## BELLAMY APPEALS FOR CLOTHING IN NEAR EAST RELIEF

State Chairman Says Thousands Will Freeze to Death This Winter

### MOTION PICTURES TO BE SHOWN AT WHITE'S THEATRE ON FRIDAY

Films to Graphically Portray Conditions Prevailing in the Near East

The 3,334 little Armenian children now in our North Carolina orphanages in the stricken Bible lands, and the 16,000 adult refugees dependent on North Carolina for their lives, must have clothing if they are not to freeze to death next winter, according to a report sent out this morning by George H. Bellamy, state chairman of the Near East Relief campaign now in progress.

Our people are throwing away their winter garments at this time and there will save many an unfortunate sufferer from acute rheumatism and pneumonia, the report states, and it is hoped people everywhere will make an effort to send in their old garments to county headquarters.

In response to this message, Rev. T. E. Beaman, Pitt county chairman of the Near East, has made arrangements for the public to leave their bundles at the office of S. J. Everett, county chairman, Friday and Saturday until noon.

Clothing needed are coats, sweaters, dresses, trousers, blankets, wool shirts, heavy hosiery, wool gloves, mittens, boots and shoes, shopworn garments, sheets, for bandages, new cloth or garments and any heavy, warm clothing in which there is still some wear. Lace, silks, veils, chignons, evening clothes, satin slippers and such kind of clothing cannot be used, as something serviceable is in demand in this section.

Accompanied by her father, she makes a tour of the most picturesque parts of this romantic territory and see every phase of the manifold activities of the Near East Relief among the orphan children and refugees. Her most thrilling experiences are Erivan, the capital of Armenia a city of the dead in the shadow of Mount Ararat—and at the Alexandropol, where twelve thousand orphan children, the largest single assemblage in history of the world—have their quarters in what were built originally as warehouses and barracks for a great Russian military post.

### SMALL AUDIENCE HEARS KENTUCKIAN AT ENFIELD

Enfield, May 31.—Between fifty and seventy-five representative business men and farmers met here today to hear the representative of the Co-operative Marketing Association speak on the success of the association in Kentucky. He made a very forceful address in which he set forth the advantages to the farmer in joining the association and also told of the success of the co-operative marketing system in the Burley belt last season. The small audience which heard the address was due to the fact that sentiment in this section is not very strong toward the co-operative marketing system on account of the unsatisfactory results obtained by those who joined the Peanut Growers' Association. Neither of the local tobacco warehouses have as yet gone over to the association.—News and Observer.

Well Known Players Arrive for Work; Champagne is Also With the Club Today

Jim White, short stop of the Greenville base ball club, Beall, pitcher and Champagne, fielder, have arrived and in all probability will play in the game against Wendell here this afternoon. The arrival of these well known players greatly strengthens Manager Smith's Blue Sox and by next Monday when the first ball is tossed in the opening game Greenville will have one of the fastest teams in the entire league.

While Doran didn't play in the game with Washington Tuesday because of an injured hand, it is quiet likely he may be seen in action this afternoon. His hand has improved considerably this week and will be practically well when the season opens. The arrival of White practically completes the infield line-up, with exception of Ormon who is attending Trinity college and will hardly be able to reach here before the season opens. This position can be filled acceptably by other players, however, and Washington will be given the time of her life in the opening game.

Practice has been continuing earnestly since last Thursday and most of the men here are in splendid condition. There are twelve or fifteen men on the bench at this time, but weeding out will begin at an early date and only the regulars and a few substitutes will remain.

It was reported that Champagne would play with New Bern this season, but this was a mistake. He signed a contract with Greenville while playing in the Virginia league, and Manager Smith had no doubt as to ownership when the controversy was in progress. He is an excellent fielder and heavy hitter and should be able to render invaluable services.

Beall is considered one of the best pitchers in the league and his arrival will be received with interest. Jim White is well known as result of his work with Kinston last season and there is no question about his ability to hold down his position at short.

## POLK DELIVERS GREAT ADDRESS AT HIGH SCHOOL

Warrenton Man Thrills Hearers in Annual Address Before Graduating Class

### URGES HEARERS TO LIVE FOR OTHERS AS WELL AS SELF

Pays Tribute to the Progress of Humanity Within the Last Century

Commencement exercises of the Greenville high school were brought to a close last night with an address by Hon. Tasker T. Polk, of Warrenton. The speaker dwelled mainly on the line of self sacrifice and told the thirty-seven graduates that the spirit of sacrifice would mean much in their future lives.

Mr. Polk was introduced by J. H. Rose, superintendent of Greenville schools, who in a brief way paid a glowing tribute to the ability of the speaker, who was a classmate at college. This was the second visit of the speaker to Greenville, and his address this time proved equally as great as the day when he thrilled members of the Confederacy during their annual reunion here.

Mr. Polk began his address by speaking of the progress of man, how God had brought him up from the depths by teaching him how to govern himself. He used as an illustration of the progress of man the early history of America, referring to the crude life of our ancestors from the time the Mayflower landed at Plymouth Rock with a band of progressive people, and said we should be proud of the fact that we live in the greatest century the sun has ever shown upon.

He spoke at length on the inalienable right of man, stating that outside of the religion of men that the state and federal constitution should be the most sacred thing in the minds of men.

He closed his address by bringing to his hearers what he described as the good old fashioned truths wrapped in new clothing. He said there was a time when the law declared an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth, but this is a thing of the past. By teachings of the great Creator people have departed from first teachings. The paramount thought in the minds of men is self sacrifice and happiness in equally sharing with other men.

During the course of the address the speaker used quotations from some of the greatest speakers and writers in history and brought out his theme in a particularly interesting manner.

