LABOR FEDERATION FAVORS STRIKE OF RAILWAY WORKERS

Body Also Endorses the Pres-
ent Nation-Wide Coal Strike
by Heavy Vote

LEADERS DECLARES
UNIONS ARE READY
FOR DECIDING TEST

Officials Will Not Interfere to
Stop Walkout of Million
Employees

Cincinnati, June 15.—The vote of every delegate to the American Federation of Labor convention here today endorsed the nation-wide coal strike that since April 1 has kept a half million miners from work. The Federation also indicated by a demonstration, its approval of the threatened walkout of more than 1,000,000 railroad workers.

The demonstration was loudly cheered from all parts of the big convention hall when E. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees' department of the federation, told the convention that the rail union officials would not interfere to stop a strike.

"It is believed," declared Mr. Jewell, "that the membership is prepared to meet the test, and if they so decide, their decisions will be complied with."

The endorsement of the miners' strike was given by a rising vote, cast by the delegates amid their own cheers, and afterwards William Green, secretary-treasurer of the miners' union, declared that the miners were in the fight to the finish, and he said it might be necessary to ask other unions for financial assistance.

Other developments also marked the convention session, although it was cut short to delegates might attend a barbecue, staged on a river island 20 miles from this city. The "One Big Union" plan, advocated by William L. Foster, was rejected by the convention without debate and later announcement was made that Mr. Foster would hold a mass meeting a week from tonight. Plans for unionizing unorganized workers also were laid before the convention, which in addition adopted a resolution declaring in favor of an "intensive organization to combat the open shop."

RAILROAD STRIKE NOW ENEVITABLE

Labor Accepts Strike of Em-
ployes as Absolutely Un-
avoidable After Vote

(By International News.)

Cincinnati, June 16.—Labor has accepted as inevitable the strike of union railroad employees set for sometime in July, according to information made public this morning.

Early returns of the strike vote throughout the country indicate an overwhelming majority in favor of the strike. J. Jewell, head of the railway department of the American Federation of Labor told the convention today. He asserted that the strike is the only way to combat railroad labor board's hundred million dollar wage cut.

BRYAN OPPOSES LIQUOR ON SHIPS

Commoner Throws His Influence
in Fight Between
Busch and Lasker

(By International News.)

Nashville, June 16.—William Jennings Bryan has thrown his influence into the fight between Adolphus Busch and Chairman Lasker of the Shipping Board, relative to the serving of liquors on American vessels.

In an interview this morning he strongly opposed "breaking of the law" because of financial or other expediency and said it had not been demonstrated that the carrying of liquor was necessary to success of shipping. He said the action was taken on the opinion of a few men without authority in congress.

He said it would be impossible for the public to form and opinion concerning the traffic as it could see only one side. If the ships lose it is better to do this than set an example of violation of the law by the government.

NEGRO ASSAULTS GIRL AT CAMDEN

Bradford Boyd Rushed to
Charlotte From South Caro-
lina to Escape Mob

Charlotte, June 16.—Bradford Boyd, eighteen year old negro, charged with assaulting an eleven year old white girl near Camden, South Carolina, was brought here for safekeeping. He was spirited away following an influx of automobiles into Charlotte from South Carolina. It is believed the automobiles contained parties intent upon lynching the negro.

THROUGH TRAIN RUNS OFF TRACK

Mobile, Ala., June 15.—Train No. 4 of the New Orleans and New York Limited on the Louisville and Nashville Railroad, split a switch three miles north of Canoe, Ala., crashing through a potato parking shed shortly before two o'clock this afternoon.

The engine overturned and the mail, baggage and express cars are across the track, a complete wreck, and the first three coaches were badly smashed. The first Pullman was derailed.

Only one fatality is reported, Willie Blundson, a small boy who was in the packing shed, being killed.

Washington, June 16.—A bitter battle between Republican senators is indicated for Monday when the question of side tracking the tariff for the bonus comes up as result of the refusal of Chairman McCumber, of the senate finance committee, to accede to wishes of President Harding that the tariff not be displaced for the bonus.

It is expected the fight will develop over the President's part leadership and ability and influence of the senate majority to carry out the wishes when out to a severe test. Some administration leaders openly predict that if McCumber persists in this attitude it is likely the president will be strongly inclined to veto whatever bonus legislation is brought up.

MAY ASK RULING FROM DAUGHERTY IN LIQUOR ISSUE

Definite Action by the Govern-
ment is Planned Within Next
Several Hours

BANKHEAD PROPOSAL
WOULD DENY FEDERAL
AID TO WET VESSELS

House Committee Probably to
Take Decided Action in Few
Hours

Washington, June 15.—Matters began shaping themselves today toward definite action by the government with respect to the sale of liquor on ships as set forth in letters and statements made public by Anheuser-Busch, Inc., of St. Louis.

