The scouts cannot leave until June 19 because the camp will not be ready until that time.

BLIND TIGER IS CAPTURED TODAY BY CITY POLICE

Ashley Harper Held on Charge
of Having More Liquor Than
the Law Allows

Ashley Harper, colored man of this city is confined in the county jail today awaiting preliminary hearing on a charge of having in his possession more whiskey than the law allows. He was taken in custody by members of the police department this morning following a raid on his home near the Standard Oil Plant.

Several gallons of whiskey were found secreted in the ceiling of the house, which had been appropriately arranged for the traffic. In the cabinet of a talking machine the officers found several glasses, which had been used in dealing out whiskey to members of the traffic.

Officers said the man was well prepared to handle large supplies of whiskey, and evidently had spent much time in arranging the secret places in the house. The building was one of "built to order" kind and constructed according to the needs of a blind tiger, the officers said.

Harper will be held in jail until the preliminary hearing Monday, unless \$500 bond is furnished.

WAR FRAUD CASE AGAIN FLARES UP ON HOUSE FLOOR

Woodruff Charges Authorities
With Plan to Drop Charges
Against Georgia Man

Washington, June 9.—The case of J. L. Phillips chairman of the Georgia State Republican Committee, who is a libel on \$25,000 bail following his arrest on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government through contracts for disposal of surplus lumber, was brought up again today on the floor of the house.

Representative Woodruff, Republican, Michigan, asserted he had been informed from three separate sources that Phillips had stated a week prior to his arrest that the case against him probably would not be pushed further than his apprehension. Phillips, according to Mr. Woodruff, held the belief that "things on the hill" (the Capital) had come to such a condition that certain authorities deemed his arrest necessary, but were prepared to let the matter rest there. The charge that Attorney General Daugherty had used the Phillips case to shield himself from public criticism was made by Representative Larsen, Democrat, Georgia. Representative Begg, Republican, defending Attorney General Daugherty, declared that if he "was one half as guilty as some people had charged," the President and the public would find it out. The Ohio member sharply criticised "attacks by innuendo" on the Attorney General, who, he declared, was just starting on the big task of trying to put war grafters in jail.

FIRE TRUCK TEST WITNESSED BY BIG CROWD YESTERDAY

Stutz Runs for Three Hours in
Efficiency and Endurance
Test Here

The three hour test made by the Underwriters of the Stutz fire truck recently purchased by the local fire department, passed off smoothly at Amuzu Park yesterday afternoon and proved highly satisfactory to members of the board of aldermen and citizens who were present. This was the final test of the machine which was later turned over to the city.

While the large machine has been seen in several demonstrations the past several days, none were so trying as that staged at the park. This was the official test to determine the efficiency of the engine and had it not measured up to expectations during the three hours it was operated at high pressure it could not have been accepted under conditions provided by insurance companies.

The truck is one of the finest in this section of the state and places the local department in position to battle with flames hours at a time without pressure trouble. The engine does its own pumping and increases the pressure to a much greater extent than afforded by the hydrants.

While Leftwich will join the club today, it is hardly probable he will be seen in action until Monday or Tuesday of next week.

Leftwich was considered one of the best players on the team last season and played a prominent part in Greenville's showing in the championship series against New Bern. He is not only a safe fielder, but swift on the bases and handy with the bat.

The acquisition of Leftwich will be received with interest among fans here, who believe he is as capable of delivering the goods this year as last.

Manager Smith's house cleaning campaign is about over at the present time. Six or seven players have been released during the week, and this leaves only enough extra men for an emergency. Both infielders and outfielders are considered among the best in the league, and can be placed in the game at any moment and be counted on to deliver the goods.

TEXTILE MERGER IS PROPOSED BY DUKE INTERESTS

Plan to Form Gigantic Combination Upon Completion
of Another Dam Under Way

Charlotte, June 9.—The city was agog with excitement today over the report that a \$70,000,000 textile company was to be launched here to operate a chain of mills in the Carolinas with headquarters in Charlotte. Report came from a New York paper. Charlotte mill men either deny knowledge or were non-committal in matter. The report was broadcasted from New York by news agencies.

The most probable basis for report local cotton men say, is that J. B. Duke, is inspiring the most gigantic mill enterprise ever attempted in the world and that Charlotte will be the center of movement if it goes through. The news agency said tentative plans for organization to operate a large chain of mills in the south with Charlotte as headquarters are being considered by a group of well known cotton manufacturers and capitalists. The company, it is said, will be headed by one of the leading cotton manufacturers in the south.

Most likely basis for enterprise, it is said, is that J. B. Duke may have plans which will lead to launching of monumental project upon completion of 80,000 horsepower electric development at Mountain Island and that one million spindles would represent the ultimate and not immediate goal of Mr. Duke's undertaking. Largest group of spindleage under operation of single system in the South is M. F. Cann Mills, Elwood, and Dan Mills at Danville, Va., second largest the C. W. Johnston group, largest in this immediate territory, with 180,000 spindles.

BELHAVEN NEGRO IS SENTENCED TO DIE FOR ASSAULT

Jury at Washington Early
Edwards Dill Found Guilty by
This Morning

Washington, June 10.—Edward Dill, colored, who has been on trial here the past two days, charged with criminal assault on a white woman near Belhaven two months ago, was found guilty by a jury this morning. Immediately after the jury had announced its decision Judge Connor sentenced Dill to be electrocuted on July 14.

