HUNDRED TOBACCO BEDS IN SIGHT OF FARMVILLE ROAD

Farmers Apparently Preparing for Large Production of Bright Leaf This Year.

LARGE PRODUCTION THIS SEASON WILL PARALYZE INDUSTRY

If Rest of County Has Planted in Proportion, Serious Situation Faces Grower.

There are approximately 101 tobacco beds in sight of the hard surfaced road from the outskirts of Greenville to Farmville, according to actual count made by persons interested in development of the industry in this section of the country.

It is thirteen miles from Greenville to Farmville, and if farmers in other sections have planted in proportion to those along the hard surfaced road, the production of bright leaf is going to be greater than ever. Tobaccoists are apprehensive concerning the coming season, and fear large acreage is going to be realized despite advice to the contrary.

World markets are already congested beyond hope of relief with the next several months, and tobaccoists generally agree that even normal acreage will result in almost complete demoralization of the industry. No power on earth can prevent the impending disaster and unless the farmer considers the seriousness of the situation conditions will be more concentrated than can be imagined at the present.

The number of beds from Greenville to Farmville may be considered a pretty good index to conditions prevailing throughout the county, it is believed. The farmer that prepares for large acreage will produce a competitive spirit among his neighbors, and the opening of the season will find the market hopelessly glutted and momentarily paralyzed.

It is generally believed the farmer will do the right thing to reduce acreage and confine his time to the production of better tobacco. The market is always ready to accept this kind of bright, as past seasons have shown, and small acreage of good tobacco will really mean more in a financial way than a large crop mixed with good and bad grades.

Tobaccoists are urging the grower to plant carefully, and if the advice is followed the year is destined to be favorable despite radical changes of the world market.

FARMERS TO PLAN TO BUY FERTILIZER BY CO-OPERATION

Meeting to Discuss Plan to be Held at Court House Here Friday Morning.

O. F. McCrory WILL BE PRINCIPAL SPEAKER OF THE OCCASION

Other Matters Pertaining to the Farmer Will Also be Discussed At Length.

Co-operative buying of fertilizer for Pitt county farmers will be discussed in detail at a meeting of growers to be held at the court house in this city Friday morning, March 10th, according to information received today from O. F. McCrory, district farm demonstration agent. Fertilizer dealers are urged to attend the meeting in large numbers so a definite program may be outlined for the coming planting season.

Co-operative buying of fertilizer is receiving wide consideration in the Eastern section of North Carolina at the present time, said Mr. McCrory, and indications point to organization in practically every township. The matter has been investigated thoroughly, and it has been ascertained that fertilizer in large lots may be purchased much cheaper than heretofore.

Lenoir and Beaufort counties have practically organized for the approach season, and hope to greatly enlarge the organization by next year. Farmers who haven't bought are urged to hold up until the meeting Friday when definite plans for the venture will be outlined.

District demonstration agents are urging co-operative buying in all parts of the state at the present time. Mr. McCrory stated, and the farmer as a result is expected to save several thousand dollars. The price situation is expected to undergo a change for the better in the near future, and even dealers will be able to sell below old prices, it was stated.

COMMISSIONERS DISCUSS REGULAR BUSINESS MATTERS

The board of county commissioners were in regular session at the court house in this city today, but only matters of a general business nature were taken up for consideration. The usual monthly report of business conditions was turned over to members for consideration and a great number of bills ordered to be paid.

SMALL DOCKET IN TODAY'S SESSION OF COUNTY COURT

J. W. Gurganus, Charged With Giving Worthless Checks, Was Released Upon Payment of Checks.

J. W. Gurganus, white man residing a short distance from this city, was sentenced to eight months on the county roads for giving worthless checks by Judge Lewis G. Cooper in this morning's session of county court. Judgment, however, was suspended in this case as well as two others of the same nature, providing the defendant agreed to pay the amount of checks involved in each case and appeared before the court to show good behavior for a period of two years.

Gurganus is alleged to have given bad checks to three Syrian merchants in Greenville, who immediately swore out warrants for his arrest. He was given a preliminary hearing in a magistrate's court and bound over to this morning's session of county court in default of bond.

The docket this morning was the smallest in sometime, and adjournment became possible long before the noon hour.

R. E. Currin, charged with driving and automobile while in an intoxicated condition, driving an automobile without lights and being drunk and disorderly, was adjudged not guilty. The case was continued from mayor's court several weeks ago.

W. M. Potter, charged with gambling, was fined \$20 and cost of action. Noah Hardee, charged with being drunk and disorderly, was released upon payment of \$10 and cost of action.

