Department of Agricultural Economics at State College Are to Make Study

MR. CARL C. KIMMERMAN ASSISTANT IN DEPARTMENT DIRECT INVESTIGATION

Government Conducting Same Type of Investigation in Some Other States

Raleigh, N. C. Nov. 22.—The Department of Agricultural Economics at State College has started an investigation of rural organizations in Wake County. The survey is under the immediate direction of Mr. Carl C. Zimmerman, Assistant in the Department who has been constituted an agent of the United States Department of Agriculture. Dr. C. C. Taylor, head of the Department, and county Superintendent, J. C. Lockhart, of the Wake County Public Schools, are assisting and cooperating. The purpose of the investigation is to discover and map the natural and spontaneous grouping of rural population into neighborhood, community or other types of organization. It is believed that the discovery of these natural grounds will furnish valuable information which can be used to more efficiently promote all economic and social work in these districts in the future.

The government is conducting the same type of investigation in a number of other States and hopes to discover some things about the natural bases of rural organization which up to the present are unknown and unused.

The Department of Agriculture Economics is in its first year's existence at state colleges. It expects to do a great deal of this type of work in the future, always with two things in view, viz: finding out new facts for use in the classroom and assisting in more efficient rural, social and economic organization.

INVESTIGATION OF BUILDING TRUST GAINS MOMENTUM

A Slight Rumble Which Began Back in 1919 Now Gaining Attention and Momentum

New York, Nov. 22.—Starting with a slight rumble in 1919, investigation of New York's building trust, has gained such momentum in the last few weeks that its roar has been heard from coast to coast.

Here are a few of the results to date:

1. The city of New York already has rescinded several contracts for public work reaching into the millions and now has considered the advisability of cancelling all contracts for public buildings, lest the "trust" had a hand in the bidding.

2. One indictment—charging perjury—has been returned by the grand jury and threats of more criminal prosecutions are in the air.

3. Testimony already entered in the record of the joint legislative committee investigation, the "trust" has given hints that combinations in restraint of trade, chargeable by committee counsel, may be nation-wide in scope.

4. Sensational disclosures have attracted the attention of the department of justice, which has assigned a special official to watch developments, and the Senate committee on production and reconstruction, which, with subpoena power, has itself studied the housing situation throughout the country.

Samuel Untermyer, who is conducting the investigation for the joint legislative committee after claiming a year ago that he had "established a clear case of criminal conspiracy" in the building trades, is confident that the inquiry soon will assume wider scope. He has openly charged that "the most important of these criminal combinations and secret agreements in the building trades are nation-wide in their scope and cannot effectively be reached by local prosecutions."

What Will You Do With Jesus? Text On Sunday Evening

As the McLendon meeting has progressed it has increased in interest from day to day. Sunday was the best day since the campaign started three weeks ago. Thousands of people were here and the big tent was filled at both services. In the afternoon the evangelist preached on "Faith" and gave a wondrously clear definition of what it is to have faith in Christ and believe on Him. Many stumble over the idea that they must have some sort of feeling before expressing faith while the reverse is true, they must have faith before they can experience joy that Christ gives.

The Sunday night sermon was on "Pontius Pilate from the text—'What will you do with Jesus?'" The character of Pilate was set forth in that even after clearing of Jesus. I find a fault in Him at all, was so swayed by the clamor of the mob and fear of Jeopardizing his efficient position that he delivered Christ to be crucified. In the application Mack showed that the man nature is the same now as then and by rejecting Him they would crucify Him. He declared every person in this tent tonight will go out either a believer in Christ or a rejector of Him. When the invitation was given at the close of the sermon scores of people went forward to declare their acceptance of Christ and determination to live for Him. These were perhaps more professions at the two services together than in all of the previous services.

Mr. McLendon announced that his campaign would close here next Sunday night and he specially wanted to make this week count for Christ. He urged all Christians to put forth their best efforts in personal work and be much in prayer to win souls.

He will preach again tonight especially to the colored people, but any white people who wish to attend may do so.

From tomorrow on two services will be held each day except Thursday, when there will be a union Thanksgiving service at 10 o'clock in the morning. The offering at that service will go to the orphanages, the members of the different churches being instructed to make their contributions in envelopes designating the orphanage it is to go to, all the loose offering to be divided between the churches supporting orphanages.

