FAILURE OF GOVERNMENT TO ACCEPT FORD'S OFFER HAS COST THE NATION \$1,500,000 FOR LAST SIX MONTHS

Gray Silver Tells Farm Federation
Leader of Effort to Cheat the
Farmer of His Dues

SAYS FARMERS SHOULD
NO LONGER BE DENIED
HENRY FORD'S PROMISES

Says Opposition to Ford's Offer is an
Effort to Smother Fertilizer
in This Country

Florence, Ala., Jan. 20.—Failure of the government to accept Henry Ford's offer to open up Muscle Shoals project has cost the government approximately \$1,500,000 for the last six months and will mean additional loss of a quarter million dollars for every month's delay, Gray Silver, head of the American Farm bureau federation, told a southern group of federation meeting here today.

The farmers will no longer be denied the economic advantage of Ford's offer and promises to them, according to Silver, who characterized opposition to Ford's proposal as simply an effort to "keep the fertilizer industry retarded."

Idleness of the government in developing Muscle Shoals project is also resulting in extensive depreciation of the partially completed nitrate plant, Silver declared, and if improvements aren't going to be made the project should be turned over to some one capable of getting results.

STATE COMMISSION DECIDES TO FINISH ROAD TO FARMVILLE

Highway Commission Notifies City
That Bad Strip of Road Near
Here Be Completed

CONSTRUCTION WORK TO
BEGIN WITHIN NEXT FEW
DAYS, IT WAS STATED

Town and State Reach Agreement
Regarding Paving of Con-
necting Link

The bad strip of road connecting Dickinson avenue with the hard surfaced road to Farmville will be paved within the next several days.

This information was received by Mayor D. M. Clark this morning from members of the state highway commission, who said construction work looking to paving of the road would begin in the next few days.

The work will be done by Cheatwood & Driscoll, who have the paving of the Ayden road in charge, before moving their camp to Winterville, it was stated, and if nothing happens Greenville and Farmville should be connected by a long link of pavement without a single break.

There has been quite a controversy between the city and state highway commission regarding the paving, but this has been amicably settled, and the State will bear the expense with the city paying only the increased cost in construction work.

This information will be received with interest in every part of the county, as the bad strip of road has been a constant worry to automobile drivers going and coming from Farmville to Greenville. Mayor Clark stated that he is satisfied the matter is permanently closed now, and will exert every effort in getting construction work completed as soon as possible.

ORGANIZED MINERS PLAN TO PARALYZE FUTURE INDUSTRY

Strike of Great Proportions Planned
by Miners to Become Effective
About First of April

TO DEMAND INCREASE
OF WAGES AND BETTER
WORKING CONDITIONS

Rejection of Demands by Operators
Will Bring Greatest Strike
Known to Industry

Washington, Jan. 20.—The last ditch of the fight against "starvation wages" will be determined upon by organized miners, now massing ranks for a nation-wide strike April 1st, it was learned here today.

Miners will first demand five to ten percent wage increase to become effective April 1st, when existing contracts expire, it was stated.

Rejection of demands by operators will precipitate a strike of such proportions as to paralyze the entire coal industry.

LEGION PLANS CENSUS TO DETERMINE COMPENSATION FAVORED BY VETERANS

National Chairman MacNider Will Present Plans at Meeting in Indianap-
olis Today Which Should Aid Former Soldiers and Give Govern-
ment Correct Line on Probable Demand on Na-
tion's Cash Resources

Indianapolis.—A census of all World War veterans in the United States to determine what form of Federal compensation each man prefers is to be arranged at the most important meeting of the American Legion ever held between national conventions.

At this meeting, which convenes here today, Hanford MacNider, national commander of the Legion, will present plans for interviewing every ex-serviceman to determine his desires as regards the five-fold adjusted compensation scheme set out in the pending "bonus" bill in congress.

By determining in each instance whether cash payment, paid-up insurance, vocational training, aid in buying a home or aid in settling land is preferred, the census is expected to be of vast assistance to the government in making provision for compensation settlements. It will determine, it is pointed out, the extent of the immediate demand on the cash resources of the nation.

The canvass, which also will include ex-servicemen, in addition to giving an accurate perspective of the so-called bonus situation, is de-

PITT COUNTY CROPS SHOWS GREAT GAINS FOR PRESENT YEAR

Report of Agricultural Department
Shows 25,420 Bales of Cotton
Ginned This Year

ONLY 17,273 BALES WERE
GINNED IN COUNTY FOR THE
SAME PERIOD LAST SEASON

Major Part of Crop Has Already Been
Disposed of, But Many Bales
Remain to Be Sold

According to a report made public this afternoon by the department of agriculture there were 25,420 bales of cotton counting round bales as half bales, ginned in Pitt county up to January 1st, against 17,273 for the same period last year. This average is considered exceptionally fine and shows to what extent cotton production is developing in this county despite reduced acreage the past season.

