ANOTHER CUT IN RAILROAD WAGES ORDERED TODAY

Board Orders Nearly \$27,000,
000 Cut From Annual Pay-
roll of Workmen

NEARLY MILLION AND HALF WORKERS SHARE REDUCTION

Definite Recognition of Living
Wage Scale Was Made by
the Board

Chicago, June 16.—Pruning nearly \$27,000,000 from the annual payroll of 325,000 railway employees by cutting clerks, signalmen and stationery firemen from two to six cents an hour, the United States Railroad Labor Board today announced another wage slash, bringing total reductions under the board's order up to \$135,000,000 beginning July 1.

Clerks were cut 3 and 4 cents an hour, according to classification, signal men five cents and firemen two cents. Approximately 1,200,000 railway employees will share the total reduction which has brought vigorous protest from every union organization involved and is expected to result in a strike in ten railway labor bodies. The vote is already under way in seven unions.

A dissenting vote protesting against any reduction was included in the order. It was signed by Arthur O. Wharton and Albert Phillips, both labor members.

Definite recognition of a "living wage" and "saving wage" was made for the first time by the board in today's decision. Although abnormal post-war conditions were pointed out as obstructions to fixing any scientific living or saving wage at present, the board declared that as soon as this condition cleared away it would give increased consideration to all the intricate details incident to the "scientific adjustment" of such a wage.

The bulk of those hit by the new cut will be 200,000 clerks and 100,000 station employees. Telephone girls who the board declared have suffered from increases and decreases, are given in minimum wage of \$85 a month.

ASKS DEPARTMENT FOR LATE DECISION

Department of Justice Re-
quests for Ruling in Liquor
Case Immediately

(By International News.)

Washington, June 17.—Forman demand that the department of justice rule on the status of government vessels as carriers of liquor so that the issue will be clarified under latest decision of the United States supreme court made by Attorney General Daugherty and by Prohibition commission Menes.

The attorney general has been asked to settle the dispute between the treasury department and the shipping board, arising out of Chairman Lasker's opinion that the sale of liquor on American ships was legal if the state department of justice ruled that way.

KIWANIS CLUB IN SPLENDID SESSION HERE LAST NIGHT

State Forest Warden Tells of
Great Loss Sustained From
Forest Fires

A brief session of the Kiwanis club was held last night, in which many matters vitally affecting the club and community were discussed. The session was cut short because of the Chautauqua, but the program was interesting in every sense of the word. President James presided, and caused the evening to pass away pleasantly.

After blessing by R. G. Fitzgerald, J. L. Starkey was appointed sheriff for the evening. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, after which introduction of visitors took place. Several out of town guests were present and entered into activities in an interesting way.

The silent boost was given by R. G. Fitzgerald. Recognition was made from the Goldsboro Kiwanis club of an inter-city club meeting to be held in that city June 29th, at which time clubs from all over the Eastern part of the state will be represented, and Greenville is expected to have a large representation there.

The regular program which was to have been in charge of Charlie White was eliminated. A tenor solo by Dr. Laughinghouse and bass solo by E. G. Flanagan were outstanding features.

The feature of the evening was the presence of W. Darrow Clark, of the Forestry division of North Carolina Economic survey of Chapel Hill, who spoke on the protection of our forest from fires, bringing out many points of interest.

Mr. Darrow stated that here in Pitt county twenty thousand acres of timber had been demolished by fires, this spring, which means a loss of practically a half million dollars. He spoke of the co-operation offered by the federal government to the state and by the state to the counties in employment of forest wardens.

He said timber lands were one of our greatest resources and that if something isn't done to stop these forest fires Eastern Carolina in a short while would be practically without wood for general use. He further stated that in the western part of the state the clubs and societies of practically every county west of Raleigh are co-operating in an effort to reduce forest fires. He said they are doing everything to get their county commissioners to take steps for the employment of wardens.

He said it required from 40 to 60 years for timber to become of merchantable size and unless something is done to stop the fires it would only be a matter of a few years before we would be out of timber for any purpose.

Mr. Darrow is making a survey of the Eastern part of the state in an effort to get the various counties interested in checking the loss by forest fires.

APOLOGY SAVES HOOKER FROM JAIL

Man Who Cursed Justice
Clark's Mayor-Nephew Ob-
tains Clemency

Raleigh, June 17.—Executive cognizance of repentance and reparational apology on the part of S. T. Hooker toward Mayor D. M. Clark, of Greenville, and the payment of a \$250 fine instead of the \$200 imposed, brought Mr. Hooker a commutation of his 30 days in jail from Governor Morrison and wrote the end of a bitter chapter in the annals of the Pitt county capital.

Bitter denunciation of Mayor Clark's administration of justice in Greenville on the part of Mr. Hooker, when the latter's son was arrested for exceeding the statutory speed limits in the town brought down on the head of the irate father a fine of \$200 and a sentence of 30 days in the county jail. This happened upwards of a year ago.