Mr. McLendon preached the following sermon on Saturday night:

"I know when I announced last night that I would preach on the Devil, one of the first things that came to your mind, 'Why is there a devil?' and 'Who created the devil?' Now, the book says in Colossians 1:18 that God created all things that are in heaven and that are in earth. Everything was created for God and by God.

The devil has not always been a devil. We read in Revelations, 12th chapter, where at one time there was war in heaven and one the great dragon was cast out and his angels were cast out with him. We also read in Judges that angels which kept their first estate but left their own habitation, he hath reserved in everlasting chains under darkness unto the judgment of the great day. We also read in Peter's letter that 'God spared not the angels who sinned, but cast them down to hell. Now in the first place, we see where there was war in heaven and the dragon and his angels were cast out; second, the angels which kept not their first estate, but left their own habitation; third, we see where God spared not the angels which sinned.

You remember when Jesus' disciples went out on their evangelistic tour they returned with great rejoicing and told Jesus that the very devil was subject to them and then Jesus conveyed to them this bit of intelligence; that he was standing looking on beheld satan as lightning fall from heaven. Well, you say, 'What was the cause of his fall?' Turn with me to Isaiah, 14th chapter and we'll read: 'How art thou fallen from heaven'

O Lucifer, son of the morning! How are thou cut down to the ground which didst weaken the nation, for thou hast said in thine heart, I will ascend into heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God, I will ascend above the heights of the clouds. I will be like the most high. And God said thou shalt be brought down to hell to the sides of the pit! Now, these scriptures show that the devil and his demons were among the angels created with Michael, Gabriel and the great multitude, but fell from their exalted positions through pride to power.

'We have a class of teachers today that are telling us that the devil is only a principle of evil that comes from within; that he is just a mere influence or sentiment a kind of an ethereal something floating around in the air. Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy, who preaches that matter is non-existent, and illusion of the mortal mind tells her followers that there is no personal evil. But as she and the Bible disagree in so many places, we'll pass Mrs. Eddy up. I want to say to you that just as God is a person; just as Jesus Christ is a person and the Holy Spirit, so the devil is a person. The devil is a powerful spiritual being, but not omnipotent, nor omnipresent. He is able to move as swift as thought and has a host of helpers as the following scripture will

show in writing to the Ephesians: 'The devil is not against flesh and blood but against principalities against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places.' One day Jesus was talking to his disciples about the judgment and he said: 'In that day that he would say, Depart from me ye cursed into everlasting fire.' Is that prepared for a mere influence? No. Prepared for a sentimental or on ethereal something that floats around in the air? No. Prepared for a principle of evil that comes from within? No. But prepared for the devil is as orthodox as any of us, was made for you, and if you harden your heart and stiffen your neck and seat your conscience and break God's commands and grieve the spirit, and resist the truth and trample on the blood and wade through a mother's tears and walk over the sermons of preachers and the teachings of the scriptures and go to hell, you will go there as an intruder, because hell was not intended for you, but for the devil and his angels.

'James writing to the twelve tribes said: 'Thou believest there is one God; thou doest well.' The devils also believe and tremble. The devil is as orthodox as any of us. Peter said, 'Be vigilant on your adversary, the devil is a roaring lion; he is walking about seeking whom he may destroy.' All the titles of satan imply personality. Notice some of them: 'God of this world; prince of this world; a liar; the father of liars; a murderer; ruler of the darkness of this world, and tempter.'

'We read in the Bible where Christ carries on conversation with satan as with a person. Not only is he a great personality, but he is the greatest power of today; that's under the sun except the true Godhead. This light contemptuous speech that you hear in regard to the devil is fully unwarranted, because he is a being of great power. You remember that when the devil and the archangel Michael were on the mountain contending for the body of Moses that the archangel Michael did not bring a railing accusation, but said, 'The Lord rebuke thee.' It seemed that in reading this scripture that the devil had more power than this angel. One of his powers is to deceive. Paul, in writing to the Corinthians, said: 'No marvel, for satan himself is transformed into an angel of light.'