The majority of the crop has been disposed of, and the next month or so will see a great decrease over the December report. There are numbers of farmers who have not marketed the greater part of their crop, but it is believed the increase in prices during December caused many to sell who would have held their crop over several weeks longer.

The price situation is as uncertain today as it has been at any time the past two years, and while no distinct advance is looked for it is probable things may brighten up considerably in the near future. Changing conditions have much to do with the way cotton sells, and movements in favor of agriculture may help strengthen the market eventually.

The coming of the boll weevil may result in radical reduction of acreage in this state during the coming planting season. These are many planters who have been so badly hurt by the boll weevil that they will not plant their usual acreage and trust to luck that the weevil will miss them. This is considered an unwise course, as a small crop of cotton with surplus acreage planted in food crops would assure the grower of prosperity in spite of destruction of his crop.

CIVIL COURT TERM CLOSES FOLLOWING EVENTFUL SESSION

Term Completed Shortly After Noon
Hour Today With Completion
of Few Minor Issues

CRIMINAL SESSION TO
BEGIN HERE NEXT WEEK
WITH LENGTHY DOCKET

Everett Stroud Awarded Judgment
Against Robersonville Tobacco
Company and Others

The civil term of Pitt county superior court which convened in this city last Monday morning was brought to a conclusion shortly after noon adjournment today after disposing of many of the hardest fought cases in months. The session in reality was completed before the noon hour, but there were a number of unimportant matters requiring the attention of Judge Crammer after the noon hour, as a consequence officials remained in session and completed the work.

The regular January term of criminal court will convene Monday morning, and Judge Crammer will preside over this also. Many interesting cases are on docket, and it is expected numbers of road sentences will play quite an important part. The criminal docket has been congested many months, but the cases to be heard next week are of recent date and fresh in minds of the public.

About forty cases were disposed of this week, many of which consisted of a few compromise proceedings. Everett Stroud of Greenville yesterday afternoon was awarded the sum \$747.07 against the Robersonville Dredging and Tobacco Company as result of an indebtedness which the defendants declined to settle satisfactorily.

Johnson Edwards was granted absolute divorce from Annie Edwards. This was the third divorce action disposed of during the term.

Compromise proceedings were effected in the case of Mrs. Mary James vs. R. D. Boone.

The Farmers Bank of Greenville was awarded judgment against L. D. McLawhorn and R. R. Cannon, in which a note and interest was ordered to be paid.

Compromise proceedings were also taken in the case of P. B. Loftin against W. L. McLawhorn.

CRAMNER UPHOLDS RECENT ACTION OF JUVENILE OFFICER

Superior Court Confirms Decision Re-
moving Ethel Gardner From
Home of J. H. Boyd

Judge E. H. Crammer, of Southport, yesterday afternoon signed an order removing Ethel Gardner, 13 year old white girl, from the home of her uncle, J. H. Boyd, with whom she has been residing in the Grimesland district. The decision sustained a recent hearing before J. F. Harrington, clerk of superior court, from which Boyd entered notice of an appeal to superior court.

Clerk Harrington granted a hearing sometime ago on a petition, alleging that the girl had been neglected and was not surrounded by proper environments. It was following this hearing that the order was issued removing the girl from Boyd's care.

Through the efforts of K. T. Futrell, county welfare officer, a home was arranged for the girl at Wilson, and she will be sent there soon.

This is only one of the number of cases which have been amicably settled through efforts of the county juvenile court of which J. H. Harrington is judge. There are others on docket, and within the next several months conditions will be more favorable for neglected children throughout the section.

There are only twenty days more before the tobacco market will close for the season. Farmers who yet have tobacco on hand should make a note of this.

WATER IS YET SCARCE
IN MANY COUNTRY WELLS

The boll weevil is coming, but the fact isn't troubling the farmer that intends to produce plenty of food crops.

United States farmers are promised several million dollars this year providing they produce enough food crops to let Europe have a good supply. Farmers should take note of this and see what can be done.

Senator Glass, of Virginia, recommends that senators talk more sense to bankers and less nonsense to farmers. The suggestion is a good one, but very few members of the senate have enough commonsense to see it.

The government is rather slow in rendering a decision regarding the sale of Muscle Shoals, but nothing more could be expected. Administration officials are too slow in many matters, and we believe this particular applies to the Muscle Shoals proposition.

Germany is becoming more democratic, according to reports reaching this country. That's the best sign yet that the country is recovering from the effects of imperialism and autocracy that held sway during the Kaiser's rule.

Reports emanating from London indicate the food situation is becoming serious in that country, therefore, it is imperative that American people prepare to supply them until the next harvest season. Few other countries are in position to do so, and it is up to American farmers to provide for them in time of need.

It is pleasing to note the number of new homes now under erection in Greenville, for it assures us the extreme shortage of houses will be relieved by spring at least. With these additional houses rents should take quite a tumble. There's no denying that many houses have rented for too much in past months, and numbers of hard working people have been forced to suffer as a result. The building boom, however, should bring about desired relief, and if there's any suffering done it will be those who charged excessive prices for their houses.

