RAILWAY MEN STRIKE

RAILWAY SHOPMEN REPORTED TO BE LEAVING SHOPS AT JACKSONVILLE, AUGUSTA AND SEVERAL OTHER CITIES

President Harding Warns Workmen That Government Will Protect the Public
WAGE REDUCTIONS BECAME EFFECTIVE DURING MORNING
Trains, However, Will Be Kept Running, High Officials of Roads Said Today

(By International News.)
Washington, July 1.—While a kindly worded speech was sent out this morning to leaders of the coal mining industry, operators and workers by President Harding, admonishing them not to strike and to try and seek a prompt solution to the strike, workmen were reported to be leaving the shops in several places today.
The president's message was in the form of a delicately worded warning that if they fail to comply with the labor board's decision that the government would be compelled to administer for the common good industry and the American people.
He didn't mention federal control by name, but adopted a more delicate way of putting it. He made it very clear, however, that the administration is keeping its steel hand in velvet gloves.

THREE THOUSAND STRIKE AT JACKSONVILLE, FLA.
Jacksonville, Fla., July 1.—Approximately three thousand shopmen walked out here today in accordance with union demands that the strike go into effect this morning at ten o'clock unless their demands were met.

THOUSAND WALK OUT AT AUGUSTA SHOPS
Augusta, July 1.—Approximately a thousand men struck here this morning as a direct protest against wage reductions which went into effect this morning prior to the time the strike orders were issued.

FIRST DISORDER OCCURS IN CHICAGO DISTRICT
Chicago, July 1.—The first word of disorders in connection with the rail strike was contained in the report to the police here today that several hundred Mexicans were concentrating at camps at Rock Island and had started rioting with strikers. Reserves were sent to quell the disorders.

WAGE CUTS EFFECTIVE AT TEN THIS MORNING
Chicago, July 1.—Wage cuts aggregating approximately a hundred and thirty-four million dollars and affecting more than a million railway workers became effective on all roads here today by order of the railway labor board.

In protest of the action approximately four hundred thousand shopmen were called to strike this morning at ten o'clock. Serious interruption of traffic, however is not anticipated, as the strikers are most from repair shops. It is likely the situation will come up in the senate for discussion shortly.

Trains will be kept running and the public will be protected in the strike, high railroad officials stated this morning.
Train service not interrupted anywhere.

Mobile, July 1.—Approximately eight hundred shopmen called out here.

RELIEF CAMPAIGN IS MAKING SLIGHT PROGRESS IN CITY

Committee This Morning Reported Only \$700 Pledged Towards \$1,800 Quota
Jim Applewhite, chairman of the Near East Relief campaign in Greenville, stated this morning that the public had failed to rally behind the movement as it should and that failure was starting the committee in the face unless the next few days witnesses greater liberality. So far pledges amounting to approximately \$700 have been secured. The Greenville quota, however, is \$1,800 and the committee is two hundred dollars short of even half the amount.
Chairman Applewhite stated that the funds would probably be given a favorable boost by contributions from various churches tomorrow, but this is not expected to be sufficient to complete the required amount. The Philanthropic class of the Methodist church up to the present time has made the most liberal contribution of any other institution in the county, and it is probable the ending of the campaign will still find the main lead. The class gave \$360 which is enough to support six children for a period of one year.

The public is urged to give as liberally as possible within the next few days so the campaign may be closed. It was hoped to bring it to a close the end of this week, but such slight progress has been made that the public will be given several days grace in which to redeem itself.

Failure to raise the quota would be received with general regret at state headquarters where hard working men and women are exerting every effort to relieve the despair and suffering existing among the famine stricken people of the Near Eastern countries. Committee members realize the seriousness of the situation and their tireless service is given that civilization may be saved from the horrors of starvation and disease.
Practically every other city of the state has already raised its quota and Greenville cannot afford to remain in the rear ranks of progress. It was stated this morning. In fact, those who really realize the frightful conditions in European countries cannot deny the appeal and it is to such people that the suffering people will have to look forward to for relief.