'We see the picture of a devil on the wall. It is always a hideous being with a split foot and contorted countenance, but the Bible doesn't describe him that way. The prophet Ezekiel said, 'Thou wast perfect in

thy ways from the day that thou wast created till iniquity was found in thee. Thine heart was lifted up because of thy beauty. Thou hast corrupted thy prison by reason of thy unrighteousness.

'We see here that the prophet says he was looking and had great power.

'One of the many ways that the devil deceives is in a religious way. Here is a man who has given up a life of sin; turned his back on outrageous wickedness and has placed his all on the altar for time and for eternity. He has burned every bridge behind him; he is not looking at the mistakes of yesterday or the failures of the day before. He is not looking at the folks nor himself, but he is looking toward the mark. He has started at justification and he is headed toward glorification, living for God and serving Jesus Christ and obeying the holy spirit. He is exerting a powerful influence for God and hurrying the devil and his kingdom. This man's life is so upright, downright, upright and alright for God and decency, that it almost gives the devil brain fever to think of him. Like Bunyan's Pilgrim, he's running and the devil realizes he can't get him back here in his outrageous sins and extravagant wickedness. He says, 'What will I do? This man's influence is hurting my cause and it's impossible for me to get this man back to profanity, using whiskey drinking and committing adultery. Oh, yes, I'll just pull him over into fanaticism and wildfire extreme enthusiasm and murder his influence. Some of the best men that I've ever known the devil has sidetracked them into non-essentials and wildfire and paralyzed and murdered their influence. I don't think any of you people around Greenville need to be uneasy along that line, because you are a thousand miles below where fanaticism begins.

'The devil has two seats—a red-hot stove and a block of ice. If he can't get you comfortably located on the ice, he'll insist on your having a seat on his stove. You people around here are all fixed on the ice.'

Mack also took up how the devil would deceive a man in his dying hour and said he didn't go much on this deathbed confession business, and that it was like burning a candle from each end and blowing the smoke in the face of God Almighty. He said it was like drinking a cup to his better dregs and throwing the dregs in the face of Jesus Christ. He said that it was the most unmanly, unwomanly, good-for-nothing, low-down thing that a human being could do, to live in sin and trample on the blood of Jesus Christ unto the last moment and then try to creep into the kingdom of God, because of the long suffering of Jesus Christ. He closed his sermon by showing how the devil could hinder and take advantage of humanity; how he'd follow you from the cradle to the grave pounding on the vulnerable spot of your character.

PARIS NOW FACING GREAT PROBLEM OF FINDING LODGINGS

Paris, Nov. 22.—The great difficulty of finding lodgings in Paris has been the cause of many unusual incidents recently.

Divorced persons seeking separate apartments are having such difficulty in finding them that, in one case at least, they composed their temperamental differences in order to keep their old apartment.

A painter and his wife who had been divorced by mutual agreement were both looking for apartments. Frequently their paths crossed in their search for quarters. The first time they met they bowed gravely but politely. Their mutual smile gradually broadened as the hunt for flats narrowed down to a few hovels in the slum section.

'Let's kiss and make up and go back to our flat,' the wife finally said, and they did.

President Millerand, who recently took possession of the Elysee Palace, secured 41 applications for his apartment on the Avenue de Villars.

Henry Landru, who has been in La Sante prison for the past 20 months awaiting trial on charges growing out of the disappearance of 11 women, recently was dispossessed from the flat that he had occupied on the Boulevard Rochechouart, a rather sordid section of Paris. Requests came from every quarter in Paris, some even from aristocratic Auteuil, asking that the flat be reserved.

HUMPBACK WHALE FOUND OFF COAST BRITISH COLUMBIA

Bones of Whale Are Now At the American Museum of National History

New York, Nov. 22.—Capture off the coast of British Columbia of a remarkable humpback whale with two hind limbs became known here recently when the bones of the unique appendages arrived at the American Museum of National History. Scientists attached to the museum thumbed their noses on evolution, eugenic their brains and concluded the legs might have been a singular reversion to primitive type.

Back in prehistoric ages, they said, the multigreat granddads of modern whales may have strutted about on land. But, so far as they knew, no other whale with bones outside the body had ever been seen by man.

