OPENING OF EASTERN CAROLINA TOBACCO MARKET POSTPONED UNTIL AUGUST 15TH; GREENVILLE TO HAVE THREE SETS BUYERS

J. Frank Brinkley Announced Decision of Warehousemen at Richmond

ALL TOBACCO MAKERS AGREE THAT 15 WOULD BE BETTER THAN 8TH

Postponement Believed to be of Especial Benefit to Farmers of Section

Eastern tobacco markets, of which Greenville is one of the largest, will not open for the sale of leaf tobacco until August 15, according to an announcement received this morning from J. Frank Brinkley, president of the Eastern Carolina Tobacco Warehouse Association. This decision was reached at a joint session of members of the Eastern Carolina Warehouse association and the Tobacco Association of the United States who were recently in session at Richmond.

The opening was first announced for August 8th, but after discussing the matter from every angle it was unanimously decided that it would be for the best interest of the farmers to postpone it until August 15th. This will throw the opening exactly one week later and should give the farmers and tobaccoists more time to prepare for the opening days. In fact warehousemen, from Wilson, Kinston, Farmville, Rocky Mount, Robersonville and Greenville all agreed to the change and signified their favor at the meeting.

Mr. Brinkley stated that all the large and small buyers were consulted, and that all were favorably impressed with the postponement. The Greenville market will have three sets of buyers, and every effort will be made to serve the growers more efficiently and faithfully than ever before.

DECLARES TOBACCO PRODUCTION WILL BE MIGHTY SHORT

The Reflector this morning received an article from Mr. O. L. Joyner, prominent tobacco man of this city, giving his opinion concerning the situation in this section at the time. He believed the article carried in Friday's Reflector was inclined to be misleading, and desires to express his opinion which is based on observations made during a recent trip through the tobacco growing community.

I was very much surprised at your article in Friday's paper, giving such an encouraging outlook for the tobacco crop in this section of the state. I was surprised because I had only on Friday morning just returned from a trip through the very heart of the tobacco territory of eastern North Carolina, namely, Pitt, Greene, Wilson, Lenoir, Wayne, Nash, comprising a territory that normally produces around 150,000,000 pounds.

In my opinion this particular territory will not this year produce 75,000,000 pounds. You may have seen or had information of conditions from other sections justifying your report, but if so, the public in general and the tobacco farmers in particular are interested in knowing the facts, and as one of the latter class I will appreciate it if you will publish the same as your information and the territory covered. We would not like to have prices for our tobacco this year based in advance of the opening of the market as is the general rule on such information or mis-information as that contained in Friday's paper.

Your article on the tobacco situation are generally re-published in the Tobacco Journals, and you can therefore see what injustice might be done by misleading information as to the crop conditions.

LITTLE PROGRESS MADE IN PLAN TO END THE STRIKE

Bituminous Operators and Miners Remain Deadlocked After Day's Conference

Washington, July 2.—Operators and miners of the bituminous fields remained deadlocked tonight after another day's session of the joint conference called by President Harding and admonished to reach a basis for negotiating a settlement of the strike with measurable promptness.

Meeting from 2 o'clock to 4 o'clock today with Secretaries Hoover and Davis, each side voted down the proposal of the other for a basis of negotiation and adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow. Meanwhile, operators and miners are to meet separately to consider methods of solving the problem of the coal industry.

Upon adjournment of today's session, the operators returned to their hotels while the miners remained in the conference room at the Red Cross building with Secretary Davis.

Official report of today's proceedings was made public by Secretary Hoover in the form of a statement agreed upon by himself and Secretary Davis as follows:

"The operators voted down the proposal for conferences between miners and operators in the Central Competitive field alone. The miners voted down the proposition for independent conferences between miners and operators in each district. Upon suggestions for further separate conferences of operators and miners for further consideration of methods, the joint conference adjourned until Monday at 10 a. m."

BUSINESS HOUSES TO CLOSE IN CITY FOURTH OF JULY

Daily Reflector to Also Suspend Publication for the Day; Two Games

Practically all stores and other business enterprises will close in Greenville tomorrow in observance of the Fourth of July. The Reflector will also suspend publication for the day so its employees may take part in activities of the holiday. The two principal features of the day will be the double header to be played between Greenville and Washington. The first game will be played in Greenville tomorrow morning at ten o'clock and the second at Washington at four in the afternoon. As Washington is the strongest team in the league and Greenville striving hard to gain first place more than general interest is centered around these games and it is expected the largest attendance of the year will be present.

It has been the custom of business enterprises to suspend operation on the Fourth of July in this city the past several years, and the observance this year will probably be more complete than ever. The day is a great one in the history of American people, as it brings back to them memories of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, which most everyone has read of. The day will not only be observed in Greenville, but in practically every American city where more elaborate programs have been arranged.

