Mr. T. J. Sachse returned this morning from Camp Leach, where the Greenville Scouts are in annual encampment, and reported that the boys and girls are having one of the greatest times of their lives. He made the trip by automobile and will return this afternoon.

Mr. Sachse said the camp was one of the most ideal for a scout encampment in the state and may be easily reached because of good roads. The buildings are well screened and in excellent condition and well situated.

Mr. Sachse stated that Mr. Hartley, Y. M. C. A. secretary at Washington, had been especially courteous to them in helping them to get supplies and in training at the camp. Washington wholesale houses have also shown a splendid attitude by letting the Scouts have practically everything at a reasonable price.

The Scouts have made a few hikes since leaving Greenville Monday morning. They have also engaged in baseball practice and will meet the Washington Boy Scouts in a match game tomorrow afternoon. They are also having a big time swimming, bathing and fishing, although catches so far have been unusually small. They are expecting better luck, however, and the next few days will probably result in some real fish stories.

Miss Mial, who is in charge of the Girl Scouts, has been given a nickname since arriving at Camp Leach. It came about this way, Mr. Sachse said: One morning Quincy Wilson dared "Yankee" Arthur to call Miss Mial honey. Miss Mial unexpectedly stuck her head out of the window and said "Yankee, think twice before you do that." Yankee laughed and answered: "Alright, honey, I will."

The Scouts will visit Indian Island Bath and Pamlico Beach this afternoon, and it is expected this will prove one of the best parts of the trip. They will make the trip by water, and everyone is expecting a great time.

The boys and girls are having all kinds of experiences, Mr. Sachse said, and when they return to Greenville they will have something to tell. Early parts of the evening are spent around a campfire in story telling, singing or cracking jokes, and enough material will be pulled off during the ten days to fill a book.

BANK OFFICIALS ASKED TO APPEAR IN FRAUD HEARING

Special War Fraud Board Summons Officials to Participate in Inquiry

Washington, June 21.—Subpoenas have been sent out by the special war frauds federal grand jury, it became known today, to officials of leading banking corporations in New York, Philadelphia, New Orleans and Jacksonville, requiring their appearance in connection with the investigation of the contract under which the government disposed of its surplus lumber after the war.

Heads of the banking firms and their cashiers were ordered to produce all records of transactions made by or involving J. L. Phillips, chairman of the Georgia State Republican committee, who is at liberty on \$25,000 bail under charges of conspiracy to defraud the government through the lumber contracts.

Data also was ordered produced which would throw light on dealings of Charles Phillips, Jr., "the J. L. Phillips Company," and John Stephens, of the Phillips and Stephens Company. It was learned authoritatively today that the grand jury has been inquiring into the activities of other directors of both firms.

RADIOPHONE WILL BE INSTALLED AT WHITE'S THEATRE

PRESIDENT WRIGHT ADDRESSES PUPILS AT THE COLLEGE

Delivers Inspiring Message to Young Women Attending the Summer Term Here

When President Wright yesterday morning walked into the Assembly Hall of East Carolina Teachers College to talk to the students he was greeted with enthusiastic applause. It seemed strange for him to be greeted as a visitor, and to be introduced by some one else. But the students during the summer do not have the opportunity of knowing him as well as the students during the remainder of the year, as he appears before them only occasionally.

He made an inspiring talk on the school, its purpose, its history, and its future. He asked them first of all to get the name straight and to have others get it straight and if they could not remember it all, to remember the Teachers College, as that gives the one thing that it is necessary to know about the college, that it is an institution owned and operated by the State for just one thing, to train teachers. It is the business of the college to prepare the best teachers possible out of the material it gets, and it is the only college in the state whose sole business is to do this.

He called attention to the wheels of progress about the college which were making so much fuss that the voice of the speaker was almost drowned. He said that the mud-slinging and hammering and banging meant that room was being added to the Administration Building for the extension of the stage, for gymnastics, for literary societies, and for various other things. He called attention to the new dormitory that is going up on the east side of the campus.