After conferring briefly with unionist leaders in the coalition government who are trying to effect settlement, the premier was forced to retire to bed, suffering from a nervous strain and an old bronchial affection.

Smith, pastor of Memorial church, suspended his service for the night, and with his congregation attended to take part in the welcome service to the new pastor.

Prof. L. R. Meadows was in charge of the service, and at the completion of the devotional exercises, introduced Rev. L. W. Smith, of Memorial church, to extend the welcome of the Baptist of Greenville to Dr. Plimmons. Mr. Smith's welcome to the new pastor was most cordial, both for himself and his church, for all Baptists in the community, and for the people generally. He referred to how the pastor and congregation of Immanuel church had united with Memorial church fourteen months in extending a welcome to him, and declared his pleasure at the opportunity of showing the same spirit of unity and brotherly love in this service. He expressed the wish that both pastors, both churches and both congregations may go hand in hand and heart to heart working together to the common end of winning souls to Christ and honoring God in the extension of His kingdom.

Dr. Plimmons was equally felicitous in his response to the welcome words. He thanked Mr. Smith first for his personal welcome, and then Memorial church for their spirit of unity and cordial greeting. He expressed his hearty co-operation in and approval of the wish by Mr. Smith for a united interest and fellowship in all Christian work. As a pastor and a citizen of Greenville he pledged his best effort in service to the church and to the community.

Dr. and Mrs. Plimmons reached Greenville Friday evening and his first service was held in Immanuel church Sunday morning. He is a man of ability and of most pleasing appearance and address. At the very beginning of his pastorate he has taken hold of the hearts of his congregation and all others who have met him. He is a native North Carolinian, being born and reared in Buncombe county. He went to the seminary in Louisville, Ky., to complete his theological training and never

RAILROADS BEGIN DRIVE TO REDUCE WORKMEN'S WAGES

Every Railroad of Nation Represented At Opening of Hearings This Morning.

REPRESENTATIVES OF EMPLOYEES PLANNING VIGOROUS PROTEST

Effect Will Be Made to Maintain Present Wage Scale So Far As Possible.

(By International News.)

Chicago, March 6.—Railroads of the nation today began a drive to reduce wages when hearings of applications for wage reductions of almost nearly every railroad of the country began before the railway labor board. Nearly all classes employees were included in the hearings, except the Big Four Brotherhood. Switchmen were negotiating directly.

The railroads are endeavoring to wipe out the remainder of increases granted two years ago. Representatives of workmen are prepared to make a vigorous fight to maintain present wages.

ANOTHER OFFER OF LEASE FOR MUSCLE SHOALS PRESENTED

Georgia Man Presents Committee With Proposition From Georgia Contractors.

Washington, March 6.—A new offer for lease of Muscle Shoals will be made today by Thomas Hampton, of Georgia, in behalf of contractors, J. Levering, Los Angeles engineer, told the committee.

He attacked the three bids already made and characterized them as well worded obligations for handouts from the government. Ford's offer is the worst of all, he declared.

Chairman said he might call on Secretary Mellon to advise him on the financial end of the bid submitted to see of the government is able to finance the project in face of law suits threatened by the Alabama Power company. Another year of the kind just closed will run the Republican in his hole. And some will want to pull the hole in after them.

If all the gas about Muscle Shoals should be conserved the water power project wouldn't be necessary in supplying power for large industries.

Republicans apparently think the soldiers' bonus bill has a long road to travel before being finally settled. It looks like interest in the measure was merely a "blind" to the ex-service men after all.

Greenville people extend a cordial welcome to Dr. Pennington, new pastor of the Immanuel Baptist church of this city. He has a great field before him, and will find his flock ready to give him all support desired.

Lenoir county farmers are in favor of Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals, believing he will be able to do more with the project than other men. They have the right idea about it and may see him win out over opposition.

Old guard Republicans have a gloomy future before them, if it is to be anything like the year just closed. The public doesn't lose confidence easily but is justified in the turn of sentiment in evidence throughout the entire country.

Taxation will be increased by the soldiers bonus and the men who stayed at home during the war and made big profits should be the ones to bear the brunt of the taxes. The little man is in trouble up to the neck and increased taxes would completely bury him.

The baseball meeting should be largely attended tonight so all plans can be made for our participation in the Eastern Carolina league. The hot summer months would pass away pleasantly with this kind of diversion, and those who fail to support the club will find hanging heavily on their hands.