About the most advisable thing city officials could do at the present time would be to begin a campaign looking to the improvement of our streets. There are many streets that need immediate attention, and when they are properly improved each section of town will present a much better appearance. Well kept streets are as essential to the appearance of thriving town as homes, as the first shows thought and taste on part of the administration and the latter affects the citizen. This is an important matter, and it is hoped city fathers will take it under consideration at the earliest possible moment.

ENTERTAINS GEORGE B. SINGLETARY CAPTER U. D. C.

Mrs. N. W. Outlaw was hostess to the United Daughters of Confederacy yesterday afternoon from three to five o'clock. The day being the birthday of three of America's most famous men, Robert E. Lee, Thomas Jonathan (Stonewall) Jackson, and Matthew Fontaine Maury, the program consisted of short sketches of the life of each. The sketch on the life of Robert E. Lee was given in a most interesting manner by Mrs. E. B. Picklin, the life of Stonewall Jackson by Mrs. J. L. Hassell, and the sketch on Maury, America's greatest scientist, by Mrs. R. H. Wright. All three papers were indeed interesting and as

their subjects are known and beloved by Americans, the program was perhaps enjoyed more than any one presented in a long time.

The chapter had as their guest Mr. Barrie of Virginia. This old gentleman, aged 82 years, who fought with Lee and Jackson and who is well acquainted with the period from '61 to '65, related in a most interesting manner the events of the period. After his talk on the war, he sang songs which were popular in war days and which are not even in print now. He also gave some readings. The chapter, wishing to show their appreciation and delight at having such a distinguished visitor presented him with ten dollars.

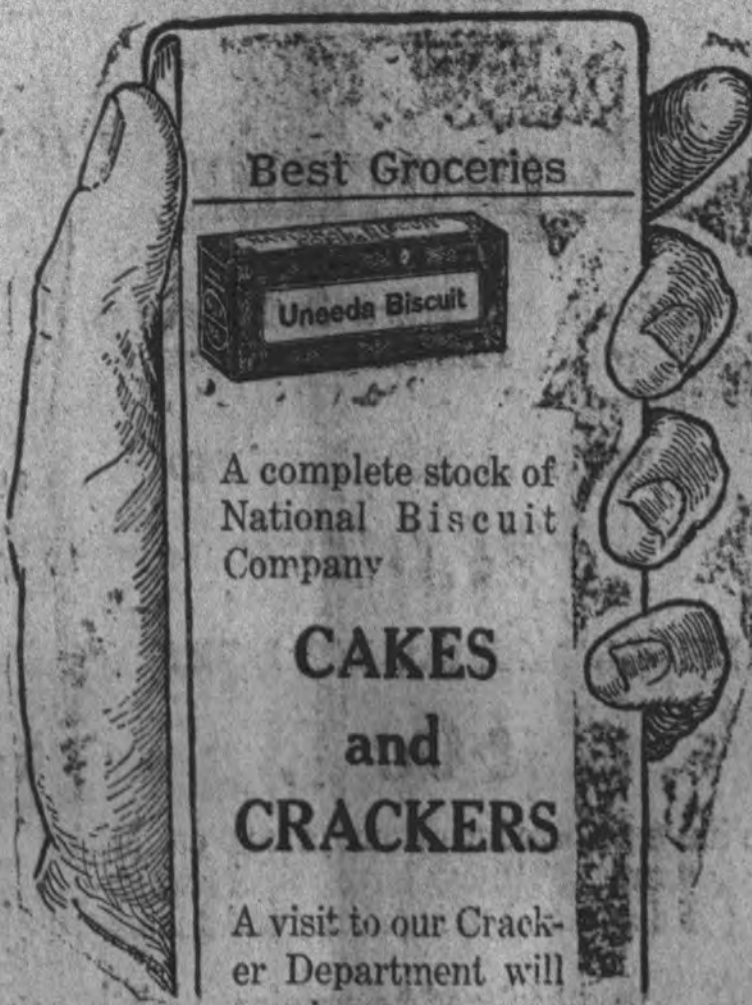

Colored Liquor Going to Reap Harvest for Business in 1925 He Says.

Young men in the Fifteenth Judicial district are being advised by Judge J. Bis Ray to get ready to go into the undertaking business about the year 1925. Rich harvests are promised by the Judge, and his predictions are based upon the chemical actions of liquors purveyed as whiskey in these parts.

A friend of the Judge has made a chemical analysis of a score of samples of such whiskey as the market affords. Everything, even to the fanciful labels is counterfeit. The color of the so-called bond liquors is obtained by the use of fusel oil. This oil saps the oxygen from the blood, and within four years, patients are dead.

Never before in the history of the state has so much "red liquor" been

sold as there is on the market now, Judge Ray told the grand jury in Cabarrus a week ago. People have got above drinking old fashioned white liquor, and must have it colored. The color kills, and wherefore the judicial admonition to get into the coffin business.
