SEVEN TOWNS TO ATTEND KINSTON MEETING TONIGHT

Formation of Eastern Carolina League To Be Featured by Great Enthusiasm.

FARMVILLE PLANS TO BE WELL REPRESENTED AT BASEBALL CONFAB

New Bern, Washington, Goldsboro, and Tarboro to Also Have Delegations Present.

The Greenville baseball delegation left Greenville this afternoon for Kinston where tonight they will take part in a meeting looking to organization of the Eastern Carolina league. News received from Kinston this afternoon was to the effect that six other towns would also be represented. In case each town is entered and another town becomes necessary the organization will be more powerful than ever before.

Towns that have promised to have representation at the meeting tonight are Farmville, New Bern, Washington, Goldsboro, Tarboro, Kinston and Greenville. The league last year was comprised of only four of these places, but the season was a good one, and everybody enjoyed the high class sport afforded by each club. Each town is enthusiastic about the league again this season, and is anticipating even a faster class of ball because of the entrance of two or four other clubs.

The Greenville delegation at an enthusiastic meeting Monday night was instructed to agree to anything tending to promote the welfare of the organization, and to demand unorganized baseball such as played last year. In fact, if organized ball should be decided upon college players who heretofore have made up practically every club will not be able to join because of certain restrictions of the various institutions.

It is generally agreed that the league last year was composed of players as fast, if not faster than the majority of the Virginia league and Western Carolina organizations, and as a consequence it has not been found advisable to agree on organized ball. The college players, as a rule, are a cleaner set of fellows than the ordinary run of league players, and if the Eastern Carolina league is to be kept unquestionably clean it must continue to play the same type of men as of past years.

Each of the towns to be represented in Kinston tonight are anxious for good ball this year. In fact, Farmville, the smallest town seeking a berth in the league, has already raised sufficient money to carry a club through the entire season. Washington and Kinston, it is understood, have done likewise, so it is up to Greenville and others to hasten plans after organization is perfected to night.

The Greenville club will be supported this season by public contributions, and those who gave liberally to the cause last year are urged to do the same this season. No ball club can successfully compete for pennant honors financially handicapped, and it is imperative that this matter be definitely settled before players begin practice season. That other clubs will do so is not to be doubted, and it is hoped Greenville will lose no time in definitely settling this important matter.

Ayden people have been greatly interested in the sing which has been postponed two times within the last two months, and it is expected large crowds from surrounding communities will be in attendance.

FRESH DISORDERS REPORTED IN BELFAST

Belfast, March 8.—Fresh disorders in which one man was killed and numerous others were wounded broke out in this city last night, according to information given out by the police department here today. An orange man was shot to death on his way to work. Bomb explosions were frequent during the night. The city was patrolled by soldiers who made an effort to quell disorders during the day.

SEVEN KILLED BY TERRIFIC WIND IN WILSON SECTION

Property Damage Estimated at Approximately \$50,000 Results From Storm.

Wilson, March 7.—One person killed and fifteen more or less badly hurt, some of them seriously, and property damages estimated from \$40,000 to \$50,000 is the toll of a tornado which swept through the Evansdale section on the Norfolk Southern railroad six miles east of Wilson at about nine o'clock this morning.

The storm area was from 300 yards to one-half mile and extended for a distance of three miles. It tore houses, barns and other buildings into shreds and, in the storm swept everything clean.

Doctors and ambulances from Wilson brought the injured to local hospitals. In one house six people were injured, in another five and another four.

The person killed was a negro school teacher, named Azula Falk, wife of a barber of this city.

REVIVAL SERVICES DRAWING SPLENDID CROWDS THIS WEEK

Dr. Matthias Delivered Another Powerful Sermon to Presbyterians Here Last Night.

"The Greatness of our Transgression," was the theme of Dr. Matthias' sermon at the Presbyterian church last night, and the close attention of his hearers indicated their deep appreciation of the way in which he presented his subject. He began by admitting for argument's sake, that man's transgression is a "little thing," but before he had finished he had established the absolute futility of attempting such an admission.

