HARDING OPPOSES ACTION OF MUSCLE SHOALS PROPOSAL

Chief Executive Desires Further Action to be Delayed Until Later Date

URGES IMMEDIATE
PASSAGE OF SHIP
SUBSIDY MEASURE

Attitude Regarding Alabama
Project Not Divulged by
Harding or Friends

Washington, June 12.—President Harding is understood to have taken as determined stand today against action by congress at this time on pending bills for disposal of the government's nitrate plant at Muscle Shoals, Ala.

The views of the President, as outlined, it was stated, to Representative Mondell, Wyoming, the Republican leader, at the White House, was conveyed to the Republican steering committee, charged with the task of farming the legislative program of the House. Members of the committee declining to indicate whether they would recommend action on the bills or let the whole question go over until the December session.

There was no intimation as to how the President regarded the proposal of Henry Ford for lease of the property beyond the statement that he felt the matter was too big to be considered hurriedly and in what members regard as the closing period of the present congress.

President Harding's demand for speed in the framing of the administration ship subsidy bill resulted tonight in announcement by the merchant marine committee that it would be submitted to the House tomorrow.

Meanwhile, the Republican steering committee, which directs the legislative program of the House—was considering the President's urgent request that the bill be put to a vote as a party measure if necessary, prior to any adjournment of congress. At his conference today with Representative Mondell, Republican leader, the President reiterated the belief that the measure was of vital interest to the business welfare of the country and that it should not go over until the short session beginning in December.

HARDING PLANS TO TRAVEL NEXT WEEK

President to Visit Many Cities
Before Returning to Washington Soon

Washington, June 13.—President Harding will do considerable traveling during the next two weeks, it was stated. His trip will carry him to Baltimore, New Haven, Cambridge, Boston, Marion and Columbus. He will leave Washington tomorrow.

HARDING PLANS TO SUPPORT SUBSIDY

President to Give Undivided
Support to Enactment of
Ship Legislation

Chairman Cambell of the House rules committee today made public a letter from the president in which he said congress will be convened in extraordinary session if the legislation is not enacted at the present session.

New Bern, June 13.—The eleventh annual convention of the Baptist Young People's Union of North Carolina, which will be held in this city this week, beginning Wednesday night and running through Thursday night gives promise of being the biggest and best in B. Y. P. U. history.

The local churches have prepared for and are expecting more than 1,200 delegates, who will be entertained on the Harvard plan, bed and breakfast being furnished. The other meals will be served at the church cafeteria style. Elaborate preparations have been made to give the visitors a good time. A big reception will be given Tuesday night following the convention sermon, down by the river side. A drive around the city and a trip down Neuse river will be other attractive features. PANTEGO YOUTH DROWNS SUNDAY IN PUNGO RIVER

Young Aycock Had Just Completed First Year at University of North Carolina

Washington, N. C., June 12.—Charles Aycock, age 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Aycock, of Pantego, was drowned Sunday afternoon while attempting to swim across the Pungo river near Belhaven. His body was recovered shortly afterwards. The tragedy was witnessed by thirty or forty persons standing on the banks of the river and watching the swimmers. Funeral services will be held today.

Aycock started out with two other young men to swim out to a buoy in the river, a distance about half a mile from shore. The three made the outward trip without much difficulty. After pausing to rest a moment or two they proceeded to return to shore. The other two swimmers forged ahead. Aycock was beginning to grow tired and was unable to keep up. He continued to drop back gradually until the others were about seventy-five feet ahead of him.

The first intimation his two companions had that there was anything wrong was when they heard young Aycock call for help. They turned thought he was joking and did not at first go to his aid. When they realized that the young man really was in danger, they made a desperate effort to reach him. Before they could get to him, however, he had gone down for the last time.

ASK APPROPRIATION FOR FLORIDA PLAGUE

Emergency Measure Necessary
to Curb Ravages of Citrus
Plague in Florida

Washington, June 13.—The department of agriculture is prepared to support the emergency appropriation of a hundred and fifty thousand and fifty thousand dollars for elimination of the citrus canker in Florida.

Two experts of the department are now in Florida for the purpose of investigating ravages of the plague. They say the need of government help is very much in evidence and that some aid must be given before eradication is completed. On the basis of their report the department is prepared to recommend immediate appropriation.

SAYS TWO NATIONS PREPARE FOR WAR

Senator Roberson Says United
States and Japan Have Prepared
for Ten Years

Fayetteville, Ark., June 13.—Fourteen years the United States and Japan have been secretly preparing for war, Senator Roberson of Arkansas declared in addressing the United States and Arkansas Semi-centennial here today.

