

MINERS STOP WORK
TO PREVENT CLASH
OF OTHER FACTION

Unhonored Dead Receive Not a Word of Sympathy From People of Herrin

OUTSIDERS ONLY
ONES TO SHOW ANY THOUGHT FOR DEAD

Unending Line of Women and Children Visit Morgue Without Showing Sympathy

Herrin, Ill., June 23.—Scores of men employed at Williamson county coal mines to guard and keep the mines in shape during the strike quit work tonight under threats from certain union mines, but shortly after midnight they returned to work when Hugh Willis, mine union district board member, personally promised them protection and placed union miners to guard them from any fresh outbreaks. Absence of these caretakers on the job through agreement of operators and miner officials would have meant ruin of millions of dollars worth of mines through flooding.

Herrin's unhonored dead lay pale and stark tonight in the vacant store building that has been pressed into service as a morgue since yesterday's mine battle. Past them filed an unending line of men and women, young and old, bare-footed boys and little girls bright in their summer clothes. They lifted muslin cloths and peered at the pale faces and at the wounds left by pistol bullets, rifle balls and buckshot.

They lingered, then reluctantly pressed on to some adjoining horror, eager to miss nothing. Never a word of pity from the crowd. These were the enemy slain in a labor war. These were the men who came to take away their jobs. Outsiders, enemies. "Well, it served them right." That was the attitude of the town as expressed by its men and women and its children. Tears, none. Sympathy, not much. These were the enemy.

The dead, of a half dozen nationalities, with sloping foreheads of the Slav, high profiles of the native born, the long mustaches of the eastern European, lay at peace for all the crowds, the laughter and the sullen looks. Bricks beneath their heads for pillows, pick boxes for their beds, they lay waiting the call of friends and relatives who loved them once and have lost touch with them in the vicissitudes of transient labor. Most of them, it is safe to say, will be forgotten in the potter's fields, their meagre courses run, their stories finished. They came because they wanted a living and because other men wanted to make money.

ROCKEFELLER DIES
AT NEW YORK HOME

Brother of John D. Rockefeller Dies as Result of Pneumonia in 81st Year

Tarrytown, N. Y., June 24.—William Rockefeller, brother of John D. Rockefeller, died of pneumonia here today in his eighty-first year. He was one of the most powerful and noted capitalists in the United States and a director of a large number of corporations. He was also interested in a number of railroads, steamship companies and banks. He was taken ill Sunday.

BERLIN IS IN THROES
OF GREAT CRIME WAVE

Berlin, June 24.—The Berlin crime wave was the highest since ten years in April this year, according to the statistics issued by the police headquarters. There were 250 cases of street robbery and forty cases of manslaughter. Berliners are planning to organize an effective self-protection by means of hired private detective and by procuring for themselves a permit to carry arms.

STATE LOSES ITS
APPEALS TO HAVE
ROAD PAY TAXES

Judge James Boyd Decides in Favor of Railroads for Injunction

JUDGE CONNOR WAS FIRST MAKE RULING AGAINST INJUNCTION

Ruling of Judge Waddill Also for Injunction But Against Franchise

Greensboro, June 23.—The State of North Carolina today lost its fight against a Federal court order directing a stay against the collection of franchise taxes levied upon the Southern, Seaboard, Atlantic Coast Line, Norfolk-Southern, and Atlantic and Yadkin railroads.

Judge James E. Boyd, of the Western North Carolina Federal district court, broke a tie between Judge H. Connor, Eastern North Carolina district, and Judge Edmund Waddill, Jr., of Richmond, of the circuit court of appeals. Judge Boyd's decision barring the State from getting its money until the United States Supreme court shall have passed upon the question of the constitutionality of the franchise tax. Herring before the high tribunal is set for the first Monday in November. About \$210,000 is involved.

At Raleigh, on June 10, Judge Waddill ruled in favor of a stay of collection of the franchise tax, and Judge Connor against it. The two were together in ruling against the collection now of the ad valorem taxes of the railroads.

