RAILWAY LABOR ASKS SANCTION ON STRIKE VOTE

Now Up to Committees to Take
Definite Action in Line With
Workmen's Policy

FINAL CONFERENCE TO BE HELD TONIGHT WITH MINERS' HEADS

Strike Vote of Clerks of New
York Central Has Been Late-
ly Authorized

Cincinnati, Ohio, June 19. — Rail-
way clerks in various parts of the
country today were seeking official
sanction to take a strike ballot against
recent wage reductions of the Rail-
road Labor Board, according to the
statement tonight of E. H. Fitzgerald,
president of the brotherhood of rail-
way and steamship clerks, freight
handlers, express and station em-
ployes.

Mr. Fitzgerald stated the matter
of taking a general strike vote is up
to the committees of the roads and
that officials of the union can sanc-
tion no strike until the men by bal-
lot have asked for such action. He
said that general committees on four
large roads today asked the brother-
hood officials for sanction to send
out a strike ballot. He declined to
give the names of the roads.

On a number of roads where the
union has contracts agreeing to abide
by the decisions of the labor board
in the matter of wages, Mr. Fitz-
gerald explained that these contracts
have a clause providing that if 30
days notice is given at the end of
that time the general committee may
take a strike vote. He asserted that
on many of these roads such notice
had been given their railroad execu-
tives.

In his statement, Mr. Fitzgerald
said that the clerks will be called on
strike if they vote to give their offi-
cials authority for such action. He
said it was impossible to say when
a decision on a strike will be re-
ported by members of his organization
but added that "it can be definitely
announced that the officials are pre-
pared to issue a strike call, if the
membership vote for such action."

Charlotte, June 20. — Charges of
assault on a former policeman and
abusive language against Walter Orr,
chief of police was dismissed. Orr
claimed that charges were initiated
by revenge and denunciation from his
clan.

MINORITY REPORT CONDEMNS FORD

Declares Offer for Muscle
Shoals is Effort to Defraud
the Government

Washington, June 20. — Condemn-
ing the offer of Henry Ford for
Muscle Shoals as a scheme of frenzied
finance tending to defraud the
government, the new minority report
was submitted to congress by five
members of the House military af-
fairs committee today.

The report was one of the most
scathing denunciations of a national
project ever before submitted to con-
gress. It branded Ford's offer as a
subsidy to defraud and a hollow
promise and bribe of sympathy for
the farmers. Congress was urged to re-
ject the proposal in the name of fu-
ture generations.

The majority report previously
urged acceptance of the Ford offer
with the Gorgas steam plant being
eliminated, while another minority re-
port urged its acceptance in full.

CHAMBER PLANS FOR INSPECTION TRIP OF SOUTH

To Arrange Trip to Georgia
and Alabama for Inspection
of Farming in the Districts

The announcement by the manage-
ment of the Eastern Carolina Cham-
ber of Commerce this morning that
an effort is going to be made to get
at least one Pullman car full of Bank-
ers, merchants and farmers to make
a trip to Georgia and Alabama some-
time in September with a view of
getting first hand information as to
how the boll weevil has been handled
will meet with a great deal of inter-
est in every section of this district,
due to the fact that "seeing" is be-
lieving.

A schedule has been worked out,
that will take in at least a dozen
towns in Georgia and Alabama where
the program of diversified farming
has been put on, and where markets
have been secured for these crops.
Also on this trip will be found places
that will show the weevil "in action,"
as many want to see him. The time
to make the trip will be about ten
days from time of leaving to the date
of arrival back home, and the total
cost, such as rail road fare, hotel
bills, pullman expenses, etc., will be
about \$125.00.

"There are already several who
have signed up to go" Mr. Bartlett
said this morning, when questioned
as to whether he thought the required
number could be secured. It will be
the best investment any banker, farm-
er or merchant could make to spend
this money making this trip," con-
tinued Mr. Bartlett. The advantage

YATES TO FIGURE IN WATER CARNIVAL IN CITY THURSDAY

Red Cross Worker to be Here
With Life Saving Corps the
Next Three Days

Mr. D. J. Yates, of Atlanta, Ga.,
manager of life saving first aid of
the southern division of the American
Red Cross, arrived in Greenville this
morning to give three days to the Pitt
county chapter Red Cross life saving
corps.

