FIRST WORK ON WHITE WAY GETS WELL UNDER WAY

Construction Work Started this Morning Under Favorable Conditions.

ENTIRE SYSTEM TO BE FINISHED DURING THE SUMMER MONTHS

System to be Extended to the Court House Square With Eight Lights.

First work in connection with establishing the Greenville white way got well under way this morning and before the summer is over Evans and Fifth streets will be brilliantly illuminated. The white way was proposed several months ago, but was not made a certainty until after committees had made a through canvass and determined exactly what property owners desired to do.

It was first proposed to extend the white way over Dickinson avenue, but property owners at the time failed to provide sufficient funds to make this possible. It is hoped, however, to arrange this matter before construction work is completed so three of the principal streets of the city will present an unusually attractive appearance at night.

Since Greenville decided to establish a white way system several other towns have started similar campaigns, and it is probable Eastern North Carolina will have the most completely lighted cities in the state within the next year or so. Such towns as New Bern, Wilson and Kinston will have up-to-date systems, it is understood, each deciding to do so after Greenville.

The white way will be extended to the court house square, on Evans street where eight lights will be placed. This will give Pitt county's temple of justice a much better appearance, especially since the splendid improvements to the lawn and sidewalks. The commissioners decided in favor of the white way at a recent session, and it is quite likely this part of the system will be rushed to completion.

Members of the light department mean to do everything possible to complete the job as early as possible, and while the task is a huge one, it is expected they will be able to finish up during the summer months, if not earlier. The greatest part of the job will come in removing the telephone poles on the two streets involved and placing the wires under ground.

GEORGIA RAILWAY GETS BOND ISSUE

Road to Issue Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars Immediately.

Washington, May 25.—The California and Georgia railway has been authorized by the Interstate commerce commission to issue hundred and fifty thousand dollars in first mortgage, six percent gold bonds, under mortgage to be dated March 1st, 1922, according to an announcement made this afternoon.

DORAN SUSTAINS PAINFUL INJURY DURING PRACTICE

Captain of Local Club Cuts Hand While Sliding Third Base Here.

Doran, captain and third baseman of the Greenville baseball club, sustained a painful injury while sliding third base in practice at the fair grounds yesterday, but it is not believed he will be out of the game for any length of time.

The young fellow was sliding third base when his hand came in contact with a broken bottle. A gash about an inch and a half was cut almost in the middle of the palm, necessitating a few stitches at the Skinner and Smith emergency hospital.

This is the second member of the local club injured in the past two days. Brown having sustained a broken leg while sliding third base in a game with Washington. While Doran will not be out of the game over four or five days, Brown will be several weeks in recovering and will be rather late in showing the fans the kind of twisters he has in store for the opposing clubs.

FINAL EXERCISES HELD TUESDAY AT ARTHUR SCHOOLS

S. J. Everett of Greenville Delivers Literary Address to Graduates.

BASEBALL GAME IS ONLY ATTRACTION OF THE AFTERNOON

Play by Members and Student Body is Climax to Activities

Final exercises in connection with commencement of the Bell Arthur school were held Tuesday and attracted large crowds of people from the surrounding community. The program of the day was of outstanding importance to the students and faculty who exerted every effort to measure up to expectation.

The principal feature of the day was the literary address delivered by Attorney S. J. Everett of Greenville, who presented many fine thoughts for the young graduates preparing to take up duties outside of the school room. The speaker was once a teacher himself and what he had to say carried a great message to teachers students alike.

The baccalaureate sermon was delivered Sunday by Rev. George J. Dowell, Baptist minister of Raleigh, father of A. Yates Dowell, principal of the Arthur school. Monday was filled with various activities of the class, but not until Tuesday did the closing exercises in reality get under way.

In the afternoon the main attraction was a baseball game between Fountain and Bell Arthur high school, the latter club winning by the score of seven to six. The game was well attended and showed the young players had received splendid training.

