RAILWAY WORKERS SEEM DETERMINED TO STRIKE AGAIN

Serve Notice on Board That Men Will Strike as Provided by Recent Vote

LEWIS DECLARES MINERS WILL DO WHAT THEY CAN

Intend to Stick to Protest Against Proposed Reduction of Wages

Cincinnati, Ohio, June 18.—Formal notice was served tonight on the Railroad Labor Board by the chiefs of ten railroad unions of their intention to go through with a strike in event one is authorized by the 1,225,000 workers whose wages are to be reduced on July 1 on orders from the board.

Coupled apparently with the action of the rail union leaders was a statement that the "railroad workers have no alternative except to fight," made by John L. Lewis, leader of the striking coal miners, who will meet with the rail union leaders Tuesday to consider joint strike action. He also pledged the miners' aid to the railmen, but declined to state definitely what aid might result from joint action.

The notice sent to the Railroad Labor Board, in the form of a letter, reiterated the rail union leaders' attitude on the threatened walkout, which was first definitely asserted in their statement issued here Thursday night. The previous statement also included the declaration that an overwhelming vote was being cast for the walkout. In their letter to the board, the rail men said:

"When there occurs a miscarriage of justice of such colossal and permanent injury to railway labor as your decisions will bring about, the only means of remedy which the injured parties have is to refuse to accept your decisions. This procedure is perfectly legal. While it should only be used as a last resort, our membership may decide it to be fully justified by your denial of elementary and long established rights and by the seriousness of the situation which you have created. Our decisions have been submitted to a strike vote of our membership and we are awaiting the results of their action. Should our members decide not to accept your decision, or in other words to strike, we shall sanction their action and advise you accordingly."

COMMUNITY SING WELL ATTENDED HERE LAST NIGHT

City Churches and College Join in Making the Greatest in Many Months

The community sing given under the Chautauqua tent at the corner of Third and Colanch street last night, was largely attended despite threatening clouds and the large crowd enjoyed one of the best programs in months. The sing was given under auspices of the Womans club who succeeded in selecting the kind of songs everybody likes to sing. After the singing was over Fred A. Boardman, Chautauqua superintendent, delivered a masterful address on the subject of "Religion of the Orient."

Mr. Boardman brought out many facts in connection with the various forms of worship of the orient, and showed to what extent this had developed within the last few years. He amazed his hearers with the accuracy of his description of conditions prevailing in the foreign lands, and produced many informative points in connection with affairs of the civilized world in christianizing the orient.

The singing of the evening was led by J. H. Rose, superintendent of city schools. After the singing of several familiar numbers a quartette composed of Mrs. Knott Proctor, Mrs. H. H. Settle and Messrs. D. S. Spain, Jr., and C. B. Rowlett rendered the only special numbers of the program.

SEVERAL GALLONS OF LIQUOR TAKEN BY CITY OFFICERS

Still Also Captured in Raid Made in the Pactolus Community Saturday

The illicit whiskey traffic of this section again suffered a stinging blow from the law when Chief Jones and Deputy T. D. Williams succeeded in capturing twenty-five gallons of whiskey about three miles below Cox's Mill. While no still was captured the officers succeeded in pouring out eight barrels of beer.

Deputy Williams landed another blow against the traffic Saturday afternoon in a capture of a sixty gallon still in the Pactolus community. The still was of the usual type used in the manufacture of illicit whiskey in this section. It was not in operation when the officers arrived and consequently no arrests will take place.

The operators had moved the still from its original site and left the whiskey and beer behind in their rush to get the manufacturing plant under safe cover. This is the first capture made by officers in a week or two, although they have been alert, ready to nab anything falling in their way.

SCOUTS LEAVE ON ANNUAL OUTING TO CAMP LEACH, N. C.

Eighty Boy and Girl Scouts Spend Ten Days in Annual Outing

Some 80 boy and girl scouts left this morning by boat for Camp Leach where they will enjoy their annual outing. The party was accompanied by Scoutmaster J. H. Rose, T. J. Satchee, Miss Ernestine Forster, Miss Mial and Mrs. R. Williams who will act as chaperones.

The large boat pulled away from Tar river landing this morning shortly after nine o'clock, and it was a happy party of youngsters that packed their kitbags away and prepared for the trip down the river to Washington where they will begin the last lap of the journey. Camp Leach is located about twenty miles from Washington, and is one of the most ideal locations in the state for such encampments.

The camp has been provided with comfortable buildings through funds left for this purpose by the late Captain Leach of Washington. The scouts intended making the trip earlier, but delayed until today so that all buildings could be completed and equipped for their coming.

The boat which the scouts used was provided by the Virginia Carolina Chemical company. The craft docked at Tar river here over a week ago but could not be used until today. The company has provided them one of the best in their service. A captain and sufficient seamen to command the craft were also provided for the occasion by the company which made a special effort to make the trip a pleasant one for the Pitt Countians.

