NEAR EAST RELIEF CAMPAIGN MAKING PROGRESS IN CITY

Greenville People So Far Have Contributed \$753.83 of The \$1,800 Quota
METHODIST CHURCH PHILATHEA CLASS CONTRIBUTES \$360.00
Churches Expected to Give Home Service Department Liberally to the Great Cause Next Sunday

Considerable progress has been made in the Near East Relief campaign in this city since Monday and this morning Chairman Jim Applewhite reported that total contributions amounted to \$753.83. The quota provided for Greenville is \$1,800 and with this splendid start Chairman Applewhite is hopeful of raising the entire amount by Sunday when the churches are expected to contribute liberally to the great cause.

The campaign will be continued the remainder of the week with greater interest than ever before and those who haven't contributed are urged to get in touch with Chairman Applewhite or Treasurer Waldrop at the Greenville Banking & Trust Company. The names of contributors will be published in the columns of the Daily Reflector every day so the public may be kept informed concerning the progress made from day to day.

The cause is one of the greatest which American people have had an opportunity of contributing to in years. Thousands of men, women and children of the Near East countries are in terrible plight and doomed to die from disease and famine unless we help them. Everybody is appealed to and it is hoped they may give so freely that the quota will be over subscribed by several hundred dollars or more.

MONTHLY MEETING OF RED CROSS IS SPLENDID AFFAIR

Reports of the Various Committees Occupy a Greater Part of the Session
WOOTEN PRESENTS FULL REPORT OF THE MOTOR CORPS
Churches Expected to Give Home Service Department Liberally to the Great Cause Next Sunday

The regular monthly meeting of the executive committee of the local Red Cross chapter was held in the office of the executive secretary Tuesday afternoon at three-thirty. Splendid reports were made by the treasurer, and the chairman of Motor Corps, Life Saving Corps, Community Sing, First Aid and Home Service. Mr. A. B. Corey stated that the life saving corps had been doing excellent work, several of the members had passed all examinations and that a charter would be applied for soon. The next community sing will be held at the East Carolina Teachers College. It will be combined with the annual county sing, which was inaugurated last year under the direction of Prof. C. W. Wilson. Different organizations will be asked to take part and it is hoped that all will co-operate to make this annual affair a great success.

Dr. W. I. Wooten presented his plan for the work of the First Aid committee. The Life Saving Corps wants the course given during the summer. There probably will be others who will want to join this class next fall it is hoped that classes can be held in the High school and college.

The Home Service work, under the direction of Prof. H. E. Austin, is being well taken care of. Last month there were 165 cases and 38 office calls.

Several cases which have been brought before the executive secretary were reported by Miss Hubbard. She also extended an invitation from Ayden to a community in that town to be held next Friday night. The next meeting of this committee will be held Tuesday, July 24th at three o'clock.

PROPOSE MINE OPERATION BY THE GOVERNMENT

Washington, June 28.—A resolution directing the government to take over and operate all coal mines of the United States for a period of one year was introduced in the House today by Representative Burke, Republican of Pennsylvania. Government operation under the Bank resolution will be directed by the president who will be authorized to adjust the present wage controversy to the satisfaction of the miners involved, sell coal at cost of production plus reasonable profits for the operators.

HIGHWAYMEN AND BLUE SOX CLASH IN DOUBLE BILL

Two Clubs to Pull Off Double Header at Fair Grounds This Afternoon at 2:30

While there were many disappointed people in Greenville yesterday as result of the postponement of the Kingston and Greenville game, these same folks returned home happy because of the prospect of a double bill between the two clubs here today. Both clubs are in fine trim after the day's rest, and the outlook for two of the best games of the season was never more favorable, unless rain should again prevent.

Kingston people by the scores were here to see the game yesterday because of the stinging defeat administered by the Blue Sox the day before, and it is probably rooting would have been more pronounced than in any game of the season. The rain that fell shortly after three o'clock so completely submerged parts of the diamond at the fair grounds that it made playing impossible. Still the sun came out about four o'clock and shone brightly the rest of the afternoon, and many persons, not knowing the condition of the diamond, contended the game should have been played.

Considerable interest is centered around the two games today because the Highwaymen and Greenville are tied for third place in the standing of clubs. While the locals found Kingston decidedly easy to defeat in the opening game Monday, they realized the visitors were slightly off and that the sluggish fielding would not continue all the time.

While clouds drifted over the sky all the morning it was quite evident at the noon hour today that the first game would be started and probably completed before interrupted by rain, if any interruption should occur. The fans are hopeful this will be the case anyway, as another postponement would throw the clubs greatly behind.

