LARGE ATTENDANCE FEATURES OPENING OF SUMMER TERM

Summer Term at College
Opens With Registration of
Three Hundred

TERM TO BE LONGER
THAN OTHER SCHOOLS
IN NORTH CAROLINA

First Assembly Held This
Morning With Director
Meadows in Charge

The summer term of East Carolina Teachers College opened yesterday, class work beginning this morning. The registration so far has reached the three hundred mark, with others on the campus that have not yet registered. Others will arrive during the week. The full capacity of the plant was accepted and more had to be turned away than were accepted because there was no room for them. This promises to be far the most satisfactory summer school ever held in the institution. Heretofore there has been a group for the county summer school working for provisional certificates. This work has been discontinued and only those who are prepared for the regular courses offered during the other three terms are allowed. It is noticeable that a good percent of the graduates of the two-year normal course have returned to get credits for advanced college work. A number of graduates from other colleges are here for professional credits.

The summer term is longer than that of any other summer school in the state. This is eight weeks and the others are six. The state department gives a full year of credit for three summers here and requires four summers at the other institutions. This school has made a reputation for working during the summer.

The first assembly of the term was held this morning, with Director Meadows in charge. He gave the students and the new members of the faculty a hearty welcome and told them something of what the work means. He announced that there would be some attractive entertainment features that would relieve the tedium of work.

Dr. Laughinghouse made a short health talk, telling the students how to keep fit, and warning them against imprudence.

MOB STORMS JAIL FOR WOMAN SLAYER

Tear gas was used in beating the mob back and the prisoner was spirited away. According to the sheriff the prisoner confessed killing the woman with an ax while she was returning to her home on a lonely street.

LABOR CONDEMNS FIRMLY DECLINES TO FAVOR SUBSIDY

Federation of Labor, Protests
Against Passage of Harding's Legislation

Cincinnati, June 13.—Unqualified condemnation of the ship subsidy bill was voted unanimously today by the delegates at the American Federation of Labor convention almost simultaneously with President Harding's dispatch of a letter asking congress to pass the measure under threat of an extra session. The convention also voted to send a protest against passage of the bill to Senate and House leaders.

The bill was termed by the resolution adopted by the convention as a "cunningly devised scheme to enrich certain classes of so-called American ship owners at the expense of the truly American tax-payers and also to provide patronage which is certain to be used for purely political purposes." The resolution concludes with the statement that the bill was "condemned as inimical to the public interest and particularly destructive to the nation's hopes for sea power."

The action by the delegates was their first attack on the Harding administration, which it was indicated by the federation's executive council report, would be the brunt of other attacks during the two weeks' convention.

HOOVER APPROVES CENSUS OF COTTON

(By International News.)

Washington, June 14.—Secretary of commerce Hoover has approved the proposed census of the world cotton supply, it was announced by Senator Harris of Georgia following a conference of officials of the department of commerce. He also approved Harris' suggestion of taking the cotton census of the United States twice a year.

SEVERAL ACTIONS GIVEN HEARING IN CITY COURT TODAY

Leroy Brown Found Guilty of Stealing Fans From the Christian Church

Several cases faced Mayor D. M. Clark in this morning's session of police court, but hearing was completed long before the usual hour.

The most important action taken during the morning was that against Leroy Brown, colored man, charged with stealing two electric fans from the Christian church about May 8. He was found guilty and bound over to the next term of county court under bond of \$200.

E. L. Latham, charged with receiving stolen property, or purchasing one of the fans stolen by Brown, was also bound over to county court under bond of \$200. It was brought out that Latham purchased the fan for \$4.50, although this was vigorously denied. Brown, however, insisted that he sold the fan to Latham, and it was upon this evidence that the second party became involved.

The second fan was found in the Eureka Pressing club and was delivered without question. Policeman Brewer had been working on the case for an entire month, and succeeded in definitely charging the theft to Brown yesterday.

J. H. Burch, charged with driving an automobile while intoxicated, was released upon payment of \$50 and cost of action.

W. S. Fleming, Jr., charged with assault, was released upon payment of \$5 and cost.

W. D. Hartman, charged with speeding and driving a motorcycle with exhaust not muffled was fined \$10 and cost in the first case and released upon payment of cost in the second.

