

FORTY MINERS KILLED IN FIGHTING BETWEEN STRIKERS AND MOBS

**Non-Union Miners Shot Down,
Lynched and Burned in Cold
Blood by Infuriated Mob**

**POLICE SAY IT IS
IMPOSSIBLE TO SAY
HOW MANY KILLED**

**Wholesale Killings Occur Af-
ter Surrender of Imported
Workers After Terror.**

Cincinnati, Ohio, June 22.—Forty-four persons, two of whom were union coal miners, were killed in the mine disorders at Herrin, Ill., according to a statement tonight of Frank Farrington, president of the Illinois district organization of the United Mine Workers of America.

Mr. Farrington declared he had received his information from an official of the union at Herrin, but he refused to disclose the identity of his informant. He also said that he had not agreed to permit the mine, where the trouble occurred, to operate, which, it was said, was possible under the union's general strike policy to permit mining of coal to fuel public utilities.

The death toll of the disaster last night and today, when 5,000 striking union miners attacked the Lester strip mine, being operated under guard of imported workers, may run past the forty mark, it was said tonight by those in touch with the situation, although thus far only 27 positively are known to be dead.

In the Herrin hospital are eight wounded men, only one a miner, and six of them are believed to be fatally injured. There were nine, but one died.

A miner said that he had seen 15 bodies thrown into a pond with rocks around their necks today. About twenty imported workers are missing.

Checking the death list has proven almost impossible. The victims, all but three of these imported workers so far is known, were found scattered over an area within several miles of the mine. Some were lynched, some were burned when the mine was fired, others were beaten to death and the majority fell before the scores of bullets poured into them.

**Murderers of English Military

London, June 23.—James O'Brien and James Connelly, Irishmen who assassinated Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson on the doorstep of his home yesterday, were arraigned in police court today and remanded to jail for eight days to enable the government to conduct further inquiry into the murder plot. The address of welcome was responded to by Great North Moose Blaylock, of Charlotte, who stated they had found Greenville an ideal place for the convention and would always remember the hospitality and cordiality existing on every hand. He said they had found many things of interest here and that every moment had been a pleasant one.

The banquet was one of the most elaborate affairs staged by the Moose in several years, and after it was over initiation of candidates got under way rapidly. This feature was to have been held in a tobacco warehouse but the hall was found to be large enough to accommodate the crowd which crowded it to its capacity.

Yesterday afternoon the Moose put on a considerable amount of street work, and the public was greatly amused at the way candidates were put over the burning sands. Principal streets of the city were paraded, after which they repaired to the hall and enjoyed a delightful social program.

The Water Carnival at Amuzu Park yesterday afternoon went off in fine shape and every one was delighted with the demonstrations given by David J. Yates, director of first aid and life saving of the Southern Division of the American Red Cross.

Miss Evelyn Hodges is to be complimented upon the beautifully decorated boats, which were occupied by the Junior Red Cross officers of Greenville. Miss Mary Moye Tucker in charge Farnville, Mrs. J. W. Lovelace in charge Ayden, Mrs. Helen Turnage in charge Grifton, Mrs. C. E. Gardner in charge and Bethel, Miss Olive Jones in charge.

Mr. M. K. Blount, chairman of the Pitt County Chapter A. R. C. introduced Mr. Yates who demonstrated the Schoeffler Method of resuscitation, using Robert Wright as his subject. This was particularly beneficial to all members of the Fire and Police Department as this is the best method known to be used after suffocation by smoke, electric shock, asphyxiation by gas, drowning, etc., and had been demonstrated by the different persons trying out for the Pitt County Life Saving Corps.

Chairman A. B. Corey had the pond marked off and arranged the different events so they would follow each other directly. In the seventy-five yard dash, Robert Wright won first place, Bill Whedbee second, and Bert Greene third. Fifty yard dash Jimmie Barber first, Bert Greene second and Robert Wright third. In the twenty-five yard dash for boys Albion Dunn first, Charles King second, and Mays and Forbes tied for third place. In the flag race Bert Greene and partner won first place; second, Crick Whichard and partner, and third Pat Foley and partner.

The Grandmother race was very amusing, and was composed of David J. Yates, Robert Wright, and Will Whedbee, dressed in night gowns. "Miss" Bert Greene was a beautiful lady and was gallantly rescued as she fell from the boat by Crick Whichard.

