

WOMEN LICENSED AS PREACHERS IN METHODIST CHURCH

Fifteen Women Licensed to Preach in Methodist Episcopal Church Since Last May MISS D. WILLIA CAFFAY WAS FIRST WOMAN TO BE GIVEN LICENSE UNDER NEW LAW

Chicago, Nov. 19.—Fifteen women have been licensed as preachers in the Methodist Episcopal church since this right was granted last May by the General Conference of the church.

"The first woman preacher to be licensed in the Methodist Episcopal church under this ruling," Miss Southard said, "was Miss D. Willia Caffay of Wenatchee, Wash. She came from a family of preachers and at the age of nine went to preach."

"The same evening Miss Winifred Willard was licensed by the First Methodist church of Denver. At the time she was 2,000 miles away in the east, but the enterprising Denverites called a meeting as soon as they heard the news and took action."

"The first woman licensed in New England was Mrs. Kate Morrison Cooper. For the past three years she had been pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church at Portsmouth, R. I. She was licensed June 10."

"Ten days later Miss Mabelle H. Whitney was licensed at Pittsfield, Vt. She was a supply pastor and previously had served as pastor of a Congregational church in Maine. Ten days after that Miss Capitola B. Lochner was licensed in the Proctorsville, Vt., M. E. church, and in a week another Vermont woman, Miss Ellen H. Wagner, a public school teacher, was licensed at Nulton."

Miss Southard herself was the seventh woman preacher licensed.

"It is not an easy task to keep informed on how many women have been licensed," she said, "when they are being licensed right along in so many sections."

"There is no doubt," Miss Southard added, "that ordination will be granted Methodist women when the next General Conference meets in 1924."

TO DISCUSS TRANSPORTATION PROBLEMS OF COUNTRY

New York, Nov. 19.—Discussion of transportation problems affecting the country will hold the center of interest at the annual meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers in this city December 7-10.

A statement issued by the society said that transportation is considered by the organization as the most pressing problem before the country. "The industry of the country is being seriously handicapped," said the statement. "From present indications, it will take several years for facilities to catch up with increased traffic and the normal development of the next few years."

In addition to purely railroad questions, the society members will consider waterway development and the greater use of motor vehicles for moving freight. A special report is expected on the St. Lawrence waterways project to make possible ocean traffic through the Great Lakes.

CORRIDA LOVERS IN MEXICO WELCOME FAVORITE SPORT

After Four Years of Prohibition Mexicans Welcome The Return of Bullfighters

FLAMING SIGNS ANNOUNCE THAT EL TOREO BULL RING WILL BE SCENE OF BATTLE

Bull Fights Held on Sunday With Large Crowds Accompanied by Good Weather

Mexico City, Nov. 19.—American fans never welcomed the opening of the base ball season with more enthusiasm than did "corrida" lovers in Mexico capital greet the return of bullfighters, after four years of prohibition.

During this period some of the world best matadors, most of whom have been engaged at fancy prices are Adolfo Gona, Ernest Pastor, Luis Freg, Fernandez Manalete and Juan Silveti.

The opening of the season with Silveti, a Mexican favorite, and Angelete, a Spanish youngster, appearing jointly was a festive occasion. At the last moment there had been a disagreement with the government both as to the amount of taxes to be paid by the promoters and as to the safety of immense amphitheater which for almost four years has been in practical disuse.

All difficulties were finally removed and Sunday afternoon found 25,000 cheering spectators awaiting the entrance of the first bull. Diplomats, high federal and civic officials, the city's social aristocracy paid their six pesos each to sit in the shade and watch the spectacle while several thousand pelados (peas) were glad to sit in the sun and pay two pesos each for the privilege. It was a glad day and six bulls were dispatched in record time.

