

# COUNTY OFFICERS EFFECT BIG HAUL OF WHISKEY STILLS

Sheriff Dudley and Deputies Get Three  
Stills at Galloway's Crossroads  
and Black Jack

SEVERAL HUNDRED GALLONS  
OF BEER DESTROYED DURING  
RAID IN BOTH TERRITORIES

Three Men Make Escape from Still at  
Black Jack Distillery Before  
Officers Arrived

Illicit whiskey traffic in this part of the county was given an effective blow yesterday afternoon when Sheriff Dudley and deputies made a raid in the vicinity of Galloway's Cross Roads and Black Jack territory which resulted in the capture of three stills, the pouring out of several hundred gallons of beer and finding of four gallons of whiskey at the first still raided. The haul was one of the largest made in this section in several months, and required some time in bringing to a conclusion.

The sheriff and his men left Greenville early Thursday morning and did not get back until some time after noon. They were well entertained, however, all through the trip, according to accounts issued after getting back, and came very near having the pleasure of bringing along two or three prisoners for safe keeping. Three distillers made their escape from the Black Jack distillery before the arrival of the officers. It is believed they were all colored although they could not be plainly seen on account of heavy growth of forest surrounding the place.

The stills were of the usual type used in the manufacture of "monkey rum" in this community, of 60 gallon capacity and capable of a tremendous output in case of emergency, and this must have been an emergency season, if beer counts for anything. It was evident at each place that production had been regular of late in preparation for the holiday season, and the beer on hand suggested another output within the next several days.

The raid was one of the largest which county officials have participated in for several months, although it was not the largest under the present administration. Distillers are becoming more vulpine in operations, officers say, and it is difficult to bring about apprehension on account of insufficient evidence when cases go to court. Every effort is being made to cope with the situation, and Sheriff Dudley means to get every still coming within reach of his men.

## TEA FOR THREE TO BE PRESENTED IN CITY DECEMBER 29

Popular Comedy Company Scheduled  
for One Night Engagement at  
White's Theatre

"Tea for Three," a brilliant comedy, will appear at White's Theatre, on Wednesday, December 29. This play comes to Greenville highly recommended, and is considered by those who have seen it as one of the best comedies on the road today. It is full of laughs from the rise of the curtain until its fall. Below we give an account of the show from The Evening Dispatch, Richmond, Va.:

"Were all tea so stimulating as the brew so smartly served in 'Tea for Three,' it would readily supplant the milk shake as the national beverage. Possibly, it might even bring investigation by the internal revenue agents to ascertain the effect of its insidiously intoxicating qualities, its cordial style and dry humor. In a cold, calm and rational statement is made the admission that 'Tea for Three' is actually a brilliant comedy, zesty, scintillating, almost inspirational, and delightfully sarcastic. The piece has been written in three acts by Rol Cooper Megrue. It was presented at the Strand last night and will be shown again this evening, with identically the same capable company seen here a year ago.

"From the view of dramatists, married life is a total loss without a first class 'triangle.' Megrue, probably, could never have fashioned a tale on 'tea for two,' certainly not a successful one, for the stage does not recognize conjugality, as other than a drab and uninteresting existence. Consequently, plays are written in and around the third person. The novelty in 'Tea for Three' occurs mainly in the circumstance that the principal point in Megrue's triangle, so to speak, is 'on the square.' He is a base, cynical individual, observant and caustically philosophic, but his attitude is altogether a platonic one. This is logical and natural, though theatrically unique.

"Trouble and the story are started by the husband's misinterpretation of the intentions of the friend who calls each week for tea and a chat. He does not appreciate the possibility of his wife desiring other company than his own, not even for passing diversion. The husband is intolerant and selfish.

