SEVERAL CASES IN FRIDAY'S SESSION OF COUNTY COUR

David Cradle, Colored, Sentenced to Six Months on Roads and Hill Peyton One Year

Some six odd cases were disposed of in the concluding session of criminal term of Pitt county court in this city yesterday, most of them of a minor nature with the exception of one or two which involved charges of participation of the illicit whiskey traffic of this city and surrounding community. Judge Cooper handled each case in his usual quick and decisive way and spared no effort in giving each offender everything coming to him in the way of justice. Road and jail sentences combined with heavy fines again predominated and the day's work as a consequence was more than ordinarily satisfactory.

Hill Peyton, colored man appearing on a charge of improper conduct in the presence of colored women, was sentenced to one year in the county jail to be hired out as county officials see fit. Charges brought against him were of a convicting nature showing that his conduct had been extremely vile and improper and deserving of severe punishment.

David Cradle, colored man hailing from the Ayden district received a sentence of six months on the county road for stealing chickens. 

This gives us 11,987,776 pounds which is the largest amount we have ever sold, and for which we wish to thank our friends who sold with us.

We sold this week 264,556 pounds making an average sale of 11.37, this is the lowest average of the season but the sales have been made up (for the most part) of "Cleanings of the Barn" and low grades which have sold low. Common tobacco has no friends at this time, and we again caution our friends to curtail the crop to no more acreage than they cultivate and house properly; trying to make nothing but good tobacco for another big crop spells ruin for the tobacco section, and a common crop will not pay for the marketing of the same.

In our opinion one acre of good tobacco will bring more than ten of common and overcropping means common tobacco, even if we have ideal seasons for growing the 1921 crop.