Mr. Yates comes to Greenville
from Wrightsville Beach, Wilmington
and leaves Thursday evening to be
the central figure at the big water
carnival being staged in Richmond,
Va. While here he will give special
instruction to all members of the
Red Cross life saving corps at Amuzu
Park this afternoon, giving special
instruction to the Junior Red Cross
children from Ayden and Farmville.

Tomorrow morning Mr. Yates
leaves for Camp Leach with several
of his life saving corps and Chair-
man A. B. Corey to give instruction
in the Junior Red Cross life saving
work of the boy and girl scouts.

Thursday morning Mr. Meadows
has asked Mr. Yates to address the
students of the Teachers College one
life saving and first aid work.

Grifton Red Cross branch has
asked the life saving corps to have Mr.
Yates to bring several representa-
tives from the corps here and demon-
strate the life saving work at the
big community picnic which is to be
held at Hillcrest lake, Kinston, Thurs-
day morning.

Thursday afternoon at two-thirty
the water carnival will be staged and
Mr. Yates will be the central figure,
having different members of the corps
show off the work in which he is now
engaged. A special lecture will be
given for first aid work and resusci-
tation to the firemen and police
forces of Greenville, Ayden and
Bethel. There will be a number of
canopy barges with the Junior Red
Cross officers from Ayden, Bethel,
Farmville, Grifton and Greenville,
acting as sponsors to the carnival.

Everyone is urged to be present
because the Pitt county chapter feels
very fortunate in having Mr. Yates
come to the city and it is through the
interest of the work done by the life
saving corps that the chapter was
able to get him to come at this time.

FARMERS CLASH WITH BLUE SOX THIS AFTERNOON

While Rained Out Yesterday,
Two Clubs Will Try Their
Luck This Afternoon

While Greenville and Farmville
were rained out yesterday, it is expected
they will be able to play this after-
noon, unless further rainfall occurs
during the afternoon. The diamond
was in bad condition this morning
because of the excessive rainfall last
night, but both fields should be in
fine shape by four o'clock if properly
worked over.

That the rain proved favorable to
the "Farmers" is not to be doubted
in the least. It is said they have
a number of players on the bench who
are not eligible until this afternoon,
and if the game had been played yes-
terday it would have been with the
same old club. The new men, it is
said, are considerably faster than
those given their release recently, and
the Farmers expect to make a de-
cidedly better showing in the second
clash of the season with the Blue
Sox.

Manager Holden did everything
possible to put out a winning team
the first part of the season, but hard
luck trailed him just as it did Green-
ville. He doesn't mean to bow to
the jinx, however, and the hiring of
the new players is expected to see
Farmville move off on a steady climb
towards the top.

Greenville has made very few
changes since the season opened. In
fact, about the only thing happen-
ing in camp was the release of the
men who failed to make good. The
club has made no acquisitions ex-
cept Johnnie Johnston, formerly with
Farmville. This player is said to be
a good one, but his showing with
Farmville wasn't what expected and
he was given the pink slip. Green-
ville expects to be able to bring out
the best in him, and it may come out
while playing against his old club.

The double header tomorrow is ex-
pected to draw a large crowd. The
showing today, however, will largely
determine the interest in the two
final games of the series, and it is up
to the boys to put forth their best
efforts.

LEGION MEETING AT AYDEN TONIGHT POSTPONED TODAY

Impassable Condition of the
Roads Given as Reason for
Postponement

The meeting of the Pitt county
post of the American Legion was to
have been held in Ayden tonight has
been indefinitely postponed on ac-
count of the impassable condition of
the county roads, according to infor-
mation given out this morning by Dr.
G. G. Dixon, of Ayden, commander
of the local post.

In a telephone message to Adjutant
L. J. Smith this morning Dr. Dixon
stated that the roads were in such
bad condition it would be almost im-
possible for the members to reach
Ayden by automobile today. The
main road are in unusually rough con-
dition because of improvements now
in progress and the heavy rainfall last
night made them impassable.

it certainly will be held at the earliest
moment possible. The session night
would have been one of the greatest

Five Hundred Visitors to At-
tend Sessions at Hines
Building During Day

The annual state convention of the
Moose Legion will be held in Green-
ville Thursday, according to an an-
nouncement made public this morn-
ing. The day will be one of the
greatest in history of the fraternity
and local lodge is making elaborate
preparations to entertain the five
hundred or more visitors to be in
attendance.