TWO MEMBERS TO COMPLETE TESTS IN LIFE SAVING

Six Men Completed Other Requirements in Test Last Thursday Evening

The Red Cross Life Saving Corps, A. B. Corey, chairman, Bert Greene, captain, had only two members, Robert Wright and Will Whedbee, who had completed the entire test and written essay on "Resuscitation" when David J. Yates, Southern Red Cross Division manager, of the department of the first aid and life saving, was here.

Thursday afternoon six men completed all "carries," disrobing in the water the necessary surface diving bringing up the ten pound weight and handing in the essay. They were L. T. Avery, S. H. Cooper, Bert Greene, Will James, Dave Whedbee and E. I. Moye, making eight men to date who have passed. Dr. W. I. Wooten, M. J. Moye, C. D. Tunstall, Pat Foley, W. L. Whedbee, Ralph Riddick have completed practically everything except the essay. So far no girls have passed. The corps wishes everyone to know that they are interested in swimming as an exercise for all ages and it was unanimously decided at their last meeting that they wanted everyone to feel that they had perfect liberty to ask anyone wearing the Red Cross insignia to teach them. On July 4th the corps will be glad to be of service to any special group who wish to have them present if they will notify A. B. Corey or Bert Greene.

ADMINISTRATION IS SQUARELY BEHIND RAIL LABOR BOARD

White House Spokesman Sets Forth Government View in Plain Manner
MUCH CONCERN FELT OVER FLOUTING OF BOARD LAST NIGHT
Officials Do Not Regard Traffic Tie Up As Immediate Possibility

Washington, June 30.—The administration, speaking today through the White House on the eve of the called strike of 400,000 union railroad shop workers, declared its determination to stand squarely behind the Railroad Labor Board. It is because of the decisions of the Labor Board that shop craftsmen have decided to quit work at 10 a. m. tomorrow.

The administration's view, set forth in language as forcible as the spokesman could command, was that the Labor Board is the one agency of the government dealing with disputes between the railroads and their employees and, therefore, its decrees must and would be backed up by the government.

"The Labor Board is the government when it speaks," is the way the spokesman summed up the administration view, adding that this view held whether the board's decision drew the protest of labor organizations because they involve cuts of wages or whether they were protested by the railroads because they required the management to desist in contracting out repair work to private shops. The determinations of the board, the administration further was asserted to hold, are by the delegated authority of congress and a field definitely marked out in the law of the land.

The administration pronouncement was made just a few minutes before there occurred in Chicago what Chairman Hooper, of the Labor Board, declared to be a flouting of a government body by B. M. Jewell, head of the railway department of the American Federation of Labor, namely, the refusal of Mr. Jewell and some of his colleagues to appear in answer to a summons of the board, and whether the administration view went so far as to take further action was therefore a question open for the time being. The general belief, however, was that as the Transportation Act clothed the labor board with no powers to enforce its decisions, there were no steps left for the government to take at this stage except to maintain its stand behind the board's decisions.

RUINS OF CLIFF HOMES USED TO MAKE VIOLINS

Aztec, N. M., July 1.—Valuable violins are being manufactured from wood taken from the ruins of cliff dwellers, near this city.

While excavating recently Carl Morris, research investigator for the Smithsonian Institution, found a number of perfectly preserved timbers which are believed to have been used in constructing the homes of the cliff dwellers.

The timbers were estimated to be over a thousand years old, and due to the dry, hot climate that prevails in the vicinity of the ruins, the wood has become so well seasoned that high-class violins are being made from it which have a tone, it is said, equal to that of an instrument that has been in use for a number of years.
The instruments are all of fine quality and are bringing high prices.

HOUSE ADJOURNS UNTIL AUGUST 15 DESPITE PROTEST

Democrats Oppose Adjournment But Fail to Prevent Republican Plans
MAKES EFFORT TO GET FINAL ACTION ON FORD PROPOSAL
Last Moment Efforts of Supporters Fail to Get Results With House Members

Washington, June 30.—The House of Representatives adjourned tonight at 9:49 o'clock until August 15, thus giving members opportunity to return home to look after their campaigns while the Senate is still at work on the tariff.