Chairman Corey states that he intends to have representatives go to the State Swimming Meet and it is very much hoped that the Pitt County Swimmers will continue with the interest already begun. Every one feels that we were most fortunate in having had Mr. Yates with us, and all members of the Corps urged that he should come to Pitt again as soon as possible.

ELECT ASHEVILLE MAN PRESIDENT OF STATE MERCHANTS

**Merchants Association Also
Selects Statesville as Next
Meeting Place**

Wrightsville Beach, June 22.—S. P. Euton, of Asheville, was today elected president of the North Carolina Retail Merchants' Association, succeeding B. F. Roark, of Charlotte. J. C. Williams, of Wilmington, was elected vice-president; J. Paul Leonard, of Fayetteville, was re-elected secretary, and A. W. Bunch, of Statesville, treasurer.

Statesville was chosen by acclamation as the place for the 1923 convention.

Adoption of resolutions endorsing the Made-in-Carolina movement, and changes in the State advertising law were the principal features of the closing session. It was proposed that the word intent be stricken from the advertising law, so as to place the burden of the proof on the offender.

M. E. Newson, of Durham, delivered an address on the merchant and his relation to the community, declaring that no organization has a better opportunity to do real service in a community. He asserted that the merchant must catch a vision of the ideals of his community, and then put his whole action behind it.

BARTLETT MAKES FINE REPORT AT GOLDSBORO MEET

**Secretary of Eastern Chamber
Tells of Conditions Existing
in This Section**

**SAYS NOT A SINGLE
TOWN HAS FAILED TO
GIVE FINE SUPPORT**

**Unique Plan to Advertise the
Eastern Section Adopted by
the Committee**

The executive committee of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce held a very important meeting Goldsboro Thursday afternoon of this week, at 3:30. This was the first regular meeting since the real organization was launched some forty days ago. The report of the vice president manager, N. G. Bartlett, was very encouraging. It showed that the people of Eastern North Carolina are really alive to the situation, and are ready and willing to put forth a little effort to develop the resources that the people of this section have at their very door. "I have never seen or heard of any movement as big as this one, that has been received with such unanimous support by both business men and farmers, as this has," Mr. Bartlett said in making his report to the committee. "Not a single town or county where a meeting has been held, has refused to come into the organization, the report showed."

The report further showed that the following counties have been visited up to now, and they are all in and ready to say the word "go." Johnston, Sampson, Duplin, Cumberland, Pitt, Lenoir, Harnett, Wayne, Nash, Halifax, New Hanover, Beaufort, Martin, and Roberson. The following towns have been visited and each has a local unit: Kinston, Washington, Scotland Neck, Lumberton, St. Paul, Clayton, Fayetteville, Smithfield, Four Oaks, Lillington, Red Springs, Princeton, Nashville, Williamston, Mt. Olive, Warsaw, Spring Hope, Clinton, Fairmont, Greenville, Faison, LaGrange, Rose Hill. Of course none of the counties have been worked completely yet.

A very unique scheme to advertise the work was adopted by the committee. In order to get the program of the big organization before the people as rapidly as possible, the manager has prepared a display, giving excerpts from the program of the Eastern Chamber, and a copy of this will be sent to each bank in the 39 counties with the request that it be published as a paid advertisement for that particular bank. The adv. also carries with it the endorsement of that bank of the program and the promise to aid any worthy farmers to put a program such as this into effect for Eastern Carolina. It is believed that a large number of the banks in the territory will use the copy and in this way the program will be gotten to thousands of farmers and business men within the shortest time possible.

So far as is known, the business men of Eastern North Carolina, have been the first group of men in any section of the south to organize in such a big way for a program of diversified farming. Localities have done this, but no section as large as Eastern Carolina has ever done this in advance of the boll weevil. With this early beginning, this section should get good and ready for this pest that has caused so much damage in other sections of the cotton growing belt. Pitt county has had quite a large part in getting this organization going and her business men who have fostered this movement, too, to be congratulated on their fine history business eye in initiating this program of work.

Everyone will regret to learn of the disorders at the coal mines in Illinois as the strike is bad enough without additional trouble. The miners seem to forget they are living in a civilized country, and resort to measures that will accentuate the situation far more than ever. Nothing tends to demoralize business more than strikes and the sooner American labor can go down to business and become contented the sooner conditions will get back to normal.

While the majority of streets of the city are in good condition, there are others that at times are almost impassable. Consider Third street for instance. This is one of the worst thoroughfares in town, considering the amount of traffic passing over it every day and something should be done to improve it. The improvement could be made at no great expense and the city should see that it is done before conditions become worse.