He said the United States should make every concession consistent to national honor and justice to other friendly powers to establish amicable relations with Japan, but should go no further. He said the breach should be avoided as far possible, but that we should never tolerate the Japanese position on immigration.

NATION COAL BILL BOOSTED BY LABOR

CITY TELEPHONE SERVICE TO BE IMPROVED SOON

Manager Tells Merchants He Will Eliminate Cause of Complaints in Two Weeks

The telephone service received in Greenville was discussed at an interesting meeting of the Merchants Association held in rooms adjoining the Chamber of Commerce this morning at eleven o'clock, and it is quite likely that people who have had phone trouble in the past will receive better service in the future.

Mr. McDaniel, manager of the local exchange, was present and explained conditions prevailing in every department. He said they were making an effort to serve the public as faithfully as possible, and that failure to do so was because some operators was not giving satisfactory service. He said the improvements made at the exchange recently greatly increased their facilities and that there is no reason on earth why every patron should not be served efficiently and satisfactorily.

He promised to meet with the merchants two weeks later and then determine whether the service causing complaint had been remedied. He said this would give him time to investigate each department and find exactly what had caused the trouble. He explained the difficulty in securing the right kind of employees, and intimated nothing but the most efficient would be employed in the future.

The Merchants Association is making an effort to serve the public in every way possible, and intends to extend its activities in the future, according to those present today.

MARKET PRICES TO BE GIVEN FARMERS

Department to Investigate
Feasibility of Furnishing
Reports Soon

REMARKABLE RECORD BY TAR HEEL STUDENT AT HARVARD UNIVERSITY

Cambridge, Mass., June 12.—Professors at Harvard University made known today what they characterized as a remarkable achievement on the part of Chesley M. Hutchings, of Goldston, N. C., a student in the graduate school.

In taking a three-hour oral examination in romance languages and literature in which he was questioned by thirteen professors and inspectors Hutchings answered every question correctly. The professors considered 50 per cent an excellent showing in such a test.

Hutchings, who is familiar with fifteen languages, was taking this examination preliminary to receiving his degree of Doctor of Philosophy. He was awarded a fellowship recently to enable him to study abroad next year.

HOPE TO CONCLUDE REPARATION ISSUE AT AN EARLY DATE

Committee on Guarantees Going to Germany to Develop Solid Basis

Paris, June 12.—That the committee on guarantees which is leaving for Berlin Thursday or Friday will develop the basis for future action on the reparation issue is the impression today in French official quarters. It was the opinion of high official circles all along that in the loan session the reparations commission was putting the cart before the horse—that the solvency of Germany by a complete balanced budget and restricted paper currency should have been accomplished first, thus forming the security which the investors demand.

France up to the present has spent about 90,000,000 paper francs in reconstruction efforts, one official explained today and the government was not at all ready to consider a reduction of its claims against Germany.

In reparation circles the theory is that France is not asked to cut off from her claim any portion that is collectible, but only to reduce it to an amount the collection of which can be counted upon. This is met by the explanations that Germany's capacity to pay eventually cannot be determined now.

It is anticipated here that Germany will pay the next monthly reparations installment of 50,000,000 marks.

SPENT LESS THAN \$500 TO SECURE NOMINATION

Col. S. W. Brookhart, Republican Senatorial Nominee, in Unusual Statement

Des Moines, June 12.—Col. W. S. Brookhart, of Washington, Iowa, expended \$453.98 in the campaign which won him the Republican Senatorial nomination, according to his official statement filed with Secretary of State Crane.

The statement written by Col. Brookhart in pen and ink, was unusual.

"I received meals and lodging from farmers and laboring people many different times," Col. Brookhart said, "and was driven through a county on automobile tips several different times without expense, individuals farm organizations, labor organizations and newspaper supporting me all so at their own expense. Halls were furnished without cost."

He received \$187 for his campaign fund, only two persons contributing cash.

POOR BUSINESS JUDGMENT CAUSES LOSS OF SEVERAL MILLIONS, OFFICIAL REPORT REVEALS TODAY

Elimination of Waste Big
Problem American Business
Must Solve

Washington, June 10.—Errors of business judgment were chiefly responsible for bankruptcy of 19,652 American manufacturing and trading companies in 1921, with losses of \$627,000,000, according to the Commerce Department.

Dr. figures seem unimportant to the average mind, but to the man of large financial or business affairs they are absolutely controlling, in the view of American trade experts.