It is gratifying to note the number of homes under erection over the city, as this is a guarantee of lower rents. Rents have been mighty high in every town the past several months, but when people begin to erect their own homes and vacate the high price buildings a great change in price will occur.

Farmville is enthusiastic about joining the Eastern Carolina league this summer, and if funds count for anything they are going to be right there when the first ball is pitched, too. Greenville should create some of the same kind of enthusiasm by Monday night or our chances of finding a berth in the league will be mighty slim.

Unemployment is serious in this country at the present time, and the employment of a million men at Muscle Shoals as proposed by Henry Ford will be a great help. The country won't likely return to normal until the men now out of employment return to work and Ford would be doing the country a great favor by giving them work.

Canada seems to be going to extremes in the case of the Bullock negro wanted in this state for inciting a race riot, and North Carolina is doing the right thing in demanding his return without having to send witnesses to Canada. This action on the part of and officials desiring enforcement of the law think they should return Bullock immediately, and without further argument. This is the first time that such a tense situation has arisen between the two countries, and it is to be hoped the issue may be concluded quickly.

The county farm department is preparing the farmer to successfully combat the boll weevil this season, and the pest will hardly make any great inroads on the crop. Those who plant as much as can be personally supervised will be glad they listened to the advice of those who have carefully studied the situation and know what they are talking about.

Cotton and tobacco growers should not fail to heed the warning to reduce acreage this year, for unless they do conditions cannot possibly become better than at the present time. The tobacco market is glutted beyond hope of relief in the near future and another large crop of bright leaf would be ruin to the industry. All leading farmers agree that it is advisable to plant food crops, and those who do so may rest assured of coming out to the good.

If the strike of miners becomes effective as threatened government control of the mines will be inevitable. No class of workmen should strike when the country is in such bad shape, and if they do so regardless of persuasion to stay on the job, they must suffer the consequences of their folly. Wages are being reduced in every branch of industry, and the miner that strikes must pay the price.

With prohibition officers working in Florida it is hardly probable much more whiskey will be smuggled over Cuba through that state. Much high grade rye whiskey reaching this country comes from Cuba and Canada, and when the states are carefully guarded the traffic will experience a great setback. The traffic has gained great proportion in some sections, but the whiskey is of a common grade and not consumed by as many persons as if it were a better grade. A few more years will see a great change in the sale and manufacture of the illicit whiskey in this country.

GENERAL BUSINESS SITUATION.

The business situation has been brightened decidedly by the rise of farm products which has taken place in the last month. This advance is of greater significance than any other development that has occurred since the prices of farm products broke in the fall of 1920. It is the first burst of real sunshine, and as such in marked contrast with the artificial variety which has been rather laboriously disseminated by cheerful people who have thought nothing was required but that everybody should smile at each other. A deadlock has existed as a result of farm products having fallen much faster and farther than other product, and prosperity has been waiting on a correction of this uneconomic and unjust situation. Another demonstration has been afforded of the profound truth that the economic law and the moral law are always in harmony, and that it is wise management to bring business affairs into line with them.

As is usually the case when a great fall of prices occurs under conditions which unsettle confidence, farm products fell below the normal level, in some instances below even the pre-war level. European conditions were immediately responsible for the fall and they have been so clouded as to involve the whole situation in uncertainty. The rise which has now occurred has given prompt vindication to the report recently made by Professor George F. Warren of the Department of Agriculture, that Europe would have to buy heavily of foodstuffs before the crop of 1922.

It has been known since last summer that the world's supply and consumption of wheat would be closely balanced for this crop year, much depending upon the crops in the Southern hemisphere. The early reports as to the crops of Argentina and Australia were of large yields and the Canadian crop was estimated to be considerably above that of 1920. Confidence in wheat, among both producers and speculators, had been weakened by the great decline of the previous year, with the result that the farmers marketed to crop rapidly and as stocks in sight increased there was not courage enough in the markets to take the offerings without price declines. The farmers suffering from a lack of speculative buying. More buyers were needed who had faith in wheat. It will be remembered that about that time the so-called farmers' bloc in congress was hot on the trail of the speculator, and has been claiming credit for enacting a law to curtail his operations. Of course it cannot be positively said that wheat would have been higher but for this act, but if it interfered with the freedom of the markets, it was bound to be detrimental, and it is certain that wheat suffered last fall from a lack of speculative buying. The low price on the crop was made November 1st, when December wheat sold in Chicago at \$1.01 and the May delivery at \$1.02 5-8.

