He said we are now witnessing the widest wave of immorality in the history of the human race. Like a consuming fire it is sweeping over the world.

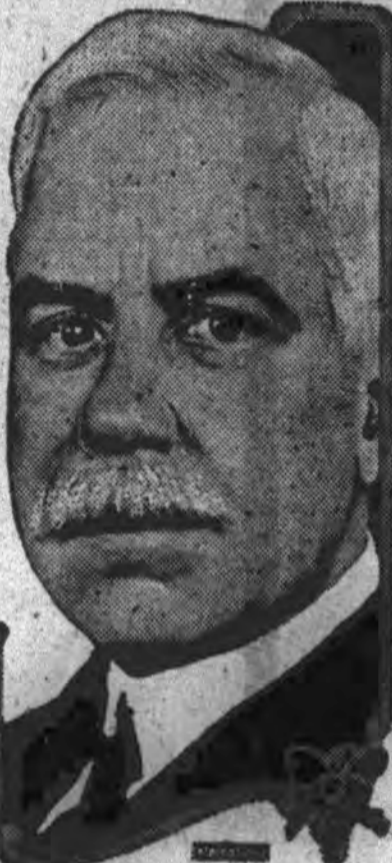

Constantinople, Nov. 9.—Pillage by the Turks of the Imperial watering place of abbas Touman in the Caucasus mountains, is being investigated here. A large quantity of the furnishings and paintings belonging to the luxurious villas of this little city, where many of the aristocracy of Russia used to pass their vacations, has been discovered in Constantinople.

The Pillage of abbas Touman is one of the untold stories of the rapacious Turkish pashas and generals. Abbas Touman is unknown outside of Russia. Yet it has one of the little paradises with which countries lying near the Black Sea are blessed.

RED CROSS STILL HAS NUMBER WAR TASKS TO FINISH

Organization Has Been of Great Help In This Country In Looking Out After Soldiers

Washington, Nov. 10.—"The Red Cross comes to its fourth roll call with its war task still unfinished," said Dr. Livingston Farland, chairman of the central committee a statement today urging enrollment in the relief society during the fortnight beginning on Armistice Day, November, 11.

"Never were the world and national needs so pressing and the corresponding opportunities for service so great," declared Dr. Farland. "It is only too evident that the world has not been able even to approach re-establishment after the war.

"At home the wounded and sick soldiers and sailor hospitals and elsewhere are still numbered by the thousands. The Cross cannot demobilize its force organized to stand by those who gave their best for their country and extend what aid and comfort may be possible.

"An attempt to build up the health of the country which is the outstanding feature of the peace program of the Red Cross, is taxing the energies visiting nurses come from every corner of the United States and every effort is being made to supply that need, the filling of which is vital. AERIAL ARMADA TO COMPETE FOR CUP THANKSGIVING DAY

Largest Armada Ever Before Assembled to Feature Race For Pulitzer Trophy in N. Y.

EIGHTEEN ARMY PLANES HAVE ALREADY ENTERED ACTIVE CONTESTANTS

Forty or More Airships With 100 Per Hour Speed to Participate In Great Event

New York, Nov. 9.—An aerial armada greater than ever before assembled for a race will compete for the Pulitzer Trophy Thanksgiving day, starting and ending at Mitchel Field, Mineola, New York. Forty or more airships with speeds exceeding 100 miles an hour are to participate in the 100-mile flight over a closed triangular course.

Aviation organizations of foreign countries have expressed interest in the coming contest and an inquiry from the French Aero Club indicated its desire to enter one or more ships.

The Pulitzer Trophy, donated by Ralph Pulitzer to the Aero Club of America is to be competed for annually, the coming race being the first. Gold, silver and bronze plaques have been hung up for winners of first, second and third places, and in addition, nearly \$4,000 in Liberty Bonds is to be awarded pilots of craft which perform best in machines of various classes.

TO COMMEMORATE BIG SCULLING RACE IN PENNSYLVANIA

Vesper Boat Club to Commemorate Notable Victory Won By John B. Kelly With Scull

Philadelphia, Nov. 10.—Local oarsmen have taken the initiative to hold a world's sculling title race yearly to commemorate the recent victory of John B. Kelly of the Vesper Boat Club in single sculls at the Olympics.