Indications were given at the Treasury that Attorney General Daugherty would be asked in the near future to rule on the question of whether ships under the American flag, but beyond the three-mile territorial limits of the United States, were subject to the prohibition amendment and the Volstead Act. Acting Attorney General Frierson, of the Wilson administration, held that they are, but Chairman Lasker, of the Shipping Board, in justifying the present sale of liquor on American ships said that the board's counsel holds to the opposite of the Frierson ruling.

Another definite move was made through presentation to the House merchant marine committee, considering the pending merchant marine or ship subsidy bill, of an amendment by Representative Bankhead, Democrat, Alabama, under which government aid would be denied any American ship having liquor aboard while in storage, for sale or for any other disposition. The committee did not act on the amendment today and members declined to state how they regarded the amendment.

Soon after Representative Bankhead presented his amendment, Representative Cooper, Ohio, first in a statement and later in a speech in the House, declared he would support such an amendment as continuation of the selling of liquor on American boats "justifies the charge made by the Anheuser Busch Company that Uncle Sam is engaged in bootlegging."

ROCKY MOUNT MAY GET DOKEY TEMPLE

Rocky Mount, June 15.—Definite steps towards the establishment of a Dokey temple for Rocky Mount were taken last night when a special committee from the Rocky Mount Dokey Club, which numbers 147 members in the city, appeared before the divan of Suez temple at Wilmington and asked approval of plans for a temple in this city which would serve Eastern Carolina.

According to members of this committee, the divan immediately agreed that the proposed temple should be established and will submit its findings and subsequent recommendation in its report to the Imperial Prices next fall. This favorable recommendation of the divan sets at naught all barriers, it is thought to a Dokey temple here, and all Local Dokeys are exceedingly enthusiastic over the outlook.

CUT DISCOUNT RATE
OF BANK OF ENGLAND

The American shipping board is charged with selling liquor. Sounds startling, but when remembering that Uncle Sam is getting old and has many business problems to worry him it isn't surprising that he needs something to stimulate him.

Federal investigation of profiteering among American importers may be filled with results. That excessive prices have been charged is not to be doubted in the least but indicting the guilty ones is where the rub comes in. There has been lots of profiteering but placing the responsibility on any particular person or concern is more than an investigating committee will be able to do. Inquiries in the past were futile and if anything should be accomplished in this instance something out of the ordinary will be accomplished.

Canvass of the senate shows it is for the bonus three to one. In this case administration members may have cause for regret, despite opposition of the most determined kind. Just why the president and some of his followers should oppose compensating the former soldiers is very difficult to understand. It cannot be that they do so from a standpoint of economy. Too much money is being spent in other ways for this. But there is something at the bottom of the fight and it may come out before the fight is over. If the bonus is not passed, then somebody will have cause for regret next election.

Insurance rates of the city have experienced a substantial decrease as result of the purchase of the new fire engine, and in the course of a few years the machine will have paid for itself in this way alone. It is comforting to know we have such an efficient fire fighting equipment in readiness in case of an emergency. In fact, no one can tell when the city will be visited by a disastrous conflagration, but how much greater are our chances of combatting the flames with this splendid new equipment. A great sum of money is involved in the purchase but it will be repaid many times by splendid service rendered.

Members of the Greenville police department are to be congratulated in their effective work against loafers. As result of their untiring vigilance the city probably has the lowest crime record of any other of its size in the state. Vagrants invariably get in trouble and the city does the right thing in taking them up and giving them work. Road sentences are not considered favorably by that class of people and as a result the majority have gone to work or "cleaned up" and left town.

The Hague conference, which was called for the purpose of determining upon some plan of reconstructing Russia, is now in session and promises to be successful despite America's failure to attend. Russia is in deplorable condition and unless other nations do what they can to help her, recovery is clean out of the question. Factionalism has been fatal to this great country, and if the Hague fails to accomplish anything definite then the future isn't the brightest in the world.

The Greenville Merchants association is looking out after best interests of the public and means to serve when ever the opportunity is presented. The fact was very evident this week when the manager of the local telephone exchange was called before the body and asked why the service of his company had not been measuring up to expectation. He promised to investigate the matter, and to report improvements in service within the next two weeks. The telephone plays a big part in American business today and when service is poor business must necessarily be likewise. Every company must serve the public as faithful and intelligently as possible and when it does so this is all anyone asks.

Members of the shipping board declare they are going to sell whiskey on board shipping board vessels until the courts rule otherwise. This is exactly what the public expected when charges were brought against the board, and if they had yielded without contending for their rights it would have been the most surprising thing in the world. Prohibition laws affect American land and do not pertain to the high seas. Whiskey may be sold beyond the three mile limit regardless of court rulings, and the shipping board seems perfectly safe in pursuing the course adopted. While considerable whiskey is smuggled into this country the traffic can be greatly decreased by keeping tabs on vessels entering the various harbors, and the shipping board's decision to continue the sale of whiskey won't interfere to any great extent with legislation in America. The wrangle seems to be entirely unnecessary.