Scoutmaster Rose has been making preparations for the trip several days, and when the boat pulled away from the dock this morning every detail of the journey had been completed. Every scout and camp fire girl knew what they were expected to do and they did it in a way that showed they were enthused to overflowing by the prospect of the good times before them.

TWO DEFENDANTS GIVEN TERMS ON COUNTY HIGHWAY

Several Other Cases Disposed of By Judge Cooper in County Court Today

Ed Latham, colored man of this city charged with receiving one of the electric fans stolen from the Christian church several weeks ago, was this morning sentenced to six months on the county roads by Judge Louis G. Cooper in the regular Monday morning session of county court. The defendant, entered notice of an appeal to superior court, bond being fixed at \$500.

While there were only a small number of cases receiving consideration this morning, the majority required more than ordinary time in completing and recess was not possible before the noon hour.

Collin Dixon and Ed Bright, charged with assault with a deadly weapon and carrying a concealed weapon, were fined \$50 and one half cost. They filed notice of appeal to superior court, bond being fixed at \$200.

Aroy Brown, charged with larceny, was sentenced to six months on the county roads.

Mamie Whitfield, charged with selling whiskey, was released upon payment of \$25 and cost.

Frank Kutz, charged with assault, was released upon payment of one half cost, but entered notice of appeal to superior court. John Turnage was fined \$10 and cost on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

Will Green and Jim Castle, charged with selling cocaine, were found not guilty.

GENERAL BUSINESS OUTLOOK BRIGHTER THAN IN SOMETIME

Financial Condition of the Country Also Much More Hopeful Than in Past

STEEL PRODUCTION OF NATION IS MUCH GREATER THAN EVER

Automobile Centers Report General Increase in Business for the Past Month

New York, June 18.—Industrial and financial conditions in the last week presented a general favorable aspect, notwithstanding the reactionary tendency in the securities market, which apparently was connected with the technical speculative position.

Steel production exceeded the best rate previously attained this year. More coke plants were started and more blast furnaces blown in. Coal production was greater and some observers believe that plans were in preparation for re-opening union mines in the Pittsburgh district.

Detroit employment figures showed another increase, thus confirming statements of automobile manufacturers as to the continuance of satisfactory business.

Railroad car loading figures continue good. Although the absolute number reported during the week ended June 30 was smaller than in the previous week, the rate was higher, if allowance be made for the Memorial Day holiday.

A similar calculation showed that the gains in the absolute amount of cotton consumed by mills during May as compared with April was not accounted for merely by the greater number of working days in the latter month. May's takings corresponded almost exactly to the average for the last ten months, for which in turn were 23 per cent greater than those in the corresponding period a year ago.

TWO STEAMSHIPS REPORTED SINKING

Key West, June 19.—According to a wireless received here today a coast guard cutter has picked up the survivors of the steamship Bella which was abandoned in sinking condition. Survivors of the DeSoto also abandoned in condition. They were rescued by their boat which is reported in a similar Norwegian steamer. Reports gave no indication as to what caused the plight of the vessels.

SAYS NEGOTIATIONS ARE BOUND TO FAIL

(By International News.)

Ann Arbor, Mich., June 19.—International negotiations cannot be conducted successfully in face of the fire of criticism from the clamorous public, Secretary of State Hughes declared in an address at the commencement of the University of Michigan.

He declared a certain amount of secrecy and reserve were necessary even in open diplomacy and that the United States premature discussions may prevent the accomplishment of the most enlightened aims, he declared.

The secretary of state said members of his department should be free to appear before the senate and explain and defend the foreign policy.

REVOLT BEGINS AMONG SOVIETS

London, June 19.—Revolution against the Soviet government has broken out, according to reports received here today. Two thousand counter revolutionists have been captured, the report also stated.

The United States has been asked to send an imposing fleet to the Brazilian exposition. That the request will be granted is not to be doubted in the least. Brazil people very naturally are interested in what America is doing in naval construction and the fleet will give them a pretty good idea of what is being accomplished.

Farmville Rotarians are to be congratulated on winning the loving cup at the inter-city convention at Wilson last week. This is the smallest town in the world with a Rotary club and the fact that it is a progressive one adds much to the remarkable fact. Farmville business men are wide awake in every respect and that they will make a greater success of their club an assured fact.

The Chautauqua which was brought to a close in Greenville yesterday proved a great success, although attendance was much smaller than in recent years. Chautauqua numbers this season were high class in every respect and commanded the admiration of that class of people appreciating such attractions. Chautauqua time is always looked forward to with interest, and it is probable this will increase with each succeeding year.

The announcement of another wage cut affecting over a million railroad workmen in this country will be received with interest throughout the nation, as the fight this class of labor is making to prevent reductions has attracted great attention. That the railroads are forced to cut expenses to meet reductions of rates is not to be doubted, and the workmen should accept the change without resorting to strikes. Nothing disrupts industry more than walkouts, and the longer this can be avoided the better off the industry will be.

