FOREIGN DOCTOR STUDIES HEALTH PROBLEMS HERE

Dr. Otakar Slanina, of Czech-Slovakia, Finds Many Interesting Things Here

GREATLY IMPRESSED BY PROSPERITY IN EVIDENCE IN CITY

Also Showed Much Interest in Production of Bright Tobacco and Corn Crops

Dr. Otakar Slanina, of Czech-Slovakia, who has been spending the last two days in Greenville studying public health problems under direction of Dr. P. J. Chester, director of the Pitt county health department, left this afternoon for other sections of the state where he will continue his observations. Dr. Slanina is making his tour of the United States under auspices of the Rockefeller Foundation and has been in North Carolina since the first of the present month.

Asked what he thought of Greenville, Dr. Slanina said it is one of the best and most attractive looking towns he had seen in this country and that to people seemed to be thrifty and of the most prosperous type. He was particularly impressed with the well lighted streets, beautiful shade trees and palatial like residences, and declared the people here should be the most contented in the world.

Dr. Chester carried his visitor into all important parts of the county yesterday where he had an opportunity of observing every branch of public health work in progress. While greatly interested in these things, the noted physician exhibited more interest in the type of rural life and verdant fields of tobacco and corn. This was the first time he had ever had an opportunity of seeing tobacco under cultivation, and that he was greatly impressed goes without saying.

Dr. Slanina said the people in the farming communities lived about the same way as in his country. He styled them as "peasants" but noticed that they seemed to be in much better condition so far as resources and financial conditions are concerned. He said the rural communities offer the same opportunity for development of public health, although greater progress has been made in this country than in Czech Slovakia where medical science has been rather slow in advancing because of the thickly populated districts.

Dr. Slanina said the Rockefeller Foundation is doing a great work by giving foreign physicians an opportunity of coming to this country to study the methods used in prevention of diseases. He was particularly impressed with the perfection of organization of the county public health departments and marvelled at the splendid way which the doctors are able to control dangerous diseases.

The visitor had an opportunity of observing many things of interest during the two and a half days he was in Greenville, and the willingness of Dr. Chester to offer him every advantage proved of great value. In fact, he said he was very grateful for the courtesy shown him while here and would not be slow in forgetting the spirit of the people in what he thought the most interesting town in the United States.

MOOSE MEMBER DIES FOLLOWING PLEURISY ATTACK

George Stanley Dies at Goldsboro After Being Stricken With Pleurisy Here

Mr. George Stanley, of Goldsboro, member of the Moose Legion who was taken suddenly ill while attending the state convention in this city last Thursday, died this morning at six o'clock at his home in Goldsboro, according to advices received here this morning. Death was due to complications following an attack of pleurisy.

Mr. Stanley remained at the hotel here until Sunday when he was carried home. He was thought to be on a road to permanent convalescence yesterday, but was taken suddenly worse last night and died within a few hours later despite last efforts of physicians to save him.

News of the death will be received with keenest regret by the hundreds of Moose who attended the state convention here and who were present in the hall at the time Mr. Stanley was taken ill. His condition was not thought to be serious at the time, but during the night the attending physician announced that he had the pleurisy.

Mr. Stanley will probably be buried in Goldsboro this afternoon with high est honors of the lodge which he served so faithfully and exhibited so much interest in. He was about forty years of age and leaves a wife and several other relatives to mourn his loss.

NEGRO TAKEN TO RALEIGH TO AVOID VIOLENCE

Driver of Truck That Killed And Injured People Near Kinston Out of Danger

Elijah Dunn, colored driver of the "death" truck, which killed one near Deep Run Saturday afternoon, was taken to Raleigh yesterday afternoon by local officers, according to information obtained last night from the sheriff's office. This removal of the negro was done to prevent any possible acts of violence, as had been rumored during the day. Feeling in the Deep Run section is still strong against the negro and local officers feared some retaliatory action.

