SHOPMEN TO STRIKE SATURDAY

RAILWAY EMPLOYEES PLAN TO WALKOUT ON STRIKE SATURDAY AT TEN O'CLOCK UNLESS DEMANDS ARE MET BY THEN

Executives to Hold Final Meeting With Labor Representatives Tomorrow

SHOPMEN DEMAND THAT WAGE REDUCTIONS BE COMPLETELY IGNORED

Practice of Farming Out Shop Work Will be Completely Abandoned Today

(By International News.)

Chicago, June 29.—Railway shopmen throughout the country today began extensive preparations to strike at ten o'clock Saturday morning in response to an official call sent out from headquarters of the railway employers' department of the American Federation of Labor.

Executives of leading railroad assembled for a meeting at two o'clock this afternoon to consider the ultimatum sent out by the shopmen demanding that wage reductions ordered by the railway labor board be ignored until old working rules have been restored.

The practice of farming out shop work will be completely abandoned, it was stated from authoritative quarters.

While several methods have been suggested to avert the impending strike nothing of any definite nature had been accomplished until the meeting this afternoon and the railroad workers are determined to stand behind their guns. Leaders are seemingly puzzled over present conditions and the outlook is anything but favorable.

The situation is truly serious and unless something is accomplished in the eleventh hour the strike will be inevitable.

GOVERNMENT MAKES FINANCIAL RECORD

Washington, June 29.—The government's ledger for the fiscal year tomorrow shows the best financial record since the war, treasury officials announced this afternoon.

Within a year the public debt has been reduced nearly a billion dollars and government expenses have been restricted to below the federal income. New financing plans by the treasury assured gradual retirement of the public obligation. Plans for further economies are forecasted and another cut or two in taxation is also indicated.

She is survived by her husband and a little son.

The interment took place this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Farmville cemetery.

Another Cotton Blossom.

CONGRESS TO KEEP HANDS OFF STRIKE

Washington, June 29.—Congress will maintain a "hands off" attitude in the great coal mine strike until President Harding is given ample time to bring about peaceful settlement, leaders declared today.

Although a resolution calling for a joint congressional investigation of the mine dispute is before the house, it was stated this afternoon that no action would be taken at present. The senate is also averse to taking any action pending the outcome of the conference of the President and mine operators Saturday and nothing will be done until after then.

COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE WILL CONSIDER AMENDMENTS TO WAREHOUSE SYSTEM LAW

Senator Harris, of Georgia, Urges Eight Changes in Measure

Washington, June 29.—The House Committee on Agriculture is expected soon to take up the eight amendments to the United States Warehouse Act proposed by Senator Harris of Georgia, and already agreed to in the Senate. The main amendment broadens the warehouse act to make it possible for the storing of any agricultural product, in the discretion of the Secretary of Agriculture, instead of only cotton, wool, grain, tobacco and flaxseed, as provided in the present law passed in August, 1916.

The Harris amendments would remove the present limit of one year for licenses to warehouses, extend a system of licensing persons to inspect and sample products, increase the penalties for violation of the law and make it possible for a farmer suffering from losses through wrongdoing to receive payment as a penalty as well as the forfeiture of the bonds of warehousemen.

Senator Harris said nearly all legislation now proposed for the extension

HARDING TO MEET COAL OPERATORS AND MINE HEADS

Sends Invitations to Various Men Requesting Them to Attend Meeting

PLAN TO DEVISE METHODS TO END GREAT DISORDER

Conference Will be of a Preliminary Nature But Full of Real Work

Washington, June 28.—Invitations went out from the White House today asking the leaders of the striking miners and the representatives of the employing coal operators in both the bituminous and anthracite fields of the United States to meet President Harding Saturday "to devise methods upon which negotiations for the settlement of the coal strike can be initiated."

The communications made evident to spokesmen on both sides of the industrial struggle had preceded the meeting call and prompt and ready acceptance are expected.