BLUE SOX DROP 12 INNING GAME TO WASHINGTON

Each team battled from inning to inning without gaining the slightest advantage. In the eleventh frame, however, Greenville sent runners to second and third and seriously threatened the home plate, but inability to secure an opportune hit proved their downfall.

Powell started out on the mound for Greenville, but lasted only two and a third innings. During this short time Washington succeeded in securing a total of six hits and four runs. He was relieved by Hathway who batted along fairly well for three innings, but the Pamlico's found his delivery for three hits and one run. Beale assumed the responsibility of the firing line in this sixth and had Washington at his mercy until the last half of the twelfth when a base on balls and a double decided the game in Washington's favor.

Washington secured a total of 14 hits during the entire twelve innings, and Greenville twelve. Two base hits featured largely during the game. Beale, Carson, Smith, Hogg, Mariette and Morefield being credited with one each. Jim White and Clark were credited with triples each, White coming in the second inning, sending over the first run for the Blue Sox.

The game continued two hours and twenty minutes, and would have been called on account of darkness before another inning could be played. It was the hurry and scurry of the last minutes probably that featured so prominently in Washington's scoring. The players were worked down from the strenuous game and couldn't have gone much longer.

Graham hurled a splendid brand of ball for Washington, and while hit freely in the first frames, he succeeded in keeping the bingles well scattered. Greenville several times threatened scoring in the last few innings, but Graham always settled down positively declined to yield anything in the shape of timely hits.

While my former place of business is still run under the name of Thompson's Loose Floor, I sold my entire interest, together with the privilege of using the name 5 years ago, and since that time have had no interest in the Loose Floor business and all advertisements, stationery, etc. of Thompson's Loose Floor show J. E. Cooper and W. H. Hammond as proprietors. Hence I think it would have been wise for McPherson to have known the facts before making his statements and had Rogers written any of the other three banks in Hopkinsville viz: City Bank & Trust Co., Planters Bank & Trust Co., or First National Bank, I feel sure he would not have gotten the facts in the beginning; but the truth of the matter is, that Mr. McPherson is the man that has an axe to grind instead of myself, as his is the only bank in Hopkinsville that has endorsed the Sapiro Association. Two of his Directors are on the Organization committee, one of them is county chairman for Christian county and the said bank of

Hopkinsville is expecting to be the depository for the Association.

Mr. McPherson further states, "This was published in our papers to obstruct the formation of the association here, but will not succeed." DOWN FALL OF JUDAH

(Continued from page 3)

the terror and intensity of the prophetic nature, Jerusalem refused to repent and recognize its dependence upon God; refused to entrust themselves and their destinies to His guidance and blindly rushed forward on their perilous path to destruction.

The sad ending of Judah as a Nation is graphically depicted in today's lesson. The horrible conditions which existed in the Holy City, immediately before and after its capture, is such as even now at this late day to cause a shudder of horror to pass through us as we read the account. Yet, Judah and Jerusalem but paid the penalty which they had been warned was to be exacted. That God had great compassion, and a burning desire to save Jerusalem from the result of its sins, is manifested; yet, He could not in the nature of things, withhold the judgment which had been promised and foretold through the prophets. The intense pity felt by God for the people of Jerusalem is expressed in these words: "Jerusalem, thou which killest the prophets and stonest them to death, how oft would I have gathered thee together as a hen gathereth her brood under her wings, but they would not."

There are a number of great truths apparent to the reader of today's lesson, chief among which, to my mind are:

1. God never destroys without first warning; not one time only but as often as there is the slightest hope of his warning being heeded. Just as Judah and Jerusalem were warned time and time again in olden days, just so are the warnings of God ever heard in national and individual life. The word of God is full of warnings and directions; full of hope to those who are faithful to His commands and clear and simple in its expressions of condemnation for those who refuse Him.

2. God is ever ready and anxious to forgive all manner of sin if repentance is made. Judah and Jerusalem were called upon to repent and given opportunity after opportunity to turn back to the worship of God. God, through the prophets had promised them forgiveness from their sins if they would only repent. Just as now does God ever stand able and anxious to forgive sin in the individual and in the nation if true repentance is made and an honest, bona fide effort made to obey His commands.

3. Just as Judah and Jerusalem were destroyed because of the sins

of the people, just so does ultimate, inevitable destruction await every individual who refuses to heed the commands of God. There can be no twilight zone between disobedience and obedience; we either obey God, or we disobey Him. That every sin we commit is known to God and that we, in some manner, pay for that sin, cannot be questioned. Man is im-

ent to hide his sins from the eye of God, no matter how great or small the sin may be. It is so stated in the words of the Apostle Paul in his letter to the Galatians; and the consequence of sin clearly stated: "Be not deceived, God is not mocked, for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."