The considerations that moved Judge Boyd to grant requests of the railroads for a stay were: That the methods by which disputed taxes paid to the State of the State of North Carolina can be recovered are not plain, and that, with the tax paid when suit to enjoin its collection is brought to the attention of the United States court, the latter might hold it a moot case and discuss it without hearing. Further, he pointed out, that the two judges associated with him in the hearing of the case were together in granting a stay in the matter of the ad valorem taxes, with which he said he concurred, and the ad valorem and franchise taxes are closely related, the latter being one-tenth of one per cent of the former.

BEGIN PROBE OF
HERRIN MASSACRE

Military Investigation Begins Probe to Fix Blame for Killing of Miners

Herrin, Ill., June 24.—The Military commission ordered by Governor Small to investigate the massacre at Herrin arrived from Chicago today and immediately went to the scene of the wholesale slaughter of non-union miners six miles east of here. The sending of troops has been found unnecessary and inadvisable as the local authorities informed the committee that the sending of troops might complicate the situation and provoke hostility of the inhabitants.

DEMAND FEDERAL
ACTION IN STRIKE

Congress Fully Aroused Over Disorders in Coal Fields and Demand Action

Washington, June 24.—Aroused by the mine members of the congress are demanding that the federal government take immediate step to end the coal strike by legislation creating an industrial tribunal with jurisdiction over production, distribution and consumption of coal.

German Cabinet Member Attacked by Assassin While Returning From Offices

DEATH REMOVES CHIEF LINK OF DEALINGS OF ALLIES WITH GERMANY

Noted Economist Expert Held Confidence of Allies More Than Any Other Man

Berlin, June 24.—Dr. Walter Rathenau, secretary of the German cabinet and one of the foremost economic experts in Germany was assassinated here last night. He was shot to death while returning home from the foreign office in Wilhelmstrasse. The assassin escaped. He is believed to be a Monarchist sympathizer. The death of Rathenau removes the chief link through which amicable dealings had been carried on between Germany and the allies.

Dr. Rathenau, more than any other German official, held the highest esteem and confidence of the allied statesmen.

The assassination was greeted with keenest regret in all countries, especially among members of the allied nations who had been intimately associated with Dr. Rathenau in peace negotiations and other issues concerning issues of paramount importance to the entire world.

THOUSANDS BEING
FLEEED THROUGH
SCHEMES OF FRAUD

Advertisements of Many "Sharps" Are Being Banned From Mails

Washington.—The American public is being misled by many thousands of dollars annually by sharpers who use the mails to lure their victims. Sleuths of the post office department are continually unearthing these schemes of getting money from the unsuspecting public through false pretenses, but by the time the department issues a fraud order denying the use of the mails the birds have flown with many easy dollars of gullible persons.

"Of course these gullible people are to blame for losing their money on schemes that are so obviously a swindle, but apparently they never learn," said a veteran post office inspector. "Every day we turn up some new swindling scheme that is worked through the mails and generally we find that a schoolboy could see the trickery in it. It is a human trait to want to get something for nothing, so that is why tricksters have such an easy time in working their scheme through the mails. When the strong unscrupulous and inadvisable as the arm of the post office department reaches out and puts an end to one of these swindling schemes the trickster who worked it cheerfully proceeds to work out another plan and under another name he sets his net to again lure the unwary."

"It's a great game if you don't weaken," said another inspector, who added that there must be many simple-minded people to fall for these "easy money" schemes.

Fraudulent Schemes Unearthed. One of the boldest fraudulent schemes unearthed by post office inspectors had its origin in Toronto, Canada, and met with unbounded success for a time because the people who responded to the advertisement thought they had found a way to circumvent Volstead law. The record showed that one Paul Morgan, claiming to be an American citizen, went to Toronto and prepared a circular letter, which he mailed to numerous persons in this country.

HOUSE MAY CHANGE
ITS VACATION PLANS

Temper on Part of Some of the Members Produces Accurated Situation

Washington, June 24.—Temper on the part of some of the House members who are dissatisfied with the legislative program may force a change in vacation plans of House leaders. It was announced today, unless the senate also consents to a contemplated vacation of a month or six weeks for House members.