John L. Lewis, chief of the United Mine Workers, who remained in the city after a personal interview with the President, accepted at once in behalf of the union.

of rural credits and assistance to agriculture possessed features touching on the eligibility of Federal warehouse receipts, and it was necessary the warehouse act be made as broad as possible to render the greatest possible assistance to farmers.

Will Reduce Insurance

"When a warehouse becomes licensed under the Federal act the patrons of the warehouse will enjoy a 25 per cent reduction in insurance rates, and the warehousemen themselves will be granted a reduction of 25 per cent in such rates on both the warehouses and their equipment," said Senator Harris. "The benefits coming to the warehouses under licenses are many, and the rapid progress in the past two years shows the licensing provisions are being seriously sought by warehousemen.

"Such agricultural products as cotton seed, peanuts, beans and other things may be stored if the Harris bill becomes a law. In Georgia and the South as a whole diversification of crops to get away from cotton entirely has brought stimulated interest in crops other than cotton."

BLUE SOX TO PLAY DOUBLE BILL WITH FARMVILLE FRIDAY

Bears to Appear Here for Single Game Saturday Afternoon, Ending Week

Farmville and Greenville will engage in the second double header of the season tomorrow, the first game to be played at the fair grounds in this city at ten-thirty and the second game at Farmville in the afternoon at four o'clock. Much interest is centered around the two games because of the tie between Greenville and Kinston. If Greenville wins and Kinston loses to Washington the Sox will be in unquestionable possession of first place, but if they lose Kinston will take the honors.

After the game in Farmville this afternoon the Blue Sox will return home and tomorrow morning be in fine trim for the first game of the double bill with the visitors. The Farmers will not come over until tomorrow morning, but the short ride over good pavement will not tire them enough to prevent their usual fast fielding and fierce work with the willow.

While the Farmers have suffered severely at the hands of the New Bern Bears recently, the team has a number of acquisitions, who are expected to make a much better showing against the Sox. In fact, it is claimed they have a catcher capable of handling the "mighty" Gibson to perfection, in which event the Sox may expect to be well entertained.

The Sox, however, will not be outdone in the way of acquisitions as "Monk" Frazier's time on the bench will be up tomorrow and he will be seen in action against the Farmers. It may be that the Farmers will pit Gibson in the game pitched by Beall, and if this should be the case fans may be assured of a battle royal. At least, that's what the old heads say and they may be considered perfectly reliable.

After the double bill with the Farmers the Sox will meet the New Bern Bears at the fair grounds here Saturday afternoon. The Bears have practically the same lineup as last season and may be counted on to furnish the best kind of entertainment. The lineup is the best in the league when viewed on a piece of paper, but three seems to be some doubt about them on the field. Anyhow, a good game is assured and those who attended will not be disappointed.

It is charged that Daugherty is responsible in a letter to Secretary Mellon.

BYRD IS CHARGED WITH RUNNING OVER AND KILLING MULE

Amos Byrd Held Under Bond Until Preliminary to be Given Probably During Week

Amos Byrd, white man residing near Greenville was today arrested and later released under bond, charged with being the person who Tuesday night with a Ford automobile ran over a mule and buggy owned by Mr. Charlie Little, of near Greenville, cutting the mule so severely about the neck that it died a short time later. While vigorously denying the charge, Byrd will be held under bond until a preliminary hearing before a magistrate probably during the week.

It was first stated that Mr. Little's fifteen year old son was driving the mule and buggy when hit by the car alleged to have been driven by Byrd, but Mr. Little stated this morning that this was a mistake, as it was a negro boy employed on his place. While the buggy was literally smashed to pieces and the mule killed the boy escaped with only slight injuries. This fact is considered short of miraculous by those who visited the scene of the tragedy yesterday and viewed the pavement on which the mule bled to death.

It is alleged Byrd was seen in Ayden about half an hour before the smashup, which occurred on the Ayden road about four miles from Greenville, and that he told someone he was coming to Greenville. There have also been several other facts brought to light in the investigation by the sheriff, and the preliminary hearing will be watched with considerable interest.