TROUBLE CLOUDS HOVER OVER THE SOFT COAL FIELDS

Operators and Miners Are Both Preparing For the Wage Clash

Pittsburgh.—Dark, threatening industrial war clouds are gathering over the bituminous mines in the hills of Western Pennsylvania.

When both the leaders of the various coal operators' associations and the United Mine Workers of America emphatically insist that they are working for a peaceful settlement of the new wage scale controversy, word from the camps on both sides shows unmistakable signs of preparation for war.

Interviews with leaders of both the miners and the operators in the Western Pennsylvania field—one of the most important in the United States—reveal these facts:

1.—The various union districts are solidly behind National President John L. Lewis in his determination that the miners shall not recant from their demands for no reduction in pay for all classes of mine work.

2.—The district has stamped with approval the proposal that the miners' organizations join an alliance with the various brotherhoods of railroad workers and enter with them in a joint fight against decreased pay.

3.—Many big operators in the Western Pennsylvania field, many of them owners of some of the largest plants in this part of the country, are negotiating for purchase of coal lands in the non-union districts of West Virginia, determined to abandon their Pennsylvania holdings for the new field.

4.—Fearing a possible general coal strike, big industrial concerns throughout the State are storing coal to tide them over in the event of a prolonged tie-up in the bituminous field and the serious shortage of coal which certainly would follow as a result.

5.—Hundreds of miners whose families have suffered as a result of the slump in the industry, and believing that the "worst is yet to come" are leaving the Pennsylvania fields for work elsewhere.

The unrest among the miners, members of the United Mine Workers of America, is reflected even among the non-union miners of the Western Pennsylvania field. Smarting under repeated cuts in pay scores of miners are leaving the non-union fields in Cambria and Somerset counties with the result that many of these mines are shutting down. Strikes also are reported at a number of these operations.

"The coal miners of Western Pennsylvania do not want to strike; they are bending every effort to bring about a peaceful settlement of the present controversy and will insist upon arbitration as long as possible," according to President John Brophy, head of District No. 2, United Mine Workers of America, and one of the best authorities on mining conditions of the State.

But Mr. Brophy adds that, unable to obtain a "square deal" from the operators, the miners are ready to throw their full force back of any action the United Mine Workers may decide to take.

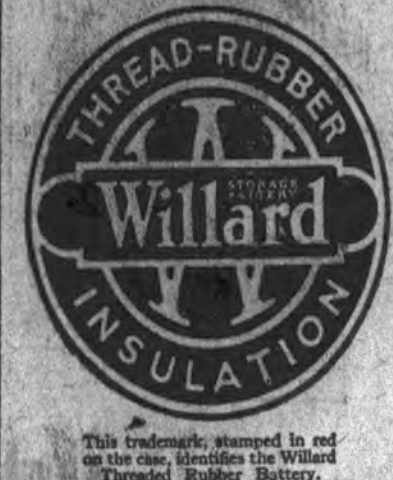

CHILDREN BRAVE ZERO WINDS MINUS DRESS, DUBBED A HABIT

Ailing Boys and Girls Romp in Snow and Cold and Grow Strong Under State Supervision

Hartford, Conn.—Persons who are accustomed to shiver at the thought of a cold shower, even in a heated bathroom; mothers who "bundle up" their children when sending them forth into the crisp winter air; geographers who write in their school books that people in the frigid climates require warmer clothing than the denizens of the tropics, prepare to shiver.

That clothing is "pretty much of a habit" is the contention of the Connecticut tuberculosis commission, and to illustrate and prove its claim the commission recently brought four near naked kiddies to the annual State industrial exhibition in this city, the youngsters romping through the snow covered streets of the city, exciting awe and amazement as they trotted along with no clothing but abbreviated trunks and sandals.

It was the first public exhibition in the State of the wards of the State commission, who are being treated, with unqualified success, for pulmonary and bone tuberculosis by simple means, namely, rest, fresh air, good food and sunlight, with the emphasis on the last named ingredient.

Two youngsters came from the sanitarium at Meriden, where the pulmonary type of the disease is treated, and two from the Crescent Beach sanitarium on the sea shore, where the bone type of the disease is being cured.

To the astonishment of the hundreds of visitors to the State armory exhibition the youngsters' only complaint was that the air of the big armory was too warm. On three near zero days during their stay they went outside to play in the snow and ice on the grounds of the State capitol.

At the respective sanitariums no clothing but the trunks and sandals is worn. The kiddies play, sleep, eat and attend school in this costume, and in addition to being free from coughs, colds and childhood ailments, than "cuddled" children of the same age, about 95 percent of them are being permanently cured of tuberculosis ailments.