To the Supreme Court Mr. Hooker brought his appeal and argued it before Chief Justice Walter Clark, who is an uncle of the Greenville mayor. The court sustained the judgment of the lower court as to the jail sentence, but remitted the fine of \$200 imposed below. Stay of sentence was secured until Mr. Hooker had time to present his case to the Governor.

"This defendant acted very reprehensibly under an erroneous impression that his son had been badly treated when the alleged offense occurred. He has since made proper and due apology and I therefore commute the sentence to a fine of \$250," says the Governor in saving Mr. Hooker from the Pitt county jail.

Monohan was later released under bond of \$100 and will appear before Recorder's Court tomorrow morning to answer charges of disorderly conduct.

SMALL NATIONS BRING PRESSURE ON CONFERENCE

Force Creation of Three Extra
Sub-Commission at the
Hague Confab

DETERMINED NOT TO BE SHIFTED DURING SESSION

All Countries Are Determined
to Join the Main Russian
Commission

The Hague, June 16.—The pressure of the smaller European countries, especially those adjacent to and having vital political and commercial interest in Russia, today forced The Hague conference to form sub-commissions of thirteen instead of eleven members, as had been planned by the allied leaders.

This is interpreted by all the delegates as indicating not only a determination not to be shut out of the important discussions by the greater powers, but as manifesting eagerness about the future of the disorganized Russian state. The pressure surprised everybody by its force.

Foreign Minister Van Karnebeek, of Holland, was entrusted by the conference with the task of naming the members of the three sub-commissions and the personnel will be announced Monday afternoon, to which time this afternoon's session was adjourned. Van Karnebeek already has begun negotiations with the smaller powers especially the Baltic states, in an effort to satisfy all nations in the formation of the committees of the conference.

Virtually all the twenty-nine countries now represented at The Hague have signified their intention to join the main Russian commission. France has reserved her decision regarding participation until after the meeting in London between M. Poincare, the French Premier, and David Lloyd George, the British Prime Minister.

When arrested McQueen had been indicted on a charge of embezzling \$25.00 dollars from the First National Bank where he was employed for a number of years. Miss Warren was employed here as a manicurist.

Cuba has begun house cleaning in political circles. They can never accomplish much until the women are given greater freedom.

Prohibition followers are planning to ask Attorney General Daugherty for a ruling on the sale of whiskey by American ships. Suppose he happens to be strong for intoxicants—the ruling may not appeal to everyone.

Labor has accepted the strike as something over which they have no control. This is a mistake, however, as they do have something to say in the issue if they would only brace up and say it. They should consider the plight of coal miners and let the lesson guide them to a better end.

A battle royal over the bonus bill is pending in the senate. The public will watch the fight with interest as the majority believe the boys should be adequately compensated for services in the world war. Practically every other country has passed the bonus and it would be a pity for such a thriving and prosperous nation not pay its debt.

Greenville's white way system has been completed, and last night the public had an opportunity of seeing how the lights showed up. The improvement is one in which everybody should be more or less interested and the city is to be congratulated in providing the system. Other towns have fallen in line and it looks like now that all Eastern Carolina towns of any importance will be pretty well fixed up in the way of illumination.

After conferring with coal men Secretary Hoover announces that prices will not be advanced. This information will be received with interest everywhere as it was feared the strike would have a tendency of sending prices skyrocketing. If Mr. Hoover can make the mine owners live up to their agreement, then every thing will be all right. Otherwise, it will be all wrong.

Admiral Kato of the Japanese government favors further reduction of armaments, according to latest advices. Such attitude is certainly commendable on part of a nation that has taken such a prominent part in preparing for warfare, and others might well to co-operate in every way possible. Kato is one of the world's greatest advocates of peace, and will go down in Japanese history as one of the greatest men of the present age.

Republicans are after President Harding to remove Democrats in the treasury department, as if they expect to succeed. While the president has been very active in finding jobs for party members he has found it advisable to slow up at the present because of Democratic activity. In fact Democrats realize what are threatened by and have gone to work to make the president slow up somewhat. If the employees have not given satisfactory services, then it is perfectly natural for them to be fired, but if they are giving service the president will find it advisable not to interfere.

The public will be gratified in learning that Edward Dill, Belhaven negro, has been sentenced to the electric chair for criminally assaulting a white woman several weeks ago. Justice came quickly in this instance because of the threatening attitude of the public, and it is probably well it did so another crime could not be committed. Sentence to the electric chair is a penalty which every person guilty of criminal assault should pay, and the law should be completely enforced regardless of conditions involved. This is the only way increased criminality can be curbed, and it is up to the courts to take immediate action before the mob law is given a chance to increase crime to greater proportions. The race line must be observed and when a white woman is assaulted by some brute the crime must be paid for in life blood.