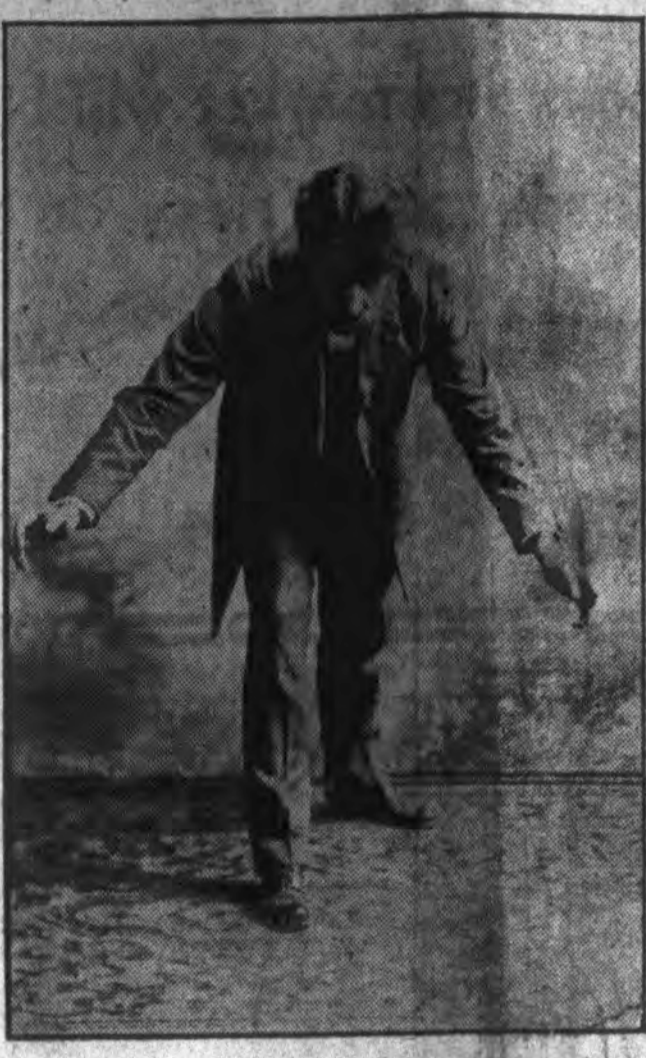
JUNIOR RED CROSS SENDS FURNITURE TO FRENCH AREAS

Last Year Thousands of Pieces of Furniture Were Sent to the Devastated Areas

Washington, Nov. 19.—For many months the little city of Coulogne in the Alsine region of France possessed but a single chair and it was the property of the mayor. It was officially known as "The Chair" until Junior Red Cross of America sent to that city a motor truck loaded with chairs and tables that had been made by the boys of America in their manual training schools. Last year thousands of these articles of furniture were sent to the devastated areas of France.

Colonel H. S. Todd and Bicknell of the Red Cross recently went to Chamery to adjust some difficulties that had arisen to block construction of the Quentin Roosevelt Memorial Fountain, the details of which had been entrusted to the American Red Cross by the late ex-president Roosevelt. At Chamery they learned that the mayor resided in Coulogne and when they located him there he apologized for having left the city's only chair at the town-hall. All were forced to stand through out the visit.

An exchange of views quickly adjusted matters pertaining to the memorial foundation and as the Red Cross representatives departed for Paris they promised to relieve the solitude of that town chair. Soon afterward the van-load of Junior Red Cross furniture was sent to Coulogne and the next time Colonel Todd visited the little city, it was again furnished.



CITY SCHOOLS WILL OBSERVE HOLIDAY ON THANKSGIVING

Will Remain Closed Friday So That Teachers Can Attend The Assembly at Asheville

The Greenville City Schools will observe next Thursday, Thanksgiving as a holiday. The following day Friday will also see the city schools closed. Following the custom of years the schools all over the state will be closed on that day to allow the teachers to attend the annual meeting of The North Carolina Teacher's Assembly, which meets at Asheville Nov. 24-26.

Evidently this year will see the largest attendance that an Assembly has ever witnessed. Already more than 7000 teachers have sent in their applications for membership. The Greenville City Schools and the Training School and the Pitt County Schools will all be well represented. And the above mentioned will have a number of representatives on the various programs. The various programs will begin on Wednesday afternoon, and continuing thru Friday night.