One of the chief problems in American business today, these experts assert, is the elimination of waste or actual losses that pile up each year on the wrong side of the American ledger. This can only be done by

SEVERAL KILLED IN SEVERE STORM IN NEW YORK CITY

More Than Sixty Persons Lost
Lives When Cyclone Strikes
Great Metropolis

GREATEST DEATH TOLL
WROUGHT WHEN GALE
ENGULFS SMALL SHIPS

Hundreds of Small Crafts
Wrecked and Many Sunk by
Terrific Windstorm

New York, June 12.—Morgues and undertakers shops of the Metropolitan area tonight held the bodies of more than three-score men and women and children—victims of yesterday's brief cyclonic thunderstorm.

Marine police, who continued throughout the day their work of grappling in Pelham Bay and Long Island Sound off City Island, where the greatest toll was taken among Sunday canoeists and fishermen, predicted they would find at least a score more victims—enough to push the death toll past eighty. Eye-witnesses of the swift tragedy placed the number even higher.

At least 250 canoes, row-boats and small motor boats were bobbing about off the island, witnesses said, when the storm came screaming down on the resort at a velocity of 80 miles an hour or better. Occupants of the little craft, sensing their danger, made a run for shelter. But scarcely had they got under way when they were engulfed in a blinding storm of rain and hail.

As quickly as it had come, the storm vanished. It had lasted less than five minutes. But scarcely a dozen of the 250 small craft had survived. Horrified, the survivors said, the crowds on the beach who about the Casino Pier saw scores of men and women clinging to wreckage and overturned craft in the churning sound and bay. One by one, they gave up the struggle and dropped quietly off to be carried out to the open sea by the tide.

Such attractions have a tendency of drawing the community closer together, and this is exactly what has been needed. The Woman's club will sponsor the sing this time, and its members will have a program of interest to everyone.

Senator Kellogg says the republican party has passed more acts of benefit to the American farmer than the Democrats did in the ten years previously. That may be, but not a single farmer will admit that the administration has done so much for him as the Democrats did. Its true the war was on and not much time could be given anything but war, but what little legislation the farmers received was effective. Everyone will be gratified to learn that the State Economic survey is beginning to take notice of the destruction of timber in this country. Thousands of dollars have been lost through forest fires in past years, and if preventative measures can be placed in effect everyone will directly benefit. Carelessness is largely responsible for such enormous losses. In fact, right recently considerable woodland was destroyed by fire in different parts of the country, and much young vegetation was wrecked. It's a pity this important matter could not have been given attention before. However, anything the department can do will be appreciated by everybody with interest of the country at heart.

LEXINGTON BUSINESS MAN GIVES HIS FIRM VIEW OF CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING

The letter of inquiry below was written by one of Pitt county's largest tobacco merchants to one of its old friends in Kentucky. We do not print the merchant's name but same can be gotten, if desired, from the Editor of C. C.

Lexington, Ky.

View of the fact that you sold Kentucky markets a good deal of tobacco last season through the Co-operative Association, we ask you to write us without either side just what you think. You know it is a new thing, and in this business a great deal of so-

bacco, and they propose to market a lot of tobacco through this Association this year. We are very much interested in tobacco, both as growers and as furnishers of supplies to tobacco growers. If you will take the time to write us, just what you think of this Association, as to the growers, and the business men, we will certainly appreciate it. It looks now as if they are coming to be equally divided. We are not taking sides either way, but want the best thing to be done for the farmer and the community, and as this matter has been tried in your state, we will certainly appreciate it if you would give us your views. It will be kept confidentially if you so desire.

Tell us how much was advanced on the tobacco, when it was delivered and whether it has been closed up, and if you think the farmers that sold their tobacco through the Co-operative Association got more money than the ones that sold it on the floor of the warehouses.

Give us full detail of just how it was handled, and just what you think of this plan.

Below is the answer received:
Lexington, Ky.
May 22, 1922,

My dear Mr. —

It has been a long time since we had a letter from your good firm and we are delighted to hear from you once more. When we sold you formerly, the writer was our sales manager, and, of course, he remembers with pleasure the many nice orders you gave us and our pleasant relations all during that period and it gives him now very peculiar pleasure to write you in regards to the Barley Growers Association and the results of the work of this Association, up to the present time. I will answer your questions in the order in which they were asked.

1. Tell us how much was advanced on the tobacco? 9 cents per lb.

2. When was the tobacco delivered? During January and February. The period of delivery was much shorter under the Co-operative plan than under the old plan. It took about 45 days to receive, grade and store the crop whereas under the old plan it took at least 90 days.

3. Has it been closed up? Not yet. The grower was paid 9 cents per pound on delivery of his tobacco and he has just now received another 9 cents which the officers think amounts to about 60 per cent of the value of the crop. They expect to pay another 9 cent a little later on.

4. Did the farmers who sold their tobacco through the Association get more money than the ones who sold it on the floors of the warehouses? Yes, they received, or will receive, more money. From 5 cents to 9 cents per pound more money.

