PITT COUNTY WOMAN IS CRIMINALLY ASSAULTED BY UNKNOWN NEGRO

Negro Enters Home of Charlie Dall and After Criminally Assaulting Wife Demands Money

MRS. DALL ESCAPES TO NEARBY NEIGHBORS WHEN ASSAILANT RELEASES HER

Facts Concerning Criminal Assault Failed to be Divulged by Woman Until Saturday Afternoon

County authorities and citizens have been instituting a vigilant search for an unknown negro man who entered the home of Charlie Dall, white farmer residing about two miles of this city, and after criminally assaulting his wife, threatened to instantly kill her and her baby if she didn't surrender every bit of money in the house...

The neighborhood in which the crime was committed has been considerably wrought up over the affair, but so far all attempts to locate the negro have been without success.

The negro made his appearance at the kitchen door while Mrs. Dall was cooking supper. There was no one present except a little child which had been moved from another room and placed in a cradle by the mother, so she could be in nearness to it.

Fearing harm would come to the child, the mother placed it back into the cradle, and as she did so the negro grabbed her, and demanded the money.

By an almost superhuman display of strength, the woman maintained consciousness and when released jumped from the floor quickly as possible and faced the brute.

Mrs. Dall was in a fainting condition when she ran panting into the home of the neighbors.

WOMEN OUTNUMBER MEN IN REGISTERING FOR TOWN PRIMARY

Forty Two Women Against Twenty Six Men Marked Activity in Registration for City Primary Sat.

Little change occurred in registration for the city primary Saturday, with the exception that women outnumbered men nearly two to one. The record is better than any other which has been established up to the present time and indicates the women vote is going to be nearly as heavy as that of the men.

The total registration up to the present time approximates 907, which lacks only about two hundred totalling the city's entire voting strength. A rough estimate of the total should be cast, including the woman vote. This is the first time the women have had an opportunity of voting in municipal elections, and consequently their total voting strength has never been fully determined.

In the First ward there has been a registration of 80 men and women since opening of the books; in the Second ward 241; in the Third 240; in the Fourth 175 and in the Fifth 171, which brings the total up to 907.

DAYLIGHT SAVING LEGISLATION TO BE TRIED IN NEW YORK

War-time Measures to Also Be Effective in Several Other Large Cities of the Country

New York, Apr. 25.—Daylight saving will be effective this Summer in most of the large cities and industrial centers in the northern section of the Eastern Time Zone, in the majority of the larger cities in the north-Eastern section of the Central Time Zone but, as far as reports are obtainable will not be put into effect in the Southern or Western States.

In Connecticut, where a law was enacted this year prohibiting daylight saving by local ordinance, several communities are adopting summer time, by common consent following referendum votes taken by Boards of Trade, manufacturers' associations and similar organizations.

Stock Exchanges, banks, and other financial institutions in the Eastern Zone will follow daylight time principally because New York City has adopted such a plan.

New Jersey—Vitality all cities and industrial towns will be under daylight time.

AMERICAN ARMIES OF OCCUPATION IN EXCELLENT SHAPE

Fighting Forces in the Coblenz Said to be Best Equipped for Action to be Found Anywhere

Coblenz, April 25.—A complete outfit, a miniature army equipped with all necessary services, capable of taking the field at 24 hours notice without the assistance of any outside elements and one of the best military units ever organized in the world's history of armies, such is the description that military men, allied, neutral and former enemies apply to the American Army of Occupation as it is constituted today.

The efficiency of the training system of the American forces in Germany, the excellence of their equipment and their faultless military bearing are generally recognized throughout Europe is shown by the fact that missions from various countries have either visited Coblenz during the past few months or have applied for permission to come to this base and get first hand knowledge of how it is done.

A few weeks ago the Chief of Staff of the Swiss army, accompanied by several officers, spent a week in Coblenz as the guest of General Allen, the American commander, attended inspections, visited the barracks, reviewed the troops and returned to Bern to tell the officers of the Swiss army that the American army on the Rhine was the most up to date, the best equipped and the best looking military outfit of all the armies of the world.

A commission from the Netherlands made a similar visit and was equally favorably impressed and now the Finnish government has asked permission to send a commission to Coblenz.

Should circumstances require the American army on the Rhine to move against an enemy or to further territory, 10,000 infantrymen composed of the First and Second brigades would furnish the bulk of the fighting force.

FLAMES DESTROY THREE BUILDINGS IN PERKINS TOWN

Dwelling House, Lodge Building and Store Wrecked by Flames at an Early Hour This Morning

Fire of an undetermined origin this morning completely wrecked a colored dwelling, store and tobacco building in the Perkins town district of this city about three o'clock. Several nearby dwelling houses all occupied by colored people, were threatened with destruction but by timely work of the fire department a destructive conflagration was prevented.