It is becoming increasingly evident to the administrators and teachers in the city schools that the parents of the town needed to know a good deal more about what the schools are doing for their children. It is very seldom indeed that a parent will take the time to spend a few hours in the school room watching the work of the teacher as she attempts to do her work. The school feels that something ought to be done about it. And they feel that what is needed is a Parent-Teachers association.

THE AMERICAN FARM BUREAU FEDERATION MILLION MEMBERS

President Announces That the Federation Has Over One Million Members

35 STATE ORGANIZATIONS ARE NOW AFFILIATED WITH THE FARM FEDERATION Has for It's Purposes the Social and the Educational Uplift of Farmers

Chicago, Nov. 19.—J. R. Howard, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, announces that the federation has now over a million members and has 35 state organizations affiliated with it. The national federation took permanent form here last spring and established headquarters in Chicago, this past summer.

Sketching the character of this new comer among the national farm organizations, together with its program, Mr. Howard, himself an Iowa farmer, said:

"The federation is an alliance of county farm bureaus into state farm bureau federations and this in turn became federated into a national organization as the American Farm Bureau Federation.

"Its purpose is to work for the economic, social and educational advancement of the farmers of the United States and for the general welfare of the Nation. It is proposed to develop this work by means of bureaus.

Our bureau of agricultural economics and statistics has already been set up. It will make a study of costs of production of the principal agricultural products and will direct and compile statistics in cooperation with the Department of Agriculture, and the various state agencies. The work will give much better insight into the supply and demand of agricultural products, with the thought that this will lead to more efficient marketing.

Our bureau of transportation is making a study of necessary transportation facilities, both by land and by water, for the marketing of our farm crops. The purpose of this bureau is to get at the real facts in the transportation problem and govern its actions accordingly. It purposes to establish rate and traffic files, which have never yet been built up for agricultural products

SLEEPING SICKNESS SPREADS IN VIENNA TERRITORY.

Geneva, Nov. 19.—A kind of sleeping sickness is said by medical authorities to be spreading throughout eastern and central Europe and the International Red Cross is seeking to have preventative measures adopted.

In Switzerland, statistics show 901 cases of the malady have been treated in the first half of the year.

AVERAGE EARNINGS IN NEW YORK CITY TRADES INCREASES

Now Double What They Were Six Years Ago and Two Dollars Higher Than a Year Ago

New York, Nov. 19.—Average earnings in this city's representative trades in September, 1920, were double what they were six years ago and, generally, \$2 a week higher than they were a year ago, according to a report prepared by the Industrial Bureau of the Merchants' Association. The report declares that, while the city's industrial activities has receded somewhat from the high water mark established during the war, there is no indication of a general slump in manufacturing. Charts giving the average weekly earnings of workmen, combining both office and shop employees, for September, 1914, 1919 and 1920, show, for the above named years respectively:

Ston, clay and glass products: \$13.96, \$26.58, \$35.11. Metals, machinery and conveyances, \$14.58, \$27.21, \$30.67. Wood manufacturers, \$12.49, \$24.26, \$30.26, 28.42. Fur, leather and rubber goods, \$11.77, \$27.00, \$26.43. Chemicals, oils and paints: \$13.67, \$24.79, \$27.00. Printing and paper goods: \$15.58, \$27.36, \$31.38. Textiles: \$9.72, \$21.03, \$24.70. Clothing, millinery, laundry, etc.: \$12.40, \$27.68, \$26.46. Food, liquors and tobacco: \$11.60, \$23.40, \$26.04. Water, light and power: \$15.79, \$30.91, \$35.59.

The general average of these industries for the three years runs: \$13.06, \$26.17, and \$28.44.

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THE GRAVE DIGGERS FOR NORTH CAROLINA'S BABIES.