At night a play, Diamond and Hearts, was given by members of the faculty and student body. This feature also drew a large crowd and attracted considerable attention.

MISS LIL WILSON RECEIVES PAINFUL INJURY IN WRECK

Local Woman's Hand Broken When Ford Coupe Crashes Down Embankment.

Miss Lil Wilson of this city sustained painful injuries while on her way to Durham yesterday in a Ford coupe when the car crashed down an embankment near Princeton, a small town a short distance from Goldsboro. With Miss Wilson at the time was Wyatt Brown, who escaped uninjured.

According to reports received from a Goldsboro hospital this morning, Miss Wilson had several bones of her hand badly broken and was badly shaken up. The bones were set a short while after she was carried to the hospital and she was reported to be resting well this morning, although slightly nauseated from the anesthetic.

Just how the accident occurred probably never will be known. The car apparently was running along smoothly in the road, when it suddenly swerved, and crashed down a small embankment, which fortunately was not very steep. The car was badly shattered, and when the occupants extricated themselves Miss Wilson's injuries were found to be so serious that she was immediately carried to a hospital. Mrs. Carey Warren and Mr. Frank Wilson, relatives of the injured lady, left this morning for Goldsboro where they will probably remain until she can be brought home.

500 GALLON STILL CAPTURED IN THE SIMPSON SECTION

Thad Williams Also Captures 14 Barrels of Beer and 13 Gallons Liquor.

NINE STILL TAKEN BY OFFICERS DURING THE MONTH OF MAY

Hundred and Forty-four Barrels of Beer Also Taken in Raids in May.

Another powerful blow was landed against the illicit whiskey traffic of the county yesterday afternoon, when Deputy Sheriff Thad J. Williams, Policemen Swain, Grimesland and Joe Nobles of Greenville succeeded in capturing one of the largest steam plants reported here in several months. The capture was made near Simpson, and while no operators were taken the officers located fourteen barrels of beer and thirteen gallons of liquors.

The still was constructed of two ordinary gasoline drums bricked in furnace shape and was capable of an enormous output of whiskey in a few hours. Only corn whiskey had been made at the place, the officers believe, as this was the kind captured with the outfit.

That the operators had no idea of the law interfering with them was evidenced by the fact that they didn't even take the trouble to secret the liquor and beer. As a rule the whiskey is placed in the woods a long distance from the still, but the most of it is disposed of to the trade at once.

Deputy Sheriff Williams has captured a total of nine stills and a hundred and forty-four barrels of beer since the first of May, it was stated this morning. A number of the outfits were of the very finest type and used in keeping the trade supplied with the very best grade corn whiskey.

The capture yesterday was one of the most important reported here in sometime and should have much to do with discouraging the traffic in that immediate section. In fact, distillers seldom ever place two stills in operation to every one captured, and persons who believe this old gag have another thought coming to them.

WATSON ACCUSES DAUGHERTY ALSO

Georgia Senator Says Attorney General Played Part in Morse Release.

Washington, May 25.—Senator Watson of Georgia today charged that Charles Morse was released from the federal prison through a decision of the medical board that never saw him.

He charged that attorney general Daugherty and Thomas Felder were parties connected with this fraud of pardoning powers.

Durham, May 25.—Bishop John C. Kilgo, of Charlotte, placed on the retired list by the general conference of the Southern Methodist church meeting in Hot Springs, Ark., a few days ago, was taken desperately ill while returning from the conference and had to be removed from the train at Memphis. Prof. R. L. Flowers, of Trinity College, reported when he arrived this morning. Bishop Kilgo was regarded as in a critical condition when he was removed from the train, but a telegram received later said he had rallied. Dr. W. F. Pew, president of Trinity College, and Rev. J. C. Wooten, of Raleigh, remained with the sick man.

SUNDAY DECLARED NEAR EAST RELIEF DAY IN THIS CITY

Campaign to be Well Observed in all City Churches During the Day.