Newspapermen went to The Hague conference determined to gain admission, and when refused, began a fight which even high officials of the meeting could not withstand. As a result they were admitted and the world hereafter will be fully informed regarding things transpiring at this important conference. Several nations were represented by the newspapermen and if they had been denied the privilege of "listening in" things might not have been so pleasant for the delegates instrumental in barring them.

It begins to look like Henry Ford will get control of Muscle Shoals despite opposition which at first threatened to bring about defeat. This intelligence will be received with considerable interest everywhere, as it is believed Ford will come nearer making Muscle Shoals a paying proposition than all others combined. What he has done for other organizations can be done in this instance, and that he will succeed is not to be doubted. Members of the House Military affairs committee who had the matter under consideration are to be congratulated if they should decide in Ford's favor. That they have the best interests of the country at heart cannot be doubted. The public favors Ford because he said he would employ a million men. This fact alone means much to American industry and will be one of the greatest issues yet for permanent recovery. Ford supporters have certainly done good work and deserve to succeed.

Lie Detector Clears Murder Suspect



Photograph shows Henry Wilkins submitting himself to the "sphygmomanometer," or, in plain language, the "lie detector," invented by Dr. John A. Larson, professor-police man of the Berkeley (Cal.) Police Department. The lie detector records the pulse vibrations of suspects under police examination, and it informed the police that Wilkins was telling the truth about the murder of his wife by two auto bandits. The police suspected Wilkins, because he told them he had never seen the bandits before, when he had actually been a foreman over one of them for months, and a nation-wide search was instituted for Walter and Arthur Castor. They further suspected him because his wife had filed a separate maintenance suit and because he had often threatened suicide because of his grief. But the lie detector freed him.

Stenciled diving Venuses and sportive fish are among the border decorations the summer girl may add to her Terry cloth cape, and if she wishes, these may be emphasized by an outline stitch in bright silk or wool. It depends largely on where you spend your summer, whether or not your bathing suit costume needs to be supplemented by a cape but depends upon it, if the watering place is a conservative one, add a cape—besides which, it is useful to protect your shoulders from both chill and sunburn.

Plaids, and above all Roman stripes, are very gay and very pleasing on the beach, so are suits gay just now, and colors which are a bit out of the running for water wear have the call. Many women are matching the sands for their beach costumes, while others like henna and jade and reseda green, and still others have a marked preference for figured silks, foulards having a strong appeal.

Rubberized silks are rather better for the composite suit or for accessories than for the entire suit, sashes, capes, head-dresses and parasols of gaily rubber treated materials add to the choice of a plain suit. The summer girl has no objections to being conspicuous and selects crotches with a reckless disregard for color or design. The gingham bathing suit has a formidable rival in the suit made of checked crotone which has a set flower as well. There are many gingham printed silks too, selling among the younger element who appear to be the ones in favor of gingham or something resembling it for deep sea water.

PAMLICO OUTFIT SNOWED UNDER BY LOCAL BLUE SOX

Washington Overwhelmed in Hit and Run Game Saturday by Score of 17 to 0

In decidedly one of the most one-sided games of the season Greenville Saturday afternoon completely snowed under the league leading Washington outfit at Washington by the score of 17 to 0. The game proved to be the most disastrous the Pamlicos have participated in this season and was a distinct surprise to the several hundred fans who went out expecting to see their idols make it three out of four over the cellarites.

Thompson went the entire nine innings for Greenville, and only in a few instances was in danger of being scored upon. Washington in early stages sent runners as far as second and third, but inability to hit opportunely resulted in their not being able to cross the home plate. Thompson pitched effectively every inning and absolutely declined to yield up anything in the way of safeties with men on bases.

Washington used Thomas and Harrison in an effort to stem the tide of victory, but to no avail. Greenville just wouldn't be refused timely hits and secured a total of twenty-one the entire game. Thomas breezed along like a house afire until the third frame when the visitors began a murderous attack that netted them four runs. This continued in the fourth and the lead was increased to six. Harrison assumed mound duties at this juncture and succeeded in having things his way until the seventh when the Blue Sox sent a lone tally across the rubber. In the eighth and ninth, however, Harrison went up like a balloon, and when he came to earth a total of ten runners had been sent to the checking station, making the score 17 to 0.

Washington staged stubborn rallies in the seventh and eighth, but Thompson settled down and hitting opportunely proved impossible. The clubs fielded cleanly behind him with exception of two errors that failed to give the Pamlicos any decided advantage. Of the seven safe bingles secured by Washington, Kotch and Moorefield were responsible for two each and Lennox and Marlette one.

Stringfield, Leftwich, Massey, Carson, Smith, Doran, White and Thompson did the heavy stick work for the visitors, Stringfield being credited five, Leftwich, four, Massey and Carson three each, Smith and Doran two each and Thompson and White one. Leftwich pounded out the only triple of the game. Doran, White, Carson, Thompson Honig and W. Marlette were credited with doubles each.