There was no earthly or waterly reason for the rear legs on the whale found off the British Columbia coast. It couldn't walk on them, as they were but four feet long, while the whale weighed several tons. It couldn't use them for swimming, as they were not flappers nor were the pedal extremities webbed. They were simply excess baggage.

But now they are the subject of lectures, lantern slides and profound discussion.

OUR SENSUS INCREASES

Eighty two counties increased in population, in ratios ranging from less than one percent in Gates and Perquimans to 38.3 percent in Gaston and 63.3 percent in Forsyth which heads the list. Thirty seven counties ran ahead of the state increases of 15.9 percent. Nearly all of these accelerated in creases are in the counties with brisk, prosperous trade and banking centers. Here we have an illustration of the lure of cities and the city producing power of industrial enterprises.

Forty four counties suffered retarded increases; that is to say, increases less than the excess of births over deaths, which is nearly 18 percent in ten years in North Carolina against about 11 percent in the United States. These counties are almost without exception agricultural counties, or counties in remote areas with deficient highway and highway facilities, in the Tidewater, the lower Coastal Plain, and the mountain regions.

ON ELLIS ISLAND**

Immigration Commissioners Show
How It Is Possible On
U. S. Doorsteps

New York, Nov. 20.—Delegates to the convention of the National Hotel Association here couldn't believe that only 15 minutes from the tip of Manhattan tempting meals are served for exactly 17 cents each. So Frederick A. Wallis, Immigration Commissioner on Ellis Island, invited doubters on a tour of culinary inspection, just to show how they do it on Uncle Sam's doorstep.

A number of the hotel men, who say they were intent on bringing down the cost of tavern fare, accepted the Commissioner's invitation, with the idea of infusing some of the Ellis Island method into the conduct of their own kitchens.

"For particulars," said the Commissioner, "see MacGowan."

The secret of reducing the costliness of provender as it appears, steaming and succulent, on the dinner table, is a mystery, but MacGowan, D. T. MacGowan, caterer on the island, is on the inside. His explanation runs: "Purchases on a lowest bid basis, quantity production, and profits never more than 1.95 per cent on the monthly investment; result, 17 cent dinners."

And when someone interposed that MacGowan "couldn't serve a 'regular' meal for 17 cents," he exhibited, as a sample menu, the following:

Breakfast: rice with milk, stewed prunes, bread and butter and coffee with two lumps of sugar to the cup.

Dinner: English beef soup with barley, Irish stew with vegetables, tapioca pudding and coffee.

Supper: Lamb hash, green peppers, bread and butter, blackberry jelly, coffee and tea.

**THE DRY ELEMENTS
IN MEXICO SUFFER
A GREAT DEFEAT**

Cafes and Cantinas Will Remain Open
All Day Sunday As A Result of Defeat

"ESTADO SECA" (DRY STATE)
MYTH AS FAR AS CAPITAL
O F MEXICO IS CONCERNED

President De La Huerta's Dry Decree
Was Subject of Much
Satirical Comment

Mexico City, Nov. 20.—The "dry" elements in the Mexican government have just suffered defeat in an attempt to close the cantinas, or saloons, on Saturday nights and Sundays. The "wets" comprising some 2,000 cantina owners and their patrons are rejoicing.

The government has strong "dry" leanings, the chief executive being alleged to favor prohibition and E. Plutarco Calles, Minister of War, being known throughout the republic as a "bone dry" advocate.

Several weeks ago a presidential decree closed all places where liquor was sold from Saturday night at 6 o'clock until Monday morning at 7. This edict had a depressing effect upon Saturday night revelry.

More than 2,000 local vendors of liquor signed a request that the government be legally restrained from enforcing the decree. After the question was violently agitated in the newspapers, the Supreme Court handed down a decision which virtually granted the request of the "wets" by naming several hundred cafes and cantinas where liquor might be sold over Sunday. This order was later expanded to include all cafes and cantinas and the "estado seco" (dry state) is a myth so far as the capital is concerned.

President de la Huerta's "dry" decree was the subject of much satirical comment in the newspapers. Handbills and placards were distributed on the main streets ridiculing the measure by burlesquing it. For instance, one bill carried a purported decree stopping profanity from sunset Saturday to sunrise Monday.