He turned on the light against which men are sinning; the Truth against which they are turning; the experience against which they are setting themselves; and the Infinite God against which they are rebelling. He showed that the greatness of any transgression is measured by the greatness of the one against whom it is committed, and to those who were honest enough to follow him honestly, he proved that Jesus Christ is man's only hope before the bar of eternal justice.

One seldom hears a greater effort packed into a short time, and men and women left the church determined to think about sin in the future in the terms in which God has judged it.

The singing on the part of the congregation was splendid. Mr. Phillips sang another of the songs of Robert Harkness, the Australian musician who was converted under Dr. Wilbur Chapman, and out of his experience with Christ, gave to the world some wonderful melodies. The service tonight will begin promptly at 7:45, and those desiring seats, had better come on time, as indications are for a crowded building tonight.

A large number of men were present last evening, showing their appreciation of Mr. Matthias' style of presenting God's Truth. A cordial welcome is extended to everybody. Come and bring a friend.

BRYAN'S ENTRANCE INTO TREATY FIGHT AROUSES SENATORS

Watson Characterizes "Commoner's" Activity in the Strongest Kind of Language.

(By International News.)

Washington, March 8.—The entry of William Jennings Bryan into the four power Pacific treaty fight has aroused a storm of condemnation from Senator Watson of Georgia.

It is charged that Mr. Bryan is merely grandstanding. His year record of 1898 was scathingly reviewed. It was charged that Mr. Bryan is trying to disrupt the Democratic ranks to obtain a Republican victory.

Senator Watson said he remembered 1898 when Mr. Bryan helped swing enough Democratic votes to ratify the treaty at Paris.

The valves are placed upright in the shape of a "T." The machine has three speeds and a reverse and is capable of ninety miles an hour. WILSON AND BORAH COMBINE IN FIGHT AGAINST TREATIES

Former President Writes Senator Borah Outlining Reasons For His Opposition.

BELIEVES TREATY IS DANGEROUS TO FUTURE OF THE UNITED STATES

Pact Termed as Iniquitous and Detrimental to the Development of American People.

(By International News.)

Washington, March 8.—Woodrow Wilson and Senator Borah have joined forces to defeat ratification of the four power Pacific treaty.

Both believe the treaty alliance is dangerous to the United States.

Former President Wilson has written a letter to Senator Borah outlining his reasons for believing the treaty to be iniquitous and villianous of the strong.

He also had views which were explained to Senator Borah through Bernard Baruch and others who have been visiting at his home.

The letter has not been made public and probably will not be, but its existence is well known to Senators Lodge and Underwood.

MOVE IS BEGUN BY LEGION TO GET JOBS FOR SOLDIERS

Nation-Wide Appeal Made to Place 700,000 Veterans in Employment.

(By International News.)

Indianapolis, Ind.—Employment of 700,000 veterans of the World War who are now idle and in need will be undertaken in a great joint national effort already initiated by the American Legion in co-operation with an impressive list of national business, civic, fraternal and welfare organizations, according to announcement today at the national headquarters of the legion.

Preliminary preparations for the campaign have been started under the direction of local units of the legion and co-operating bodies. This includes a survey of conditions and suggestions for remedy in every locality. This work will be completed before March 20, which shall be known as American Legion Employment Day.

Hanford MacNider, national commander of the legion, has appealed to the President, State commanders have requested their governors, and local leaders have asked Mayors of cities and towns to set aside that day to launch by concerted effort in every community in the nation this joint drive to give work to and relieve need among the unemployed who served their country in war.

On March 20 it is planned to hold meetings under the auspices of the joint local committees in every city and town in the United States at which the business men and employers and representatives of every element in the community life will be confronted by a survey of the situation in their town with suggestions for relief which fit the conditions. Programs will be perfected and endorsed at these town meetings and the organized constituted to carry out the projected work of employment and relief.

"Properly supported this concerted-localized national effort will result in the relief of 500,000 men in thirty days," declared Lemuel Bolles, national adjutant of the legion, who supervised the organization of the effort. "We are dealing with methods which have been proven. The legion has long been interested in the unemployed problem. Through our own bureaus we have placed several hundred thousand men in jobs within the past six months. A recent concerted effort in St. Paul resulted in putting every deserving veteran to work in that city. The Louisiana department of the legion reports not a resident veteran unemployed in the State."