He then gave a sketch of the plans that are being made for the enlargement of the plant so that a thousand students can be accommodated. These plans have been drawn up and are ready to be submitted to the building committee. These plans include a social-religious building which will take care of all the students activities; four more dormitories, and additional buildings for class rooms and other needs. He gave the reason why the State should carry out the plans made. The demand for trained teachers is great and it must be met. He reported that more had been turned away this summer than were accepted. He gave as the record of refusals for admission as ten times the dormitory capacity in the first ten years of its existence. No advertising is done because applicants are turned away without the effort being made to get them here.

During a warm wave several of the boys went to school in their shirt sleeves. They were sent home by Principal Horne. Boys with their collars are forced to sit sweltering in their respective classes, where their girl classmates, with sleeveless blouses and throats exposed, are as cool as cucumbers.

BRITISH MARSHAL IS ASSASSINATED

London, June 22.—Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, former chief of the British Imperial guard staff was assassinated on the doorsteps of his home last night while returning from the unveiling of a war memorial. He had been named commander of an Unionist army of volunteers in Ireland, which led to the belief that he was killed by Irish Republicans. Two men were arrested on suspicion during the night.

CHINESE GAME BECOMES FAD IN UNITED STATES

New York, June 22.—Described as "the game of a hundred intelligences," "Pung-chow," invented in China more than a century ago, has become a fad in New York social circles. Popularity of the game from far Cathay is spreading to Palm Beach, Hot Springs and other summer resorts. "Pung-chow" is a combination of bridge, whist, dominoes, chess, Oriental allegory and modern warfare. It is played with 136 pieces of ivory. Four players are necessary for the playing of a set.

SEVERE FIGHTING OCCURS AT MINES IN ILLINOIS TOWN

Several Miners Die as Result of Injuries Received During the Disorders

MEAGRE REPORTS AS TO CASUALTIES RECEIVED TODAY

List of Fighting Reported From One to Fifteen, According to Reports

Herren, Ills., June 21.—Dardness tonight compelled cessation of hostilities between striking union miners and employees of the Southern Illinois Coal Company's strip mine near here after hours of fighting in which thousands of shots were exchanged. One union miner is known to have been killed. Reports were current that 12 to 15 employees of the mine were killed but these could not be certified because of confusion at the camp.

Two union miners were wounded seriously and about six others were wounded slightly. Three mine guards also were reported seriously wounded. Thousands of persons, many armed, were rushing to the camp tonight.

Shortly before the shooting began here late today, three of ten men en route here to work in the strip mine are known to have been shot down just outside of Carbondale. One of the ten escaped injury and the other six swam a creek and were fired upon. They have not been accounted for.

The scene of the rioting resembled a battlefield. The strip mine, being a surface colliery, permitted the employees to entrench themselves behind the piles of coal on the ground waiting to be loaded on to cars.

The striking miners, said to number more than 1,000 surrounded the camp, shooting from all sides and open war-fare was conducted for several hours.

The trouble followed an indignation meeting held just outside of Herren today following publication of a telegram from John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, that the workmen at the strip mine, who are members of the Shovelmen's Union, were "common strike-breakers." Mr. Lewis' telegram added that the Shovelmen's Union had been outlawed by the American Federation of Labor.

LABOR THREATENS POLITICAL PARTY

(By International News.)

Cincinnati, June 22.—The American Federation of Labor today squelched an attempt to stampede the convention into favoring the formation by organized labor and a third big political party.

The appeal for political revolt through placing labor of the party on a political battlefield came while the convention assailed all branches of the government and threatened revolution by labor if the government continues to stop progressive revolution.

FRENCH-SPANISH TARIFF SQUABBLE GROWS BITTER

Paris, June 22.—Bitter feeling has been aroused by Spain's latest move in the France-Spanish tariff squabble. Spain has raised duties 80 per cent for all countries whose money is depreciated as much as 70 per cent in relation to the peseta.

RATTLESNAKES OVERRUN BOURNBORN COUNTY, KAN.

Parsons, Kan., June 22.—The marked increase in rattlesnakes throughout Bournborn county is causing great alarm to the residents.

In one week's time recently thirty five were killed near Fort Scott, Kan., authorities stated. Eight "rattles" in two days is the record to date and is held by C. M. Grimes. The increase is caused by a mild winter, according to plowmen.