Elijah Dunn, negro driver of a West Construction company material truck which left the roadway one mile from Deep Run, this county, last Saturday, collided with a horse-drawn vehicle, parked in the yard of the home of Tom Hill, a farmer, and killed James Hill, aged 12, and seriously injured Mrs. Julia Anna Smith and a one-year-old infant, walked into police headquarters here yesterday morning and gave himself up, declaring that he wanted to be kept in a safe place pending an inquiry into the accident.

Mrs. Smith, who is grandmother of the dead boy, is at a local hospital in a critical condition, while at least four others, including Mrs. Bertha Hill, mother of the dead boy, and some smaller children are seriously injured. Opinions as to the cause of the fatal accident are conflicting. The driver of the truck, which was loaded with colored laborers returning from the day's work, declares he lost control of the truck, due to a broken steering rod. Witnesses claim that the truck was going at an excessive rate of speed and that the driver appeared to be drinking.

PRESIDENT WRIGHT SPEAKS TO YOUNG GIRLS AT COLLEGE

Delivers Inspiring Message At Y. W. C. A. Services Here Sunday Afternoon

President Wright led the first Y. W. C. A. Sunday evening service for the summer term of East Carolina Teachers College on Sunday. His theme was "Carry the Message to Others," or the responsibility of the individual to others. He used Ezekiel as the example, reading the second chapter of Ezekiel in which the story is told of how he first protested, saying the people did not want the message, but finally accepted, giving one of the finest statements of the spirit of the Christian religion to be found in the Bible. He had learned the lesson that he must meet the responsibility of giving the people the truth of Jehovah, whether they would receive it or not; they have the chance to know. The same responsibility is laid upon us who know. "The more one knows the greater the responsibility."

He took a passage from Isaiah, also, in which is the prophecy about the end of wars, and he showed that this is unusually misinterpreted for the prophet distinctly says that wars will cease "in the later days" when all the people shall have heard the truth about Jehovah's God, and must have accepted his teachings so that the heart of man shall have been so changed that all will be willing to work together for the good of all. The breaking up of the world by the most horrible war in its history has brought the opportunity to the Christian nations to spread the truth. Taking food to the hungry nations, and taking medicines and doctors to the suffering in body gives the chance to help their sick souls.

He brought the message home to the young women before him by letting them see that theirs was the greatest opportunity of all, to spread through their profession, teaching the truth, by leading the coming generation to see the light so that they become true honest, upright men and women. This each generation spreads the truth and brings the great day of peace on earth nearer and nearer.

The Young Women's Christian association is running as a regular organization this summer.

The president and treasurer are both in college this summer, three of the regular faculty advisers are in the summer term faculty, and many of the members have been in college during the winter, therefore the work has been more like a continuation of the regular work of the Y. W. C. A. than ever before.

MILLIONAIRE RED MUST GO TO PRISON

The Illinois State Supreme Court has upheld the conviction of William Bross Lloyd and eighteen members of the reformed Communist Labor Party, and they must serve prison sentences for advocating overthrow of the Government. Lloyd is the millionaire son of the late Henry D. Lloyd, newspaperman, who married a daughter of ex-Governor Bross. Mr. Bross was part owner of the Chicago Tribune. Lloyd was sentenced to from one to five years and to pay a fine of \$2,000.

HARDING TAKES HAND IN TRYING TO END STRIKE

President Entertains Head of Coal Miners at Luncheon to Discuss Issues

EARLY SETTLEMENT HOWEVER IS GIVEN DECIDED SETBACK

Lewis Says Miners Will Insist on Immediate Adjustment of New Wage Scale

Washington, June 26.—Administration efforts to bring about a settlement of the bituminous coal strike met a preliminary check today.

After conferences with President Harding and Secretary of Labor Davis John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, announced that the union policy was still unaltered and unyielding in its insistence that a new wage scale must be set up, for the strike-ridden mining districts by National or semi-National conferences with operators.