# BOMBAY STRIKERS STORM POLICE AND STONE MOTOR CARS

Three Thousand Workers Wreck Office  
to Factory in Disorder Several  
Days Ago

COMMISSIONER OF POLICE  
FORCED TO CALL MOUNTED  
COPS TO RESTORE ORDER

Series of Strikes in Mill Industry Re-  
fused to Be Arbitrated by  
India Government

Bombay, Dec. 24.—Three thousand strikers at one mill in the vicinity of Bombay, wrecked the office of the factory a few days ago and stoned a motor car containing police, severely injuring one inspector and two soldiers. Before the police succeeded in dispersing the strikers, they took to looting shops. A number of arrests were made and the mill district is being picketed.

Minor disorders took place elsewhere in the city, some stoning of street cars being indulged in at various places. The situation became serious enough for the commissioner of police to call the mounted police, who charged the crowd in semi-circular fashion. The casualties have not been reported, but the crowd broke up and fled. Wholesale arrests were soon after made, 60 men being taken in custody.

For more than two months now the city of Bombay has been witnessing a series of strikes in the mill industry, on the street cars, in gas works and the postal service. The tension has grown every day more serious especially on account of government refusal to arbitrate the various disputes. An All-India Trade Union Congress recently held in the foremost industrial city has given further impetus to the laboring ranks.

The Bombay strikers have sent a table to London asking for financial support from the British labor movement for their cause.

## LATVIA PEASANTS MYSTIFIED ABOUT NEW LAND POLICY

Numbers Fail to Understand How  
They Can Acquire Land Formerly  
Belonging to Barons

Libau, Latvia, Dec. 25.—Peasants are much mystified by the Latvian government's land policy and are unwilling to believe they can acquire land which formerly belong to Baltic barons without getting a title from the old owners.

Where owners of land, whether they were big estate holders or had only small acreage, participated in any of the various movements designed to thwart the present government, the government has confiscated the estates and promises to divide them eventually among the landless peasants.

But the poor peasants have had much trouble in cultivating land allotted to them because of the lack of animals, machinery and seed, and the government being unable to give them material help.

Where the peasants have been successful and have acquired money they frequently approach the former owners of the land and want to arrange a cash payment on the land to insure that the old owners will not eventually take it away from them. The statement of old owners that they cannot sell the land has no effect on the peasants, who refuse to believe they can ever acquire title without paying the old landlords and getting a blue paper or deed.

# CHILDREN OF MANY RUSSIAN GENERALS TAKEN AT CRIMEA

Sons and Daughters of General Wrangel's Staff Among Refugees Sent  
to Constantinople

THOUSANDS OF RUSSIANS  
DYING FROM STARVATION  
IN DISTRICT OF REFUGEES

Best of Old Russian Families Included  
Among Those Suffering  
Untold Hardships

New York, Dec. 24.—Two hundred children of the officers of General Wrangel's staff, sons and daughters of generals, colonels and captains, were among the 100,000 Russian refugees brought to Constantinople harbor by ships of the allied nations when the bolshevik broke down Wrangel's defense and overran the Crimea.

Many of them were orphans, their fathers having perished while fighting the bolshevik. One was the daughter of the minister of finance of the Wrangel regime. All were nearly famished when the vessels on which they had taken refuge arrived here for the ships' larders had been exhausted.

So hard pressed were all the refugees to obtain food that they threw diamonds and weapons or any other valuables into the boats of traders from Constantinople in payment for anything to eat.

A graphic story of their arrival at Constantinople and how an American destroyer took the 200 children of Wrangel's officers off the refugee vessels and landed them at the Trachona lunger maintained by the Near East Relief is told in reports received by that organization in this city. It reads in part:

## CHINA IN SERIOUS NEED OF EFFICIENT GOVERNMENT HEAD

Premier Tells Newspapers That Country  
Needs Parliament Capable  
of Doing Things

Peking, Dec. 24.—China needs a new parliament and a foreign loan to reorganize the government, Premier Chin Yun-peng told the newspaper men at the capital recently in a verbal statement. The premier outlined to the correspondents a whole program of reorganization which the government hopes to put into effect. The parliament, he said, should draft a proper constitution for reunited China, now that the mandate of the president has gone forth declaring peace between the northern and southern factions.