Unanimous consent of the Alabama delegation interested in Ford's lease of Muscle Shoals, who desire to see its acceptance must be obtained before the recess. They object to the proposed delay and have hope of forcing Muscle Shoals legislation to the front with the farm bloc. They are satisfied Ford followers can be overriden in the House.

A broadcasting station will be set up and every agent of the State police kept in constant touch with general headquarters by code messages sent by wireless.

Everyone will be interested in progress which construction of hard surfaced roads is making in this county. Right at this time Farmville and Greenville are connected with one of the best roads of the state. In a short time we will be connected with Ayden, then Bethel. The Ayden road already has passed Winterville and traffic with Winterville is much greater than it used to be. Everyone appreciates good roads, and the sooner the entire country system has been completed the better everyone will like it.

The Greenville white way shows up might find these dark nights and goes to show what the city did in appropriating money for this purpose. There is nothing of greater value to a thriving city than well lighted streets, and never before probably have Greenville people been more directly impressed than since the white way was installed. While the lights are not of the cluster kind, they are sufficient size to brilliantly illuminate the two principal streets. This is all that is necessary and no one can complain.

It seems now that Henry Ford is going to lose Muscle Shoals. The House will very soon appropriate sufficient funds for beginning work at the plant in Alabama and negotiations will then be called to an end. The public will not receive this information with pleasure as everyone is convinced that Ford is more capable of getting the project on a paying basis than all others. He has accomplished something wonderful in past years, and if he should fail to develop Muscle Shoals, then there's not much chance that the government will ever make anything out of it.

Bethel business men are to be congratulated in their effort to establish a government bonded warehouse for the storage of cotton in the future. Such a place will certainly be needed for the cotton sold through the co-operative association, and unless it is there is danger of much of the crop going to the bad. Bethel, however, should not be the only town to establish the warehouse. Every section with the future at heart should get busy and see what can be done before marketing of the present crop takes place. It is to their interest as well as the farmer and unless it is done we cannot expect to make the progress we would under these conditions.

It seems that most of the summer schools of the state are well crowded this season. In fact, it is probable attendance is greater than it has been in years, as teachers are realizing the necessity of taking advantage of every opportunity afforded for improvement. The Teachers college here is one of the largest in the state, especially for the training and preparation of young women, and it is only natural that hundreds of young teachers from all sections of the state should make application for summer courses. The need for higher education was never more apparent and it is pleasing to note that so many young women are taking advantage of the opportunity to improve themselves for the future.

Excessive rainfall of late has resulted in enormous damage to crops of Pitt county and it is probable this year will be worst for the farmer in his lifetime, although there isn't a one who will not recover in one way or another. This is a country of great resources, and no man can be put down to stay unless he is one of the kind ready to yield to circumstances. The majority of Pitt county growers, it is very gratifying to note, are of the resourceful kind and before the year is over there are very few who will not be fully recovered from the damage done by the rain. This county, however, is not the only one suffering. Lenoir, Beaufort, Martin and Edgecombe have also suffered seriously and are probably as badly affected as this immediate locality. We

shouldn't permit this situation to trouble us, however, as we have been signally blessed in past years compared to other sections and have no right to complain.

Everyone will regret to learn of the disorders reported among the miners of the nation's coal fields, as it was hoped the strike would eventually be concluded without either loss of life or property. The situation, however, has become decidedly accentuated at this time and unless something is done things may become even worse. If an improvement doesn't take place within the next several weeks the government should interfere. While this may not be received with general favor on every side, it is about the only way of ever definitely accomplishing anything. It can be seen that the miners are in no mood to yield to terms of the operators, nor the latter to the miners. With this spirit prevailing it is very imperative for some outside sources to come in and see if the issues cannot be amicably concluded. The interference may not be accepted with favor at first, but when the miners are impressed with the necessity for such action there is no doubt they will fail to yield.

Everyone will be gratified to learn of the re-election of General Julian S. Carr as commander of Confederate veterans in annual reunion at Richmond, Va. General Carr is one of the best known figures in the south, and it was only proper that he should again be recognized as the national leader of the Confederacy for which he fought so stubbornly. The ranks of the veterans are thinning with each succeeding year and it was only proper that Richmond honored them tenderly. The cause for which these old men fought was one of the greatest in history and they will leave footprints on the sands of time which will never be obliterated as long as the country exists.