A petition has been addressed by the Schuylkill navy, an organization of local rowing clubs to those interested in amateur rowing as follows:

"The recent victory of John B. Kelly we believe, is the only victory ever recorded that may be truly considered as representing the world's championship in amateur single sculls.

"Heretofore, the winning of the diamond sculls at the Henley has carried with it the nearest approach to such a title, but due to the fact any sculler, no matter how valid his personal qualifications, may have his entry refused by the Henley stewards this event may well be considered as a closed local or at least an invitation event.

"In his recent victories John B. Kelly defeated not only the recent winner of the diamond sculls, but the pick of all the amateur single scullers from all nations of the world.

"Now, therefore that this victory may be commemorated for all time that lacking for clean amateur scullers from all parts of the world to compete for this noble title, it is proposed to present a gold cup to be known as the Philadelphia Challenge Cup, for the World's Championship Amateur Single Sculls, this cup to pass from one champion to the next under terms to be set forth in a deed of gift to be drawn up by the committee appointed by the commodore of the Schuylkill Navy and executed by that committee representing the individual subscribers.

RED CROSS PLAYS SPLENDID PART IN WORLD ACTIVITIES

Summary of Organization Shows There Are 3,502 Chapters Active In Entire World FIFTY-SEVEN CHAPTERS DOING WONDERFUL WORK IN MANY FOREIGN LANDS Junior Red Cross Activities Occupying Much Attention In Other Parts Country

Washington, Nov. 11.—There are today 3,502 American Red Cross chapters, 3,502 of which are in this country and 57 in foreign territory and American possessions outside continental United States, according to a summary of localized Red Cross work just compiled at National Headquarters. In American territory overseas the Canal Zone, Guam, Hawaii, Philippine Islands, Porto Rico and the Virgin Islands there are eight Red Cross chapters; in foreign territory Asia, Central and South America and Europe there are forty nine.

A summary provides the first complete picture of the home town projects of service which are the concern of Red Cross chapters.

In performance of the duties undertaken during the war in behalf of service men and their families, 2,821 chapters are still engaged in completing some for the war job, such as ministering to men in the army and navy and Public Health Hospitals and aiding the disabled men who are requiring vocational training. Home service for the families of these men did not cease with the signing of the armistice but has been continued and extended to civilian families as well, and is now being undertaken by 629 chapters while 273 others have applied for authority to carry such work on a peace-time basis.

The Health Service, a new project of the Red Cross, has already effected the establishment of Health Centers in 126 chapters while in 429 other chapters various other forms of health activities are being undertaken. Classes in First Aid form a part of the programs of 299 chapters; instruction in life-saving is given seventy five chapters. Health information Service is conducted by seventy five chapters, 118 have a general information and 219 a combined general and health information service.

Recognizing the value of the work of the public health nurse in disease preventive work, 713 Red Cross chapters are today employing 950 public health nurses. Under the direction of nursing Service classes in home Hygiene and Care of Sick are held in 1,006 chapters and instruction in Nutrition in eighty five.

In 286 chapters Disaster Preparedness Committees have been formed for the purpose of furnishing immediate relief relief to their communities in the event of disaster. Canteen Service which is maintained by forty seven chapters and Motor Service which is a definite project in forty chapters have both proved invaluable in time of disasters and in other emergencies.

In the rural districts where there is especial need for recreational activities, forty eight chapters have adopted programs of this nature while nine are cooperating with other agencies in providing facilities for recreation. Community centers which provides rest rooms, offer a place where entertainments and community gatherings may be held, have been established in thirty five chapters. In nine other chapters the Red Cross is helping other agencies in this work.

Junior Red Cross activities are being undertaken by 1,639 Red Cross chapters the report discloses. This means that the American Red Cross program of service has been established in nearly 60,000 schools throughout the country and daily reaching millions of American school children.