While Byrd is being held under bond largely through suspicion, the officers will keep their eyes open, and do everything possible to obtain further evidence. If it wasn't his car that ran over the mule, the officers are determined to find out whose it was and to bring the guilty party to justice.

FIFTEEN KILLED IN DUBLIN DISORDER

(By International News.)

Dublin, June 29.—After a lull of several hours, fighting between Republican irregulars and Irish Free State troops in this vicinity was renewed with greater fierceness than ever before today.

The stronghold of the irregulars was under artillery fire. The rebels have mounted machine guns on roofs of public buildings and are still in possession of four court fronts.

The dead was this afternoon estimated at fifteen and wounded at about forty. Indications are that the civil warfare will continue at least several days before peace can be restored.

LITTLE HAZEL VAINWRIGHT BURIED YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

The death of little Hazel Vainwright, the 17 months' old baby of Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Vainwright occurred Tuesday afternoon about two o'clock at their home about three miles from Greenville, funeral services being conducted from the home and interment made in the family burying ground yesterday at three-thirty o'clock.

The child had been ill for three weeks, but her condition was not thought to be serious until Monday when she became critically ill, death resulting from colitis. The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the bereaved parents.

CAPTIVES GIVEN THEIR LIBERTY BY MEXICAN BANDITS

Advices Received by the State Department Say No Ransom Has Yet Been Paid

AMERICAN EMBASSY OBTAINS FACTS OF THE ENTIRE AFFAIR

Member of Party Kidnapped by Bandits Makes Escape After Bandits Plan Death

(By International News.)

Washington, June 29.—The forty Americans and quarter of a million dollars worth of American property belonging to the Cortez Oil Company which was seized near Tampico by Mexican bandits, have been released, according to official advices received at the state department today.

Bruce Bielaski, who was one of the members of the party kidnapped by the bandits escaped and made a detailed report of the situation to the American embassy. He arrived last night, and said that he escaped from the Mexicans after over hearing plans to take his life. No money was paid to the bandits as ransom, and it is believed the information given the embassy by the escaped member of the party will enable the government to bring about the release of other members of the party.

HIGH COST OF GAS AROUSES WRATH OF CONSUMERS

Citizens Ask Governor's Aid in Removal of Service Commissioners

New York, June 29.—Is it possible that New York City, having the latest rapid transit systems in the world, the "last word" in most public utilities and consumption capacity, which very size should guarantee the efficacy of the "quantity production" theory of economy, possesses "the most antique method in America" of producing common illuminating gas? This is the charge made by the City Parliament of Community Congress, in asking Governor Miller to "fire the chairman and the other four members of the Public Service Commission."

The irate consumers declare that in spite of the fact that gas is manufactured on a larger scale, materials are purchased in larger quantities and all other conditions are at least equal to those of other cities, the price of gas in New York is far in excess of that charged in most other municipalities in the United States—in some cases being most twice as much.

The Community Council members allege that the basic discrepancy in the New York process is the employment of the twenty-two-candlepower unit, which, they aver, was adopted primarily for the purpose of furnishing gas for lighting purposes. With the advent of electricity, they argue, and the development of the gas mantle in such places where gas is still used for lighting the use of gas for heating and cooking purposes has become paramount. Because of this they urge the adoption of the British thermal unit—the basis employed in thirty-five states of the Union.

President Harding approves the release of political prisoners held in the Atlanta prison and has signified his intention of helping them to get their freedom. Whether this spirit will be received with favor throughout the country yet remains to be seen, but whether this is so or not the president feels he has done his duty by his fellowmen.

Vigorous federal action to establish a truce in the great coal strike is now under way at Washington and the public may eventually have the pleasure of learning that amicable settlement has been reached. That this would be great news to everyone is not to be doubted in the least, and if there is any chance of bringing the issue to a close we hope it will, and that as soon as possible. The public is worried out with strikes and other forms of labor disorders and the sooner it is brought to an end the better everyone will like it.

Official and political Washington exhibited more than usual interest in the North Dakota election yesterday where Senator McCumber, head of the powerful finance committee of the senate, was running for his life against a stronger contender representing another party. No wonder the Republicans were interested in the outcome of the fight, as the more of their leaders are defeated the weaker they become. They will watch all other elections with interest, and especially the general election when the party will come nearer meeting defeat than ever before, except in a very few instances.