TWO YOUNG MEN DROWN IN POND NEAR FALKLAND

Walter and Charlie Langley Get in Deep Water and Unable to Swim to Safety

COMPANION CLOSELY ESCAPES DROWNING ALSO

Bodies Recovered Within an Hour After the Drowning Was First Reported

Walter and Charlie Langley, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Langley, who reside on the Henry Pittman farm near Falkland, were drowned yesterday morning about ten o'clock while in bathing at Eason's mill pond, about three miles from Falkland. A companion who went to the aid of the young fellows narrowly escaped drowning also, but after a determined effort succeeding in reaching shallow water. The bodies of the drowned boys were recovered about an hour later.

Walter Langley was about 22 years of age and his brother 19. From all information available they were bathing in shallow water when they suddenly found themselves over depth. Charlie was the first one to go down, and his brother seeing his danger attempted to go to his assistance. As he reached the drowning boy the water was so deep that he was unable to make any progress and went to the bottom also. It was at this juncture that the companion went to their aid, and narrowly escaped drowning himself.

A crowd was soon attracted to the pond and the bodies were recovered only a short distance from where they went down. The companions rendered valiant service in locating the bodies as it was his information that led to the early recovery.

The sad incident was received with keen regret throughout the community where the young men were well known and held in highest esteem.

UNITED STATES TO END RAIL STRIKE

(By International News.) Washington, July 3.—The plan of the United States government for ending the nation wide strike of miners has been formally presented to the conference of coal operators and miners. It was announced today by Secretary of Labor.

JAPAN APPROVES CONFERENCE PACT

Washington, July 3.—The Japanese privy council has approved all treaties of the Washington conference, the state department was advised today. The last two pacts approved were the nine power treaty affecting China and Chinese customs.

JUPITER PLUVIUS FINALLY ALLOWED TARS TO WIN 1-0

Kinston, July 1.—The first game of the doubleheader scheduled to be played at West End park today, progressed only one and a half innings and was rained out with the Tars and the Highwaymen at a deadlock, the score being 2 to 2.

The opposing factions got off to a decidedly ragged start, the Tars filling the way-stations in the first frame with one down. Buck Edwards who began the game for the locals was precipitated into a seemingly hopeless hole by the laxity of his comrades and himself was forced to draw upon all his hurling powers to extricate himself from the difficulty. He came through unharmed, fanning the next two Tar Baby batsmen with a fancy assortment of whistlers.

EIGHT KILLED AND MANY INJURED IN FAST TRAIN WRECK

Midnight Flyer Runs Through Switch at Winslow Junction, Ditching Many Cars

SEVENTY-TWO PERSONS SAID TO BE INJURED AND OTHERS MAY DIE

Accident Caused by Improper Setting of Switch Which Threw Flyer Off Track

Winslow Junction, N. J., July 3.—Eight persons are known to be dead, several others may be dead and 72 injured in a wreck of the midnight flyer operation between Philadelphia and Atlantic City on the Philadelphia and Reading railroad system.

Thirty-seven of the injured were in a serious condition this morning. Among the number are ten children and sixteen women. More than forty have been taken to Atlantic City.

The accident was said to have been caused by improper setting of the switch which threw the flyer into a curve leading to a branch line. The engineer was driving the train at terrific speed, expecting to continue along a stretch of track.

Five cars and the engine were ditched. The signalman who is believed to have set the switch had disappeared at the noon hour today and all efforts to locate him had been futile.

PROMISE SUPPORT OF PLAN TO CHECK BIG FOREST FIRES

County Commissioners Promise to Consider Request for \$500 to Match State Offer

Several prominent business men and farmers of the county met at the court house this morning with W. Darrow Clark, chief forest fire warden of the state of North Carolina, for the purpose of determining whether or not the people of Pitt county wished to co-operate with the state in combatting the forest fire menace, which has resulted in a half million dollar loss in the past year alone.

The meeting was enthusiastic in every sense of the word and much interest was manifested in the number of facts which Mr. Clark set forth for the consideration of his hearers. It was decided that the menace should be avoided so far as possible and a committee immediately afterwards appeared before the board of commissioners, who were also in session during the morning, and asked them to consider the issue and provide a sum of \$500 to match a similar amount offered by the State Geological Survey for employing forest fire wardens for a period one year.

While the board failed to take any action at the time, the committee was promised that everything would be done to protect the forest and that a decision would be rendered as early as possible.

Interesting talks in favor of preserving the forest lands were made by Messrs. R. E. Smith, C. D. Smith, and John Ivey Smith of Arthur. Mr. Edward Hodges of the Grimesland community also said something should be done and promised his approval and assistance in the work.

TWO NEGRO MEN INJURED IN GAS TANK EXPLOSION

Ben Outterbridge Painfully Cut on the Hand by End of the Exploding Can

RICHARD TEEL IS BADLY BRUISED IN MIDDLE OF BODY

"Shorty" Gibson Has Narrow Escape Also When Twelve Gallon Tank Explodes

Ben Outterbridge and Richard Teel, colored men employed at the White Motor Company, were this morning painfully cut and bruised when a twelve gallon gas tank which they were repairing blew up. "Shorty" Gibson, well known mechanic of the city, was also working on the can at the time, but escaped without the slightest injury.