It is estimated that the loss will approximate at least \$4,000, partially covered by insurance. The property was owned by P. M. Johnson, the store being occupied by Richard Moore. The lodge building was a crude affair used by a colored fraternal organization as headquarters. The flames had gained such headway when the fire department arrived that effort to save the buildings proved futile and the firemen directed their attention to other buildings in close proximity, which at times were threatened with destruction.

EDWARDS DELIVERS STRONG SERMON TO CROWD LAST NIGHT

Basing His Sermon on the Subject "If We Only Knew", Dr. Edwards Denounces Hasty Verdicts

Denouncing gossip and pleading with his audience to always with hold their verdicts until the evidence is all in. Dr. Edwards, who is conducting the revival services in the Christian Church, on last evening preached one of the most unique and powerful sermons ever preached in this city on the subject "If We Only Knew", taking his text from Luke—23-34, "Father forgive them; for they know not what they do".

Dr. Edwards related incident after incident showing where verdicts pronounced before evidence was all in had led to the ruination of lives, the blighting of hopes, and the suicides' grave. He painted gossip and scandal in the most scalding terms, and showed in each where the verdict would have been different had people with held their opinions until the evidence was all in.

The sermon was most opportune and one which should be preached much more than it is. Gossip and criticism is doing more damage today to the American homes than any one thing, and if sermons are not preached, and if gossip does not cease the American home stands in danger of being destroyed.

Tonight Dr. Edwards will preach on the subject, "A Days Journey with Him", basing his sermon on the account of Jesus being left in the Temple, while His parents journeyed without Him. It is one of the strongest sermons of the series, and the evangelist is especially anxious for the people of the city to hear this sermon.

Mr. Pollock sang a beautiful solo last evening. He possesses a strong voice, and always delights with his singing.

WILLIAM C. EWING TO DIRECT ACTIVITY FOR NEXT SEVERAL WEEKS

Every Plan for Success of Institution Outlined in Brief Way by Public Managers

A campaign committee of representative men and women of Pitt county will have general supervision of the intensive effort to build up the membership of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce, according to announcement this morning. A special meeting has been called for two o'clock tomorrow, Tuesday afternoon, at the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce, No. 317 Evans Street.

Mrs. R. R. Cotton of Bruce, Mrs. Ned Laughinghouse, Mrs. H. S. Ragsdale and Mrs. R. Williams of Greenville, have been invited to serve. Others of this committee are: Amos Clarke, of Grimmesland, W. C. Chauncey, of Pactolus, P. L. Clodfelter, W. W. Dawson, of Grifton, W. H. Dall, Jr., J. R. Davis, of Farmville, Dr. C. J. Ellen, R. A. Fountain, of Fountain, B. D. Forrest, of Winterville, E. B. Ficklen, J. N. Gorman, G. B. Hadley, E. B. Higgs, G. E. Harris, F. C. Harding, F. G. James, J. I. Little, B. W. Moseley, C. L. Parker, of Bethel, Joe Parker, of Farmville, J. L. Perkins of Stokes, G. S. Porter, of Chicod, G. H. Pittman, of Falkland, H. V. Staton, of Bethel, J. R. Turnage, of Ayden, H. A. White and J. E. Winslow.

Membership of the campaign committee is not confirmed to present members of the Chamber of Commerce. True, the Board of Directors of that organization is very active in preparing for the expansion movement and all of the eleven men constituting the Board are doing everything in their power to broaden its scope and work towards the betterment of Greenville, of Pitt county in general, and of the men and women who reside in every section of Pitt county.

William C. Ewing, campaign director, of The American City Bureau, will be presented to members of the campaign committee. It is his intention to place at the disposal of the people of Pitt county the experience gained by The American City Bureau as the result of several years of civic work. Mr. Ewing said this morning that already there was a marked degree of interest in the plans that are being formulated and that there is no question in his mind but the Chamber will be made very serviceable to the people of Greenville and of other parts of Pitt county.

So many people have asked me during the past few days just how we are going to handle the task of enlisting several hundred people in the Chamber of Commerce and what plans of vital interest will be adopted by the Chamber as a result of this reorganization, that I have made a little outline of the whole campaign, said Mr. Ewing. It is arranged under the headings that have been suggested by questions that have been asked.

The following is the plan: First, securing the necessary membership and income for three years. (a) A carefully compiled list of the citizen of Greenville and other sections of Pitt county who should support such movement, made in card index form. (b) The number of memberships that each should carry, based upon the benefits to be expected and what corporations, firms and men of similar standing in other cities are doing, indicated on each card. (c) This list examined carefully by two separate committees and passed by the executive committee before it is used.

Second, creating a working membership. (a) During the campaign for memberships and afterwards, a systematic method of acquainting the public with the proper functions of the Chamber of Commerce to be put in operation. (b) A series of forms and meetings which ultimately become schools of organization. At these gatherings specialists will present the steps

The country will approve of Secretary Hughes' action in demanding greater restriction of immigration in this country. This would have been advisable long ago, but since it has been left up until now it is to be hoped there won't be any procrastination in making it a reality.

