MONTHLY REPORTS FEATURE MEETING OF WELFARE BOARD

Extension of Work Discussed
at Length by Officers and
Other Members

MANY CHILDREN HANDLED THROUGH JUVENILE COURT

Survey of Child Welfare Com-
mission Proved Big Feature
of Month's Work

The regular monthly meeting of the board of public welfare met on Monday afternoon in the office of the county superintendent public welfare and heard a report of the work for the past month and discussed many matters pertaining to the extension of the work in the county. Rev. L. B. Padgett, Farmville, N. C., has been selected as a member of the board taking the place of Mr. J. W. Holmes resigned. A brief report ran as follows:

"During the month of May up to and including the first two weeks in June 32 children had been handled by the juvenile court. Many of these children were sadly in need of medical attention and care it was noted. The circumstances in which many of these children were found were very bad and under the state law they could not be left under such environment and in such deplorable conditions. 16 of this number, it was noted were delinquent, while the others were either neglected or dependent or both. Those being dealt with or assisted were as follows: One to Jackson Training School, 2 to Oxford (col.) one to Wilmington, one to Belhaven to relative, two fitted with glasses, two certified to state school for deaf, private schools for 3 arranged, 2 placed in private homes, one 14 year old girl returned to her father, one infant under 6 months old returned to mother, 2 being boarded out at present time.

During this time 9 applications for poor relief was noted and three of this number were county charges of other counties while one was found in good circumstances, and one other was sent to the insane asylum at Goldsboro. Three men were brought into court and fined for failure to observe order of juvenile court and two other violators of the school law, who had appealed to the higher court, came in and adjusted their cases and closed the matters. Investigations for outside agencies were made during the month to the number of 15, none of these in matters of placing children. Employment found for three persons, 2 cases of operations at hospitals be adjusted through the office. One cancer patient admitted to hospital at Tarboro for treatment. One sent to county home.

During this month a survey under the state child welfare commission was made of 137 places in the county, and 25 violations of the State Toilet law and 17 violations of state seat law were found. A great number of violations of the child labor law found and to date 17 working certificates issued. Every child under the age of 16 must undergo a physical examination and receive an age certificate before he or she can be legally employed beyond home or domestic work. Since the federal child labor law was held unconstitutional, the states must issue certificates and all this work is done by the welfare officers as the authorized agents of the commission in the several counties.

GENERAL INCREASE IN FOREIGN IMPORT

(By International News.)
Washington, June 21.—Imports in increasing volume from European countries are being rushed through American ports. The collector of customs and the treasury showed that the government revenues are forty million dollars more than last year because of the coming of foreign manufacturers.

CROPS SERIOUSLY DAMAGED BY RAIN DURING YESTERDAY

Heavy Precipitation Yesterday
Caused Great Damage in
All Parts of County

Pitt county crops have suffered incalculable damage as result of the heavy rainfall the last few days, and especially yesterday when fields for miles and miles around were completely inundated. Precipitation late yesterday afternoon was the heaviest in many years, according to old observers, and the damage to crops is so extensive that it is impossible to even venture a rough estimate.

While this immediate section was visited by a torrential downpour it is probably the Grifton community suffered to a greater extent than any other section of the county. In fact, the rainfall was so heavy in the town of Grifton that streets contained several inches of water. The railroad embankment last night was so severely damaged at places that a wreck train had to be ordered out from Rocky Mount. The early morning passenger train was delayed quite awhile today, but work had made such progress that further delay will probably be avoided.

While it is realized the crops have been damaged to a great extent, it is impossible for farmers of any community to definitely determine the extent of their loss. All low ground crops are a complete loss, and tobacco planted on land not well drained will be burned so badly by the sun that it will be absolutely worthless. Many of the best fields of tobacco in the county have been only slightly damaged by the rain, and it is this which will prevent the farmer from suffering so severely. Many, however, will have a hard time this year as result of the rain, but even then they say it's not as bad as it might be.