One of the principal features of
the program will be a banquet to be
given in the lodge rooms of the Hines
building Thursday night. Work of
the order will be staged at the ware-
house of Foxhall, Cannon and Mc-
Gowan. There will be many street
features during the day and the pub-
lic is assured of seeing something out
of the ordinary.

A twenty-six piece band from Wil-
son will furnish music for the occa-
sion. This is one of the greatest
bands of the fraternity and it will do
much towards livening up things.

The local lodge at the present time
has a membership of one hundred. It
has experienced remarkable growth
in the last few months and anticipates
even greater progress in the future.
Its members ship will make an effort
to entertain the one hundred candi-
dates several hundred visitors in great
style as it is a distinct honor to en-
tertain a state convention, especially
for such a young lodge.

SCIENTISTS AGAIN GET CLOSE UP OF THE PLANET MARS

Planet Was Nearer the Earth
Than Any Time in Recent
Years, It Is Said

Washington, June 19. — The planet
Mars, with its two moons and what
many scientists believe to be snow-
capped mountains and fertile fields
of vegetation, hovered only about 42-
000,000 miles from the earth last
night, and was the subject of com-
paratively intimate observations by
astronomers at the United States na-
val observatory despite heavy clouds
and unsatisfactory atmospheric con-
ditions.

No remarkable discoveries or ob-
servations were recorded during the
inspection of the huge planet, it was
announced today by observatory of-
ficials who added that greenish mark-
ings and white shadows were clearly
discernible. What these shadowy
substances might be, Dr. Asaph Hall,
one of the foremost astronomers of
America, who studied the planet in-
tensely for several hours during its
closest approach to the earth last
night, said was matter of conjecture.

Dr. Hall expressed the opinion
from "close-up" inspection of the
planet that there must be little at-
mosphere and less heat and light on
the distant sphere than on the earth.
Under such conditions, he added, in-
habitants, if there are any, must of
necessity be "quite different from in-
habitants of this earthly body."

Dr. Hall was inclined to believe
that the white shadows or markings
discernible, especially when the sun
was shining brightly might possibly
be snow or ice and the greenish mark-
ings either water or vegetation.

Washington, June 20. — The United
States will soon be in the grip of the
greatest labor combine in history with
industry completely at a standstill if
the tentative program of the new al-
liance of coal miners and railroad
unions is carried out, labor leaders
declared today. If such a program
is followed labor leaders say industry
is certain. Nationalization of hard-
coal mines and railroads will certainly
be demanded as the price of settle-
ment.

NAVY PERSONNEL FIXED AT 86,000 IN FINAL ACTION

Senate Passes Annual Appro-
priation Bill After Consider-
able Delay

FURTHER ACTION IS DELAYED UNTIL LATER IN THE YEAR

House to Present Further Rec-
ommendations Within Next
Few Weeks

Washington, June 19. — The annual
naval appropriation bill, carrying ap-
proximately \$295,000 and providing
for an enlisted personnel of 86,000
men, was passed late today by the
senate and sent to conference with
the House.

Action on the enlisted personnel,
now about 115,000, is final as the
Senate accepted the House decision
and the question will not come be-
fore the conferees, who will deal
principally with Senate increases of
about \$44,000,000 over the House
bill. There was no record vote on
final passage and no effort was made
to reduce the enlisted personnel.

Unsuccessful efforts to end occu-
pation of Hayti, the Dominican Re-
public, Nicaragua and to launch a
Congressional investigation of navy
administration marked the final days
debate. An amendment by Senator
King, Democrat, Utah, providing for
withdrawal of American Marines from
the two republics and Nicaragua
December 31, next, was rejected, 42
to 9, after a nearly all day debate in
which the American policy of inter-
vention was both attacked and de-
fended.