The premier said the government desired to reorganize and reduce the army and to separate the civil from military jurisdiction. This last, he said, might appear ridiculous to foreigners but he added, in China, "the military have overstepped civilian powers so that one finds difficulty in drawing a clear line between the two."

The premier referred to a report that the main reason for issuing the mandate announcing a reunion of the north and south was the desire of the central government to secure loans from foreign countries. "I emphatically state that the government has no such thought," said Premier Chin. "The mandate was entirely free from such a desire. On the contrary, it was only after this unity and in view of the government's measure for reorganization of the whole country that a necessity for the loan arose."

"The idea of a foreign loan was only to spare the people from making that loan themselves to the government. Capital from abroad might be brought into the country and thus save the people from using their own capital already earmarked for their own individual undertakings."

# Ruth Law, Famous Aviatrice To Visit Greenville To Fly With Daring Bill Strother

Charles Oliver, Aviatrice's Husband,  
Wires They Will Be Here  
Probably Saturday

EXHIBITION FLIGHT TO  
BE GIVEN IN GREENVILLE  
SATURDAY OR SUNDAY

Desire to Secure Services of "Human Spider" in Training Woman Flyers in Air Stunts

Greenville will this week have the distinction of being one of the first cities in North Carolina to entertain Ruth Law, world's famous woman aviatrice, who will arrive here probably Saturday or Sunday of this week with a view of securing the services of Bill Strother for training young women in the aerial profession, particularly in performing such features as the "Human Spider" has been presenting to the country for the past several months.

A telegram received by Mr. Strother this afternoon from Charles Oliver, of Chicago, husband of the famous aviatrice, stated that he would leave Chicago tonight for Greenville, accompanied by a lady member of the flying profession, who will immediately become a student of the "Human Spider" in event a contract is signed up. The lady has had considerable experience under Ruth Law, but so far they have never been able to change places successfully while in the clouds and require the intrepid spirit of one more bold and experienced.

Mr. Strother stated immediately after receiving the message that in case the party arrived at a time an exhibition flight will be given at the Greenville Heights landing field probably Saturday afternoon or Sunday morning. The young lady will be seen in daring stunts performed with the plane going at a rapid rate, and in event other machine can be secured, it is quite probable she will be seen swinging from the wings of her machine over to that of the "Human Spider." This feat will be one of the most daring ever before seen in this city, and if the lady does not make the change herself the "Human Spider" may be seen crawling over to another berth in the clouds.

The reputation of Strother and Lieutenant Treat has passed around the entire country. They are recognized as two of the most daring and intrepid airmen of the age, possibly because of Strother's ability to defy gravity, as no other man has yet succeeded in accomplishing, and, too, because of his absolute disregard for anything like fear while flying at high altitude and great velocity. For this reason it is no wonder that one who has such recognition as Ruth Law should seek his services in perfecting plans for training of the most distinguished set of women airmen in the world.

Immediately on arrival of the party here they will consider plans for an experimental flight in the interest of Greenville people. Mr. Strother stated yesterday afternoon, and nothing will be left undone to make it well worthy of hundreds of people to witness the event. In case Mr. Oliver's wife does not accompany him the flight will be made just the same, and the "Human Spider" guarantees that no one will go away disappointed for lack of being thrilled to the core. Time of the flight will be well advertised as soon as the date is decided upon, and whether it is Saturday or Sunday, will be an event to be appreciated by Greenville people.