PLIGHT OF ARMENIAN CHILDREN IS TO BE PRESENTED PEOPLE

Pitt County People Asked to Contribute Exactly \$3,960 as Quota.

Sunday has been declared "Near East Relief" day in the churches of Greenville and Pitt county.

In nearly all pulpits the plight of the Armenian children, whose parents died to check the onward rush of Mohammedanism or the German drive on the Baku oil fields, will be brought to the attention of the congregations. Pitt county has always been generous to worthy causes and it has often been said that the Near East Relief is the most worthy of all Christian charities.

Rev. Thomas A. Beaman has been for several weeks preparing for Pitt's campaign for its \$3,960 quota which begins Sunday. He has secured the co-operation of a number of prominent business men of the county and has organized committees in every township.

The 3,960 asked of Pitt county will provide food and clothing for the 66 children assigned to Pitt county by the state organization. North Carolina is raising \$200,000 this year to take care of its 3,334 "wards" now in the Tar heel orphanages in the stricken Bible lands.

To date the sum of \$155 has been sent in by generous-hearted Pitt countyans to the state office entirely unsolicited. This shows what a strong pull the plight of the Armenian children has on the heart-strings and purse strings of those who know of the Near East Relief and its work. If any part of the \$3,960 is not raised before June 30 all children provided for must be turned out of the orphanages at starvation on that date. There is no other alternative.

SCORES KILLED IN BELFAST RIOTING

Many Killed and Wounded After Curfew Regulations are Extended Again

Belfast, May 25.—With six persons reported killed and upwards of twenty-five wounded within the last twenty-four hours, military curfew regulations heretofore applying to Belfast only, have been extended to all provinces of the Ulster district. The situation is the most serious in many days and authorities are making every effort to preserve order.

RED CROSS LIFE SAVINGS CORPS TO HOLD MEET TODAY

Interesting Demonstration to be Saged at Amuzu Park This Afternoon.

The life saving corps of the American Red Cross will give its first demonstration at Amuzu Park this afternoon under direction of A. B. Corey, chairman of the committee.

Dr. W. I. Wooten will give first aid instructions which is necessary for those desiring to become members of the saving corps. The demonstration this afternoon will quite likely be largely attended as numbers of citizens are interested in the corps.

The object of the life saving corps is as follows:
To develop sentiment and facilities for safeguarding human life from drowning. To teach precautions that should be observed on water, and preventative measures necessary to avoid accidents. To prevent drowning. To teach swimming and boat handling; Holding swimming and life saving exhibitions.

The corps will also promote swimming and life saving competitions; Give instruction in the various methods of performing artificial respiration; Rescue of those in peril of drowning; Resuscitate persons apparently drowned; Teach its members first aid to the injured and to instruct others or non members in this work.

Miss Louise Hubbard is making an effort to create as much interest as possible in the work of the corps, as it is very necessary in a community like this or any other close to water. Members are taught everything necessary to the safety of good swimmers, and should make much progress by proper attention to instructions.

SAYS DAUGHERTY PLAYING UNFAIR WITH CONGRESS

Senator Carraway Says He has Secret Eyes on Members of Congress.

SECRET SERVICE MEN CHARGED WITH SECRET ACTIVITY

Arkansas Senator Also Brings Several Other Charges Against Attorney.

Washington, May 25.—Attorney General Daugherty was charged by Senator Carraway, Democrat, Arkansas, speaking today in the Senate, with having assigned secret service operatives to shadow members of congress.

The Arkansas Senator declared Mr. Daugherty never had denied the charge recently made by H. L. Scaife, discharged Department of Justice employee, that secret service men, including a negro coachman, had been assigned to follow members of the House. The Senator added the statement that he knew of witnesses who would testify that "secret" service men are trailing members of the Senate as well as spying on members of the House.