Investigation of Naval administra-
tion was proposed by Senator Mc-
Cormick (Republican, Illinois), but
his resolution drew objection from
Senator Dial, Democrat, South Caro-
lina, and was referred to the naval
committee. It contemplated a sur-
vey to abolish useless navy yards and
stations, Senator McCormick declar-
ing that there was a navy "pork bar-
rel" and one-third of its establish-
ments were unnecessary.

REPUBLICAN PARTY DEFEATED BY IRISH

Constitutionalists win Sur-
prising Victory Over Other Fac-
tions

(By International News.)

Public, June 20. — Irish consti-
tutionalists made a clean sweep of
the free state in the general election by
defeating the Republicans in all parts
of the country, according to further
tabulation of votes received here to-
day. Results so far show that the
constitutionalists have forty-seven
the Liberals six. The constitution-
alists supported the Anglo, Irish peace
treaty and favored ratification of the
Irish constitution by the Dail Eireann.
Republican repudiated both these is-
sues.

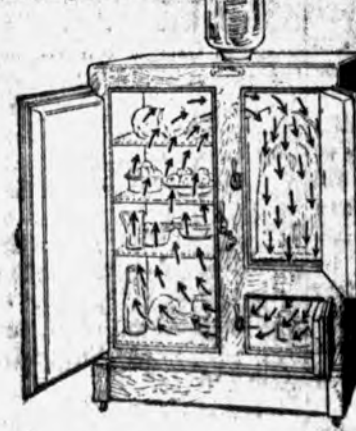

HEAD OF FARMERS
UNION IS AGAINST
CO-OP MOVEMENT

President of the Farmers
Union Says the Auction
Method Is the Right Way.
Advices the Farmers to Con-
tinue Like They Have Al-
ways Sold.

Thinking men and sensible practical men, constituting that element who are not looking for jobs, nor who are fooling with politics, are taking notice of the five year contract that tobacco growers are being called upon to sign, and which contract many have already signed. It is worth while to read what Mr. Stone says, if he is correctly reported in Sunday's papers. Mr. Stone is quoted as follows:

President R. W. H. Stone of the Farmers union, is against co-operative marketing and "that devil of a Jew lawyer" who is trying to get the farmers to sign a "one-sided contract."

While in Raleigh this week, the head of one of those organizations which Governor Morrison recently characterized as "quasi-political agricultural societies," let it be known that he is going over the state preaching against the co-operationists as false prophets. The old way suits the Farmers' union head. He considers himself a chosen leader of the soil tillers by reason of his presidency of the union, and he's on the move to tell the farmers to keep on like they have been going.

"They've been kidding me because I'm against this new scheme," said he, "but I know, I'm wise to 'em. I'm a practical tobacco grower myself, and come from a tobacco section, you know Guilford. Why, they're making them sign up a onesided contract for five years. wouldn't sign a contract like that with my wife."

He poses as being terrible worried over the poor farmers, tobacco and cotton growers, who have signed the contract. He ses flamity staring thm in the face. One reason he does not like the scheme; is he can't understand how Sapiro is being paid.

"How're they paying that fellow?" he asked. "They can't do it out of the three dollars the growers pay. It don't look good to me, and I ain't hesitating to let the farmers know it, helpher." Southern Tobacco Journal.

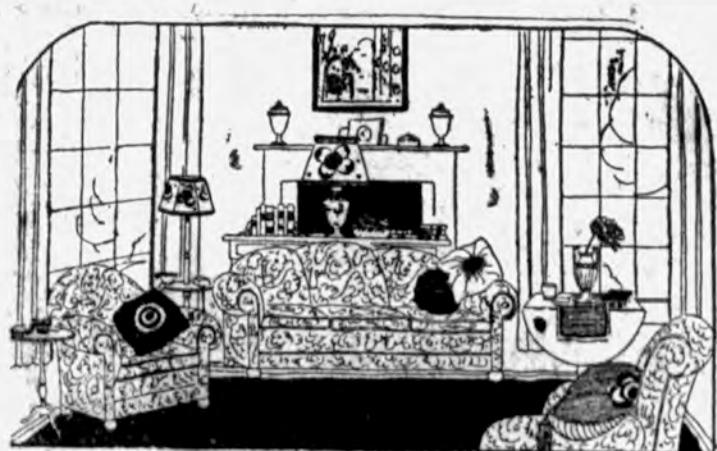
