NEAR EAST RELIEF CAMPAIGN STARTS SUNDAY, MAY 28TH

Pitt County Asked to Raise \$3,960 to Assist in Relief Work.

COMMITTEES NAMED FOR ACTIVE SERVICE IN THIS TERRITORY

Herbert Waldrop of Greenville Appointed County Treasurer Today.

The drive for \$3,960, to care for Pitt county's 66 "wards" now in the North Carolinian orphanages in the Stricken Bible lands, will begin May 28 and end June 4. Pitt county is asked to raise this sum as its pro rata share of the state's \$200,000 quota.

This money is being raised to save from starvation the children of the Armenian war heroes and Christian martyrs. Josephus Daniels of Raleigh is honorary State chairman and Col. George H. Bellamy of Wilmington is State chairman.

Mass meetings will be held during the week of the drive at Greenville, Farmville, Ayden, Fountain, Falkland, Grimesland, Bethel, Arthur, Winterville and perhaps other places. A three-reel education film, showing actual scenes in the famine-stricken Bible land, will be shown at White's theatre here, and at motion picture houses in Farmville, Ayden, and Grifton. During the week of the drive.

Just as the state's quota is apportioned among the various counties, Pitt county's quota has been apportioned among the various communities as follows: Greenville \$1,800; Farmville \$700; Ayden \$500; Bethel \$250; Winterville \$150; Stokes \$100; Fountain \$100; Grimesland \$100; Grifton \$100; Falkland \$50; Pactivus \$50; Arthur \$30 and Simpson \$30.

The committees as announced this morning follows: J. H. Waldrop, county treasurer; J. A. Applewhite, chairman for Greenville township; G. A. Johnson, chairman of Ayden township; C. B. EDISON PROPOSES PLAN TO RELIEVE AMERICAN GROWER

Wizard Presents Plan to Congress Which May be Immediately Adopted

SCHEME EXPLAINED AT SECRET NIGHT SESSION OF BODY

Farmers would have Monopolistic Control of prices in Plan as Adopted.

(Copyright by International News.) Washington, May 19.—Thomas A. Edison, world's electrical genius, appeared before a secret night session of the senate agricultural inquiry committee last night and recommended the establishment by congress of a titanic government warehouse system for solving the nation-wide agricultural depression, it was learned by the International News Service today.

The plan which Edison urged congress to adopt will give the American farmers an almost monopolistic control over the price of their products through the operation of a full year's storage provision.

Mr. Edison urged passage of the proposed legislation as early as possible "in order to give the farmer relief before the next crop is reaped." The warehouse system which Edison recommended appeared tremendously interesting to the senators who frequently interrupted him during the session for additional details concerning the plan.

NAVY RECRUITING OFFICE REOPENED AT COURT HOUSE

E. Atkinson, Formerly Located Here, to be in Charge of the Office.

A navy recruiting office has been re-opened in rooms of the third floor of the courthouse by E. Atkinson, who was in charge of the office here last summer. Mr. Atkinson was transferred to Wilmington for a short time, being later ordered back to Greenville after the government decided to maintain the office here.

All ex-service men of the army, navy and marine corps are eligible for enlistment. Mr. Atkinson stated this morning, and the opportunities for such men to see the world are unlimited. The government is also in need of several new men, who will receive full information by applying at the local office.

Several Pitt county men enlisted in the navy while the office was open here last year, and it is expected a number of others will make application this summer, especially after the planting season comes to an end.

FEAR OPERATION OF MUSCLE SHOALS

Experts Believe Project Would Pay Operated from Commercial Standpoint.

Washington, May 19.—Operation of Muscle Shoals for the production of commercial fertilizer was heartily endorsed by Dr. Richard Telman, V. J. Voerman, nitrate experts testifying before the senate agricultural committee. They said the project should be placed on a commercially sound basis at a cost of four million dollars.

The team will come in contact with the Rotary club in the first game and will challenge clubs of other towns after their strength has been determined.

BLIZZARD FORCED TO DEFEND CHARGE

Alleged Leader of Miners is Denied Motion to Dismiss Indictment.

(By International News.) Charleston, W. Va., May 19.—William Blizzard, alleged leader of the miners' army which marched on Logan county last summer and fought state police and deputy sheriffs of Blair Mountain, must defend himself against the charge of treason Judge Woods decided today in denying motion of the defense to dismiss indictment.

GROWERS' DRAFTS ARE CLASSED AS AGRICULTURE PAPER

Ruling is Made by Federal Reserve Bank Board Following Controversy.