Harding's ship subsidy letter has started a row in the ranks of his own party, and before it is over the proposed legislation may not stand such good chance of going through. The country is more or less disgusted with the Republican attitude towards legislation which really means something to the country, and if they can't make up their minds to support this, then they shouldn't receive the support in other measures. The ship subsidy may be near the president's heart, but it is destined not to get much nearer.

Conditions are splendid in this country now to what they will be after July 1st if railway labor walks out on the prolonged strike as planned at this time. The situation may not be quite so serious, but as the time for the walkout draws nearer, it increases in seriousness. Some action to avert the strike should be taken even if the government is forced to interfere. While this may not be an approved way of preventing the disorder, it is nevertheless far better than the strike itself. Something must be done and the sooner we get down to business the earlier things will improve.

EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA FARMER GOES TO SEE AND IS CONVINCED
The following letter was received this morning. I had heard that Mr. Murray, (who is a farmer at Wallace, N. C.) had been to Kentucky and I requested that he give me his views.
J. N. GORMAN.
Wallace, N. C.
June 20, 1922.

Dear Sir:
The thing that most concerns our country and ourselves, is the making and marketing of our crops, and it is our duty to see that such is done in the best possible way, that we may get the most for our labor and our products. Men, we are not working for our health.
There has for the past few weeks been a great deal said and done about Co-operative Marketing. Men have made speeches all over this country in behalf of the Co-operative Association. Several have tried to get me to sign the contract, but I would not, as I did not believe it was a good thing, and I did not know much about the thing. There was such a hot fight going on, I concluded, the best thing to do, was, to go to Kentucky and find out for myself. I wanted to know whether these big speakers had been telling the truth about it, for they all bragged about Kentucky.

A few days ago I went to the great Kentucky in the interest of myself and friends, and young Carter went along with me. Our first stop was at Mr. Sterling, Ky., where we talked to most every person we met, some on the street, some in banks, some in stores, some on the country roads, and most on farms. The first man we talked to was on the train before reaching Mr. Sterling. He was a brewer from Lexington, Ky., by the name of John Kloecker. He praised the Co-operative Association in the highest terms, and gave us the names of several men to see in Lexington. Our first talk in Mt. Sterling was with Mr. Eddie Michell, a farmer of Moorefield, Ky., R. F. D. No. 1, who was sitting on the curb of the sidewalk when we ran afoot of him. He said it was the best thing on earth for the farmers and gave the name of Mr. Harve Wilson, cashier of the Moorefield Bank, and asked us to be sure to call on him. Every man we talked with, was soul and body for the Co-operative Association. We couldn't even as much as find a Greek or Italian against it. From Mt. Sterling we drove through the country to North Middleton, then to Paris, and from there to Lexington, talking with practically every man we met. Mr. Roy Byrd, of Mt. Sterling, raised 15000 lbs. of tobacco last season and put it in the pool. He has received 30 cents per pound for about two thirds that has been sold, and can now borrow 9 cents per pound from the bank on his receipts for the other third. Others can do the same in proportion. We stopped on the farm of Mr. H. E. Wiley, North Middleton, Ky., R. F. D. No. 1, and talked with Mr. Wiley who was ploughing. He told us that his father-in-law, who was a member of the Association and had a tenant last year who was not a member, split their crop, and the tenant sold his half over the warehouse floor for less money than his father-in-law had gotten for two-thirds of his half. We heard of other cases similar to this. While in Lexington, we went to see Mr. J. C. Stone, President of the Kentucky Pool, who showed us samples of some of the burley tobacco, also showed us how it was graded, priced, redried, etc. One that I especially remember was an A grade that was originally priced at 45 cents per pound, and lots of it was sold at that price. It was later advanced to 48 cents green, or 53 cents redried, which includes insurance, storage, etc. Now follows, you have heard that the big companies were fighting the Pool and would not buy from them, but I am here to tell you there is not a word of truth in it, for good reliable men all over Kentucky will prove it to any man who will write or go to see. I have heard that H. J. Reynolds would not buy a pound from the Pool, but would fight it to a finish; but men, they have already bought twenty million pounds and have got an advertisement in the Kentucky Co-operative paper, and I have a copy of the paper to show any man that wants to see it.