The meeting between Mr. Harding, Secretary of Labor Davis and Mr. Lewis, which took place around the White House luncheon table, was the last of a series of conferences into which Secretary of Labor Davis took Mr. Lewis after his arrival from Cincinnati Sunday.

Officially no statement was forthcoming, though Secretary Hoover was called to the White House for a word with the President about the situation immediately after Mr. Lewis left.

Apparently no spokesmen for the mine operators, whose refusal before last April to meet in the semi-national wage scale negotiations of the Central Competitive Field was the controversial point in the strike, were in the Capitol for today's discussions.

Mr. Lewis was first invited to Washington last Tuesday and upon his arrival Sunday was taken to Secretary Davis' private apartment for a protracted discussion, running several hours past midnight, to be renewed later today at the Labor Department.

"We talked over the general problems of the bituminous industry and the strike," Mr. Lewis declared on leaving the White House, "its overdevelopment and territory, and prospects for its stabilization. No definite plans affecting the strike were decided upon. The strike situation is unchanged."

HEAD OF TINIEST NATION ON EARTH DIES AT CAPITAL

Prince of Monaco Well Known in United States Passes After Short Illness

Paris, June 26. — Prince Albert Honore Charles of the principality of Monaco, died here this afternoon at 6 o'clock.

Prince Albert of Monaco, ruler of the smallest principality in the world, within whose eight square miles is the famous international gaming town of Monte Carlo, was well-known in the United States as a sportsman and scientist. One of his old friends was the late Colonel W. F. "Buffalo Bill" Cody, on whose ranch in Wyoming he went hunting years ago.

The Prince made three visits to this country, the first in 1868 as a sailor in the Spanish navy, when he obtained a three months' leave of absence, the second in 1913, when he passed considerable time in the West; and the third in April, 1921, when he received the Alexander Agassiz gold medal from the National Academy of Science and a similar medal from the National Geographical Society for his researches in oceanography.

He was also an enthusiastic paleontologist but held that the sea held few, if any, secrets of the antiquity of man.

One of the Prince's most valuable contributions to submarine knowledge was his charting of the drift of both German and allied mines in the North and English channels. Although for years a close personal friend of the former Emperor of Germany, the Prince, from the beginning supported the cause of the allies. The Germans seized his Chateau de Marchais near Rheims and threatened to burst it unless he paid them a ransom of \$100,000. The ransom was never paid. Just before the armistice, in 1918, the Prince placed at the disposal of the American government his beautiful estate at Monte Carlo where for months from 6,000 to 8,000 American wounded soldiers were brought through rapid convalescence.

LIQUOR CARRYING VESSELS BARRED

Washington, June 27.—All foreign ships will be barred from transporting liquor in American waters if the attorney general upholds the legal interpretation of the Volstead law as presented by lawyers of the prohibition enforcement unit it was intimating today. Commissioner Haynes is pressing the attorney general for a new opinion that will outlaw liquors aboard American vessels and rule that will extend equal force to foreign ships.

EXTENDED SCHOOL TERM DEFERRED

Nashville, June 27. — The movement recently inaugurated here for twelve month school term met a snag this morning when the city board of education considered legal objections of the innovation, one of which was the compulsory attendance law which would keep children in school every day of the year. Action in the issue was deferred pending an opinion of the city attorney. Nashville will be the first southern city to have a 12 month school term if it should be adopted.

SENATE MEMBERS AGREE TO ADJOURN

June 27.—Senate leaders today consented to adjournment of the House July 1 to August 8th when it is expected the senate will reach final vote on the tariff. Opposition to adjournment is coming from advocates of legislation authorizing lease of Muscle Shoals to Henry Ford.

Democrats, it is said, are lined up almost solidly behind Henry Ford and will vote against the adjournment resolution, it indicated by party leaders this afternoon.