5. Give us the full detail of just how it was handled. The farmer or grower would deliver his tobacco at one of the houses. It would be unloaded and then graded by an official grader for that house. He would then allow a certain amount of money for that grade. This amount was based on a schedule, worked out at the very beginning whereas the Association decided it would not sell the tobacco for less than a given price for a given grade. Of course this had to be assumed—nobody could actually know what the tobacco would finally be sold for, but just as you in your business, or we in our business, decide we will not sell at less than a given price. This was the minimum price and the schedule worked out on that and the farmer was paid 13 upon the grading of his tobacco. Every member of the Association received the same price or received the same payment on his tobacco for that grade that ever other farmer did. Of course if one farmer's tobacco graded out better than another, he received a higher price for his. Then this tobacco was sold to large manufacturers. The deal was made by the general officers of the Association with a representative of the Tobacco Manufacturing concern. They just simply went about it like one of our salesmen would come to your store and sell you a car load of flour. It was the proper principal, just exactly as other business is done upon, and the buyer could take it or leave it and the funny part of it is they have taken it right along.

The second payment has just been made to the farmers of another 9 cent per pound. This now nets them 18 cents for their crop, whereas those who sold on the floor of the warehouses did not receive on an average of more than 20 cents for their crop, but they got it all at one time. The grower in the Association can take his warehouse receipt to the bank and borrow money on it, just as he wishes. Of course he has to pay interest and he now has another payment coming to him in the future, which will amount to somewhere between 5 and 9 cents per pound. They hope to make it nine cents.

No. 6. What do you think of this plan? We confess we were fearful as the results at the beginning. We

thought it would make hard times in this particular section inasmuch as the farmer would only get 9c for his tobacco and would have to wait a long time for the remainder but we have been surprised at the way it has worked out and we understand many who would not sign up the pledges at the beginning of last year are now eager to get in. We neglected to tell you that the farmer is pledged for 5 years, so if there be an overwhelming crop one year the association can hold that back and be assured that another crop will not be thrown on the market until they say so, the next

year. If this plan is followed out in North Carolina we believe you will be pleased with the result.

Now Mr. — we are going to take advantage of your nice letter and hand it over to our sales manager. We want to tell you again and while we do not wish to take advantage of your friendship to us, we hope we can again be able to get your name on our lists. What do you say?

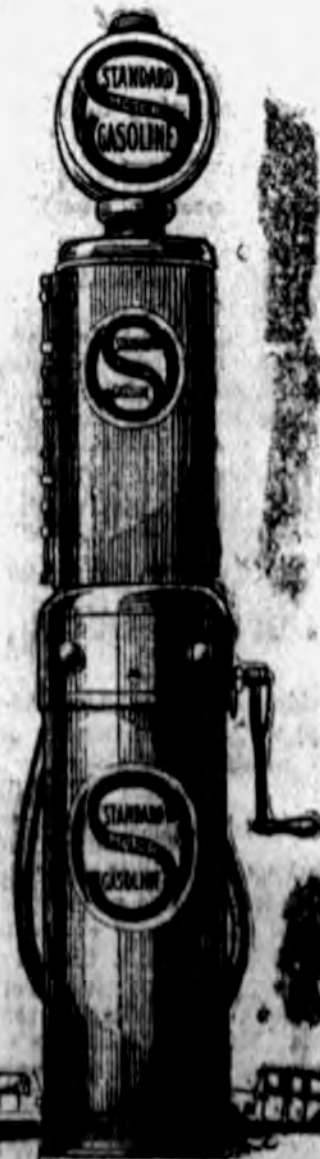

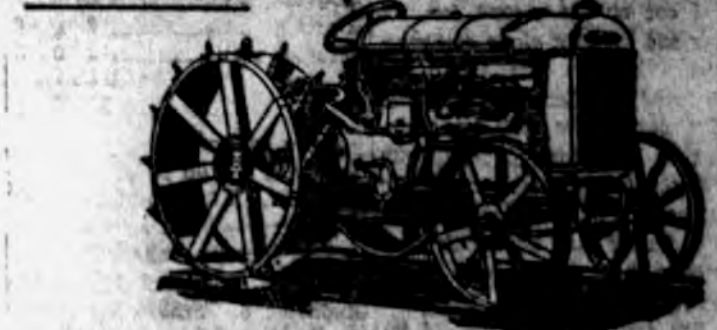

BLUE SOX BAT WAY TO VICTORY OVER TARBORO

Despite costly errors in the first three innings the Blue Sox yesterday afternoon recovered and batted their way to a 7 to 2 victory over the Tarboro club at the fair grounds here.