President Harding is hopeful of bringing about amicable settlement of the coal strike, but whether he will really succeed remains to be seen. The situation is as serious today as it has ever been before, and the president probably may find the issue more complicated than expected. The miners contend they will not strike a lick unless terms of their agreement are met, and if they live up to this assertion there isn't much prospect of the president accomplishing anything. It may be, however, that the operators will agree to the advance, in which case, the issue will be brought to a conclusion with every one satisfied.

It is gratifying to note the progress which the Near East Relief campaign is making in Greenville and the liberal way which people are contributing to the great cause. That our people are truly interested in the suffering people of the Near East is very evident by their liberality, and before the campaign is over it is probable the entire quota will be oversubscribed. The cause is one of the greatest which our people have had an opportunity of giving to in years. In fact every five dollars will maintain one child for a month. Six dollars will keep it for a year. The Philanthropic class of the Jarvis Methodist church did a handsome thing when they raised enough money to provide for six children for an entire year. If other classes and organizations would become as interested and show their appreciation of the cause as plainly, then Greenville would make a better showing than any town of its size in the United States. Everybody should rally behind the movement and endeavor to make Greenville outstrip all other towns in the state in the size of funds.

SAPIRO'S CAMPAIGN

Dear Sir:

I wish to congratulate you upon your recent editorial on Sapiro. It was alright and to the point. But some of our Wilson warehousemen should have saved you the trouble and either individually or collectively have gotten after this fellow before now and let him know that if he is running a "so called farmers or-

ganization" that he must do his work in a decent and gentlemanly manner and not undertake to build up his institution by appealing to prejudice and calling men "Hypocrites and Wolves," etc., who are far his superior.

I have been in the warehouse business 40 years and am known considerably around Wilson, Greenville, Sanford and South Carolina and I do not relish the language that is being slung at warehousemen and it will not do his organization any good, and is an insult to decency and unbecom- ing to any gentleman to try to array the farmers against many of the best men in the state.

I went not long ago to hear Mr. Sapiro and I went with an unprejudiced mind and came away thoroughly convinced that it was not an organization that I could advise my friends to go into, but to the contrary to keep out of it. Some of my reasons are:

1st. It is a contract all one way, it binds only the fellow who puts in his tobacco.

2nd. The time that it can be held legally is for 5 years.

3rd. It gives them the right to do as they please with it and the farmer has no say so in it.

4th. A farmer loses all identity to his tobacco and holds nothing in lieu, therefore, except a slip with their grading mark and the pounds upon it.

5th. They are buying on credit many million dollars worth of property and lots of it that is known as dead warehouse property, thus investing the farmers money when many of them can now scarcely meet their obligations on account of the general business depression of the country.

I have heard Mr. Sapiro use this language: "I say to you people of South Carolina, that if South Carolina should sign up only ten thousand pounds of tobacco, every warehouse this association buys will be paid for, there is enough signed up in North Carolina and Virginia to pay for all the warehouse property bought in South Carolina." This was the language that completely turned me against the organization. Binding the peoples' tobacco to make investments without consent. This same kind of law is what caused the tea to be thrown over board in Boston Harbor and brought on the Revolutionary War.

I say now to all my friends, you better know what you are doing and look into this carefully before you sign your tobacco when you can sell it at good prices and get the cash the

same day. Mr. Sapiro may do his talking, but there is one fact that he cannot get away from, that is the law of supply and demand.

They have been hammering at cotton 12 months before they ever touched upon tobacco and I have never seen any good that has been done the cotton planter. The recent heavy rains all over the cotton belt including several big cotton growing states has stimulated the price a little, because it brings supply and demand face to face. It has also affected the tobacco crop in a great measure and Sapiro will likely claim the benefit for his association.