TAXES SAID TO BE ON THE INCREASE

(By International News)

Washington, June 27.—Payment income taxes and profit taxes on June 15 will approximate three hundred million dollars, it was originally estimated by experts today. Secretary Mellon said there was no basis for reports that taxes were falling off.

FOURTY AMERICANS HELD FOR RANSOM

Washington, June 27. — Forty Americans and property valued at a quarter of a million dollars owned by the Cortez Oil Company is being held as ransom near Tampico by the Mexican general Corozabe, the state department was advised today. The ransom demanded is said to be fifteen thousand pesos and forty-eight hours is given in which to raise it.

FOUR MEN JAILED IN MURDER CHARGE

Birmingham, June 27. — Cortez Trimble, Bunty Lince, Kimball Thomas and Clayton Barkdale of Limestone county, were jailed here this morning charged with implication in the murder of C. Crawford and wife which occurred January 19th. The men deny the charge. The warrants were sworn out by the brother and mother of the dead man.

PAINTER PRESENTS SPLENDID PROGRAM AT LOCAL COLLEGE

Mississippi State College Professor Entertains With Dialect Stories

Prof. L. G. Painter, who is teaching English at East Carolina Teachers College this summer, gave a delightful program of dialect stories and poems yesterday evening. Prof. Painter who has charge of the English department in the State College at Columbus, Mississippi, is a scholar of note, and has a reputation as a writer and an entertainer.

He has made a careful study of dialect literature. In his program he gave examples of negro dialect, Scotch, Irish, Italian, Pennsylvania Dutch, and rural as used by Shakespeare and others. He gave a series that developed his literary theory and then gave others purely for entertainment.

"Auld Lang Syne" tribute to our own North Carolina poet, John Chandler McNeill, and gave charming interpretations of his poems. He stated that he knows the old thing better well and at first hand many of the selections were humorous.

The Federation of Labor becomes radically inclined occasionally, but the sentiment invariably receives a knockout before making much progress. There are still a number of cool heads guiding the destiny of this great institution, and radicalism will long as they remain cool and with long as they remain cool and with best interests of the public at heart.

Occupation of Haiti is said to be absolutely necessary to uphold the Monroe doctrine. A senate committee investigated conditions and said marine should be retained on the island until law and order have been fully established. Conditions along this line are said to be better than in years, and if this is so continued occupation should bring about even a more favorable situation. It may cost Uncle Sam a tidy sum to carry out the recommendations of the committee, but if it is for the good of the islanders, then no one can possibly object.

Standing armies of Europe are said to be greater today than in 1914, before beginning of the world war. If this is the case, and we have no reason to doubt it, there seems to be plenty room for decreasing expenses by reductions of the various armies. France, Greece and several other important countries are maintaining armies much larger than in pre-war days, and there is no reason on earth for this when Germany's has been cut to one thousand men by order of the Versailles treaty. These countries are said to be badly in need of money. We have no doubt of that, but why not practice a little economy in army circles and experience rapid recovery.

The Eastern Carolina chamber of commerce is exerting every effort for the rebuilding of this section of the state, and has started out by giving aid. Realizing that the farmer is the backbone of the country, the organization means to devote a great part of its time to his welfare. That this is the wise thing to do is not to be questioned. The farmer has never received the attention he should and therefore has failed to develop proportionately to other industries. The chamber has hit upon the right plan—that of promoting the farmer's interests, and should be able to accomplish great things in the future.

The public will be glad to note the improvement in industry reported from the major division of the United States. That the country very soon will get back to normal is not to be doubted in the least, but before this can be accomplished the workman and business man also must learn how to accept conditions as he finds them. This would have improved much more rapidly had this been the case in past months, but since it was not the best thing to do is for the business man to turn his face to the future, with confidence in himself, his business and his fellowman.