Drafts issued by the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association as advances on tobacco turned over to it by members will be classed as "agricultural paper" and will be eligible for rediscount in federal reserve banks with a maturity up to six months, according to a recent statement from the federal reserve board. This ruling was made following a controversy as to whether such drafts should be classed as agricultural or commercial paper. Commercial paper is eligible for rediscount only when its maturity is not in excess of ninety days.

The board ruled that, according to the Federal Reserve bulletin, "the association was a non-stock and non-profit corporation, and that its members consisted exclusively of growers of tobacco who had agreed to sell and deliver to the association all the tobacco grown by them or acquired by them as landlord or lessor."

"The agreements between the growers and the association provide for the pooling of the tobacco each year by type and grade and for the distribution of the proceeds of each pool pro rata among the growers who have contributed to that pool."

"The association is given power to sell the tobacco in such form and upon such terms as may be deemed most advantageous to the growers, it being contemplated that a part of the tobacco will be sold without being re-dried and that much of the tobacco as can not be sold at a reasonable price in that form will be redried and stored."

The Tar River Dokie Club was organized by members of the local order of Knights of Pythias at an enthusiastic meeting last night. Much interest has been manifested in this organization since the ceremonial held here the first of the month, and the club is a natural outgrowth of the sentiment produced during the time.

In election of officers L. H. Bowling was elected president, J. H. Waldrop, vice, president, W. A. Darden, secretary and Jack Brown, treasurer. The committee for bylaws and constitution is composed of George W. Woodward, J. H. Waldrop and A. B. Ellington.

Much interest was manifested in organization work, and the club no doubt will become one of the strongest and liveliest in the state. An intensive membership drive will be waged as soon as organization has been fully completed, and it is expected growth will be rapid.

FRANCE FALLS IN LINE WITH ALLIES

Louis Cathon Says Nation will Probably be Represented at Hague Confab.

(By International News.) Genoa, May 19.—France swung into line with other allied powers when Louis Cathon, head of the delegation announced that he would recommend France's acceptance of proposals for the Hague meeting to study Russia and for the truce pact to last eight months.

The French delegation has already accepted, but the question has not been approved yet by the government. The conference ended this afternoon after six week's session and the delegates returned to their respective homes.

STEAMER JANELEW REPORTED DRIFTING

Wrecking Tug Sent Out From Key West to Take Charge of Vessel.

(By International News.) Key West, Fla., May 19.—The steamship Janelew, bound for Savannah to New Orleans and the Gulf of Mexico, is drifting at the rate of three miles an hour, according to a wireless received here this morning. The wireless was received from coast guard cutter and a wrecking tug was sent to the rescue.

KNIGHTS TEMPLAR EAT POISON FOOD

Thirty Members of Georgia have Narrow Escape from Death at Atlanta.

Atlanta, May 19.—Thirty members of the Georgia Knights Templar, who have just returned from Brunswick, are recovering from severe poisoning from eating shrimp and salad at the Brunswick shore dinner. Prompt medical attention averted more serious consequences, it was declared by attending physicians.

Officials said the record was incomplete, and believe additional deaths will be reported later. Many of the killings occurred on the Texas border, which has become one of the principal battlegrounds for liquor bandits and dry agents.

COLORED SCHOOLS TO BEGIN CLOSING EXERCISES TODAY

First Feature will be annual Dinner Served by Domestic Science Dept.

FINAL EXERCISES TO BEGIN TUESDAY OF COMING WEEK

Prof. Epps Highly Gratiified at Progress Made by Department this Year.

An annual dinner, the first feature in connection with the closing exercises of the colored schools of this city, will be tendered members of the school board and friends of the school shortly after the noon hour today, according to an announcement made this morning by C. M. Epps, superintendent of colored schools. The dinner is an annual occurrence with the colored people, and heretofore has been well attended by those interested in progress of the institution.

Graduating exercises of the school, in reality will begin Tuesday of next week at the court house. Exercises for the primary and intermediate grades will be held Wednesday and Friday. An interesting program has been arranged for the occasion and a large attendance is expected.

Dinner today will be served by the domestic science department of the high school, and will show exactly what progress has been made under direction of competent teachers. The institutions last year was highly complimented on its splendid showing by the number of white people present.

Prof. Epps is highly gratified at the splendid progress made this year and is satisfied the year has been one of the best in history of the schools. Students and teachers have been unusually diligent in their work this year and this fact has meant much to the progress which has been enjoyed by practically every department.