Railroad workers seem determined to strike regardless of the plight of the miners. They should learn a great lesson here. And avoid the strike as long as this becomes possible.

The water carnival at Amuzu Park today should prove a great success. Such attractions should be staged every now and then, as they produce skill in swimming that is very necessary in every sense of the word.

Foreign imports are on a general increase in this country, and the future for increasing the treasury's resources is very bright indeed. The collector of customs reports a forty million dollar increase in imports over the same period last year, and this indicates even better times ahead.

Government ownership will not be an issue in the strike of railway workers, but before it is all over they may get exactly what they didn't expect. Things will develop rapidly after the strike becomes effective, and government ownership may be found advisable despite what the workmen say.

President Harding has agreed to the plant to sidetrack the ship subsidy bill until after congress recesses, believing it will have more time to gain public favor. The president forgets probably that opposition is as likely to develop as favor, and if he doesn't wake up to find this so we will be very much surprised.

Crops of every kind in North Carolina seem to have suffered more or less as result of excessive rainfall of late, and farmers are destined to check up short when harvesting season rolls around. However, the majority of growers are in prosperous shape, and will be able to tide over the season in pretty good shape. They have had their part of prosperity in past years and have no right to kick over another season of bad times.

Rain has wrought great havoc in this section the past few days and farmers will lose considerably more than at one time expected. The situation is to be regretted in every sense of the word but since it is one of those unavoidable occurrences we will have to make the best of it we can. The crop of tobacco would have been much larger this year than under ordinary circumstances, and while the rain has wrought great havoc the loss will not be as great as it would have been otherwise.

Money lost in strikes this year will be appalling, and when the strikers take time to figure up their loss they may wish they had remained on the job and accepted the slight decrease of wages. Conditions are bound to change if business ever gets normal, and it is the part of every class of labor to help. If war prices and wages are to remain all the time then no one would ever expect things to be otherwise. But when we are bound to get back to normal it is the duty of everyone to do their part.

That great labor combine materializing between railroad workers and miners should never be formed. They have as much of a combine as needed in the unions, and can certainly not expect to gain anything through mass politicking the nation's labor. The public is becoming impatient at the disorder and if the workers strike as planned they won't get very much sympathy from that class of people believing it is better to continue working even though wages are not what they used to be. That this is the right spirit cannot be doubted and the men that follow it will come out at the big end of the horn.

Routhern manufacturers with in- double valued at three hundred million dollars are stubbornly opposing the sale or lease of Gorgas plant to Henry Ford or anybody for that matter. They say it would completely demoralize industry for them, and place the cities securing light from

the Gorgas plant in an unusual situation. They may be right or wrong, but there is one thing certain, the plant would make greater progress under Ford's administration than at the present time. Ford knows exactly what he is doing and it's safe to say he would make the plant pay if he gets possession of it. The public believes this, and will stand behind the automobile manufacturer until he gets what he wants.

The greatest labor combine in history of America is being formed by railway workers and coal miners and the present strike may increase in seriousness if plans carry. With such conditions in prevalence the government should get busy and see what can be done in improving the situation. The matter has been deferred long enough and unless something is done the unions will do exactly as they please. It's a pity the laboring class will not accept the reduction of wages and return to work. What they will lose in idleness is by far more than they would make by the increase. They can't see it this way, however, and the public no doubt will be forced to suffer as result of their folly.

The Eastern Carolina chamber of commerce is planning to make up a pullman load of business men, bankers and planters for the purpose of making a trip to Alabama and Georgia to look over the "craps". The idea is a good one and should be of great benefit to the business man as well as the farmer. Diversified farming is being tried out in these two states, and as farmers in this section are greatly interested in this plan they should be able to derive great benefit from the trip. There is plenty room for improving the farming method of this community, and seeing is believing, our people would be more fully impressed than just hearing or reading the reports.