Senator Walsh, democrat of Massachusetts, has endeavored to show the public to what extent the tariff would increase the cost of living. While some of his statements no doubt were not based on actual facts, it is believed that he didn't miss the mark as very far after all. It is only natural to expect members of the Republican party to support the tariff, but we haven't yet found a single one capable of advancing any sane reasons for it. They all claim tariff is necessary, but just what part of the business world is in need of it is yet to be discovered. What this country needs is cheaper rates of every kind. Since the tariff will have no tendency of producing anything of the kind it would be the height of folly to experiment when experimentation at the last thing in the world needed. Senator Walsh is on the right track and if he gets proper support the tariff shouldn't have much an easy road after all.

Tells of Achievements of Aldermen This Year

As the town's new administrative year begins July 1st, I deem it only fit and proper to enumerate a few of the undertakings and achievements of the Board of Aldermen during the past twelve months.

By Finance Committee:

1. Complete audit and installation of double checking financial systems whereby all purchases for the town are made by the Purchasing Committee on requisition from the respective committees representing the various departments, and requiring all bills for purchase or other expenditures to be approved by the Finance Committee before ordered to be paid by Board of Aldermen in regular session. Also requiring all vouchers to be accompanied by approved bill and signed by the Mayor, Treasurer and City Clerk.

2. Retirement and cancellation of \$21,000.00 of the town of Greenville bonds.

3. Assumption \$50,000.00 floating indebtedness of school commission, by note.

4. Financing of various city purchases and improvements mentioned below except school debt and fire engine. All financing done by General Fund these by note.

By Street Committee:

1. Purchase and operation of Elgin Street Sweeper with which our paved streets can be kept cleaner than ever. Paid for out of general fund.

2. Pavement of Atlantic Avenue.

3. Pavement of Students Street.

4. Widening Dickerson Avenue.

5. Establishment of School Quiet Zone.

6. General repairs to asphalt pavement, by paving company, and without cost to town.

7. General repairs to Dickerson Avenue, including Norfolk-Southern crossing.

8. Improvement and maintenance of dirt street and drainage of same.

9. Installation of drinking fountains in various parts of town.

10. Establishment of grades and lines for property improvement, including court house square.

By Municipal Building Committee:

1. Renovation of city market building and utilizing same for new city offices and court room, out of general fund.

2. Renovation of old city offices and establishment of police headquarters in same, out of general fund.

3. Renovation of firemen's hall quarters, out of general fund.

By Water and Light Committee:

1. Installation of White Way, financed by citizens.

2. Sewer, water and light extensions in various parts of town, general fund.

3. Survey and plans for general extension during ensuing years.

By Fire Committee:

1. Building inspection, regulation and control by fire chief.

2. Purchase of 1000 feet of fire hose by general fund.

3. Purchase of Triple Combination Fire Engine, (Stutz), by note.

3. Sanitation and Health Committee:

1. Malaria control through mosquito eradication, by half—General fund half.

By Cemetery Committee:

Large water mains laid throughout, general fund.

Contemplated Improvements for Year:

1. Culvert over town branch from 4th street to 4th street, or portions of same.

2. Improvement of Town Commons between 4th street and 5th street and conversion of same into play grounds and park.

3. Pavement of Pitt street from 1st street to River Bridge.

4. Side walk pavement in various parts of town, and general improvements of dirt streets and drainage of same.

6. Extension of water, sewer and lights to all parts of town.

7. Improvement and enlargement of cemetery.

8. Increase in fire hydrants and alarm boxes.

All of the committees have been functioning splendidly during the last year, and to their painstaking efforts is due much credit for the splendid condition of the city's affairs. The public generally does not consider and does not realize what the present Board of Aldermen has done for Greenville in the way of systematizing its affairs and organizing its departments. The respective committees are in control of the various departments and generally speak for the accomplishments in each department are due to the efforts of the committees, especially the chairman. Although the work of the purchasing committee ordinance committee, market committee and etc., does not show in tangible form, these committees have functioned with splendid results that have been very beneficial to the town.