This ter mor court was a special one ordered by Governor Morrison for the trial of Dill. When the negro was arrested he was rushed to the state prison for safe keeping as several threats had been made against him. The jury received the case yesterday at 5:30 and deliberated all night.

The Italian ambassador to the United States says tariff is an international question and worthy of the consideration of foreign representatives. That he has the right idea about the matter is right, but very few Republicans would say so because they realize the opposition engendered by American tariff on every side. It is the duty of everybody to oppose anything tending to harm American trade, for unless they do we cannot expect to make progress of other countries not hampered by the burdensome rates.

No one had any idea the house military committee would approve Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals, and the favorable report will be received with genuine pleasure on all sides. The committee didn't favor government ownership because it realizes that Mr. Ford could do more with the project than all others. He not only has the money to complete necessary construction, but also has the ability to put the plant on a paying basis. This may not sound out of the ordinary to the general run of people, but it's a mighty big thing and demands the consideration of everyone interested.

The soldiers' bonus has not received the support of administration members, so it is quite evident the Republican party is opposed to the measure. The men who fought that the country should be saved should not forget this fact when the time to close leaders comes again. If they do they can't ever expect to better the present situation. Compensation for the soldiers has been provided by practically every country in the world except America and it would be a shame if we should fail. The issue is one of the greatest the country has had under consideration since ending of the war, and the thousands of men involved realize the fact as no others possibly can.

Feeble attempts are being made to settle the coal strike, but if anything has been accomplished it isn't noticeable. The miners still continue their wages should not be reduced to the extent approved by the operators, and the operators declare they will not yield under any other terms. The situation is the most serious that has faced American industry in years, and unless something is done we are bound to suffer. The miners will accomplish nothing in the long run. What they are losing now will take months to make up in wages, and if they had realized the fact at first they could have saved millions of dollars. They are to be pitted, but it isn't yet too late to get busy and make up for the loss.

While baseball demoralizes business to an extent, those who kick against it should remember that all work and no play makes Jack a terribly dull boy. When we work ten months of the year is it too much for us to take an hour or so off each day to go to a ball game and get the recreation and diversion afforded by the splendid sport. Every business man of any vision desires his workmen to have proper diversion. Without it they are dead and devoid of proper animation. The greatest American sport quickens the pulse as nothing else can do and the town without it certainly can't experience the benefit of these with good teams and happy fans.

The speeding on hard surfaced roads of Pitt county has reached alarming proportions and unless immediate action is taken to remedy the situation many lives may be lost. There are many people who do not realize the danger of speeding until they have been in an accident, and it is those who jeopardize the lives of others by running their cars at top speed at every chance possible. It is mighty nice to run fast on the good roads, but it is much safer to take a leisurely pace and be assured of making the trip safely. After all, what is the use of riding if we are going to kill ourselves, as many will eventually do. If the situation does not improve in the near future it is up to the county commissioners to take some action looking to improvement.

Mints were served by little Miss Charlotte Dutner.

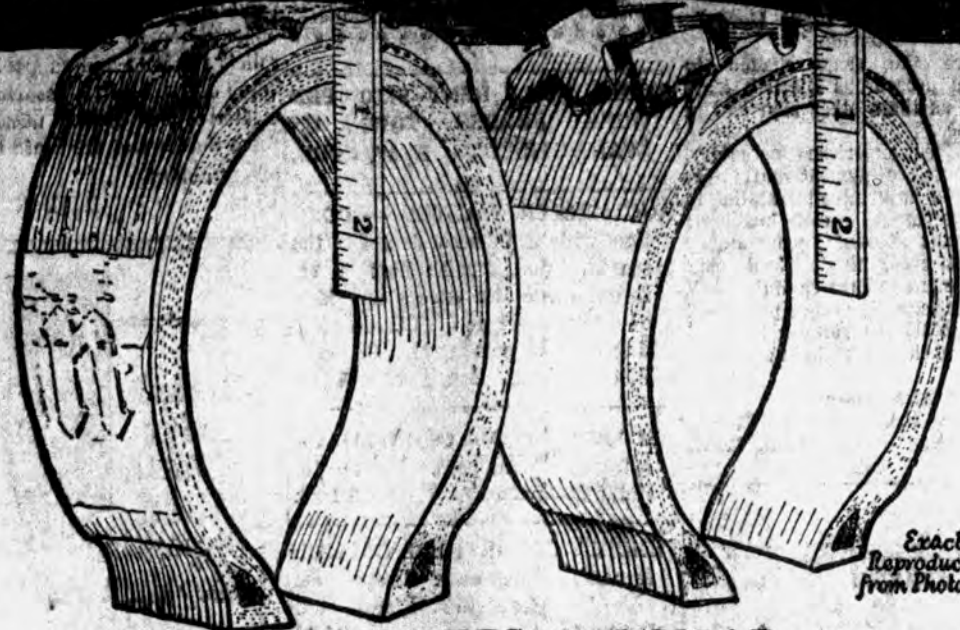
Music was furnished by Bills orchestra and dancing was enjoyed throughout the evening.

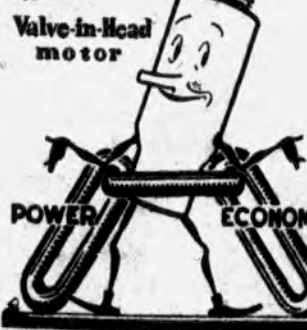