Crops sustained serious damage from rain and hail several weeks ago, but a majority of farmers were able to recover somewhat by plowing up their fields and replanting. This time, however, the farmer will be unable to resort to such measures and must suffer the full extent of the damage.

JAPAN'S BUSINESS OUTLOOK DISQUIETING REPORT SHOWS NOW

Tokio, June 21.—The outlook for business in Japan continues "disquieting," according to the annual report of I. Bickart, chairman of the Tokio-Yokohama Foreign Board of Trade. The year has not been so bad as was anticipated, he pointed out, the volume of business was smaller, but with fewer claims on account of exports and better deliveries of imports.

In most countries considerable declines in values have followed the war boom, and wages have been drastically cut, but in Japan the contrary exists; wages in most cases are higher than ever, and there is no tendency to lower the cost of living, while Japanese goods are generally of a very inferior quality.

Bickart condemned disturbed labor conditions, the spirit of gambling, the government's policy of trying to maintain high prices, the work of customs officials and the inefficiency of the Postal Department as adverse factors which firms doing business have to contend with.

"Among the adverse conditions is the spirit of gambling, which to a considerable extent has been encouraged by the ultra-protectionist policy pursued by the Japanese Government and seriously interferes with the transaction of legitimate business," he declared in his report. "The manipulation of the raw silk market is a striking instance of what is possible when the government decides that the price of any article is to be maintained on an artificial level. The law of supply and demand is not permitted to govern the regulation of values."

CLUBS WILL CLASH TODAY UNLESS RAIN AGAIN INTERFERES

Greenville and Farmville
Teams Rearing to Get at
Least One Game out Series

Rain again prevented Greenville and Farmville from playing yesterday, and if the two clubs manage to get a single game out of the present series it will be in the double header scheduled for this afternoon, but which was very doubtful this morning because of threatening clouds.

While it looked like the game would be possible yesterday, rain continued to fall shortly after three o'clock and the heaviest precipitation noted in several months occurred in less than half an hour. The diamond was literally covered with water and the team and a hundred or more ardent supporters were forced to return to the city and give up the second game of the series.

A short while after the game was to have been played the community was visited by a torrential downpour, and the diamond was again covered. This morning the ground was still wet and soft and the prospects of the game today looked very slim.

The two clubs, however, are getting desperate at this time, and if playing is possible at two-thirty this afternoon they will begin the first game and do their best to finish it before rain again interferes. Even if the double header is possible, the series will end today with one game short. It will be impossible to make up for the shortage anytime soon, but when the clubs clash again they can put on a double bill for one day.

Greenville and Farmville have suffered worse from rain than other clubs of the league and unless something happens the end of the week will find them greatly behind. Still, when the weather does become favorable they can make up for lost time by resorting to double bills.

The Rancocas Stable has asked Stabling space for a quartette of its leading stake horses, while Sam Hildreth is expected to bring Mad Hatter, Knobble, Grey Lag and Thunderclap. The Sengram Stables has named Golden Sphere, Parladale Diamond and Brilliant Jester, their last year's British importations, and Mode.

HARDING HOPEFUL OF SHIP SUBSIDY

Washington, June 21.—Relieved from an embarrassing situation by President Harding's willingness to let the ship subsidy bill go over until after the senate disposes of the tariff, Republican leaders today drafted plans for a three day recess to begin July 1st. Congressmen will soon begin to leave for home to tell of the shipping bill to their constituents.

The president is confident the delay will gain votes for the bill as soon as the people become better acquainted with its provisions include necessary legislation to build up the American merchant marine.

OPPOSE SALE OF THE GORGAS PLANT

(By International News.)

Washington, June 21.—Southern manufacturers with industries valued at three hundred million dollars today condemned the inclusion of the Gorgas plant in any offer for the leasing Muscle Shoals as a menace to their existence.

