It is reported that business is exceedingly dull on the stock exchange. That's about the way everywhere, so the bears have nothing to growl about.

The tariff bill has just hit the rocks in the senate where it will probably remain until next session. The wheat industry, at least, will be able to flourish until a rescue is effected.

Plant less and produce better crops seems to be the slogan of the farmer at this time, and if carried out it will mean more than the average man conceives just now.

The hard time croaker ought to be ashamed of the part played in increasing the period of discontent the nation has faced for so long, and the day seems to be near when he will be ready to swallow everything said.

Official investigations have occupied so much attention for the past several months that they no longer create more than ordinary interest. The country would save much money if many could be eliminated, but this will not be learned until public confidence is again restored.

Pitt county planters seem disposed to accept proposed acreage reduction in good spirit for they realize that it is the only way to bring about better conditions. Curtailed acreage and more food crops ought to place the country on a firmer footing, and if the farmers will just organize and keep organized prosperity ought to continue.

The Republican committee on River and Harbor appropriations pruned and pruned on proposed appropriations until the very heart of the bill had been cut out. The result is about what that recently approved by congress, therefore, improvements along this line will suffer considerably from unnecessary "stinginess" on part of stubborn irreconcilables.

The Supreme Council remained at odds just long enough for the report to reach America. After that its members got down to business and provided reparation that certainly will not meet with popular favor in Germany. The council, as all other great organizations, is bound to experience interruptions occasionally, but after they are over work is generally more efficient than ever.

The high price of foodstuffs would be subject to a more direct reduction if every town had a chain grocery store instead of so many of the other kind. The chain store has been instrumental in bombing business establishments trying to keep prices at the top notch forever, and as a result both city and country people have prospered in an interesting way. The trouble with the food situation is that there is hardly enough large concerns in direct competition.

Prominent business men look forward optimistically to general trend of business in the future, and it is this fact that is going to carry the country over the present period of deflation in the most profitable. The country is far from being bankrupt, and the present financial stringency cannot possibly continue longer than when readjustment becomes a permanency. It is a matter that has perplexed old heads, but one which will do the country much good in the long run.

GOVERNOR'S RECOMMENDATIONS

Governor Morrison's recommendations to the General Assembly may be considered timely as they cover several things absolutely essential to future progress and development of the State which he has been chosen to serve. His proposal for a fifty million dollar appropriation for building hard surface roads involves more than ordinary consideration, as it is realized that the old systems are a drawback to every community.

The times demand something better, and if the governor should get the legislature in the notion to give the matter the consideration it deserves there is not the slightest reason in the world why the future should not experience rapid development in an industrial and commercial way. Mr. Morrison's tax issue proposal is also an important matter and should his suggestion be heeded and every town and county given authority to arrange programs it is believable there would be greater general satisfaction and more prosperity. These two problems are the most important that have been presented for public consideration in many months, and show that the new governor is taking the initiative in matters that have been neglected too long. It is certain, however, that some time will be necessary in finally reaching a definite decision in proposed programs, for there must necessarily be a wide divergence of sentiment prevalent in the legislature which first will have to be concentrated before and definite action becomes possible. This should not be a very difficult matter as there are enough committees to get busy and within a reasonable length of time be able to present their findings to the public. Both questions are of sufficient importance to justify immediate attention. And if the legislature does as the governor desires little time will be lost in ascertaining ways and means for action.

The campaign to raise funds for suffering children of Europe is being pushed in a determined way in every section of the country and reports indicate that it will not be long before the total amount has been raised. North Carolina is far behind yet, but activities in progress among city canvassing committees indicate that funds will be increased considerably by the close of the month. The mission is one of the greatest which America has had an opportunity of taking part in in a number of years and ought to receive favorable consideration in every community. If you haven't given anything yet, do it now, and be sure you give until it hurts. The children just ask for sufficient funds until the next harvest season when they will be able to take care of themselves.

It is pleasing to note that Senator Nash's bill to abolish the State Board of Public Welfare and Charity has been withdrawn and tabled by the legislature following Mr. Nash's declaration that "he bit off more than he could chew." Welfare work is absolutely essential to every prosperous and thriving community, and if North Carolina had abolished the office the State would have suffered more than conceivable at this time. It is gratifying to note that Mr. Nash came out and candidly admitted that he found popular sentiment outweighed opposition, for he will be discredited for apparent insistence and determination when the proposal was first introduced.

Texas is considering loaning money for the purpose of erecting residences. The proposition is a very appealing one to any State with a vision for the future, but is one which most sections would not like to try out. It is true the time to build has come, but State aid should not be extended too far in a project which certainly would prove beneficial. There are enough large corporations and moneyed agencies to provide building funds, therefore, Texas seems to be a little premature in the matter.

JAPANESE GAINING IN POPULATION IN HAWAII

(Continued from page one) says in part:

With an actual population now in the islands of 114,137 (1919), as reported by the Japanese consulate-general, against 25,000 Portuguese, the next largest group, it is clear that the Japanese race has acquired a momentum which puts all the other groups out of the running with respect to numbers. That this momentum inevitably will carry the Japanese race into an increasingly dominant numerical position, if continue, is clearly shown by tables compiled from information obtained from the office of the Japanese consul-general and from records of the territorial board of health.

Dealing with the parallel presented by the methods of adjustment to island influences represented by the Portuguese and the Japanese races, the report says: While both groups originally brought into the islands to satisfy the need for cheap labor on the plantations, there is with both a pro-

nounced tendency to seek a better economic position by breaking away from the plantations and engaging in other activities giving promise of a freer and more ample life.

The Japanese are ambitious to become tenants, to own land, to set up business, to enter a profession, to rise above the category of unskilled labor and as they individually achieve their ambition, they are, like the Portuguese, participating more and more in the affairs of the islands, socially, educationally, politically. Furthermore, they are all at work. There are few triflers and idlers among them. There are now, approximately, 38,000 male and 27,000 female adult Japanese in the islands. A table, based upon information obtained from the Japanese consulate-general shows that 50,140 of them are employed in gainful occupations.

It should be said in fairness that there are few Japanese children in the juvenile courts and in institutions for delinquents; and there are proportionately very few Japanese among the convict labor gangs and in the jails. Few, if any are supported by public charity, nor are any begging in the streets.

SAYS EARTHQUAKE EPIDEMIC SHOULD CAUSE NO ALARM

year 1755 the city of Lisbon in Portugal was destroyed by an earthquake on November 1, while on the 18th day of the same month Boston was severely shaken. The difficulty is that there is no way of telling exactly when or where they will occur. If one serious quake occurs, we may predict that others are likely to follow it, but that information is of little practical value since we cannot tell how long the epidemic will last, what the interval between the quakes will be, or in what part of the earth they will occur.

The eastern part of the United States is not often visited with severe earthquakes. The only severe ones felt hereabouts since New England was settled were in 1638, in 1727, and in 1755, with a much lesser one in 1872.

The shock of 1727 was so vigorous that sermons were preached on A Holy Fear of God and His Judgements, and a day of fasting and prayer was observed. The shock in 1755 brought down 1,500 chimneys and the gable ends of brick houses in Boston. But the really large earthquakes are in the portions of the earth such as Japan, the East Indies, Alaska, and the Pacific Ocean floor, where the mountains

are new geologically, and where the rocks are moving. Volcanic regions are often identical with earthquake regions, but great earthquakes show no immediate connection with volcanoes.