Very recently I see where they (claim) to have borrowed 30 million dollars from the War Finance Board and pledged (350,000,000) pounds of North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia tobacco to pay it back. See what your tobacco is bound for? There are a few men possibly that can stand this and do without their money, but what is going to become of the little fellow when it comes his settling time? Now Mr. Sapiro has been throwing mud and bricks and I will simply throw a little sand in his eyes. I have some very good Jew friends and they are good fellows, but as a rule you farmers have more confidence than I have to put that much faith in Mr. Sapiro. He has an excellent opportunity to be a Tobacco Millionaire and settle down in a nice California Orange Grove. He is a sharp, slick Jew, and you better keep your eyes open and stay out.

Of course the farmers have a right to pool their tobacco and I have a right to open a warehouse to sell tobacco. I have this right without being called a hypocrite and I for one warehouseman do not propose to swallow such language, and I say in conclusion to all my friends, you had better do some solid thinking before you sign away any of your rights to do as you please with anything you have for sale. I point you to conditions before any tobacco was raised in Eastern North Carolina, look at Wilson county, what made it one of the best counties in the state? answer, tobacco and the open market. Look at Moore and Lee counties and the Apex section, see the wonderful development in the past ten years, what did all this? answer, tobacco and the open market. I could fill a book along this line, but think I have said enough.