PARKER BOY WINS SILVER LOVING CUP AT CANTON, OHIO

Horse Owned by W. H. Dail Wins Cup and Splendid Purse in Races

Pitt county people will be interested in learning that "Parker Boy", race horse owned by W. H. Dail of this city, carried off first honors in the races recently held at Canton, Ohio, and received a silver loving cup in recognition of his speed. "Parker Boy" circled the track at 2:10 1-4 and led the other contestants by a comfortable margin.

The cup was awarded by Mr. H. H. Timberlake, manufacturer of auto bearings, being won by Mr. Dail who is one of the largest automobile distributors in North Carolina.

The victory of Parker Boy not only resulted in the winning of the silver loving cup but a purse of several hundred dollars. The races were probably the largest attended of the entire circuit, and the Eastern North Carolina horse today holds a warm place in the hearts of sport lovers of the north west.

Messrs. Dail and Smith have a number of fine race horses in action this summer, and the majority probably will be seen in action at the Pitt county fair this fall. A number of other noted racers will also be entered here as the fair races this year will be of greater interest than ever before.

HARRISON DENIES G. O. P. ECONOMY IN HEATED SPEECH

Attacks Speech of Senator McCormick and Flays Other Allegations of Party

Washington, June 27.—The recent statement of Senator McCormick, of Illinois, chairman of the Republican Senatorial campaign committee, presenting administration claims of economies, was attacked in the Senate today by Senator Harrison, Democrat, Mississippi, and defended by Senator McCormick.

The Mississippi Senator said Senator McCormick had his "facts all wrong" and "ought to make an apology to the Senate and to the country." Senator McCormick responded that Senator Harrison had presented only part of his statement and that he "had nothing to qualify" in his original statement.

Senator Harrison particularly criticized statements of Senator McCormick comparing appropriation estimates of the Democratic and Republican administration, claims that the Republicans had paid off \$1,000,000,000 of national debts and the claim to a reduction of taxes. Senator Harrison said a Republican newspaper had attributed to Senator McCormick that the Harding administration had "saved" \$7,000,000,000 as compared with Democratic appropriation estimates. The latter, Senator Harrison explained, were made during the war, were reduced voluntarily by department heads when the war ended unexpectedly and yet, Senator Harrison asserted, the reductions were claimed as "Republican savings."

MULE KILLED IN CRASH WITH AUTO NEAR GREENVILLE

Charlie Little Has Narrow Escape From Death When Thrown From Buggy

Sheriff Dudley is today seeking an unknown man with a Ford automobile who last night ran over a mule and buggy driven by the fifteen year old son of Charlie Little, on the Ayden and Greenville road, about four miles from Greenville, killing the mule almost instantly, smashing the buggy to pieces and painfully injuring the boy. While no definite clue had been obtained until the noon hour today Sheriff Dudley believes he has the right person spotted and will probably make an arrest during the afternoon.

How the boy driving the mule escaped without being instantly killed or injured for life is considered short of a miracle of those who later visited the scene of the accident and viewed the gruesome tragedy. The road was literally covered with blood from the injured mule. The animal was cut so badly about the throat and head that it bled to death a short time after the accident.

Young Little had just made a trip to Greenville to bring farm hands employed on his father's place. He was returning home when he saw the car approaching at a rapid rate. He is said to have pulled out of the road as far as possible, but the driver of the car apparently wanted the whole road and collided with the mule and vehicle, precipitating the boy several feet from where the collision occurred.

While the windshield of the car was shattered by the impact, the man failed to stop. In fact, the youngster said he shot the gas to his car and sped away even faster than he approached.

The car is believed to have contained a load of contraband whiskey, and the man was in such hurry to reach Greenville in safety that he decided not to stop for fear of detection. The law is after people who wilfully violate the highway speed laws, Sheriff Dudley said, and every effort will be made to bring the guilty one to justice.

DAKOTA ELECTION CREATES INTEREST

Washington, June 28.—Official and political Washington watched with absorbing interest today the North Dakota Republican primary where Senator McCumber, chairman of the powerful senate finance committee, is fighting for his political life against Lyan Frazier, member of the non-partisan league and former governor. TO TAKE FEDERAL ACTION IN STRIKE

(By International News.)

Washington, June 28.—Vigorous federal action to establish a truce in the coal mine war and to refill the nation's almost exhausted coal bins will be taken before the end of the week, according to opinions in administration circles. The White House and commerce and labor departments observed silence regarding the issue this morning.