In opposing adjournment, Democrats insisted the House ought to stay in session and act on Henry Ford's offer for lease of Muscle Shoals.

On objection by Representative Montague, Democrat, Virginia, Mr. Mondell failed to get through a request that all members be given five days in which to extend their remarks into the congressional Record on any subject relating to legislation.

Democrats, opposing adjournment almost solidly, forced a roll call and the vote to quit was 171 to 43, with two voting "present."

The Democrats, having voted with their fingers crossed indicated "I now move that the House be adjourned," said Representative Mondell, the Republican leader.

That was a shout and wild race to taxicabs waiting outside to rush the members to outgoing trains.

Declaring that lease of the Muscle Shoals nitrate plant to Henry Ford means "more to the farmers than to all the legislation in their interest enacted at this session of congress," Representative Aswell, Democrat, Louisiana, urged the House tonight to act on the Ford offer "before running away from Washington."

Mr. Aswell pressed Representative Mondell, the Republican leader, to agree on the fixing of a date for consideration of the Ford proposal by the House.

FREIGHT BILL TO BE GREATLY CUT

Washington, July 1.—The nation's freight bill will be reduced approximately two hundred and fifty million dollars under the new rates which become effective today.

FRENCH LABOR TO SUPPORT SOVIETS

Paris, July 1.—The French Federation of Labor today voted to support the Moscow and Soviet and Bolshevik principles of government, it was stated by high officials of the government.

CLOSE RACE WILL FEATURE PRIMARY IN COUNTY TODAY

Indications at Noon Hour Pointed to Neck and Neck Race for Sheriff
The second primary to be held in Pitt county for the purpose of nominating a sheriff and several constables, got well under way at the usual hour this morning and voting had made considerable progress at the noon hour today. The race between Amos C. Jackson and R. E. Corbett, who pulled the largest vote out of a field of 11 candidates in the first primary will be one of the hardest fought witnessed here in several years and indications at the noon hour pointed to a comparatively close vote.

The woman vote is expected to figure largely in the present campaign because it is realized that the sheriff's office is where law enforcement really begins. The support of the first candidates is pretty well divided between the two in the race today and the outcome is a matter of much speculation.

There was not a man in the county at the noon hour today or at two o'clock for that matter who could venture even a rough estimate concerning the outcome of the race, as the strength of the two candidates was so well divided in the first primary that it is impossible to say which will come out at the big end of the horn.

Supporters, however, made favorable claims for their respective candidates this morning, but at the noon hour the most definite information obtainable at the polls indicated the race would be a neck and neck affair. It was the same in the race for constable between Thad J. Williams and Mr. Savage and not until the votes are counted tonight will the public know who is the winner.

RUSSIAN OIL DEAL IS HOAX, DECLARES ENGLISH OFFICIAL

Russia Cannot Supply Oil to World, Asserts Urquhart
(By International News.)

London, July 1.—"The world has been hoaxed over the supposed Russian oil deal," says Leslie Urquhart, oil adviser to Lloyd George at Genoa, and chairman of the British Oil Importers Association. "Half my life," Urquhart goes on, "has been spent in the oil industry in Russia, so I am in the position of knowing as much about Russian oil as most people. The world wants oil, but it looks to Russia for it, now or in the immediate future, it will look in vain. Russia cannot supply it."
"The talk about Russia giving us all the oil we want is a myth."
"Before oil can pour out of Russia rivers of gold will have to pour in."
"No more dramatic change has ever been witnessed than the change which occurred in the Baku oil field with the coming of the Soviet regime. The production dropped from 7,000,000 tons a year to 3,000,000 tons and it has remained at 3,000,000 ever since."
"In 1917 there were 3,700 oil wells producing oil in Baku; today there are not 500 wells producing oil."
"To maintain the former production Russia had to drill 750,000 feet of new wells every year. The Russians are now drilling in a year what they previously drilled in twelve days."