Another statement made by Senator Carraway was that the Attorney General and C. B. Felder, New York attorney, "suggested" that Charles W. Morse had a kidney disease when they were endeavoring to secure his commutation from the Atlanta penitentiary.

Mr. Carraway's statements, in the course of another long address on the Morse case and war fraud prosecutions, were made in commenting on a statement issued by the Attorney General declaring that his connections with the Morse case were shown by letters of former President Taft and Attorney General Wikersham. The statement also suggested that the Attorney General's war fraud prosecutions were the cause of the attacks upon him. This was denied today by the Arkansas Senator.

Referring to Mr. Daugherty as the "titular Attorney General," Senator Carraway said that Mr. Daugherty's statement was "not candid" and that he used that term to be polite and not to state what he really meant. The Taft and Wikersham letters, Senator Carraway said, did not show Mr. Daugherty's connection with the Morse case, as stated by Mr. Daugherty, because, the Arkansas Senator declared, they did not show that Mr. Daugherty and Mr. Felder had a contract calling for \$25,000 to secure Morse's release.

This news should inspire every grower to do everything possible to make it an actuality, as combined effort would mean much in this direction. Nothing can be accomplished unless everyone pulls together.

Greenville and Pitt county people should respond liberally to the Near East relief campaign to begin here the 28th of this month. The cause is one of the greatest which the public has had an opportunity of giving to

in months, and everyone should contribute liberally. There are thousands of people suffering from want in that part of the world and it is up to the more fortunate to support them.