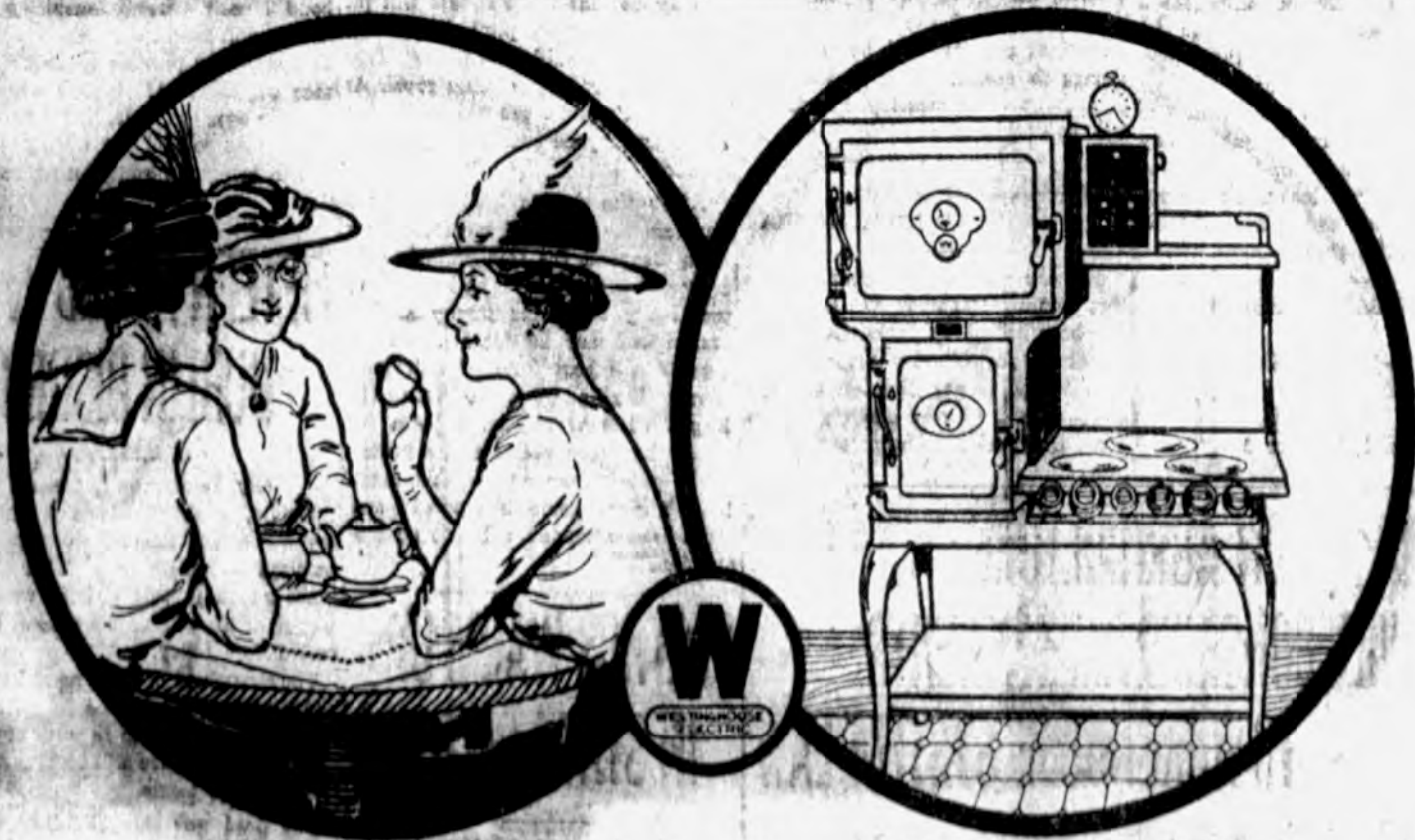

BLUE SOX DIVIDE DOUBLE BILL WITH THE HIGHWAYMEN

Kinston Runs Away With First Game 14 to 4, Blue Sox Tak- ing Second 3 to 1

The Blue Sox made it two out of three from the Kinston Highwaymen by breaking even in the double header at fair grounds here yesterday afternoon. The first game, which was nothing more than a comedy of errors and poor pitching for the local club, was won by Kinston by score of 14 to 4. In the second game the Blue Sox recovered and won by the score of 3 to 1. Thompson held the Highwaymen to one scratch hit and no runs until the seventh frame when a couple of doubles enabled them to shove the single runner across the rubber.

Never before probably have the Blue Sox fielded so poorly as they did behind Loach in the first game. The visitors pounded the ball almost at will, and were able to pile up a lead of five runs in the first three innings. This seemed to take the pep out of the entire club and in the seventh a total of nine runners were sent to the checking station, increasing the score of fourteen. In this disastrous inning twelve Highwaymen faced the Greenville hurler, nine of whom crossed the plate in perfect safety despite a desperate effort on the part of Loach to recover and stem the tide of victory.

"Dick" Evans, on the other hand, found himself on easy street practically throughout the entire game, and at no time was really in danger. Only in the sixth, seventh and ninth frames did the Sox show an inclination to pound his offerings, but these rallies were of a slight nature and only netted them a total of four runs. Loach started the run getting in the sixth with a single, later scoring when Gibson threw wild to second. Smith singled in the seventh and scored on a crashing two base drive to left field by Leftwich. An error of White's liner by Weik and singles

by Smith and Leftwich in the ninth netted them the other two tallies.

A triple by Phillips, double by Gibson, singles by Thrasher and Adams and a hit batsman, free pass to first and error by Doran netted the Highwaymen a total of nine runs in the fifth inning, after five tallies had already been checked up to them. They succeeded in amassing exactly eleven hits, one of which was a triple and four doubles off Loach in the entire nine innings. While Evans yielded only eight, two of which were for extra bases.

The Blue Sox got the sweetest kind of revenge in the final game, however, as Thompson had the visitors at his mercy and at no time was in immediate danger of being scored upon until the seventh frame when it began raining. Pitching under this great disadvantage retired the Highwaymen in this inning with one run and two doubles. This increased their hits to four, the first two being of the scratch variety.

Heicher started out to do mounds duty for the visitors and breezed along fairly well until the third when singles by Keating and Thompson followed by a triple by White and singles by Smith and Leftwich netted the locals three runs. Beard relieved the unlucky Heicher and succeeded in checking the tide of victory and preventing further scoring and timely hitting.

The final game was as pretty an exhibition as anyone would want to see, and although the first affair might have been ragged it was exactly what Kinston people had been desiring as sweet revenge for the stinging defeat administered by the Blue Sox the day before. Greenville fielded errorlessly in the final game, while the visitors were only accredited with two. The Highwaymen pulled off three double plays in the first game and one in the last. The Sox were credited with one.