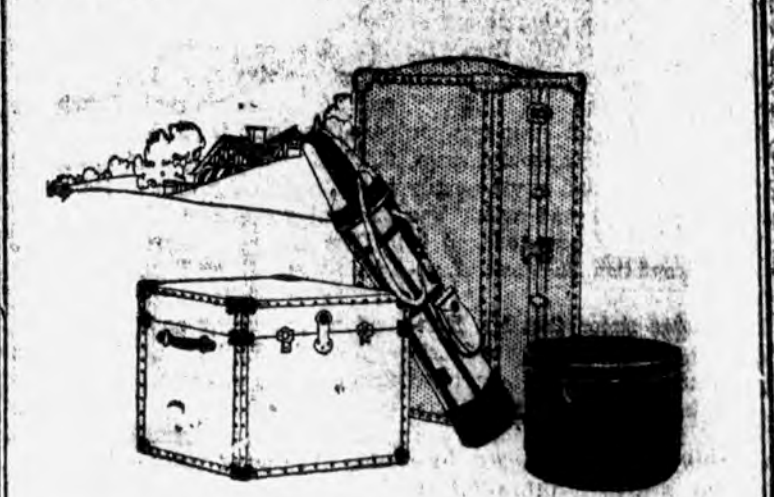

THE SELF TRIMMED SUMMER FROCK

The fact that trimmings are eliminated to a considerable extent from many of the smartest frocks of the season, does not mean that they are without ornamentation since designers have amused themselves and made our dress problems more complicated by experimenting with all manner of manipulations of material.

A dress may be really quite well trimmed and have nothing on it but some treatment of the material itself. Drawn work is one of the forms which lends itself to the dress of the hour, for cottons, linens, thin crepes and silks are dainty when so trimmed. The shops are well supplied with French hand made frocks of the types shown and reasonable prices so that would appear to take care of our thin frock problems.

Cotton frocks have a tremendous vogue embroidered in a semblance of beads or beaded in a semblance of embroidery. Beads made of cotton thread were introduced last season but it is pretty generally conceded that it takes two seasons to really develop a style; certainly one sees more heading of that kind this year than last and the beaded cotton voile frocks at a distance has much the daintiness of effect achieved by a georgette or chiffon. Apricot, peach, periwinkle, blue and orchid are the colors which, with yellow, center our immediate interest.

The exodus of the leisure classes

from town has resulted in shops stressing country club clothes and sheer things which are a bit more at home in the country than in town. The greater number of these frocks are for afternoon or informal dinner wear the great majority being white or in the ivory tone, and varied mostly by the fashion of the sleeve, or by details of trimming.

Several of these models are made with chiffon slips in pastel tones and have ribbon girdles and garlands of hand-made flowers in delicate shades. One model combines filet lace and hand embroidered batiste over a rather long black taffeta slip.

Lace casts a deciding vote for evening wear, many of the evening gowns featuring black over a white satin or metal cloth foundation. These evening gowns are especially interesting in the variety of hem line finishings. There are bindings, and cordings of Canton crepe and crepe de Chine, or the lace hangs free, without any finish whatsoever.

Rivalling the black and the beaded gown is the gown of imported cre cloth. These are of a shimmering metal cloth with a tone of wistaria, silvery blue, rose, or one of a dozen other lively shades.

HOLMES' RETURNS FROM TRIP TO CALIFORNIA

Mr. J. W. Holmes of Farmville one of our county commissioners has returned from California where he went to attend the Rotary conference. He reports a fine time and a most successful meeting.

In his interview he stated he was surprised in the soil of California as compared with this section, and that he had rather have one acre of his land than ten of the California land. Yet the country and condition of the farmers show much more prosperity than ours.

Mr. Holmes stated that while talking to one farmer he asked him how he sold his produce, he replied that he had nothing to do with selling any of his crops, etc., but turned it all over to one of the several Co-operative Marketing selling agencies which did all of the selling. Mr. Holmes stated that this farmer seemed so surprised at his not knowing of the method of disposing of the produce, that he did not ask any of the others he met as to how they sold.

On his way back to North Caro-

lina, Mr. Holmes stopped in the Burley district of Kentucky. He said that he talked with from 75 to 100 people and not one of them had a word to say against the "pool" as operated there. In fact he states that every one (none of them were officers or employees of the association) spoke highly of the association, saying that it had been the salvation of that country and the farmers.

One merchant to illustrate what the farmers think of the "pool" stated that over 5,000 new contracts had been signed during the past few weeks and that everybody in Maysville, Ky. were very enthusiastic since the second payment was made and that business was good.