## SALE OF AMERICAN SHOES CAUSES PANIC

## EMPHATICALLY DENIES

REPORTED EXISTENCE OF  
MONARCHIAL CHANGES

Peking, Dec. 23.—Neither bolshevism nor monarchism has a chance in China today, in the opinion of Dr. Philip Tyan, assistant under secretary in the foreign office, unofficially expressed to The Associated Press. Dr. Tyan, who is a student of international law, refutes "erroneous reports and inspired statements of a damaging nature which have been circulated recently both in China and abroad and which not only mislead public opinion but have a serious repercussion on trade." He writes as follows:

"The reports which are most persistent are precisely those which are most ill-founded. One is that a monarchical restoration has actually occurred or is imminent; another that the country not only offers an attractive field for bolshevism but that an insidious and far-reaching campaign of propaganda is actually raging which may engulf the nation.

"Both reports disclose ignorance of existing conditions and of the whole trend of Chinese thought. The factors which led to the abdication of the Manchu dynasty nearly a decade

Wilson, tobacco growers are planning to reduce tobacco acreage. If Wilson and Pitt counties fall in line together they will accomplish something worthy of note. The best bright leaf tobacco in the country is produced right here, and that is enough to cause one to believe reduction in acreage will have the desired effect.

## FUNDAMENTALLY SOUND

Pitt county is a great cotton county and a great tobacco county. These are the two products which the price slump has affected the most seriously. But the showing that Pitt is making through the Chamber of Commerce of Greenville indicate that even with the existing low prices a great amount of new wealth has been created by the farmers this year.

Putting out a statement to show that financial conditions in Pitt are fundamentally sound and to depreciate false reports as to a number of financial, industrial and mercantile concerns, the Greenville trade body gives the figures as to what cotton and tobacco have brought to the county. The total is nearly nine million dollars, quite a tidy sum any way you look at it. The average of the cotton is between twenty-two and twenty-three cents. The average of the cotton is 15.50. It is estimated that sixty per cent of the cotton and thirty-five per cent of the tobacco is still unsold and the opinion also is expressed that a large per cent of the cash that has been paid out for the portion of the crops that has been sold is still in the hands of the citizens of the county.

On the basis of these facts the Greenville Chamber of Commerce takes a hopeful view of the business situation and points with pride to the fact that although the conditions which have prevailed have tried the courage and nerve of business men, not a failure has yet occurred in the county and declares that "by honest, straight-forward dealings, man to man, there will be no failures."

The Greenville Chamber of Commerce has done business a good turn by the statement that it has issued. The south has passed through conditions much more serious than those now prevailing. It will pull through this emergency with colors flying if a reasonable number of its people will pay their debts when they can or as much of them as they can and in general, as the Greenville statement advises, deal honestly and straightforwardly as man to man.—News and Observer.

It has been discovered by a careful observer of industrial conditions that young men of the present day are not learning trades, and it seems to have occasioned much comment in some sections. The situation is really serious and no one is impressed by the fact more seriously than those who have served their time at different trades, and who readily observe lack of interest and desire to assume mechanical duties. It is something which affects the public as no other matter does, for it is a direct result of distaste for earnest labor such as made America what it is today. The way to success, however, is through labor, and the young man who goes out into the world with the idea that he doesn't have to get dirty or soil his hands to earn an honest living might as well count every effort a failure. Everybody can't be rich and influential. They are not the people that constitute the nation, for look over the world wherever you will and many of the greatest men won their way, step by step, up the ladder of success. This is a great old world, but when people forget duty we will be in a sad plight, a sad plight.

The man who thought readjustment would never take place is the one suffering the most today. Abnormality may continue for a while in almost anything, but it must be remembered that even kites always come down.

Ruth Law, famous Chicago aviator, is desirous of securing Bill Strother to train young women students in changing from plane to plane. If Bill can keep his head under such conditions, well, he's defied the law of nature and gravity too.

## JUVENILE COURTS IN AMERICA

It is estimated, on the basis of a questionnaire study made by the Children's Bureau of the United States Department of Labor, that 175,000 children were brought before courts in the United States in a year. Of these, 50,000 came before courts not adapted to handling children's cases. Although every state except one had laws providing for juvenile probation, according to the investigations of the bureau, less than half the courts hearing children's cases actually had probation service. The majority of the courts failed to make adequate investigation of the child's home and family circumstances, his physical and mental condition, and his personal tendencies.