Henry Ford has agreed to modifications of his offer for Muscle Shoals, so wonder what his opponents will do now. If the proposition can be handled successfully, then it must be Mr. Ford who does it.

That great mass of people who were induced to buy worthless stock during the inflation period are sadder but wiser these days. And it might also be said that stock salesmen won't find sales quite so easy in the future.

President Harding's plans for reorganizing the cabinet created such disfavor that he had to postpone action. Which goes to show that the "big chief's" ideas are not in accord even with members of his own clan.

Russia is planning to begin foreign trading during the early spring. But before she can be successful at trading or anything else it will be necessary to get the bolsheviks to stop fighting. No country can expect to prosper under such conditions, and

unless the citizenship of Russia begin to realize what they are up against there is no hope for them in the least.

It is gratifying to note that Pitt county fair will be larger and better this year. The addition of a poultry department supervised by such men as Dr. Morrill of Falkland and J. J. Jenkins of Greenville should draw interest from fanciers in every part of the county. In fact, no fair is complete without exhibits of fowls, and the larger this is the better the public will like it. Pitt county people should co-operate in every way possible this year and help make the yearly attraction one of the best in the state.

Greenville will be well represented at the baseball meeting in Kinston tonight, and if the league is agreed upon it is safe to say we will be among the first to take advantage of it. The meeting here last night was enthusiastic in every sense of the word, and shows our people are ready to do their part by the sport that contributed so greatly to our amusement last summer. A town without a good baseball team cannot expect to keep pace with those having one, and when the fact is taken in consideration very few places the size of Greenville will be without an organization, whether a winning one or not.

Greenville and Farmville people will be thrown in close contact during the summer months in event both towns join the Eastern Carolina league, and a strong friendship should spring up between the people. The completion of the hard surfaced road is going to have much to do with the number of people attending games in each town during the season also. The last strip of this road opened today, and from now on business relations in the communities along the road should greatly improve. Farmville and Greenville are merely a few minutes apart, and in case of an emergency a great part of the population of each place could be transferred on short notice.

Greenville people were gratified to learn that first work looking to widening Dickinson avenue began the first of the week. This is something in which everyone is interested, especially people who live in tobacco town, and are forced to traverse the congested thoroughfare several times a day. Four feet from the sidewalk

would relieve the congestion occurring during tobacco season considerably, and traffic will be speeded up also. The cost is small in comparison to the great benefit which the city will derive from the improvement, and those who have contributed to the cause are to be congratulated.

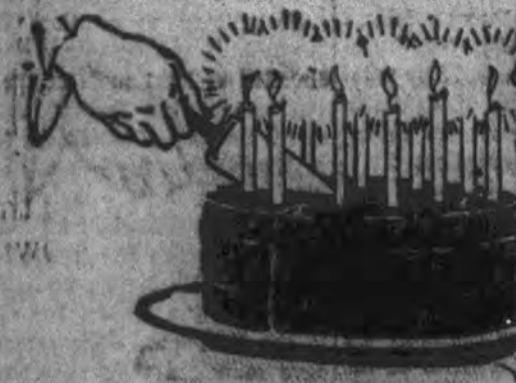

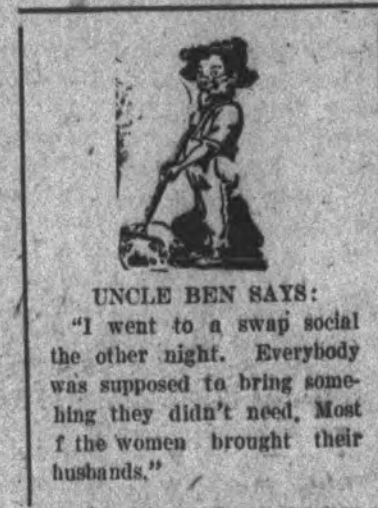