The local chamber at Rocky Mount, of which Mr. Norman Y. Chambliss is secretary, is also pushing the movement. Mr. Chambliss in speaking of the work to be accomplished said: "You can count on me 100 per cent strong. This is a great undertaking and you can count on Rocky Mount."

Greenville people will get enough baseball to last them through the week-end Friday when Washington and Greenville meet in the first double header of the season at the fair grounds park. The first game will be called promptly at 2:30 o'clock. Manager Smith stated this morning and it is hoped the largest attendance of the season will be present.

While Washington has been in the habit of winning Fourth of July double bills from Greenville in past years, the Blue Sox are determined the trick shall not be repeated this year. SENATOR SIMMONS CONTINUES FIGHT AGAINST TARIFFS

North Carolina Man Denounces Duties Imposed On Necessities of American People

Washington, June 13.—The administration tariff bill was subjected to another general attack today in the Senate by Senator Simmons, Democrat, North Carolina, who declared the committee duty of 60 per cent ad valorem on reed and willow furniture—which subsequently was approved—was illustrative of the plan of the majority as outlined in the whole bill.

"You start in the kitchen, levying heavy duties on kitchen utensils and ware," said the Senator. "Next you impose a heavy tax on tableware and then you go after the furniture in the home, levying a duty of 60 per cent on furniture in common use throughout the country."

"If you can tell me anything of consequence entering into the household or the building of the home or that goes on the backs of the people on which you have not increased the duties, I don't know what it is. If this tax is for revenue, then I say to you do you go into the homes of the people to tax the necessities to raise a revenue."

Senator Simmons argued that a 60 per cent duty could not be justified from a protectional standpoint, but this was disputed by Chairman McCumber, of the finance committee, and Senator Townsend, Republican, Michigan, who presented figures to show that this duty was not sufficient to equalize the difference between the cost of production in this country and in China and Japan.

THREE MORE VICTIMS ADDED TO STORM TOLL

New York, June 13.—Three more victims were added to the death toll resulting from the storm which crossed New York Sunday afternoon with the fury of a hurricane. Two more bodies were tossed from the water and another victim died from injuries suffered in the collapse of the ferris wheel at Coney Island.

Police are keeping up the search for the drowned at City Island. They think that the total death list will reach 75.

AMERICA CHARGED WITH LIQUOR SALE

President Harding also comes out and opposes the lease of Muscle Shoals. This was to be expected after so many other members of the party have done their best to bring about delay. Regardless of this opposition, however, the project will be disposed of and Henry Ford will be the man to get it.

The United States is rapidly regaining European trade and the future seems to be brighter than in sometime. With increased demand for products of the farm prices should be slightly strengthened from time to time. In fact, the cotton market may be stimulated to a much greater extent than past months, and the sale increased more than usual.

City authorities have done mighty fine work in doing away with vagrants and it is hardly probable that the score of lawless men will increase in the future. There is no reason for anyone remaining without employment of some kind these days, and the future. There is no reason for viding the vagrants with work on the streets or roads. This is an effective way of breaking up idleness, and will mean much in the future.

The county highway commission should get busy and see that danger signs are placed on the hard surfaced roads of the county. There are several curves in the roads where signs are very necessary, and unless they are placed there at an early date many deaths are likely to occur. There are as many reckless drivers today as ever and while they may not regard the signs the county will be irresponsible in case they kill themselves.

The Commerce Department has begun the tabulation each month of statistics of more than 500 industrial and commercial movements, in its surveys of current business conditions. The subjects covered include textiles, metals, paper, fuels, rubber automobiles, glass, hides, leather chemicals building construction, building materials, food products, tobacco, transportation, foreign exchange, insurance labor, banking and finance.

Greenville people should make it a point to attend the Chautauqua which opened here last night. Chautauqua contains numbers of attractions of the community building type and the town that fails to have them during the year lose to no little extent. The programs become better with each succeeding year because great men are sacrificing their time merely to help others. The numbers are educational in every sense of the word, and prove an inspiration to those seeking entertainment and profit.

Success of the Hague conference has been dimmed somewhat by friction between Anglo-French forces. This is to be regretted, but it is nothing more than was expected. There is only one sure way for Europe to recover. That's through the natural process featuring the recovery of other nations. Conference will not help the situation to any great extent and the sooner the people realize the fact and get down to real work the earlier we are destined to get back to pre-war days.