In appeals to the senate agricultural committee, Alabama manufacturers and mine operators urged the committee to reject any offer for the government's portion of Gorgas plant. Alabama interests declared they are dependent on electric power supplied from the Gorgas plant by the Alabama Power company. They pointed out that fifty percent of Alabama mines will be closed if the plant should be turned over to Henry Ford or any other concern for that matter.

TRADE AGENTS WARN MERCHANTS AGAINST BUYING IN GERMANY

German Industry Conducted
on Speculative Basis, Says
Report to Capital

(By International News.)

Washington, June 21.—American trade agents in Germany have hoisted a danger signal for American buyers of German goods. American commercial experts in Berlin have cabled to Washington warnings that German business and industry is being conducted upon a purely speculative basis. American buyers are reminded that German merchants will decline to guarantee prices for future deliveries.

Americans returning from the Leipzig fair have reported that German manufacturers generally refused to offer firm prices, except for goods in limited quantities and goods already manufactured.

An element of instability in German manufacturing is the fact that the Germans make no wage agreements for a longer period than one month. Exact knowledge of future German trade values is impossible because of the prospect of wage advance from time to time of increases in utility rates, which have failed thus far to cut down heavy deficits, and steady advances in prices of raw materials. Another factor of insecurity, according to these expert observations, is the system of levying export supplements. These are designed to bring the price of German exports closer to the price prevailing in the country importing German goods.

Shifting prices in Germany, therefore, and the almost certain prospect that production costs will rise steadily up toward the world level, eventually can be counted upon by Americans in their dealings with German traders. Further uncertainty grows out of the fluctuations, and depreciation of the German mark continues as disturbing factor.

COTTON STORAGE HOUSES PLANNED FOR FARMVILLE

Government Bonded Ware-
house to be Established in
Town This Year

At an enthusiastic meeting of business men and farmers in Farmville yesterday tentative arrangements were made for establishing a government bonded warehouse for the storage of cotton. It was definitely decided to convert the old R. L. Davis structure into a bonded warehouse, and a committee was appointed to complete plans in this direction.

T. C. Beaman was appointed chairman of the committee, and will immediately get busy to put the proposition over. The warehouse will have a capacity of one thousand bales of cotton and should be able to accommodate the production of that immediate section committee members believe.

T. B. Parker members of the state bonded warehouse corporation, attended the meeting and explained why bonded warehouses are necessary to every cotton producing community. He said all cotton must be stored in such warehouses after being ginned, and that a section without a bonded house would be forced to ship its cotton to other communities where warehouses are located.

The warehouses are being urged in every community where farmers expect to see through the co-operative way, and the present year no doubt will see several hundred bonded warehouses spring up in this and other states.

PRESENT METHODS FOR BOLL WEEVIL FIGHT IN STATE

Early Fall Destruction Deem-
ed as the Most Advisable
Plan at Present

(By International News.)

When possible practice early fall destruction of the cotton plants. Destroy as many weevils as possible in hibernation by cleaning up and burning over hibernation quarters. Also, clear land whenever possible to consolidate open areas and reduce fields subject to early, heavy infestation.

If you are not poisoning, plant in the fields located in situations where weevil damage will be minimized. If you are poisoning, however, plant your fertile soil adjoining hibernation quarters and concentrate your efforts on thorough control of the weevils in these fields.

Prepare the land early and thoroughly in order to obtain an early crop. This means fall plowing and winter working of the land.

Determine the best distances between the rows and between the plants by experiments on local soils. Once this is determined make every effort to obtain a perfect stand at the desired spacing.

Insure an early crop by early planting of early maturing varieties and by fertilizing when necessary.

Continue to procure an early crop by careful chopping to a stand and early and frequent cultivation. Do not lose the fruit the plants have set by cultivating too deeply or too close to the rows.

Study the instructions governing poisoning very carefully and if your conditions seem suitable for profitable work—poison the weevils thoroughly with powdered calcium arsenate.