Six tourists were killed at a railroad crossing at Macon, Georgia, recently. This causes us to remember the dangerous crossing in and around Greenville. The city or county authorities should immediately take some action looking to improvements at such places. Either overhead or underground crossings can be provided at the dangerous places at small expense and how much safer the public would feel. Several deaths have occurred in Greenville in past years because of the unprotected crossings, and if something isn't done others are likely to suffer in the future.

The investigation of fraud in the shipping board during the war is destined to meet with about as much success as previous inquiries of the kind. The government is already ready to conduct a probe, but really making findings of any value to the nation seems to be a matter of impossibility. If there was fraud during the war, as there probably was, the time is past for investigating it. In fact, the responsible ones have had time to cover up their trails by this time and if the investigation discovers any irregularities it will certainly accomplish something out of the ordinary.

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TOBACCO GROWERS NEGOTIATE LOANS FOR 30 MILLION

War Finance Corporation Advances Credit Which Assures Safe Marketing

Application for a loan of thirty million dollars to the Tobacco Growers association was approved yesterday by officials of the War Finance Corporation in Washington, D. C., at a meeting with a committee of directors from the largest co-operative marketing association in America, according to announcement made today from Raleigh headquarters of the organization which represents close to 75,000 tobacco farmers of Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina.

In addition to the loan of \$30,000,000 which enable the big Tobacco Co-operative to pay its members cash advances upon delivery of their tobacco, the War Finance Corporation further agrees to re-discount loans secured by green or soft order tobacco for local banks throughout the Virginia-Carolina tobacco belt.

The loan of the War Finance Corporation is to be secured by more than 350,000,000 pounds of its members' tobacco now under five years contract with the Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association, which represents a value of over \$70,000,000 in the first year of operation, according to conservative estimates.

Among the officials of the Tobacco Growers Co-operative association who met with Eugene Meyers, Jr., director of the war finance corporation were George A. Norwood, president, banker and planter of Goldsboro, N. C.; Oliver J. Sands, General manager of the association and president of the American National Bank of Richmond, Va.; James H. Craig, treasurer of the association is Richard R. Patterson, General manager of the Leaf Department, formerly manager of the leaf department of the American Tobacco Company; C. B. Cheatham and F. G. Williams of the Leaf Department and M. O. Wilson, secretary of the board of directors which consists of 22 tobacco planters from Virginia, North and South Carolina, and three

directors named by the governors of those states.

Following the example of the Burley Tobacco Growers Association of Kentucky, which after securing a similar credit from the War Finance Corporation was enabled to gain all necessary funds from State and local banks, and to repay their 90 day loans of \$6,000,000 within 40 days. Officials of the Virginia-Carolina Association are confident of obtaining the support of State and local bankers for whom the offer of the War Finance Corporation opens a new field of profitable co-operation with tobacco farmers throughout the belt.

For the organized tobacco growers and the thousands of farmers from three States who are joining the association every month, the action of the War Finance Corporation assures the safe and orderly marketing of tobacco which resulted in largely increased profits and a new source of credit for Kentucky farmers whose organization has now sold 70,000,000 pounds of tobacco for highly satisfactory prices, during one month receiving an average of 29 cents a pound for tobacco sold through the association, while that sold outside the association brought less than 21 cents per pound upon the auction warehouse floors.

Close to 80 percent of the Tobacco Farmers of Virginia have joined the Marketing Association, and North Carolina growers are nearing a 75 percent sign-up following the recent statewide campaign for members.

A whirlwind campaign among tobacco farmers of South Carolina will

begin next Monday, June 26th and will continue until every one of the 38 co-operative marketing points of the South Carolina belt has been reached with a mass meeting.

Leaders of the movement from Kentucky, Virginia and North Carolina will join this campaign which will mark the last opportunity, for South Carolina farmers to market this year's crop with the giant co-operative.

The Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association has now secured 206 warehouses where it will receive tobacco from its members as the markets open in three states.