The community sing to be held in Greenville Sunday, June 19th should be largely attended. It is these kind of gatherings that binds the community together, and it is the duty of everyone to attend in large numbers. The sings are to be held from time to time during the summer and should prove a great inspiration to that class of people who like to mix with one another and enjoy the spirit of union. Each club in the city should encourage the sings as much as possible and leave nothing undone towards their success.

The hard surfaced road from Greenville to Ayden will be completed in the near future and Pitt county will then have two complete hard surfaced roads. Traffic condi-

tions are better today than ever before, and in the course of two years they will be twice as good as they are today. Our road building forces are to be congratulated upon their splendid showing. Not many counties have made as much progress in the same length of time and we have a right to feel proud of what has been accomplished.

Widespread unemployment is working serious damage in many parts of the country, but this is mild compared to the desire not to work. Anybody with a desire to work can find it in the south, and that's why we contend this is the best section of the country to live in. Strikes demoralize industry as nothing else can possibly do, and the sooner the spirit is forgotten the earlier we may expect to get back to normal.

Senator Simmons has ably represented opposition to the tariff measure and that he deserves to succeed goes without saying. The North Carolina man believes the duties on farm products are far too high, and realizes what this would mean to the south. Advocates of the tariff don't care what the farmer suffers. Their object is to benefit the manufacturers as much as possible and receive rich returns from this source. It's a pity the best interests of the country can't be served. But we must take what the majority decides is best and how to the inevitable.

Senator Walsh does not approve Herbert Hoover's plan relative to settling the coal strike. And Hoover in return asks congress to do something. While it is true Mr. Hoover probably didn't accomplish as much as expected, his work may eventually have some results. Congress, however, should be able to do much more than any single individual, and unless conditions improve it is hoped such men as Senator Walsh will do something instead of talking so much. Talk is cheap, but getting results is entirely another matter as the past has proven.

Greenville is enjoying another splendid chautauqua and the public is attending in a commendable way. Such attractions should receive the support of everyone. They are community builders in every sense of the word, and the people receive enough inspiration to last them a long time.

While the crop shortage may be troubling a few farmers this year, it is quite evident the loss will be made up by improvement of prices. The competition in the tobacco industry at the present time should produce a general increase in prices. Even the poor grades of bright leaf should sell for more than under ordinary conditions, and the grower may rest assured of coming out at the big end of the horn.

While Greenville people are suffering somewhat from excessive heat, they should be glad they do not live in sections where cyclones and other disturbances frequently occur. Think of the awful disaster in New York recently, and then think of conditions here. This is truly the best part of the world, even though tobacco does sell at a low price some of the time. It's better to be living peacefully than threatened by death, as many have had occasion to learn.

There is little hope of quick action on the soldiers bonus, but it is certain no one will have cause to complain. The opposition will not get by without a severe battle. The administration at first pretended to be in favor of compensation for the men who fought that civilization might be saved from German autocracy, but as days began to pass it became very evident they weren't sincere. The ex-service men, however, still believed they would live up to expectation and of my knowledge of the duties of an officer. I feel confident that I can depend on many to support me now that I appear before you in the first primary. Zellers appeared on the mound for Tarboro and honors were about evenly matched. Each hurler at times found himself in hot water, but pulled out by exhibiting a brand of pitching probably never before surpassed by any hurler on the local lot.

Greenville several times succeeded in getting runners on bases, and really threatened to score in the sixth frame, but had base running caused them to lose out. With three runners on bases in this inning, Umpire Kelly failed to make his decision clear regarding Champagne who was at bat, and the runners were caught off bases and put out. It was thought Champagne had been given a free pass to first, but instead the umpire had called him out.

In the ninth inning Doughton, the first man up for Tarboro, hit a swift grounder out to left field. Leftwich let the ball pass through him, and the runner landed on third, the runner being credited with a single and the fielder and error. Bradley fled out to center field and Doughton scored. Shaner hit a grounder to second base. White fumbled the ball and threw wild and the runner was safe. Webb doubled and Shaner scored. Crump singled and Webb scored.

This ended the affair with exception of Greenville's half of the ninth. The game for eight innings was without a doubt one of the best seen here in a long time. Both teams fielded brilliantly until the final inning, when Greenville couldn't handle the ball in proper form to save their lives.
