NEGROES JAILED HERE ON SERIOUS WHISKEY CHARGE

Leon Patrick, Robt. Whichard and Peter Blount to be Given Hearing Today.

Leon Patrick, Robert Whichard and Peter Blount, colored men of this city, are confined in the county jail here today awaiting trial charged with connection with the illicit whiskey traffic of the city. They were arrested in a raid of members of the police department on Patrick's home and a store operated by Whichard and Patrick on First street.

Five gallons of liquor were found buried in a keg in the rear of the store. Three gallons were located inside of the building and a quart at Patrick's home.

The men will be given a preliminary hearing before a magistrate this afternoon and it is probable they will be released under bond for their appearance before a higher court.

K. K. K. BECOMES POLITICAL FORCE

Washington, May 24.—The unexpected political strength of the Ku Klux Klan in the state of Oregon where their candidate for governor has probably won and two congressmen opposing them narrowly escaped defeat and in Dallas, Texas, where the Klan is waging a bitter fight against Senator Gilbertson is perplexing both Republicans and Democrats in congress.

In Texas the K. K. K. issue between Senator Culbertson and R. Henry, who is opposing him with the Klan endorsement. In Oklahoma they are holding night processions seeking to defeat James Mathers, anti-Klan candidate for attorney general.

GREENVILLE WILL PLAY FIRST GAME WITH WASHINGTON

Initial Clash June First to Take Place with Sailors in this City

NEW BERN TO PLAY KINSTON-TARBORO TO TAKE FARMVILLE

Season to Close August 23 with Greenville Playing in Washington.

Washington will play in Greenville, New Bern at Kinston and Farmville at Tarboro during the first two days of the opening of the Eastern Carolina league, according to the official schedule decided on at the meeting of directors here Saturday night. The season opens June 5 and the above will play in the same place on the sixth.

On the seventh, however, Tarboro will go to New Bern, Kinston to Washington and Greenville to Farmville. The clubs will play at these places two days and the ninth will find Greenville at Kinston, Farmville at Washington and New Bern at Tarboro.

The greatest interest in all probability will be centered around the days Greenville appears in Farmville and Kinston as it is from these two towns the greatest opposition is expected. Farmville and Kinston are certain to put fast clubs in the field and if Greenville can win the opening skirmishes with them, then battling the New Bern Bears, the first game to be played when Greenville goes to New Bern June 19-20-21 will be interesting. In other words the Bears will be the last club which Greenville comes in contact with in the opening clash of the first half, and one of the others will have taken a definite lead for the banner or be at the bottom of the column.

These two clubs, it will be remembered, played in the championship series last season, and furnished considerable excitement for people of both towns. The race was a close one and will be long remembered by those who saw the determining clash at the fair grounds here.

The season opens the 5th of June and closes August 23rd with Tarboro at Kinston, Farmville at New Bern and Greenville at Washington. The championship games will come after this time.

BROWN BREAKS LEG SLIDING BASES IN WASHINGTON GAME

Greenville Hurler Suffers Double Fracture in Scrub Game Yesterday.

Edward Brown, former Ayden boy who came to Greenville the first of this week to report for training with the local club of the Eastern Carolina league, sustained a broken leg while sliding third base in a game between a Greenville scrub team and the Washington league team yesterday. The news will be received with keen regret throughout the entire league, as Brown has been in training with the Baltimore Orioles several weeks and was expected to do great work for the local club.

The Washington diamond seems to be unlucky to the league players as two men within the last two seasons suffered the same misfortune as Brown. Decker, first baseman of Washington, was one of the unlucky fellows and a Greenville player the other.

There was nothing unusual in connection with Brown's sliding. His legs in some way failed to land on the bag in the usual way and a few minutes later he was taken from the field suffering from a double fracture of the small bone about the middle of the leg.

Brown was secured by Manager Smith from the Baltimore Orioles several weeks ago, and he was being depended upon to pitch the local club to victory against the strongest clubs of the league. While quite young, the southpaw has wicked hop on his offerings and may step up into the higher circles after seeing longer services in the minor leagues.

The unfortunate accident will cause Manager Smith to augment his pitching staff immediately, as Brown will be out of the game several weeks. Beall quite likely will arrive today and will probably be able to help out more than ever in Brown's absence.

TO LOAN GERMANY BILLION DOLLARS

It is expected to place Germany on a parity with Great Britain and eight nations with large merchant fleets. It will overcome German's lack of ships and be of great aid to America also.

COUNTY CHAPTER OF RED CROSS TO HELP FLOOD AREA

Request for Aid Met at Meeting of Executive Committee Yesterday.

MANY IMPORTANT MATTERS RECEIVE ATTENTION HERE

Members Greatly Enthused With Prospect of Activity in the Future.

The executive committee of the Pitt county chapter of the American Red Cross met yesterday afternoon at four o'clock in the office of M. K. Blount, chairman. The meeting was one of the very best ever held in Pitt county. All members were present with exception of Miss Ellington, Secretary and G. T. Gardner, of Grifton, chairman of the Grifton branch.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The treasurer gave a report of funds now in hand and expended since the last September when the chapter was reorganized. Treasurer Ellington reported that the \$200 had been paid to the general clinic which was the decision of the last meeting.

Miss Lee made a good report of Junior work, reporting the desire heard from all sides to have swimming one of the main features of the Junior Red Cross from the coming months.

Mrs. Williams, chairman of the motor corps, reported six trips made by volunteer members during the past month.