Especially in small towns and rural districts the child is still subjected to the unsocialized treatment which the juvenile court was designed to replace.

However, certain important tendencies are noted in juvenile court work. The intelligent methods worked out by the best courts are being adopted by others. Facilities for mental and physical examinations are being extended. Co-operation between the courts and other social agencies has been increasing, and in some instances social agencies have given the services of trained social workers for probation work.

A further development is indicated in the tendency to merge the cases of children with those of their families, and to try them before "family" or "domestic relations" courts. In this way the child is dealt with as a member of his family and all the family circumstances are taken into account.

The campaign is rapidly drawing to a close, and unless Americans respond in a liberal way thousands will suffer from hardships and privations. Millions of dollars are needed to carry on the work. The record so far has been one any nation might be proud of, and it should not be overshadowed this time by failure of meeting this touching appeal.

## PLANS TO SECURE RECOGNITION FOR SOVIET RUSSINS

Leader of Russian Party Appeals to  
Unions for Common Effort in  
Interest of Country

DECLARE DEFEAT OF  
GENERAL WRANGEL IS  
VICTORY FOR PEOPLE

Would Raise Blockade and Resume  
Trade With Entire World as  
Early as Possible

Berlin, Dec. 23.—L. Martoff and B. Abramowitch, leaders in the Russian Menshevik party opposed to bolshevism who are sojourning in Berlin, have issued an appeal here in the name of their party, calling on the socialistic parties and trade unions of all the nations to make a common effort to secure the recognition of soviet Russia, to have the blockade raised and trade relations with the outside world resumed.

The appeal states that the defeat of General Wrangel is not the victory of bolshevism, but the victory of the Russian revolution and the whole Russian people.

The menshevik manifesto declares that the Russian peasant who is fighting communism in his own hamlet nevertheless furnished the government with troops to repulse Wrangel as did also the Russian social democratic proletariat both of whom are determined to have "Russian soil cleared of international and Russian reactionaries."

The manifesto then goes on to say: "The time has now arrived when the question of putting an end to further intervention in Russia is a matter of honor with the nations of Europe, as well as the United States."

The call asserts that the quickest way to accomplish the downfall of the present soviet regime is to permit it

With probably 60 per cent of our cotton and 35 per cent of our tobacco unsold and the enormous food crops that have been raised, is there any well founded reason for unfounded rumors?

It is generally believed that a large percentage of the \$8,882,697 that has been paid out for the above crops is still in the hands of our citizens. Are any of them withholding money from those to whom they are justly indebted? If so, rest assured it will become known and be held against them in the future.

## Children Of Many Russian Generals Taken at Crimea

(Continued From Page One)

"The harbor is a wonderful and sad sight. One hundred thousand Russians are on ships there, some of them dying. The best of the old Russian families are among these refugees, the men who fought for Wrangel, crowded and sick and without food except what the relief people can get to them and the bread and water given to them by the French.

"Of course, natives are profiteering, and little boats go to the ships and the Russians drop diamonds, firearms and other valuables to these traders in exchange for food. The people on these vessels represent the remains of an old aristocracy with no country to take them though the French expect to send many to Morocco.

"The children were packed with grown people like sardines on the big ships coming from Crimea and most of them were sick from fatigue, lack of nourishment and lack of sleep. Miss Gunther and Miss Hastings (relief workers), went to the ships on board a United States destroyer and 200 children were tagged with the names of their fathers and mothers, and the father's occupation. Many said: 'Father died in Wrangel's army fighting for Russia.' The destroyer brought the children to the landing of the Trachoma orphanage which is located right on the Bosphorus. Ten mothers were taken with their very young children and babies and the other children ranged from five to 13 years.