It is believed, however, that President Harding will be able to bring the strike to an end through the joint conference under governmental direction.

MUST HOLD BACK WAGE REDUCTIONS OR MEN WALK OUT

Intention to Call Out 400,000 Shopmen July 1st Revealed in Telegram Today

LENGTHY DISCUSSION PRECEDES DECISION TO CALL THE STRIKE

Shop Crafts Demand Restoration of Certain Conditions Before Yielding

Chicago, June 27.—A strike of the 400,000 railway shopmen of the country will be called for July 1 unless the railroads agree to stay the \$60,000,000 wage cut due the shopworkers on that date and to restore certain working conditions formerly in effect, it was made known tonight through a telegram from B. M. Jewell, head of the shop craft, to the association of Railway Executives.

Decision to call a strike came late today after a lengthy discussion by the executive committee of the six shop crafts unions based on the strike vote of the men thus far tabulated.

Should the rail heads arrange an immediate conference, agreeing meanwhile to continue present wages, restore working rules modified by the Railroad Labor Board and discontinue farming out railroad work, however, a walkout can be averted, the telegram said.

Otherwise, a sanction of withdrawal from employment on July 1, 1922, as voted by the employees, will be unavoidable.

The 2,500-word telegram, addressed to T. DeWitt Cuyler, chairman of the association of Railway Executives, threw no light on the actual strike vote beyond saying it was an "overwhelming majority." Ballots were still coming in, it was said, as they were not returnable until June 30. A two-thirds majority is required by the union by-laws to call a strike.

Although the actual call for the walkout was made dependent on the railway executives' reply to President Jewell's ultimatum, little expectation was expressed in railroad circles tonight that the executives would agree to such sweeping demands as those made by the unions.

Six international union presidents, forming the executive council of the mechanical section, railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, were responsible for the strike decision. Closed for two days in secret session, they remained silent on their actions until tonight.

HARDING RELEASES MANY PRISONERS

(By International News.)

Washington, June 28.—President Harding today approved recommendations of the department of justice that will release a considerable number of political prisoners, it was learned today. There are some ninety-six more inmates of the federal prison who will be given their freedom under provision contained in the recommendations.

Greenville, June 28, 1922

William Rockefeller, brother of John D. Rockefeller who died recently, left from a hundred to two hundred and fifty million dollars, according to latest statements issued today. While immensely rich the brother never did as much good with his millions as John D. He seemed to be immersed in looking out for himself and letting others do the same thing. John D., however, has given away millions in his day and it isn't surprising that he should be worth much more than the brother.

The chamber of commerce is urging the appointment of committees in each city to prevent increased prices of coal during the prolonged strike. If the committee should be able to accomplish anything of benefit to the public, then everyone will be glad to see them get busy, but on the other hand they are going to do nothing more than wrangle and discuss matters, we can't see the advisability of organization. Constructive criticism and action in the right direction should result in something of benefit to the public, and if this is what they mean to do, then we approve the plans.

The public will be glad to note that the administration at last has made a definite move looking to settlement of the coal strike. The railroad strike is threatening as it is, and with industry suffering from paralysis in both sources the country would indeed be faced with one of the most serious situations in its history. President Harding should have taken steps to settle the issue long ago, but since he did not it is hoped he will hit upon the right plan in the beginning and avoid the impending strike of railroad workers.

Foreign ships will be barred from transporting liquor in American waters, according to the latest statement issued from prohibition headquarters. Attorney General Daugherty will be asked for another ruling in the case, and it is believed the distribution of liquor on the high seas will be prevented. That this will be impossible unless some action of the kind is taken is indubitable. The sale of whiskey will continue as long as it is permitted to be carried on American water, and the sooner something is done the sooner the traffic will be dealt the knockout blow.

Senate leaders have consented to adjournment July 1st, but Democratic members desiring immediate action on Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals are going to do everything possible to prevent it until this matter has been acted upon. Whether Ford's supporters will succeed is yet to be seen, but there is one thing certain, and that is—adjournment is inevitable, especially since the Republicans are supporting it. The public isn't particularly interested in the matter, although there are many who would be delighted at some definite action in Ford's offer. However, whether they do or whether they do not, the senate will keep on grinding after adjournment and everything will come out in the wash, whether they have any washing or not.