### ENCOURAGING ECONOMY

Plans have been made by the United States Treasury Department whereby college students in Maryland, Washington, D. C. Virginia, and the two Carolinas, will be encouraged to make a practical study of the principles of wise spending and the relationship of expenditure to income.

In this work, which is to be conducted in various colleges by savings councils composed of members of the faculty and student body, the principles of regular saving for safe investments and keeping of budgets, will be taken up, being correlated when practicable with the regular course in general economics, political economy and domestic science according to formal announcement just made by the War Loan Organization of the Fifth Federal Reserve District which was instructed by the Treasury Department with the formulation of the plans.

One of the features of the moment is that in every college it will be self-governing. It is designed not only to encourage regular saving and investments in government saving securities, but to discourage expenditure on useless luxuries and on unnecessary articles. Especial attention will be given, it is said to the science of balancing expenses against income, and in order to make this more effective, all students who are not already on allowances or who have no fixed weekly or monthly income will be asked to have themselves placed, or place themselves, on a straight allowance basis, and then to budget their expenses so that their money may be wisely apportioned and used to the best advantages.

In each college a saving council is proposed. This is to include the president of the institution; one or more members of the faculty, to be appointed by the college president; the editors of the college publications, and the presidents of the student association and societies together with a sales manager of securities who is to be named by the students themselves.

According to the plan, which has been mailed to the colleges throughout the Fifth Federal Reserve District, the saving council is to hold its regular meetings to consider methods or presenting practical thrift principles and practice to the students daily. In addition, debates, general discussions and writing of these showing the application of these principles to every day life and especially to the life of the college student will be encouraged, while members of the faculty, acting as council members, or otherwise, will be urged to work out methods by means of which thrift instruction may be made apart of the class work in the various branches of the curriculum.

These plans, before being sent to the colleges, were given careful consideration by a number of prominent educators and economists, among them several university presidents. It was thought that by reaching the young college men and women in some of the most formative periods in their lives and by encouraging the development of fundamental thrift habits they would be materially benefited and thus become valuable citizens.

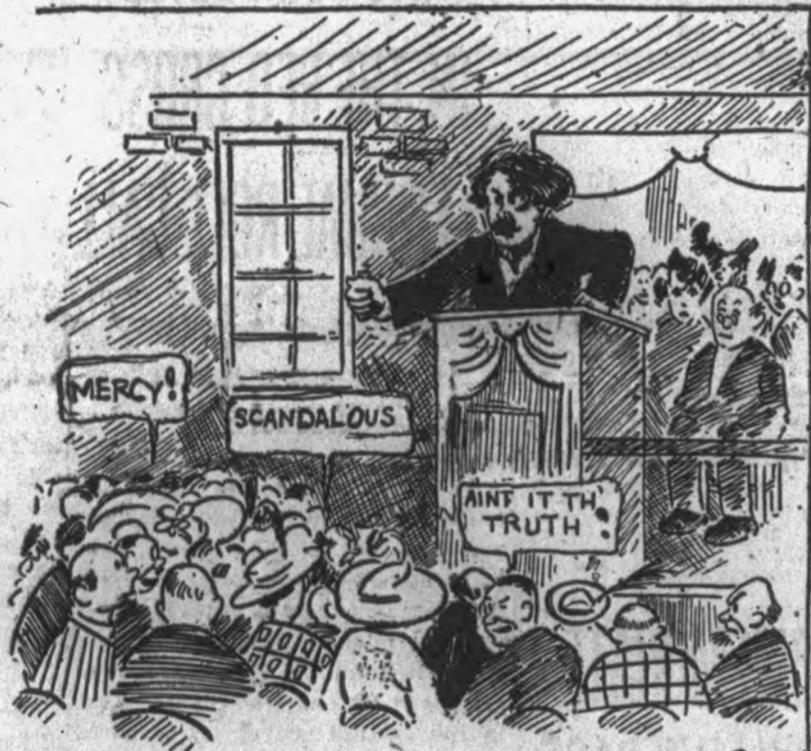

## COOKIES and DROP CAKES

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

WHEN the children romp in hungry, here are some wholesome delights that will satisfy the most ravenous appetites.