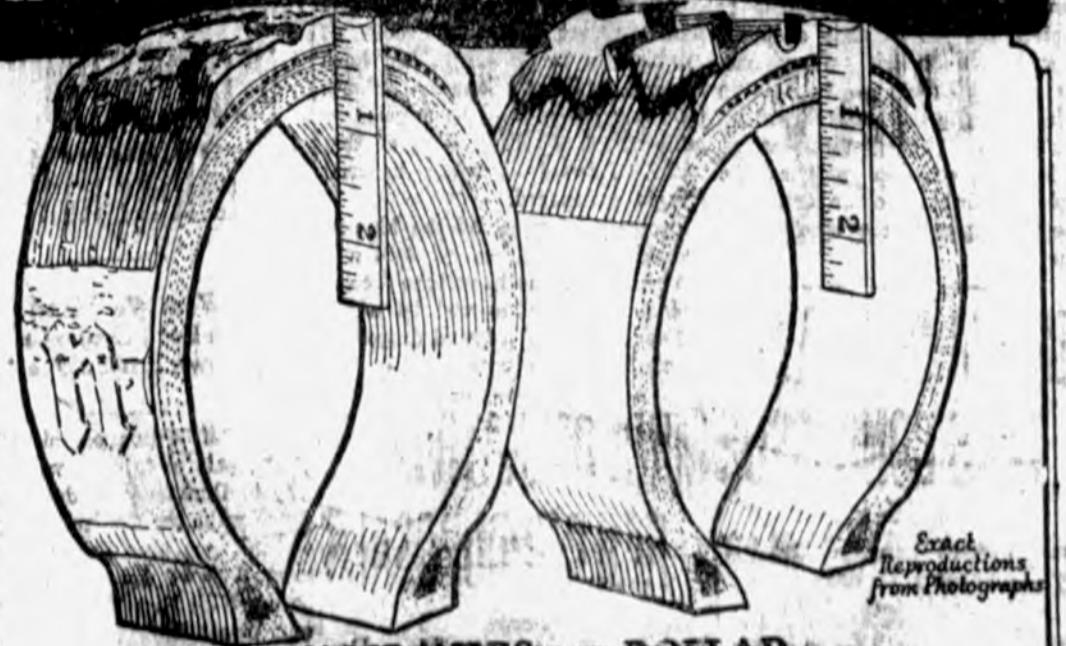

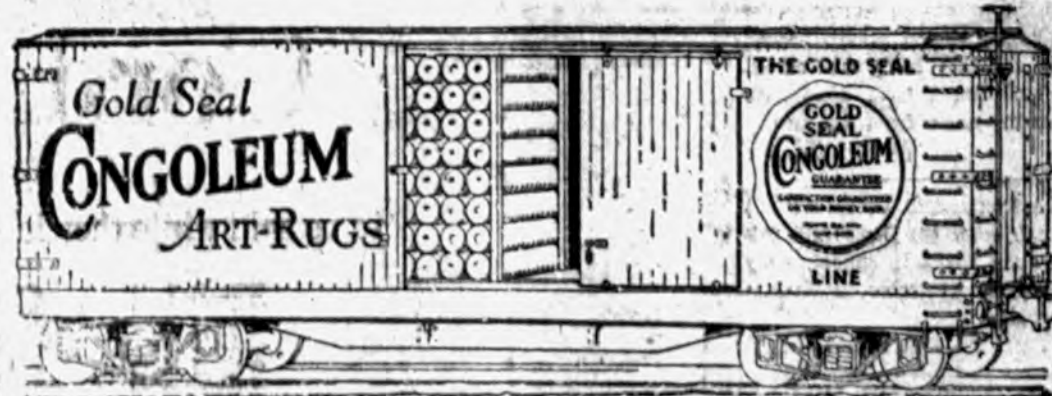

CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING WHY "WAIT AND SEE"?

Howdy Bill, pretty good Jim; but my wife and the girls sure have jumped on me since I saw you last. My wife and the girls have been grading all my tobacco and if I don't go into the association I am afraid they will quit. Wife says she can't see why I am waiting to see before I sign; says anyone can see that the association method of selling is better than the auction system, in that the association "What we will take" and the auction system "What will you give me?" She says that she and the children have worked hard and taken pains in grading, and seen me sell the same grade at difference of 10 to 20c. That in the last two years I have sold several barns for less than their time was worth to grade them and that they do not see how any farmer wants to work himself and family and take a chance on getting a fair price when he can make a sure thing of it. Wife says she has been reading the farming papers and she is convinced that every farmer who stays out of the association is doing his "bit" against those who are in: That every pound sold on the floor weakens the pool just that much and that it is my duty to throw my influence with the farmers and not with the warehouses and speculators as my "Waiting to See" is doing. She also says that it would be foolish for me to stay out even if I knew I would get more at auction this season, since the prices I received would be given as a bait, hoping to break up the association when the association is out of business. I would have the same hard times and irregular market as I have had in the past, and never will such an opportunity be open to us again.

Well Bill; The way I see this Co-operative Marketing business, your wife is right and I would sign and give the association my support as I believe it is bound to be a success. 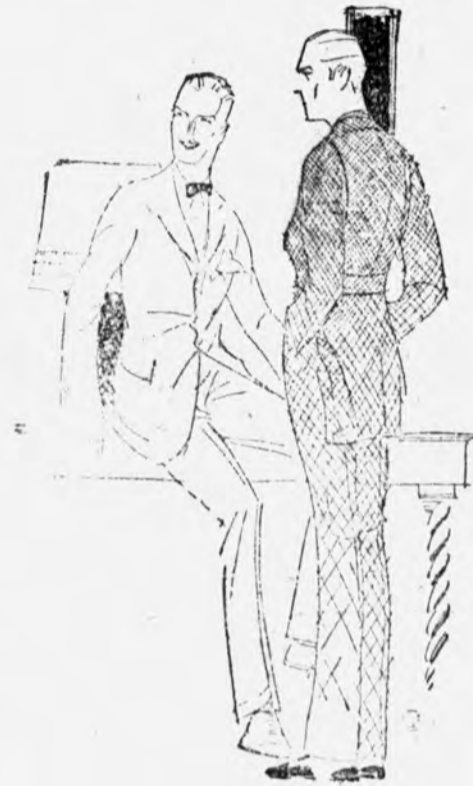