H. F. Austin, chairman of the home service department, which deals with the handling of all claims of ex-service men, gave a full report of his department. At the present time the Red Cross office here has been called on to assist men from other counties where they have no Red Cross organization.

The chapter has 160 open cases 31 closed cases, or a total of 197, and there have been 97 calls at the office of ex-service men to get information and assistance during the past month.

Definite motion was made that the chapter should continue this work with the same care, but that no man coming to the office to put in his claim for the first time on account of disability should have the same done without a letter from his family physician asking that the Red Cross assist him in filing his claim.

The office here has had a number of recommendations from outside officials for the care and thoroughness with which the cases were investigated and prepared.

A. E. Corey, chairman of the life saving corps, gave an explanation of his field, stating that this was not a new, but old branch of the Red Cross. The death rate from drowning accidents had been greatly diminished in places where they had the corps organized. Mr. Claude Tunstall has co-operated in this work to no little extent and it is hoped to have the corps in fine trim at an early date when Mr. Yates, professional life saver of the Southern division arrives. Also there are other parts of the state which wish to have a contest with Pitt county represented. So far there are fifteen men from Greenville and two from Ayden trying for the corps. Amuzu park has offered the twelve charter members complimentary tickets for the season.

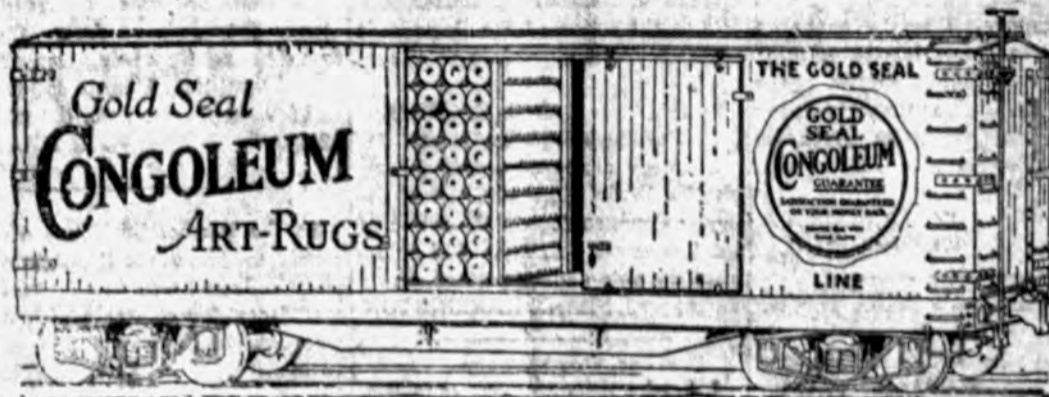

CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING.

(News and Observer.) To the Editor: So much has been said by the publicity committee of the Tobacco Co-operative Growers' Association, that I think it is not unwise to state the view-point of a traveling man, because I fully realize that when the farmer succeeds, the merchants, the traveling men, and every one else succeeds proportionately, so what is to follow is said in the interest of the farmer, and he can take it for what it is worth.

No association, fraternal or otherwise, is any stronger than the membership composing that association; this being true, the Tobacco Co-operative Growers' Association is no stronger than the membership composing it. The farmers tell the supply merchant today that he is not in a position financially to pay his just debts, but now through his Co-operative Growers' Association, the officers being his spokesmen, he tells the world that he has money enough to hold his crops, buy re-drying plants, build warehouses, pay insurance, carrying charges, and all other expenses incidental to the marketing of his products. The farmers have been made to believe this condition is possible, having been preached a sort of topless heaven and bottomless hell doctrine by the paid organizers. These organizers, in my opinion, are only interested in the "dear farmer" to the extent that he knows he is to receive a stipulated fee for signing him up. When these organizers get through with Wake county, they move on to Johnston, then to Wayne, and so on down the line, their interest ceasing in the farmers once they get him hooked. The farmers have been told lots about what they are going to receive as first payment for their crop, but do they find these promises in the five year contract which they sign?

Suppose these officers were to come to the farmer and say to him something like this: "We want you to let us have Five, Ten or Fifty Thousand Dollars for a period of five years, without any security whatsoever; we hope to pay you back within that time, but it is possible that we may pay only a small part." The farmers would readily tell these fellows that they were either crazy or thought they (the farmers) were. Yet, the farmers are doing this very same thing, when they turn over their crops to the value of this amount to this body or men without any security whatsoever.

The farmer mustn't forget that the salaries of these officials, organizers, and their expenses running about over the country, come from somewhere, and he should have sense enough to know that they are not doing it for any love they might have for the farmer. It is only another case of trying to stop the leak at the spigot and paying no attention to the bung hole. Stop the pay and unlimited expense account of these fellows and you will see the publicity activities and everything else connected with the Tobacco Co-operative Growers' Association come to an end.

Only last Saturday, the Peanut Growers' Association called on their members to come across with \$200,000 in cash or collateral that can be converted readily into cash at your bank, and it is surprising to say that the farmers cashed in Liberty Bonds, other perfectly good securities and took same and handed them over to the "dear officers." It remains to be seen if they will ever see the face value or anything like face value for this real money. Every mortgage that has been lifted for the past thirty years has done through the auction method of selling his tobacco crop. It now looks as though these mortgages will be recorded again in our court records.

It will pay the farmers to give this careful consideration. L. A. SHIRLEY, Raleigh, N. C. Adv.
