts are most optimistic and indicate unusual interest in the contests for Senators and Representatives by the Democratic candidates and their friends, Chairman Flood asserted.

"With the enthusiasm being shown by Democrats everywhere in the choice of Cox and Roosevelt for the head of the ticket, I fully expect we shall be able to elect enough Democratic Senators and Representatives in November to take the place of Republicans to upset the control of both the Senate and House and place the Democrats in power in congress."

Chairman Flood expects to hold a conference with Governor Cox when the Democratic presidential nominee comes to Washington and to carefully go over the plans for the congressional campaign with him. The chairman of the Democratic National congressional committee and the Ohio Governor were close friends when the Ohioan served in the House and are certain to work out the campaign for control of congress in complete harmony.

Senator Reed may have an idea that his questionnaire on the league of nations will be received with interest by the people, but for one time in his life, he will have the sad experience of learning that people don't think alike.

Congressman Flood thinks that Democratic supremacy in congress will be one of its most interesting features following the national election, and no doubt he is right. Mr. Flood has pretty good ideas about national affairs anyway, so it is quite probable that things may turn out according to his way of thinking.

The Republicans are intending to wage an "Americanism" campaign in fifteen states, so we are told, but as they have so little of this spirit in their ranks it is difficult to see just where each state will receive any benefit. Americanism is beyond the conception of the party, so how will the campaign become possible.

Anti-suffrage leaders have seen fit to congratulate Governor Clement for his moment for his action regarding the ratification of suffrage in his state, but the governor, after all, has nothing to be congratulated upon. His failure to recognize woman suffrage places an indelible stain upon the state's record and shows in a plain and convincing way the depth and calibre at the man who found it impossible to recognize the right of American women to protect their own homes.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has seen fit to approve that 17 million dollar loan of the government to the railroads of the country, but it must have felt a certain reluctance in doing so. The railroads are probably in greater need of finances than ever before, and as the government was chiefly responsible for the destruction of much of its property during the war it is quite right that it should reciprocate in some way. There is much to be done before railway efficiency has been placed upon a normal basis in this country, and this will be realized quicker now there is assurance that adequate funds will be supplied to make this possible.

Governor Cox plans to be in session with several members of the national suffrage forces before leaving Washington to meet President Wilson, and while no information has been given out regarding the nature of the meeting, the subject may be easily surmised. Suffrage forces of the country realize that they have found in the nominee a faithful and staunch supporter, and it is more than probable that he will be asked to use every influence in their interest. If the American woman is enfranchised, then the Democratic party will receive a record vote, for it is confidently expected that a majority of suffrage supporters would stand behind the party faithfully and do everything possible in its interest. Governor Cox has the right idea about woman suffrage, and the women have the right idea about the governor, and the Democrats have something good in both of them.

President Wilson and Governor Cox will meet next Sunday and talk over issues connected with the coming campaign. Of course, there is much speculation regarding the conference, but only a very few will ever be acquainted with real issues discussed by the two leaders of the party. There are many issues before the party and the nation so that desire to be considered by men capable of considering them from every angle, and it is possible that Governor Cox will receive much advice from the president who is considered one of the best informed men in the country. The conference certainly will be profitable to the party in every way, for it will give the nominee a clearer conception of the work before him, and be more fully prepared to grapple with problems of the future. The Democratic party may well feel proud of the president and the nominee for one has commanded recognition of the world, while the other is the new leader of his party.

New party heads are trying desperately to pacify the minor factions at the convention in Chicago, but right at this particular moment it seems their efforts are going to be in vain. The new party, like all other things while in an insipient state, will be subject to countless worries before organization is completed, and while the optimistic promoters apparently have not anticipated anything out of the ordinary, it is certain they will wake up to the truth of the situation in a short time. A third party is absolutely unnecessary in this country, in fact, about as unnecessary as an emperor in a free country, and it is easy to see that it cannot receive only fair support at the greatest. People are weary of standing behind a man years of service for its record. They have found that in the Democratic ranks and will support it to the end.

Senator Harding says that President Wilson made Democratic nominees for the presidency accept the league of nations, but as the statement is without the slightest foundation whatever it is hardly probable that it will receive more than passing consideration from the public. He says that the Republicans accept the challenge of the carrying the issue to the polls, and believe that it will meet with defeat. However, it is possible the situation may change exceedingly before the campaign, and until then, Senator Harding may have the pleasure of fooling himself and his ardent supporters. The League of Nations is recognized as one of the most important matters before the country just at this time, and it will receive firm support by those who realize what it means to all nations concerned.

The Water & Light commission of Greenville is perfectly justified in increasing its rates, for there is everything in evidence to cause one to believe that such action is absolutely imperative. Several cities of the state have found such action absolutely imperative, and the wonder is how Greenville has continued this long, without asking for a revision of its rates. The commission is giving mighty good service of late, and it is said that the additional revenue desired from the increase will facilitate certain improvements already in progress. Greenville people feel that they are perfectly justified in paying reasonably for electric current, and do not consider the advance anything unusual when considering the abnormality in sway throughout the entire country.