**Cookies**  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup milk  
2 eggs  
1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
or grated rind of 1 lemon  
4 cups flour  
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
Cream shortening and sugar together; add milk to beaten eggs and beat again; add slowly to creamed shortening and sugar; add nutmeg and flavoring; add 2 cups flour sifted with baking powder; add enough more flour to make stiff dough. Roll out very thin on floured board; cut with cookie cutter, sprinkle with sugar, or put a raisin or a piece of English walnut in the center of each. Bake about 12 minutes in hot oven.

**Cocoa Drop Cakes**  
4 tablespoons shortening  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1/2 cup milk  
1 1/2 cups flour  
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1/2 cup cocoa  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla

# AMERICANS ASKED TO FEED STARVING PEOPLE IN POLAND

Request For Relief Proved Outstanding Feature of End of The Polish Soviet War.  
**MORE THAN 1,250,000  
PEOPLE MUST BE CARED  
FOR BY THE AMERICANS**

LONDON, Nov. 9.—One of the aftermaths of the Polish Soviet war is that Americans will be called upon to feed and clothe more than 1,250,000 Polish children this winter through the American Relief Administration. Up to the time of the latest outbreak of hostilities, destitute had been so reduced that the Relief Administration officials

believed that Poland, with the organization the Americans had perfected, would be able to carry on the work after this autumn. That is considered impossible now and preparations are under way for caring for as many children during the dark days of last winter.

This decision came after receipt in London of reports of a complete survey of the country begun immediately after the bolsheviks were driven back. Trained observer report that the Poles themselves have not painted the pictures black enough. After two armies had fought over the ground there was little left for the children, they report, and each requested immediate shipment of food and clothing. As far as possible, distributing agents of the Administration.

The organization by which about \$10,000,000 worth of food and clothing was distributed in Poland in 16 months at a cost of approximately \$80,000, is virtually intact. It includes between 15,000 and 18,000 Poles whose services are paid for by Poland but who worked under the direction of a few American administrative officers. The Poles also pay for transportation from the ships, warehousing and distribution.

In addition they supply all flour received by them through a \$200,000 credit granted them by the Grain Corporation.

Although the distributing organization was considerably disarranged during the recent fighting, officials here say they can get into working order again very quickly after railroad repairs have been completed.

# DECLARES ITALIAN SPENDS MILLIONS YEARLY FOR WINE

Former Secretary of Transportation Presents Deplorable Conditions

Rome Nov. 9.—Professor Ugo Ancona formerly, Under Secretary of Transportation in the Italian cabinet, has just made a public statement that while the Italian government has spent more than \$10,000,000 a year for bread for the people, the Italian workers have spent \$900,000,000 a year on wine.

The government's expenditure for bread has suited from its undertaking to pay the difference between the cost of producing wheat and the price of bread. In consequence of this the Italian workers have been able to buy bread at the rate of one lira for each kilogram of 2.20 pounds.

Professor Ancona says that while the workers refuse to pay more than this they have no objection to paying 4 to 5 lire for a quart of wine, which before the war cost about 12 cents a quart. He asks whether it is just that the Italian government should continue to supply over \$1,000,000,000 annually for when the people do not grudge \$800,000,000 a year for the luxury of wine.

The Professor advocates that the Italians should eat less bread and pay what it costs and that they should drink less wine and export more of it so that the profit on wine should help to pay for importation of bread.

The amount of land given over to wheat production in Italy greatly decreased last year. The disastrous result is that the imports are increasing daily.

treat of the Russian army which had gone bolshevik. The Turks were amazed at the riches of Abbas Touman. The commandant of the 31st brigade sealed up all the valuable he could find. Then came signing of the treaty by which Abbas was left to Georgia.

No sooner had the Turkish Commander learned of this treaty than he gathered up before leaving, all valuables and hurried them to Batum. He notified Essad Pasha, at Constantinople that this booty should be offered the Sultan. Meanwhile, as his army withdrew it is charged that they systematically robbed churches and convents and sent these treasures also the Batum. Two other Turkish commanders are alleged to have been shared in the loot.
