AYDEN PLANTERS AGREE TO HELP MARKETING CAMPAIGN FORCES IN THEIR TERRITORY

ly imperative that business men, bankers and growers accept the plan as all are directly affected. Pitt county has faced problems brought on by slumping prices, and if its planters had been organized and controlled the market, there is no reason in the world why

prices should not have been much better. It is true there has been a slump in foreign demand, but buying interests realizing that the crop was controlled, by a powerful association would have been convinced in the beginning that crops could not be taken at any old price. The plan is as applicable to the cotton and tobacco crops as all others, and Pitt county would be greatly benefitted by organizing as soon as possible and be in position to see their crops handled in a more efficient way with prices much better.

The market closed Friday. Gorman's selling 72,292 pounds. This gives us 11,987,776 pounds which is the largest amount we have ever sold, and for which we wish to thank our friends who sold with us. We sold this week 264,556 pounds making an average sale of 11.37, this is the lowest average of the season but the sales have been made up (for the most part) of "Cleanings of the Barn" and low grades which have sold low. Common tobacco has no friends at this time, and we again caution our friends to curtail the crop to no more acreage than they cultivate and house properly; trying to make nothing but good tobacco for another big crop spells ruin for the tobacco section, and a common crop will not pay for the marketing of the same. In our opinion one acre of good tobacco will bring more than ten of common and overcropping means common tobacco, even if we have ideal seasons for growing the 1921 crop.