A man in the employ of the U. S. Government, whose two daughters have made telephone operating their profession, said: "If I had ten daughters, I would want all of them to be telephone operators. Aside from the fact that they work under the direct supervision of women only and that every provision is made for their comfort, the training they receive is a great developer of tact, resourcefulness and initiative." Telephone operating is more than a job. It is a young woman's profession and the work is essentially a woman's work. At the present time it offers unusual opportunities for advancement.

In most young women's professions months of preliminary training are necessary at the learner's expense. But in telephone operating the beginner pays nothing for her training. On the contrary, she is placed on the pay-roll as soon as she begins the brief course of instruction. Her salary is increased at the completion of this course and thereafter at regular and frequent intervals. Meter rate 15c per kilowatt hour, subject to the following discounts on bills paid on or before the fifth of the month:
On bills less than \$10, 5 per cent discount
\$10 and less than \$25, 10 per cent discount
\$25 and less than \$50, 15 per cent discount
\$50 and less than \$100, 20 per cent discount
\$100 and above, 25 per cent discount
Minimum rate for each connection \$1.25 per month, no discount.

POWER RATES

Meter rate 05 per kilowatt hour, subject to the following discounts on bills paid on or before the fifth of the month:
On bills less than \$20, 5 per cent discount
\$20 and less than \$50, 10 per cent discount
\$50 and less than \$100, 15 per cent discount
\$100 and less than \$250, 20 per cent discount
\$250 and less than \$500, 25 per cent discount
\$500 and less than \$1000, 30 per cent discount

Minimum rates: \$1.00 per month for each horsepower connected up to 25 horsepower; 75c per month for each horsepower connected from 25 horsepower to 100 horsepower; 50c per month for each horsepower connected above 100 horsepower. No discount.

HEATING AND COOKING RATES

Meter rate and discount scale same as for power. Minimum rate \$2.00 per month for each connection, no discount.

DEPOSITS

Applicants for water and electric service will be required to make the following deposits: Water \$2.50, Lights \$2.50, Water and Lights \$5.00.

The above revised rates are based on the present cost of labor and materials, notably coal, and will be subject to change with the further increase in the cost of these items.

WASHINGTON AND GREENVILLE PLAY TO 13 INNING TIE

Game Called at End of Thirteenth Account of Darkness, Score Standing 2 to 2.

In probably one of the most stubbornly fought games staged at the ball park in this city during the season, Greenville and Washington yesterday afternoon battled for thirteen consecutive innings without being able to secure any definite lead either way, the game being called at the end of the thirteenth on account of darkness with the score standing 2 to 2. Greenville tied two run lead which Washington gained in the first inning, in the sixth frame, and from that time the contest was nothing more than a veritable pitched battle, in which between Barnes, for the locals, and Austin for the visitors, both showing unusually excellent form and pitching like veterans throughout the entire contest.

The game was somewhat different from what enthusiasts have been witnessing throughout the season, for both clubs played in a way that would have made the heart of any fan bound with ecstatic delight. Superiority in handling the sphere was simply out of the question, as Washington's participation was careful, determined and insistent from the first inning until the last, but like the locals, they were unable to hit when hits would have sent the winning runner across the rubber, and unfortunately for both, they were forced to battle from inning to inning, sanguine and optimistic concerning the result of their next trial at the bat.

While of course, it was natural that the ball should be fumbled occasionally and one or two misplays made in such a long drawn out contest, fielding with the exception of these two features was almost perfect. Both teams worked particularly careful immediately following the sixth inning, and from that time until the thirteenth, the game was as near perfect as one could imagine. Greenville showed up possibly to better advantage than any other game of the year, and every man on the team played skillfully and exerted every possible energy to turn the tide of victory in their favor.

The credit for the splendid exhibition does not go to any single player, as it is generally conceded by those who have watched the club's activity throughout the season that every man played to better advantage than ever before. It appeared almost an impossibility to hit timely after the sixth inning, but like the visitors, they were unable to find the opposing twirler's offerings when men were on bases, seriously threatening the home circuit. Runners were gotten around to the third corner occasionally after the sixth inning, but some angel of the baseball realm hovered avengingly around the rubber, absolutely refusing to let a winning runner reach the desired goal.

The game concluded the series between Washington and Greenville, the locals taking the first two, leaving the visitors with an undaunted determination to take the third game at all costs.

AVIATION SHOWING HEALTH INCREASES IN UNITED STATES

West the airplane is being adopted as the occasion demands, and it is meeting with encouraging success the severe competition of good railroads and high ways, lack of landing fields and the considerable indifference of the Middle Atlantic States. For myself and for the Republican party, I earnestly desire that ratification may be accomplished in time to give the whole body of American women the ballot in next November. I am wearied with efforts to make partisan advantage out of this situation. I hope there will be ratification, and I do not care a fig whether it is secured through a Republican or a Democratic state. I will rejoice if North Carolina will do it, or if Tennessee will do it, just as I would rejoice if a Republican state did it.

There will be glory enough for the Republican party, no matter whether the thirty-sixth state is Republican or not. If any word of mine could possibly be influential with any Republican in the North Carolina legislature, the word would be 'vote for ratification and don't worry about who gets the credit of putting it over.'