COPPER STILL IS CAPTURED IN RAID NEAR GREENVILLE

120 Gallon Affair Taken By Chief Jones and Deputy Thad Williams.

The whiskey traffic of this section again suffered a stunning blow from the law this morning when Chief Lester Jones and Deputy Sheriff Thad Williams captured a 120 gallon copper still near Warren Bell's place, about four miles of Greenville. While no whiskey could be located two caps and a worm were included in the capture.

If the officers had arrived a few hours earlier they would probably have caught the operators at the still, as it was very evident the outfit had been in operation during the night.

The outfit was one of the finest captured in several weeks, being constructed entirely of copper and capable of producing the best brand of whiskey. It had been used in the distillation of monkey rum, however, and was capable of holding two barrels of that at a time.

A few more captures of the kind will cripple the industry to no little extent, although it is claimed two stills are placed in operation for every one captured. Officers are making an effort to bring as many moonshiners as possible to justice, and the captures of the last few days were good beginnings.

HAIL DOES DAMAGE NEAR WILLIAMSTON

According to report reaching the city today a heavy hail storm in the Williamston district did considerable damage to crops yesterday. The hail stones were so large that the glass was broken out of the windshield of a traveling man's automobile.

promoters to lose heart for the time
being at least.

Wilson people are going to cast
their vote to determine whether or
not they will have an union passenger
station. This causes us to realize
such a station has been proposed for
Greenville. In fact, we thought the
matter would be taken up with the
commission immediately, but nothing
definite has ever been accomplished.
Greenville is in need of better depot
facilities as much so as Wilson and
if the people get behind the question
as they should favorable action might
be the outcome.

The Majestic, the world's largest
ship, should prove a great boon for
the American government. Such a
ship is really a credit to the nation
and shows to what extent shipbuild-
ing has developed in the last few
years. The big vessel contains a swim-
ming pool with a surface area of 820
feet and dining room capable of

GROWERS DRAFTS ARE CLASSED AS AGRICULTURAL PAPER
 (Continued from page one.)

by the association and sold as there is a demand for redried tobacco.

"It was stated to be necessary for the association to make advances to growers at the time the growers deliver their tobacco to the association and it was proposed that the association should make these advances by accepting drafts drawn upon it by the growers, the amount of the drafts to be equal to a fixed percentage of the estimated market value of the tobacco delivered. These drafts were to be discounted by the drawers with their own indorsements at their local banks.

"The question upon which the Federal Reserve board was asked to rule is whether drafts so drawn and so discounted could be eligible for rediscount with Federal Reserve banks as

agricultural paper with maturities not in excess of six months, or could be eligible for rediscount only as commercial paper with maturities not in excess of ninety days.

Not Trade Acceptances.

"The federal reserve board ruled some time ago that drafts drawn upon and accepted by co-operative marketing associations, in transactions similar to those between the growers and the Tobacco Growers' Co-Operative Marketing Association in the instant case, were not trade acceptances within the meaning of the board's regulations, for the reason that looking through the form of these transactions and at the substance thereof the drafts represented advancements made by the associations to the growers rather than partial payments of the purchase price of the commodities delivered to the associations.

"Although the board was not asked at that time to rule upon the particular question raised by the Tobacco Growers' Co-Operative Marketing Association, the board did, in order to define the scope of its ruling, intimate that the drafts then under consideration, although not trade acceptances, would be eligible as agricultural paper, provided that the drawers discounted the drafts at their local banks and used the proceeds for agricultural purposes, and provided, also, that the drafts complied in other respects with the requirements of the law and the board's regulations.

"A further consideration of the subject has confirmed the board in the views expressed in its former ruling, and the board ruled, therefore, that in its opinion drafts, with maturities not in excess of six months, drawn by the growers, accepted by

the Tobacco Growers' Co-Operative Marketing Association, and discounted by the growers with their indorsements, in accordance with the statement of facts herein contained, would be technically eligible for rediscount at federal reserve banks as agricultural paper when offered by member banks, provided that the growers use the proceeds of the drafts for agricultural purposes, and provided, also that the drafts comply in other respects with the requirements of the law and the board's regulations.—Richmond News Leader

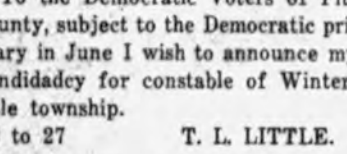