DEPTH CHARGE USED TO RECOVER DROWNED BODY

London, July 1.—A depth charge, the most potent weapon used in the destruction of German submarines, was used to find the body of James Anderson, of Accrington, who had been missing for several weeks.
The police had dragged the water without success and then resorted to the depth charge. The body floated to the surface immediately.

FOREST FIRES TO BE DISCUSSED AT MEETING MONDAY

Protection of Forest From Fire to be Principal Matter Discussed
GEOLOGICAL SURVEY OFFERS SUM OF \$500 TO ASSIST IN WORK
County Will be Asked to Provide Similar Amount Employ Forest Wardens in Future

A meeting of Pitt county citizens will be held at the county court house Monday, July 3 at 11 o'clock.
The purpose of the meeting is to determine whether or not the people of Pitt county wish to co-operate with the state in combating the forest fire menace.

A fund of \$500 is offered to the county by the State Geological and Economic survey for this purpose, provided the county will put up an equal amount. This would provide a fund of \$1,000 which will be spent in employing forest wardens on part time during the periods of the fall and spring when the woods and grass are very dry and when the damage to the forest occurs.

The duties of the wardens will be to inform the people of their districts in regard to the penalties provided by state laws for letting fire escape and also to summon into court those who are guilty of such infringements of the law. At the present time this happens to be nobody's duty and the result is that carelessness in the use of fire out of doors for all purposes is becoming so flagrant that the entire wood supply of Pitt and other counties throughout the eastern part of the state is seriously threatened with total destruction.

W. Darrow Clark, chief forest fire warden of the State Survey will be present at the meeting Monday to explain further details of the work and enlighten the public as to what may be expected.

Here is an opportunity for the county to afford protection to one of its fundamental resources at one half cost and surely all citizens seriously interested in the future welfare of the county should attend.

The damage to the forests of the county during the past year alone has been estimated at a half million dollars, a sum sufficient to pay for the proposed protective plan for five hundred years.

Refusal by the county to provide for a reasonable amount of forest fire insurance is an unwise and foolish policy, a policy which saves at the signet and wastes at the bung.

FORTY KILLED IN DUBLIN FIGHTING

London, July 1.—Total casualties occurring in Dublin fighting were this morning estimated at forty killed and one hundred and eighty wounded, according to a report received from the Central News Agency.

The railroad workers should have set the strike for July 4th, so they could remain on the job one day then go back in next morning and tell the boss they were merely celebrating the Declaration of Independence instead of union independence.

Congressional investigation of the kidnapping of Americans by Mexican bandits was demanded in a resolution introduced in the House yesterday. This seems very unnecessary now the Mexicans have released the people. If they have extra money to spend for investigations they had better place it at the disposal of those fellows trying to solve the coal strike.

Mount Mitchell is the highest mountain in the east, according to government experts, and threatened war between North Carolina and Tennessee over which has the highest mountain has been set aside. Tennessee contended that Mount Leontes was higher than Mount Mitchell, and could not be convinced otherwise until the government decided to relieve the indecision and establish the height of each peak. It was found that the Carolina mountain is exactly 131 feet higher than that in Tennessee, and the difference was determined by one who didn't favor either state.

President Harding and members of his cabinet are due to discuss the coal strike with the miners today and if the president has ever talked we hope he will do it today. The miners' representative no doubt are in a frame of mind for settling the strike and by the right kind of persuasion the chief executive should be able to bring the issue to a conclusion. The time for such action was never better, and if something favorable isn't accomplished here are due to face one of the worst winters in years. The situation may be materially improved anyway if the government will take possession of the mines and operate them until the miners reach some agreement. If the strike continues any longer this should be done, and as soon as possible.

The victory of Lynn Frazier over Senator McCumber of North Dakota has caused considerable confusion in the camp of old guard Republicans and right at this time they are unable to see their way clear of accomplishing several things that held places nearest their hearts. The defeat of Senator McCumber is indeed a blow the party will feel in the future, and if they recover, as they probably will after awhile, the fight won't be soon forgotten. The victory of Frazier is direct repudiation of the Republican program of economy of which Senator McCumber was such a strong representative. In fact, he is the very man who originated the McCumber tariff idea, and this popular measure of the Republicans no doubt also featured in his defeat. Tariff, like Mr. McCumber, isn't needed by the country just now and if the Republicans can be definitely convicted of the fact they should get along much better in the days to come.

