TO SELL LIQUOR ON SHIPS UNTIL COURTS PREVENTS

Chairman Lasker Firmly Declines to Yield to Prohibition Advocates

BUSCH DECLARES AMERICA'S GREATEST BOOTLEGGERS TODAY

Interesting Developments Expected to Result From Recent Charges

Washington, June 14.—Sale of liquor on Shipping Board vessels at sea will be continued, Chairman Lasker reiterated tonight, until a Supreme court decision has been rendered holding such practice illegal under the prohibition laws, or until he has "been convinced of its legality."

Mr. Lasker maintained throughout the day the position taken by him in his letter to Adolphus Busch, III, vice-president of the Anheuser-Busch Brewery Company, St. Louis, despite indications that it would be made the subject of attack in congress and by the Anti-Saloon League and other dry organizations.

Officials of the department of justice refused to comment on the situation but in other quarters attention was called to an opinion on file there which was rendered by former Acting Attorney General Frierson in 1920. Mr. Frierson held that the national prohibition act was effective upon ships flying the American flag wherever they might be.

According to high department officials, an opinion of an Attorney General remains the official interpretation of a law until it has been reversed by court decision or by a superseding opinion. Furthermore, they added, such opinion always stands unless request for a review comes from the same department or agencies which originally requested the ruling.

Mr. Lasker's stand as to liquor sales on board American vessels was taken, he informed Mr. Busch, on the authority of an opinion rendered by General Counsel Schlesinger, of the shipping board.

The chairman conferred today with Attorney General Daugherty and while there gave him copies of the correspondence with the St. Louis brewer. The matter of liquor sales at sea was not the primary purpose of the conference, Mr. Lasker indicated later, but it was brought up incidentally.

ENTERS DENIAL TO CHARGE OF SHIPPING HEAD

Adolphus Busch Was Not Closest Friend of Kaiser Chairman Lasker Says

St. Louis, June 14.—Denial that the late Adolphus Busch was "possibly the Kaiser's closest friend in America" as charged by Chairman Lasker of the shipping board, was made at the officers of Anheuser-Busch, Inc., today with the announcement that a second letter was in preparation to the shipping board on the subject of liquor sales on shipping board vessels, and answering Mr. Lasker's charges of the Busch connections with Germany.

The letter will state that the Anheuser-Busch organization reserves the right "to protest when the United States government buys German beer to sell on its ships, and will not let American beer me made," the announcement said.

The announcement declared that "if the government decides to make an investigation of this matter, it will establish, by a reliable witness, that Mr. Lasker has said that he went to President Harding with this whole matter, and told him that the sale of liquor on the shipping board ships would help to solve the board's financial problems, and that he said that President Harding replied to him: 'Mr. Lasker, you are chairman of the shipping board, you know what to do.'"

SENATE PLANS TO END PROFITEERING

Washington, June 15.—Federal investigation of alleged profiteering of American importers loomed prominently as result of charges in the senate during the debate on the tariff bill. A resolution was introduced calling for the department of justice to explain the failure of alleged profiteering and directing of inquiry into import trade before the senate. Senators Walsh and Underwood charged members of the Republican party with protecting importers and profiteering.

SKELETON OF WAR HERO UNEARDED BY WORKERS

Cambridge, Mass., June 15.—While workmen were digging in a cellar in a field at the corner of Channing and Mt. Auburn streets, in this city, they unearthed the skeleton of a Revolutionary War hero, who is believed to have been killed in action during the American War of Independence.

The field, once a part of the James Russell Lowell estate was used in Revolutionary times as the site for an American army officers' hospital. It is believed the skeleton found was that of an officer who died in the hospital and was buried there. A bullet hole was found in the skull. The bones were found by the medical examiner who have been in the earth 150 years. Cambridge Revolutionary societies will permit the Soviet officials to give the remains a military funeral.

HAGUE CONFERENCE BEGINS INQUIRIES

The taking of testimony from a commission of Russian experts will begin June 28 and continue for a period of three months after which a mixed commission will make recommendations.

BLUE SOX PLAY AT WASHINGTON THIS AFTERNOON

After Today's Game They Will Return for Double Bill Tomorrow Afternoon

After completing the series here with Tarboro the Greenville baseball club left today for Washington where they will play this afternoon. They will return tonight and prepare for the double-header with Washington at the fair grounds tomorrow afternoon. The first game will be called at two-thirty, and after its completion the second game will be called. Much interest is centered around the double bill tomorrow, as Washington has the strongest club in the league, if standing of clubs count for anything. While Greenville has had a protracted losing streak the past week, the boys are expected to recover at any moment and handle even the best of them.

The Blue Sox have been in the cellar the entire week, but if two games can be taken from Washington they will evacuate in Farmville's favor. In event Farmville loses. Although it is hardly expected the first half can be won by the cellarites, they have a fighting chance and can take the top by winning practically every game from now on.

LABOR APPROVES VETO OF RECENT COURT DECISION

American Federation of Labor Wants Congress to Kill Court Rulings

LAFOLLETTE ASSAILS ACTION OF COURTS IN RECENT ISSUES

Wisconsin Senator Proposes an Amendment in Labor Convention Address

Cincinnati, June 14.—Organized labor indicated a determination at the American Federation of Labor convention here today that it would start a drive for a constitutional amendment for a congressional veto of Supreme Court decisions, and for the denial of the power of lower federal courts to set aside a federal law as unconstitutional. This, the delegates were informed, would overcome decisions, which labor has regarded as inimical to its interests.