People everywhere are complaining about high taxes, while members of the Republican party are doing everything in their power to place a heavy tariff on imports. One is trying to do away with oppression and the other is trying to increase it. Now which please, is really worth consideration?

President Harding at least finds time to commend work of the Salvation army. There are very few who find time to do anything else when the organization is concerned, for it is one of the greatest factors for public good of any other in the country. The president might find it advisable to reach down in his pocket and help increase its funds instead of doing it all in commendation.

It is pleasing to note the gas rate hearing has been completed in favor of Raleigh and other cities. This is exactly as it should have been, for increased rates are clearly of benefit at this time, and the public should do everything possible to discourage further extortion of any kind. It was a very unfair demand of the power company to even propose an increase in rates at this time when wages and cost of production are being decreased almost daily, and the commission ruled wisely when it favored the municipalities.

The United States has declined to act as mediator on the reparations question between Allied countries and Germany, and in doing so the administration acted more wisely than the public really gave it credit for. Germany should realize by this time that the indemnity is not unjust, for the great damage which its people committed against the world cannot possibly be atoned for in money. The government should be glad to get off so lightly and no one realizes that more than those who saw conditions as they prevailed in the war stricken districts when the war closed.

President Harding should remain firm in his decision regarding the German reparation question. He probably realizes as did Mr. Wilson that Germany is responsible for every cent the Allies demand, for the crime committed against civilization was of such enormous proportions that money alone will never be able to pay for the damage. It's natural for the Germans to appeal for aid, but it is unnatural to expect that any one country will feel inclined to become more lenient than they have already been. That's impossible and Germany ought to have realized it long ago.

Herbert Hoover is of the opinion that all freight rates of the country must come down if business is to thrive as it should. Mr. Hoover will find that there are many fruit and truck growers who have the same opinion about the matter and are willing to do everything possible to produce better conditions. High prices and excessive rates must be abandoned by every source of industry before things become normal, and the sooner business men and large manufacturing enterprises find it out the earlier readjustment may be reached. Business conditions are very uncertain at this particular time, and money is very tight, but when prices come down the public will be much better off in every way.

HIGH HOUSE RENTS

High house rents are another thing which deserves to be earnestly considered by property owners in Greenville at this time. Prices on practically all commodities have been decreased together with wages, and it is very evident indeed that people are not able to pay extortionate rents as they were several months ago. There are numbers of men that own houses for rent who seem determined to hold prices at the top rung as long as possible, and this is about the meanest thing noticeable in the readjustment period.

Pretty soon, however, big changes is going to come, and when it does become a reality such people are going to find it a very difficult matter to rent their houses to anyone. There have been numerous instances during the recent house shortage when families were forced to advocate by unprincipled person offering higher prices without their knowledge. This has been frequent, and the man that yielded to such persuasion deserves very little respect from that community in which he resides. It's mighty nice to have property and vast wealth, but when one gets them by making the other fellow suffer there's certainly a great punishment in store somewhere if not in this life.

Unfortunately Greenville has a few such men within its confines. They have been instrumental in literally robbing their fellowmen by imposing unnecessary high prices for homes, real estate and commodities, but the reckoning time is coming much sooner than expected and when it comes they are to be pitied even though they committed the greatest possible crime against humanity. The past period of inflation was instrumental in bringing out the real character of many business men, and many of them will live in the community for years and years before they will be able to square themselves with the public, or the people who have suffered as result of their action.

necessary in the successful organization management. (c) The speakers to be aided by charts and other methods of graphic presentation. Everything reduced to a common sense basis and hiphurrah devices to be avoided. (d) The definite and methodical way of presenting a sometime misunderstood field of activity fortifies the optimist with a mass of intelligent arguments and smother the pessimist under the mass of careful correlated facts which leave no ground for just criticism of a real Chamber of Commerce.

Third, the development of a program of work. (a) With the completion of the membership and educational campaign, the development of a program of work will be the next step. (b) Each member will be asked to express in writing on what he thinks the organization should undertake to benefit the city and county as a whole, and for the promotion of his own line of endeavor. (c) The expression thus received will be correlated and written into concrete paragraphs, these forming the planks in the program of work. (d) This method brings unity of action in the shortest possible time, and enables the officers to reach out intelligently to the individual members for support and action.

Fourth, installation of committees, organization and control. (a) Special, instead of standing committees, for specific work. (b) Careful analysis of the work to be done. (c) Careful schedule of action, preparation of needed data, limited committee appropriations, conferences between committees and directors at frequent intervals.

Fifth, Outline of office system. (a) Disbursement records and authorization of expenditures. (b) Budget for proper distribution of expenditures. (c) Card index for membership records showing what projects the members are interested in as assistance to the committee on committees for the proceedings of the committees and the directors. (d) Filing records for commercial, industrial, agricultural, civic and other information; photographs and other data for publicity purposes.