The public's attention is also directed to the excellent condition of our Water and Light Plant and the efficiency of same. This department is administered by the Water and Light Commission and is not under the direct control of the Board of Aldermen.

What has been said concerning our Water and Light department might also be said about our school system. For although our school buildings are inadequate to take care of the present needs the school system is efficient and is rendering splendid service under the direction of the School Board.

The above facts are given for the consideration of those citizens that are interested in the welfare and progress of Greenville, and we trust that they will show more public interest in these matters.

And again: "The true French policy should consist in profiting by the rivalry of the Standard and the assure to France, under the most advantageous conditions, that petroleum production which is not less indispensable in peace than in wartime."

TRADE THIS YEAR EXCEEDS PRE-WAR RECORD

Whatever we may say about our foreign trade in the fiscal year which ends with the current month, its "favorable trade balance" or excess of exports over imports will far exceed that of any year prior to the war. The biggest "favorable trade balance" that we ever had prior to the war, says the Trade Record of The National City Bank of New York, was \$60,000,000 in the fiscal year 1908; \$65,000,000 in 1901, and \$63,000,000 in 1913. In the fiscal year 1914, all of which elapsed before the beginning of the war, the excess of exports over imports was \$470,653,000, and in the fiscal year which ends with this month will be approximately \$1,140,000, or 40 per cent over that of the year preceding the war, and nearly 100 per cent above that of any pre-war year.

The billion dollar line in the "favorable trade balance" was first crossed in the fiscal year 1915 and the excess of exports over imports rapidly mounted during the war to a little over \$2,000,000,000 in 1916, 3 1-2 billions in 1917, 3 billions in 1918, and a little over 4 billion dollars in 1919, dropping to \$2,870,000,000 in 1920 and \$2,800,000,000 in 1921, while for the current year it will, as above indicated, approximate \$1,140,000,000, all of these figures relating to the fiscal years.

"Favorable trade balance," adds the Trade Record, have been the rule in our foreign trade since the development of our great Mississippi Valley as a producer of the foodstuffs and manufacturing materials which the world requires, and of our factories which supply the big increase in our exports of manufactures. In the long period from 1790 to the beginning of 1874 imports almost continuously exceeded exports; since the beginning of 1874 exports have almost continuously exceeded imports. In 70 of the 84 years from 1790 to 1874, imports exceeded exports; in 44 of the 48 years since 1874, exports exceeded imports. The excess of imports over exports from 1790 to the beginning of 1874 was, in round terms, \$2,300,000,000, while the excess of exports over imports from the beginning of 1874 to date exceeds \$31,000,000,000.

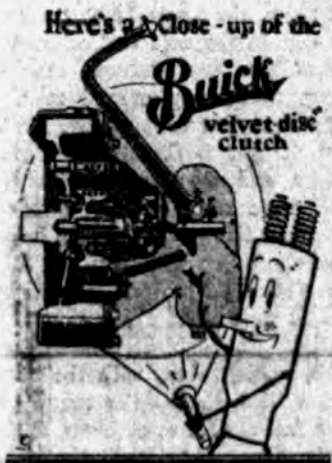

BLUE SOX TRIM HIGHWAYMEN IN INITIAL CLASH

Buck Edwards went the entire nine innings for the visitors and found his work of the up-grade kind every inning with exception of the first and eighth when the Blue Sox failed to tend a runner to the checking station. He yielded a total of fourteen hits two of which were triples, one double and the remainder singles. However, he would probably have come out better if his teammates had fielded better behind him, but they were unable to do this and the Blue Sox had their way about things practically every inning.

Beall appeared on the firing line for Greenville and probably never showed up to better advantage. The visitors at no time threatened to overcome the definite lead which the locals began piling up in the second frame, and the "Iron Man" had them feeding from his hand in every inning with exception of the sixth when a single by Edwards, errors of Crawford's drive at second by White and Webb's single netted them a total of two runs.