What I want you to know, is, that Kentucky is 100 per cent Co-operative as far as I could find, and out there, Co-operative means Kentucky and Kentucky means Co-operative, and every man farming is co-operating with the farmer, therefore you can't get any body to say a word against the Pool, (they call it Pool out there) and if you hear a man from Kentucky knocking the Pool, he must be in the asylum, or just out. When I got back from out there, I joined the Co-operative Association, and I want to see every farmer join, and every man who is not farming, cooperate with the farmers. It means money; that's what we are working for.

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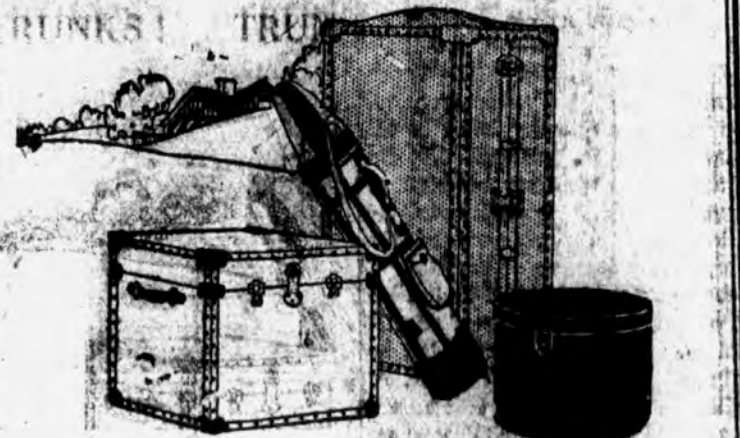

BLUE SOX DROP FIRST GAME TO NEW BERN BEARS

Greenville Blue Sox journeyed down to New Bern yesterday for a three day series expecting to return to Greenville Saturday evening with a big haul of Bear meat but some how things took an unexpected break and the Bears routed the invaders by the score of 6 to 1. A FEW WORDS IN REVIEW

Short Talk on the Lesson by Mr. Bert James, Teacher of the Young Mens Class of the Methodist Church.

A Few Words in Review.

Since the first of the year our International lessons have been based on passages from the Old Testament.

We have thought about, read about and studied about character, among whom we found giants in faith and service and others who sold themselves to sin and wickedness.

As the New Testament rests upon the old we might review, or I might say give a short outline of the last few lessons.

The first quarter dealt with the Prophets and Kings of the Northern Kingdom, while the lesson of the last quarter dealt with the Prophets and Kings of the Southern Kingdom.

The Northern Kingdom began with revolt under Jeroboam and ended with the conquest by Shalmaneser and Sargon in the days of Hoshea. Among the prophets we found Elijah, Elisha, Jonah and Amos.

The Southern Kingdom began with Rehoboam, the son of Solomon and as we learned last Sunday ended with the fall of Jerusalem under the leadership of Zedekiah. Among the prophets we found Isaiah and Jeremiah. The southern kingdom was more liable to the temptation of

small compared to the few tribes of the northern. While the southern was infertile and yes, barren, it was protected from invasion—on the south by the desert—on the west by the sea. Jeroboam was the "son of Nabat, who make Israel to sin," and the record stands against him, but he was no more sinful than Ahab and Ahab was no worse than Jehoiakim, and Hoshea was no weaker than Zedekiah.

But the greatest of the prophets we found operating in the southern kingdom what magnificent men, were Isaiah and Jeremiah and had it been possible would have saved Judah.

The kings exhibited human frailties; Asa relied on God at first, then forgot him. Uzziah was not so bad but ruined by pride. Hezekiah sometimes proved his weakness, and which Josiah turned to God and re-established his word he finally died and sea, the east by the hills of Moab and on the north by the few tribes. The northern kingdom by reason of its location was kept in a state of watchfulness and war-like preparation. There we found fertile spots and the temptation of

wealth. The southern kingdom being poor and having little intercourse with the outside world remained more faithful to the tradition of the Hebrews. In the north the messages of the prophets even those of social injustices, the oppression of the poor by the rich, as in the case of Nabath's vineyard. No less wicked even the kings of the south. we found his successor among the weakest men who have ever borne the title of king.

Was it not fitting that the resurrection lesson came in the midst of the story of these vacillating kings and taught us that the hope of the world is not in Israel's kings nor in human fidelity to a government, but in that redemption which comes through death on the cross. The nation that forgets God shall perish, but the soul that trusts in Christ shall live in spite of crumbling thrones and crashing royal houses. Governments may pass away and dynasties fail, books may be burned and prophets crucified, but that people whose trust is in a deathless One shall live forever.