The reserve coal supply of the nation is diminishing with each succeeding day and unless the strike is settled within the next few weeks the situation in all probability will be the most accentuated the country has witnessed in years. The miners have been out several weeks now, and the supply of coal on hand is lower than it has been in years. Unless production becomes normal within a comparatively short time things will be more serious than ever before and efforts to avoid a serious situation will be ineffective. The administration should have taken a hand in the strike long before this time, but since it did not about the only thing the public can do is to stand quietly by and watch prices as they continue to mount skyward. All the organization in the world can't prevent inflation if the supply becomes seriously short, and it will be futile to organize expecting to accomplish anything.

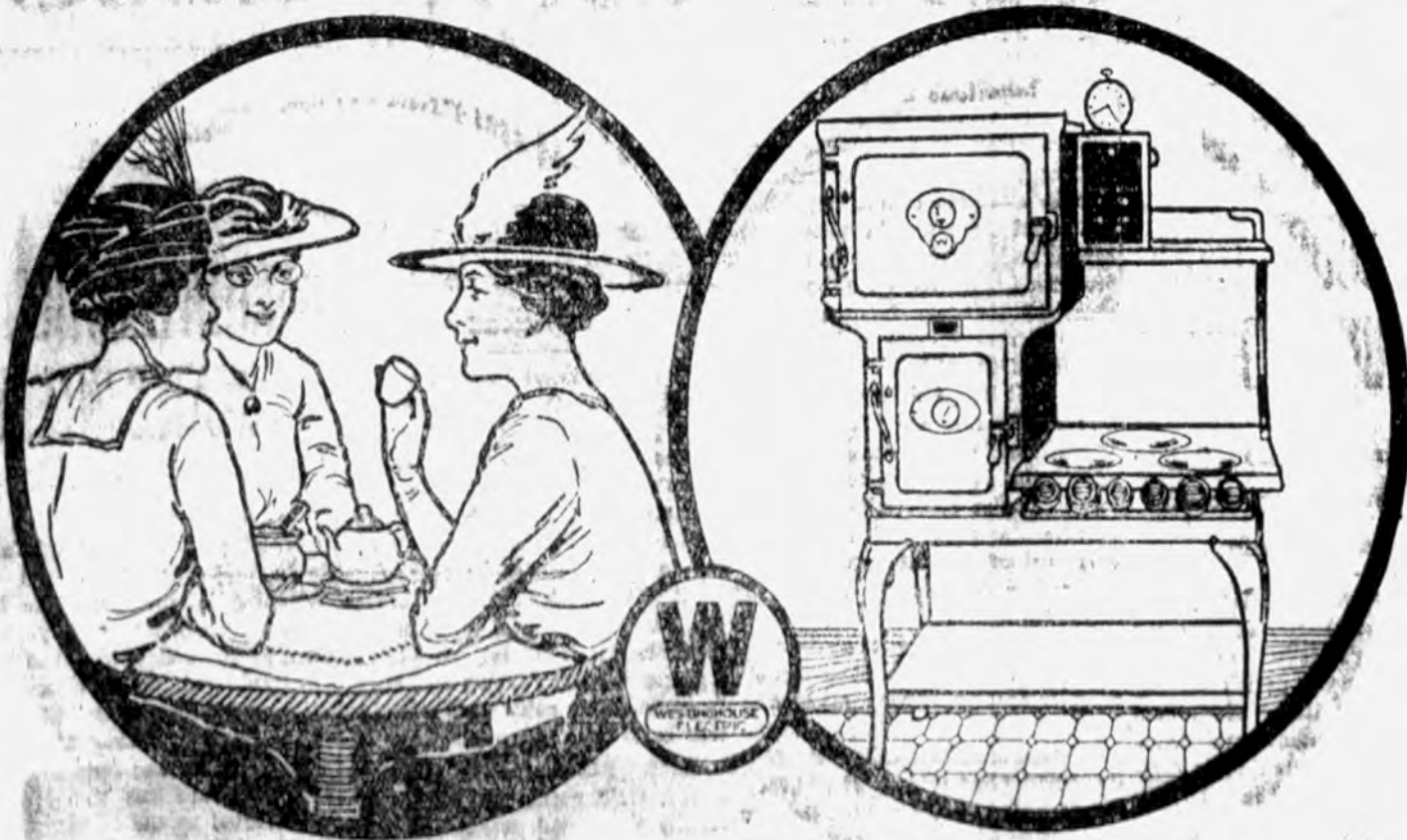

**EXPERTSTELL HOW TO
JUDGE EGG QUALITIES**

Washington, June 28.—Do you know how to tell the quality of an egg without breaking the shell? It's as simple as blinking your eyes, says Department of Agriculture experts.

All you need, they say, is a paste board box, with a hole one and one-fourth inches in diameter, a strong light such as is given by a lamp or an electric-light bulb, a dark room and, of course, the egg.