Anyone doubting the success of the Co-operative Marketing association method of selling farm produce will be much enlightened if they will talk to Mr. Holmes.

SAYS WOMEN SHOULD BE GIVEN SHOW IN GOVERNMENT ISSUES

About three years ago when the fight for Woman Suffrage was at its height, the Anti-Suffragist argued that "Woman's place was in the home" to which the suffragist replied that, "Woman's place is wherever her children are—in the schools, at the playgrounds, on the streets." Meaning literally that woman's interest in politics centered around whatever effected her children—be it good teaching, wholesome environment at the playgrounds, sanitary markets, safe streets or what not. This undoubtedly is the natural interest of all good mothers. But have the women of Greenville shown the interest in these matters that was expected of them, and have the men extended to the women the character of invitation that would encourage and welcome their participation.

The city government is administered principally by a Mayor, eight members of the board of aldermen, seven members of the school board and three members of the Water and Light Commission. The Mayor and board of aldermen are selected by popular vote, and although no woman has yet aspired to any of these offices, the Woman's Club of Greenville for the past two years has been extended invitations to appoint committees to advise and co-operate with the Aldermanic committees on streets playgrounds, sanitation and cemetery. Yet this invitation has never been accepted, and the women as a whole have shown very little collective interest in the matters directly under the control of these committees, some of which should naturally lie close to the Woman's heart. Just why this is, I am unable to say and no one but the women themselves can answer the question.

But as to the selection of a school board it is an entirely different matter, for the school board is selected by the board of aldermen, but the board of aldermen is confined in its selection to the choice of one of three that are nominated for each vacancy by the school board itself. That is to say, when the terms of members of the school board expire each year, the school board sends to the board of aldermen three names for each vacancy occurring, and the board of aldermen under the law is compelled to select one of the three so nominated by the school board. Thus it can be seen that this is an appointive office and one which a person does not have to offer himself or herself as a candidate. Yet, during the past two years, although women have been enfranchised and five vacancies have occurred on the school board, not a woman has been nominated or recommended by the school board to the board of aldermen for appointment to the school board. I do not mean by this that it is at all necessary to the success of the school system that women should serve on the school board, but in view of the fact that

the women have participated in our national, state, county and town elections and will undoubtedly be called upon in the near future to put across a bond election, if it is to be carried, for the further improvement of the school system and in view of the further fact that more than ninety per cent of the teachers in our city schools are women, does it not seem reasonable that at least one of the seven members of the school board should be a woman? No fault can be found with the present school board, as it is composed of our highest type of citizenship, commanding the respect and confidence of the public. And admitting there is no necessity for a change of personnel, yet as a matter of courtesy to the women, and in recognition of their participation in our business, civic and political undertakings, is it not due them that at least one of the three nominated by the school board to the board of aldermen for the selection of one to fill each vacancy, should be a woman? During the past two years—since women have been eligible, the names of fifteen men have been transmitted by the school board to the board of aldermen for the selection of five members of the school board, and at present there are six names before the board of aldermen, from which two members of the school board will have to be selected at the next meeting of the board of aldermen, but no woman's name appears on the list.

In conclusion, may I not ask, is it exactly fair, or do not the women care?

In nearly every town of any size in the state women are serving on the School Boards, and in many instances their co-operation and interest, aroused by actual participation, is found indispensable to the school system.

Why not give them a trial? Respectively,

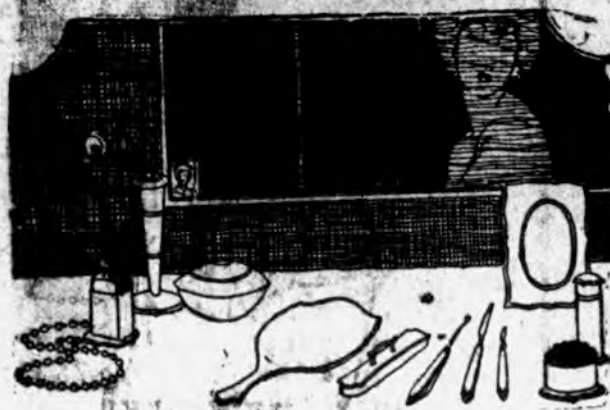