The only formal action, however, was unanimous adoption of a motion creating a special committee to frame a policy, which action was taken after the proposal for the amendment had been made by Senator LaFollette, of Wisconsin. Other speakers, most of them leaders in the labor movement, approved the program as practical, while the delegates voiced approval with applause.

The suggestion of a drive for the amendment came in the midst of a program devoted to condemnation of child labor. The address of Senator LaFollette centered attacks on the Supreme Court, which for a second time recently declared the Federal child labor law unconstitutional. In authorizing appointment of the special committee, the delegates voted to vest in it authority to consider all opinions over the last few years which the federation has branded inimical to organized labor.

MERCHANT MARINE BILL THREATENED

President's Hobby May be Defeated as Result of Development in Liquor Case.

(By International News.) Washington, June 15.—President Harding's long cherished plan of development of the American merchant marine is threatened with defeat unless the government stops the sale of liquor on United States Shipping Board vessels.

Members of the House opposed to the ship subsidy bill are prepared to form a coalition with prohibitionists and pass the amendment barring ships from carrying liquor from benefits of the subsidy legislation.

It was declared that American ships without liquor couldn't compete with British vessels permitted to dispense liquor. The Anti-Saloon League declared this problem solved by prohibiting all ships from carrying intoxicants within the three mile limit.

IRISH PROBLEM SETTLED TODAY

(By International News.)

London, June 15.—The Irish constitutional problem which threatened re-occupation of Ireland by British troops has been satisfactorily settled. It was learned from an authoritative source today. Other difficulties are pending, however.

RUSSIAN TITULAR KING IS MARRIED IN FRANCE

Paris, June 15.—Grand Duke Dimitri, slayer of the monk Rasputin, and looked upon as heir to the Russian throne, has been married quietly here to Miss Chanel, whom he met while he has made his home in Paris.

Chautauqua certainly have a fine plan of collection. They are guaranteed everything and the guarantors get the "caboots," as those who have to make up the shortage of contract funds term it.

Senator Simmons continues to attack the G. O. P. Tariff, hoping eventually to bring about defeat. If he succeeds he will receive the approbation of the public, but will incur the displeasure of the big interests favorably affected.

President Harding has a pet hobby—The ship subsidy measure. This is not the only pet that has met defeat in the senate. In fact, president's pets generally receive less consideration than others.

President Harding doesn't want the tariff bill side tracked by the bonus. He is having his say now, but wait until the several thousand former soldiers go to the ballot boxes again. Mr. Harding won't be president always.

That special session of congress to enact the ship subsidy as threatened by President Harding won't produce any great sensation. Opposition is developing that is likely to delay the measure even though the president desires it to pass. Then, too, congress may not want to do exactly like the president desire.

Secretary Weeks has asked for something over six hundred thousand dollars with which to finish payments on Camp Bragg property. If that much money is paid out in Fayetteville at one time it will take something more than a panic to trouble Fayetteville people, especially the ones receiving the money.

Railroad workmen might as well stop kicking and accept the inevitable. They lose if they accept the reductions, but how much greater the loss if they walk out on a protracted strike. They should learn something from experiences of the coal miners, who will be delighted to return to work at most any old price.

If the government can take dismal swamp and convert it into fertile farm land the investment will meet with public improvement. But if on the other hand the property isn't developed it would be folly to make the purchase. Thousands of acres of land are involved in this great swamp, but unless some plan of reclamation is considered it will prove worthless.

The recent amendment to Greenville's traffic ordinance regarding the parking of automobiles on Evans street seems to be receiving general favor. While drivers have greater trouble backing in and out they do not interfere with traffic as much as formerly. That's what the authorities wanted to accomplish. Now it's up to the officers to see the ordinance is fully enforced.

Greenville's white way system will soon be completed, and main street will present a splendid appearance. The improvement is one in which every one should be more or less interested. It adds greatly to the appearance of the city at night and causes the visitor to have a much better opinion of the town. The investment is the best the town has made in many a day.

Growing children should be given more eggs and milk. The reason we see so many delicate children these days is because they get improper nourishment. There are some children that can eat anything and fatten on it, while there are others requiring strength producing diet. Every farm in the county should have enough cows to afford the family plenty of milk and butter. It's the best investment on earth in the long run.

RAGGED FIELDING AGAIN RESULTS IN BLUE SOX DEFEAT

Tarboro Stages Another Ninth Inning Rally Winning Final Game 2 to 1

Tarboro came back with another ninth inning rally yesterday afternoon and won the final game of the series from Greenville by the score of 2 to 1. The game was one of the prettiest seen here this season, barring Greenville's five errors in the first few innings, and proved a fitting climax to the series.

Tarboro scored their first run in the second inning off a series of errors at short stop and third. The runner circled the bases without his teammates securing even a scratch hit during the inning.

Thompson pitched a wonderfully effective game for Greenville and was really due to win, but inability of his teammates to field the ball cleanly in the first few innings resulted in the disastrous finish. The entire team was credited with a total of five miscues.

Firth also pitched an effective game for Tarboro, but received much better support with men on bases. He allowed four hits against Thompson three, and handled the ball in particularly fine style with men on bases.

While neither side featured with the willow, Smith and Gillette were credited with the only doubles of the game. Smith secured two of the three hits of his club, one of which was for extra bases. Gillette, Shaner, Bradley and Marable secured one hit each, Gillette's coming in the ninth frame, scoring the winning run.

Probably never before have Greenville fans had an opportunity of witnessing two such uncertain exhibitions as featured the two last days. Neither side was able to gain any definite lead, and it was always left to the ninth inning to do what was going to be done.