The October issue of the North Carolina Health Bulletin which discusses the prevention of typhoid, diphtheria, whooping cough, measles, and colitis is just off the press. It is edited by the Bureau of Epidemiology. Four diseases which take such a heavy toll from infants are vividly presented by pictures labeled whooping cough, measles, diphtheria and colitis. The first in 1918 dug 775 graves, the second 373, third 252, and the fourth, colitis, the Master Grave Digger, dug 1,914. Then below the champion killers are two groups of children; the one anaemic, ragged, dirty, and ill-fed, begging the hosts of light on the opposite side, a group of beauties fed on pure milk and taught by an enlightened public opinion. "The spirit of two communities" it is labeled. And below: "Which spirit has yours?"

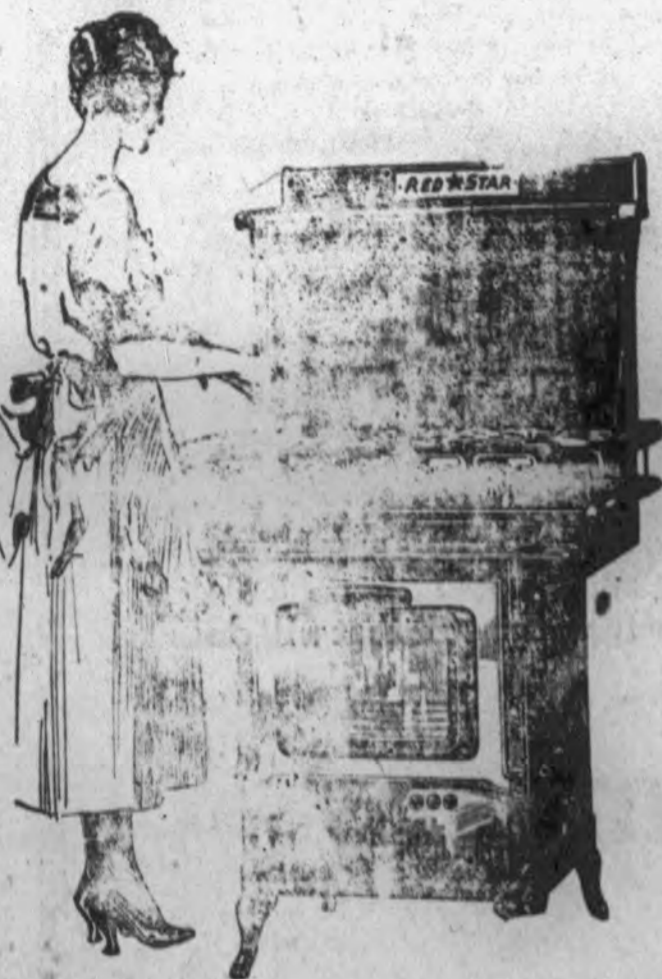

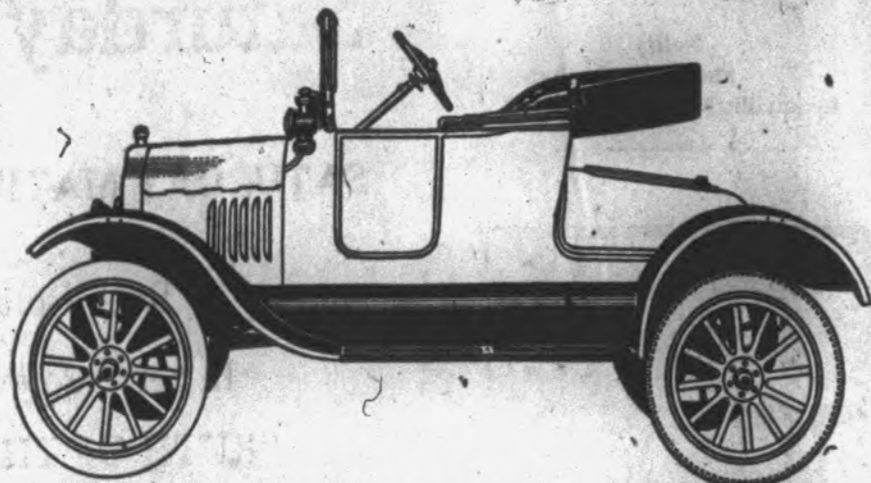

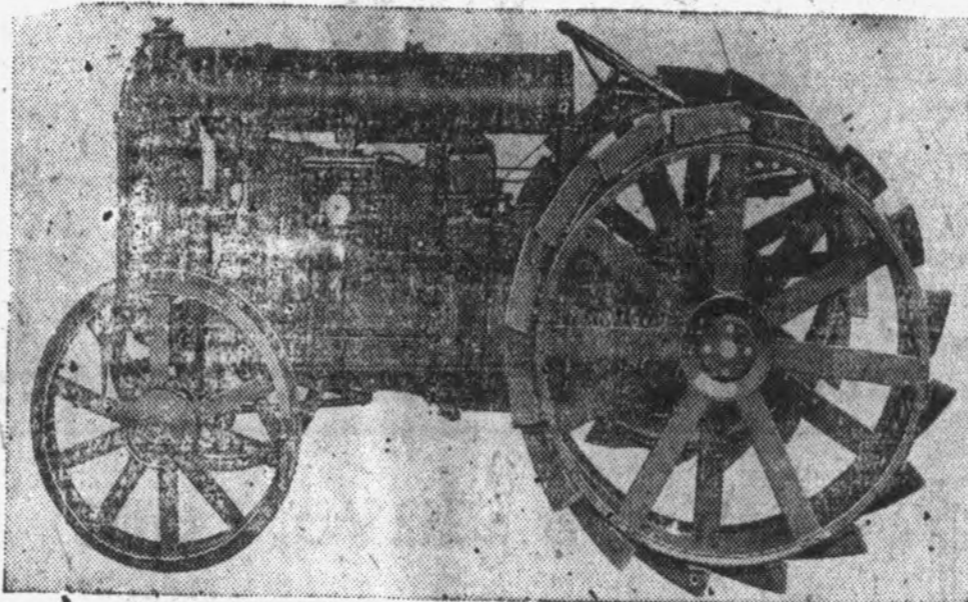

London, Nov. 19.—H. W. Nevins, a well known journalist, lecturing on "America" at the National Liberal Club here, said his visit to the United States had upset nearly all his preconceived notions about Americans.

He said he found Americans most polite, very kind and hospitable and only too ready to take trouble for other. He did not find them particularly business-like and hard-working. One thing that struck him as terrible was the individual subservience to the state and the tendency of the police to dominate everything and he gave instances of what he regarded as savage sentences of ten years' imprisonment on a "perfectly innocent and harmless gentleman," and of 15 years upon a girl of 20, who had distributed a pamphlet urging American soldiers not to fight against Russia.

There was no real political labor party in America, which was 40 years behind England in that matter. Concerning anti-English feeling in America he said he was constantly confronted by the shame of Britain's treatment of Ireland and he confessed that when he found the House of Commons jeering at dying men, and heaping insults on a country struggling for political freedom, it was almost like going home and seeing his own mother drunk on the floor.

Paris, Nov. 19.—General Fayolle said upon his return recently from his three weeks stay in the United States, "I have just discovered America and America has conquered me. It is a wonderland."

"It has been a hard fight, those three weeks in America," the General went on with the usual humorous twinkle in his eye. "I come back on the verge of collapse with grim dyspepsia holding me in its grip. Without taking back anything that I have said about American Expeditionary Force cooks being rank amateurs, I must take off my hat to American chefs. There were many banquets, luncheons, I survived them all."

To the suggestion that most of the chefs of the leading hotels were French, General Fayolle replied: "They may be but they certainly have undergone an evolution for they had strange dishes of their own."

"Did you miss your wine with your meals?" he was asked.

"I never missed my wine," Fayolle replied.

"Don't ask me to talk local American politics," General Fayolle went on when requested to explain whether he meant that he had his wine twice a day as is his custom or that he did not miss it temperamentally.