The large auditorium was packed to its capacity, and those who heard Mr. Polk declared his address to be the greatest delivered before a graduating class here in several years.

## CURRIN ATTEMPTS TO SHOOT MAN IN SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Intense Excitement Created Today When R. E. Currin Fires on W. C. Keel

### COMPANY WILLING TO LIVE UP TO ORDERS OF INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION

Wilmington, May 31.—The Atlantic Coast Line Railway will likely find it necessary to cut wages to meet the reduction in freight rates ordered by the Federal Commerce Commission. Contemplation of such action was intimated today by President J. R. Kenly, in officially announcing that the Coast Line, in common with practically all of the Southern carriers, will accept the ruling of the board without "accepting the reasoning by which the board reached its judgment."

President Kenly expressed the hope that a combination of deduced labor costs when warranted, and an increase in traffic will yield results more nearly approximating a reasonable return upon the investment of the carrier companies. The full statement follows:

"Responding to the notice and invitation contained in the report in I. C. C. Docket 13293, the undersigned carriers for themselves individually and as members of the Southern group hereby advise that they undertake to make effective on or before July 1st, 1922, on not less than 10 days' notice to the commission and to the general public by filing and posting in the manner prescribed in the Interstate Commerce Act the reduced rates and charges prescribed by the commission in the proceedings designated above.

"In giving this notice the undersigned carriers do not, however, accept all the reasoning by which the commission reached its judgment. Specifically, they except to the findings of the commission that a fair return upon the aggregate value of the railway property of the carriers defined in section 15-A of the Interstate Commerce Act is or will be 5.7 per cent of each aggregate property value. They further specifically except to the conclusion that a general reduction in rates in the Southern group is at this time justified and can only express the hope that further reductions in labor costs.

## FORD SUBMITS NEW OFFER FOR SHOALS

Washington, June 1.—Ford definitely notified the House military affairs committee today that he would not lease Muscle Shoals if the Gorgas steam plant should be eliminated under the new contract drafter for disposition of the property.

Ford's notification was contained in a letter received by Chairman Kahn. The committee immediately went into executive session to consider Ford's reply.

In a letter Ford said that he would not consent to eliminate the Gorgas plant because it was necessary to economical operation of Muscle Shoals. If my revised offer for Gorgas is rejected it must be understood that the offer must be taken as a whole.

It was further requested that the committee send the final offer to the house so members could vote acceptance or rejection. If congress votes acceptance Ford plans to begin work immediately, if rejected he will begin a determined effort to have the project benefit the public.

Premier Poincare would limit the Hague personnel to experts. Uncle Sam may not be classed in this line, but he has enough money to get in anywhere at the Hague and anywhere else in Europe.

Weldon has voted bonds for school improvement. This is another step towards the goal of progress, and the rest of the state will congratulate the people of Weldon in the interest thus exhibited.

Greenville graded schools made considerable progress the past session and the number of graduates is the largest in history of the institution. This is commendable indeed and shows the teachers have done some mighty good work.

The Missouri branch of the association against prohibition charges that liquor is being sold on ships operated by the shipping board. This is a peculiar source for such a charge to originate, and we can't figure exactly what is behind it.

The ten percent reduction in freight rates will be received with favor in this state where business men suffered to such extent that they would do without railroads if such were possible. We deserve rates equal to those in any other state and when the railroads oppose giving them to us they are not fair.

The powers at Genoa are still hopeful that the United States will change her mind and attend the conference at The Hague, but from all indications such hope is futile. This country has done as much as it can to help Russia and doesn't believe any discussion at The Hague could possibly improve the situation.

Joseph Daniels believes the women should take advantage of their enfranchisement and make their vote count in the coming primary. That he is right cannot be doubted in the least. Women have a finer conception of duty than the majority of men and their strength at the polls will do much towards better law enforcement and high public morals.

Bootleggers are certainly "strutting their stuff" using a little parlance of the street, but it seems strutting is about all they are doing. The dragnet of the law is becoming a great menace to the traffic at the present and the officers are liable to sweep down on a blocking outfit before they know it.

The Greenville baseball club has a mighty fine name and the boys should be able to cap everything they come in contact with this season. "Blue Sox" as Mrs. C. B. Bowlett was fortunate enough to call them, should make a wonderful showing this year and it is hoped the public supports them the same way New Bern people are determined to support their club.

Railroad workers are planning to fight the reduction of wages passed on by the interstate commerce commission. That this is the wrong attitude is indubitable. It is time for price cutting to reach every branch of business and railroad workmen might as well take their medicine as others. Their work is no harder. In fact, work is work any way you look at it, and reduction of wages is as fair to one as another.

Railroad workers should consider the plight of the miners before voting to strike. The decreased wages provided by the labor board will not cause the employees to be denied anything and they can live as well as before. No man can be just to himself or the public to expect wages similar to those paid during the inflation period, and railroad men should thank their stars they have been paid the high prices this long. The price of commodities has been reduced considerably in past months, and if anybody can't live cheaper than before than they have no one to blame but themselves.

Potato storage warehouses have met with favorable consideration in many sections of the state and it is hoped Pitt county people will erect as many buildings as possible. Preservation of the potato crop is something in which every grower should be more or less interested and when annual losses are set aside conditions will be more favorable. The houses cost very little in comparison to the annual loss and every section will realize a great saving in money expended this way.

Land banks will be of great value to southern farmers in event they realize exactly what the institutions mean to them. Mighty few fellows know how to take advantage of what the government offers them, but in this day of enlightenment no one should be ignorant of conditions. The farmer has much greater advantages than many poor people in large cities and if he doesn't go forward by leaps and bounds he has no one to blame but himself.