With the world facing a cotton famine within the next two years, it looks like the staple might demand a pretty fair price this year. If it does not the grower should hold what he raises as long as possible and wait until the famine really comes. The situation has been discussed among the most prominent leaders of the country, and all agree that prices should show greater strength for the next two crops, if not longer. It stands to reason that insistent demand for a product should result in price improvement, and farmers who follow to argument to the contrary will be the ones to receive the same old prices. Other countries are short of cotton supplies than they have been in years and it will be up to the American farmer to supply

them with their needs. There seems to be a period of prosperity in store for the producer of the fleecy staple and the south should derive great benefit from the predicted famine.

That developments will take place in rapid succession during the debate of the coal strike between miners and operators at the White House is not to be doubted in the least, as the representatives of both factions have something in their breasts they would like to give the world. The miners quite naturally feel like they are receiving bad treatment at the hands of the operators and the operators feel like the miners' demands are now what they should be. As a result what they will bring about in discussion at the White House should prove interesting to the public, although it is true we are getting tired of hearing the issue continually repeated. The operators are glad to continue the strike as long as the miners desire to remain out. They believe this will give them greater opportunity of raising prices, even though the government says some means of price adjustment will be decided upon to save the public. The outcome of the meeting of the two factions will be awaited with greatest interest, and if it has anything to do with ending the strike the public will be even more interested.

BLUE SOX DEFEAT FARMERS IN BOTH GAMES YESTERDAY

Loach Pitched Sox to Victory Over Gibson and Two Other Hurlers by 14 to 1 Score

The Blue Sox came back at Jim Holden's Farmers in old time form yesterday and won both games of a double header as easily as if the Farmers had not been on the war-path. The first game was played in Greenville yesterday morning and ended by the score of 4 to 1. The second was played in Farmville in the afternoon and resulted in an overwhelming victory by the score of 14 to 1. Beall hurled the first game for the Sox and found himself on easy street in every inning, except the ninth when a couple of hits coupled with an error resulted in the Farmers' only score.

But the first game is history so far as readers of The Reflector are concerned, and everybody is interested in how the Sox managed to snow under Jim Holden's crew in such a deliberate way. It was done, however, as easily as any ball game in the world has ever been won. Loach appeared on the firing line for the Sox and positively declined to yield the Farmers more than seven hits, most of them being well scattered except in the first inning when the only runner was sent to the checking station. Gibson started out on the mound for Farmville and everybody was anticipating great things. But the Sox began hammering the old apple in the very first inning and sent five runners to the checking station before the premier Farmer hurler could get his bearings.

In fact in three and at third inning they amassed a total of eight runs and nine hits off Gibson who was relieved at this juncture by Walker who yielded up four runs and three hits before the side could be retired. Snead relieved Walker who succeeded in momentarily delaying the slaughter. The Sox, however, weren't to be denied and before Snead completed his five and two-third innings he had been touched up for two runs and six hits. Gibson, however, was checked up as the losing pitcher.

Along with Greenville's heavy stick work the Farmers made a total of eleven errors against the Blue Sox four. Never before probably did Jim Holden's outfit prove so completely helpless before the onslaught of a visiting club and when the smoke of battle cleared away the scoreboard had the Farmers credited with a goose egg in every inning except first when they sent their only runner to the checking station.

The disastrous work with the willow for Greenville was done by Smith, Carson and Frazier. That "hitting fool" Smith out of six trips to the plate secured a circuit clout and three doubles. Frazier was credited with a double and two singles and Carson three singles. Stringfield and Duncan were credited with two singles each, with Loach, Massey, Doran, and Leftwich being credited with singles.

Farmville had eight men left on bases for the entire game against Greenville six. While the Farmers several times threatened to score their attempts were weak and ineffectual.