BLUE SOX TAKE BEARS IN CAMP BY SCORE 8 TO 2

Thompson Hurls Splendid Game for Greenville, Allowing Bears Only 4 Safeties

If the New Bern Bears had any idea of taking all three games of the present series from Greenville, as they probably did, they were sadly disappointed yesterday when the Blue Sox came back entirely different from the day before and walloped the Bears to the tune of 8 to 2. The game was similar to that of the day before, except that timely hitting was done by the visitors who drove Tobin from the mound in four innings and hammered Lindberg almost at will the remainder of the game.

Thompson pitched a wonderfully effective brand of ball for Greenville, allowing the Bears a total of only four well scattered hits that netted them two runs. Several times, however, the Bears threatened to overcome the lead, but in each instance Thompson settled down and positively declined to yield anything in the way of a hit at opportune moments.

The principal hitting of the day was done by Smith for the Blue Sox and Shirley for the Bears, both slugging the old apple over right field fence for a home run with no runners on base. Shirley's drive came in the second inning, and after that the Bears were unable to send another runner to the checking station until the sixth frame, when another home run was added. Smith's circuit clout came in the seventh inning and apparently gave the Blue Sox new lease on life, as from then on they continued to pound the old apple unmercifully, especially with men on base.

Greenville secured a total of seven hits and three runs off Tobin's delivery and four hits and five runs off Lindberg in five innings. The principal part of the stick work was done by Smith, who was credited with a home run and a double, and Doran, Leftwich and Korting secured a single each. Thompson, Johnson and White succeeded in getting a single each. Shirley, McLean, Morris and Decker did the hitting for the Bears, each being credited with a hit each, Shirley's being for the entire circuit, McLean's a double and the remainder singles.

Thompson struck out four against Tobin and Lindberg none. This was a remarkable pace considering the record of Lindberg and the ability of the Bear players to hit safely at opportune moments. In fact, the tables were turned so quickly that the Bears were taken completely by surprise and were unable to recover in time to overcome the lead which the visitors began piling up at early stages of the game.

The victory gave the Blue Sox three out of four for the week, and as a consequence this afternoon's performance will be more stubbornly contested than any other of the season.

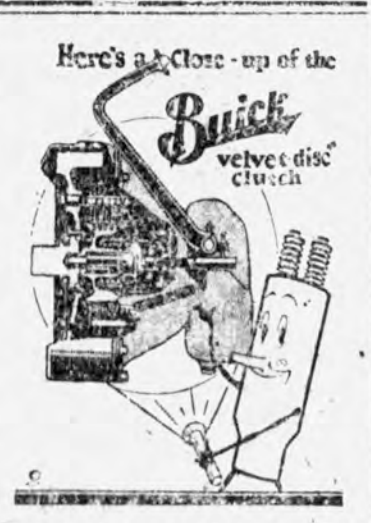

THE HOOKER CONTEMPT CASE

To the Editor: On account of erroneous statements having been made in your news item concerning the Hooker contempt case and headed "Apology Saves Man From Jail," I am constrained to make the following statement:

This case was first heard by Judge Lyon under habeas corpus proceedings and appealed from his decision to the Supreme Court by S. T. Hooker. On account of the relationship of your news item refers to Judge Clark did not sit in this case, and had nothing whatsoever to do with it—the opinion handed down being a unanimous decision of the Supreme Court, Judge Clark not sitting.

I have not asked for an apology from Mr. Hooker in this matter and have received none from him, except by letter which the Governor directed him to write.

I did not oppose the pardon granted, for the reason that I felt to do more than my duty in protecting the court and demanding the proper respect of same, would be vindictive, however I want it to be understood that I was not in any manner a party to any petition or request for a pardon. With me it was not a personal matter at all, but rather a question of demonstrating to Mr. Hooker that he and his money were not bigger than the law and the courts, and through him to the world that we are not going to have anarchy in this country.

There is no doubt that one of the principal contributing factors in my recent defeat for solicitor for the Fifth Judicial District was the money spent in revenge for this official action on my part, yet I have no regrets and make no apology for having done what I conceived to be the official duty of a branch of the judiciary of the state. But further, I am most conscientious in the statement that I have no regret that the pardon was granted and make no criticism to his Excellency, Governor Morrison, for having intervened and exercised his prerogative.