Before attempting to poison, obtain from the Bureau of Entomology full and detailed instructions based on your local conditions.

The weevil is practically dependent on cotton for reproduction. The mortality of the weevil during the winter is very high.

Hot, dry weather during the summer exercises a tremendous control upon the weevil stages, while moist, cloudy weather, removes this control and greatly accelerates multiplication.

The weevil is attacked by many different species of insect enemies.

The emergence from hibernating quarters during the spring is slow and prolonged until well into the summer.

Early in the season, on account of comparatively low temperature, the development of the weevil is much slower than during the midsummer months.

The cotton plant produces many more squares than it can carry to maturity as bolls. This surplus is shed by the plant throughout the season under normal conditions about 60 percent of the fruit being shed.

Up to a certain point weevil puncturing of fruit does not reduce the cotton crop, because large numbers of forms would be shed normally.

DEMAND PASSAGE ON 'WET' SHIPS

Washington, June 21.—American shipping companies are completely swamped with orders for passage on "wet" ships as result of the government edict permitting the sale of liquor on board American vessels. Thousands are cancelling future bookings aboard foreign ships, according to advices of the commerce department.

PREDICTS RUIN OF RAILROAD UNIONS IN THIS COUNTRY

Chairman of Railroad Board
Declares Strike Will Kill
Labor Strength Sure

SAYS IT IS VERY
UNFORTUNATE FOR
AMERICAN LABOR

Replies to Recent Statements
of the Railway Union Chiefs,
Calling Strike

Chicago, June 20.—Disaster for the striking railway unions and unfortunate results for their membership were predicted to follow the threatened walkout on which a strike vote is now being taken by nine railroad labor organizations, in a letter from Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the Railroad Labor Board, to the union leaders today.

Answering a letter from the union chiefs, which declared the executives would authorize a strike if the employees demanded it, Chairman Hooper made categorical reply to "the fierce assaults" on the board, for which he declared there was no ground.

"With the degree of friendly interest that I feel in these organizations and with the recognition I accord to their great service to the membership, I am hopeful that they will not adopt a course that will surely prove disastrous to organizations and unfortunate to the men composing them," wrote Mr. Hooper.

"It is regrettable that such a step is contemplated at a time when the country is just entering upon an era of more stable industrial conditions, and that give promise of a large degree of prosperity to railway employees."

Although Chairman Hooper said in the letter, which was addressed to B. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, that he felt no reply was required to the union's strike avowal, he expressed "a willingness to go beyond the strike limits of my official authority in the interest of railway peace."

He said he felt it his duty to reply because the threatened strike "contains such possibilities of loss and detriment" to the strikers. The chairman added that a strike vote should not be taken on any misunderstanding of the action or attitude of the board, but declared the union chiefs' letter manifested "a strikingly distorted conception of what the board has done and why it did it."

DRUG SMUGGLERS JAILED IN GEORGIA

(By International News.)

Washington, June 21.—Drug smugglers of the Atlanta federal prison will be jailed speedily and reforms will be instituted to stop further traffic in narcotics, according to instructions sent today to Attorney Hager at Atlanta by officials of the department of justice.

A special report sent out by attorney general, Daugherty to the superintendent of prisons detailed a committee to make a close inspection of the narcotic scandal of the federal pen and reveal the shocking conditions. The prison superintendent was instructed to make a clean up so drastic that repetition of the disorders will be impossible. Lax discipline of certain prison officials is believed to be a cause of existing conditions.