Hold the egg close against the hole. The strong light will render its contents visible, and you can ascertain the egg's quality by the appearance of the yolk, the white and the air space at the blunt end. Then compare the egg with charts furnished by the Department of Agriculture and you will know, without breaking the egg, whether or not it is fresh.

This process is known as testing eggs by candling.

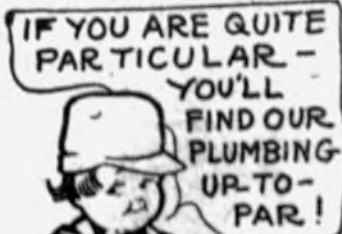

REORGANIZED ARMY OF RUSSIA NOW IS FORMIDABLE FORCE

Trotsky's Fighting Machine to
Be Dreaded, French Writer
Tells Readers

Paris, June 28.—From an impotent, disorganized body, camouflaged as formidable, the Red army has become a force genuinely to be dreaded, according to Paul Erio, writing from Moscow to the Journal. And the man who is responsible for the change, according to the French correspondent is Leon Trotsky.

Formerly, M. Erio writes, the Soviet Government had at its disposal only a few thousand well trained men, which it trotted out on parade for propaganda purposes. Since Trotsky became Minister of War and Marine in 1918, however, the Red army has been entirely reorganized. Czarist officers have been induced, sometimes by threat, sometimes by bribery, to train the men; other officers have been imported from Germany, and arms and supplies have been assembled from all over the world.

The classes of 1890, 1920 and 1901 now serving under the colors number 1,370,000, to which must be added a militia of 500,000. At the end of April the Red army possessed a million and a half rifles, more than 2,000 pieces of light artillery, 500 to 600 pieces of heavy artillery, about 10,000 machine guns and from 500 to 600 cartridges per gun. A supply of airplanes is being furnished by Berlin.

A feature of the new army is the elegance of the officers' uniforms, according to M. Erio. Instead of gold braid, red braid is worn, and this assumes curious designs according to the taste of the individual officer. Privates wear a uniform similar to that worn by the Czarist soldiers, but with a queer khaki cap, pointed and adorned by an enormous red star.

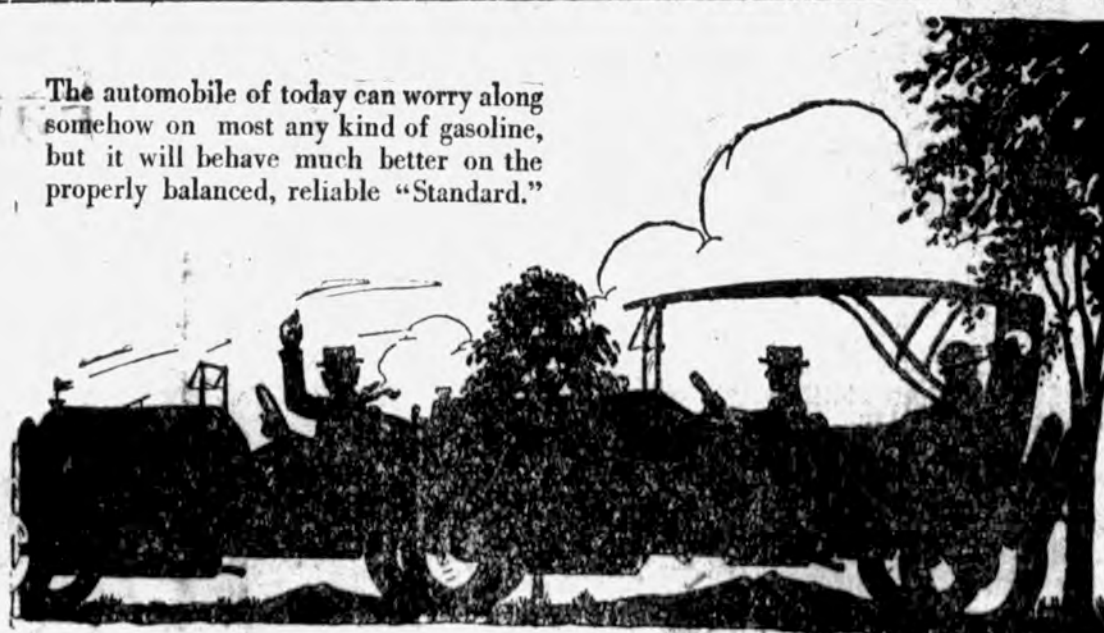