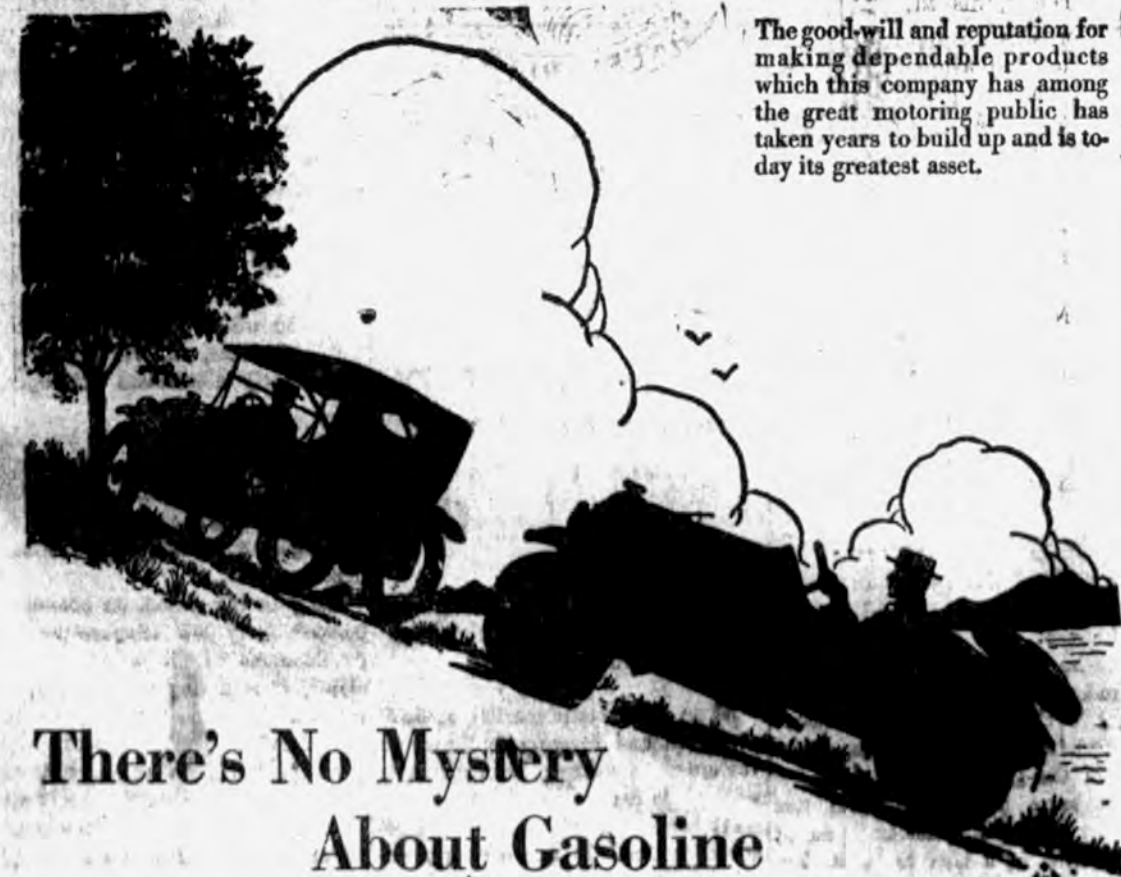

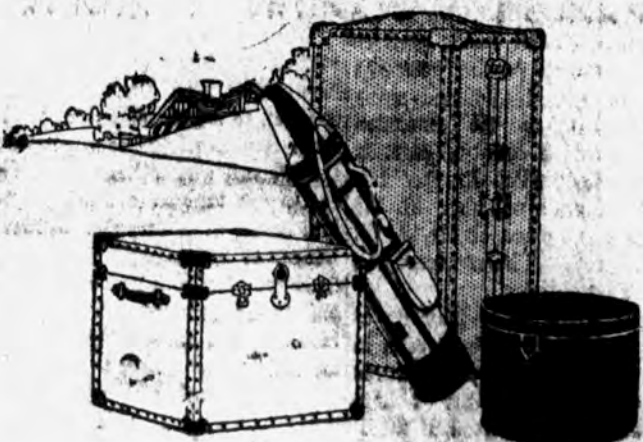