Outterbridge was cut so seriously on the right arm that he was rushed to the office of Dr. Joseph Dixon where examination showed the gash extended to the bone. Several stitches were found necessary. The wound bled profusely before the physician's office could be reached. While Teel escaped without serious injury, he received painful bruises about the body where the entire force of the 12 pound can landed. He was examined by Dr. W. L. Wooten, but no bones were found to be dislocated or broken at the time.

It was stated that the men had no idea there was gas in the can as it had been out of use several weeks. They were reconditioning it and had to use a torch in the operation. Mr. Gibson was standing to the side of the work bench making the repairs, and the colored men were standing at each end of the can holding it in shape. When the can became heated one end suddenly blew out, striking Outterbridge on the arm. The can precipitated against Teel's body so forcibly that he was momentarily stunned.

The explosion was one of the most unusual occurring here in years, and those involved were about the most frightened in the city, except Mr. Gibson who retained his composure and the bung to the can which was attempting to place in position when it shot out of place.

THREE RUM STILL TAKEN IN PACTOLUS SECTION SUNDAY

The illicit whiskey traffic of the county was given another serious setback yesterday when Deputy Sheriff Thad Williams and the chief of police of Grimesland succeeded in capturing three stills in the Pactolus community, across the river from Grimesland.

The stills were constructed of ordinary fifty pound lard stands, but were capable of producing large quantities of monkey rum in a comparatively short time. The distillers had evidently received information of the intended raid as everything had been removed but the stills.

The two officers are doing everything possible to check the traffic, and it is expected that several other captures will be made within the next several days.

AMERICAN WOMAN KILLED BY BANDITS

Washington, July 3.—The state department this morning received a dispatch from Consul Shaw at Tampico announcing the killing of Mrs. Shaw Cheney, wife of an American citizen at Chucuy about forty miles from Tampico, by Mexican bandits.

AMOS JACKSON DEFEATS R. E. CORBETT FOR THE OFFICE OF SHERIFF IN SECOND PRIMARY HELD IN THE COUNTY JULY 1

MAYOR CLARK ISSUES 4th JULY PROCLAMATION

State of North Carolina, County of Pitt, Town of Greenville.

Whereas, tomorrow the 4th day of July, 1922 is the anniversary of our Declaration of Independence, it being the 146th year thereof; and,

Whereas, it is our custom, as a great and grateful people to reverence and respect this honored occasion, so valiantly immortalized by the blood of our forefathers, and,

Whereas, the 4th day of July has been declared a National Holiday so that our people may enter into a full and complete enjoyment and celebration of our Declaration of Independence as a nation:

Now, therefore, I, D. M. Clark, Mayor of the Town of Greenville, by virtue of the power vested in me as mayor, and acting in my official capacity, do hereby proclaim and declare the 4th day of July, 1922, a legal holiday for the Town of Greenville, and call upon the citizenship of said town to suspend operation for and during said day, to-wit: Tuesday, July 4th, 1922.

Proclaimed and issued this the 3rd day of July, 1922.

RAILROAD WAGES SAID TO BE OVER LEVELS OF 1917

Labor Board Complies Figures to Show Conditions as They Actually Exist

Chicago, July 2.—The cut of about \$135,000,000 in the wages of some 1,200,000 railroad employees, which became effective at the same time that a ten per cent cut in freight rates amounting to about \$400,000,000 went into effect, still leaves hourly wages measured in actual buying power above the wages of December, 1917, just before government control, according to figures compiled by the United States Railroad Labor Board.

Machinists, who are among the shop crafts employees on strike, were cut seven cents an hour. They averaged 77.3 cents and now average 70.3 cents. In 1917 the rate was 56.5, the new hourly rate being 89 per cent higher. Cost of living, according to board figures 17 per cent higher than in December, 1917. The board figures the new hourly rate for machinists 19 per cent greater in real purchasing power than in December, 1917.

Car men, cut nine cents an hour, now have an average hourly wage of 64.4 cents as compared with 37.7 per cent in December, 1917, the board's figure show. This represents a net increase of 71 per cent in cash and an advance of 45.7 per cent in actual purchasing power of the hourly wage, the board maintains.

Average hourly earnings of machinists, according to the board's figures, are 15 cents an hour less than under the peak rate established by the board in May, 1920, but the real value is figured as seven per cent greater due to the drop in the cost of living.

Average earnings of car men are figured as 16.6 cents an hour less than in May 1920, but buying power is given as 3.2 per cent greater for the same reason.

Heber Savage Defeats Thad Williams by Slight Majority for Office of Constable

GREATEST INTEREST CENTERED AROUND THE FIGHT IN ALL PARTS

Jackson Polls Majority of 462 Votes Out of All Fourteen Voting Places

Amos Jackson defeated R. E. Corbett for the office of sheriff of Pitt county in the primary Saturday, according to complete returns received at this office Saturday night and today. The total vote cast in the county approximated 3,560, about one thousand less than in the first primary one month ago. Jackson's vote from the fourteen precincts was 2,019 against Corbett 1,554, a majority of 465 votes.

In the contest for a constable of Greenville township Heber Savage defeated Thad Williams by a majority of about 98 votes. While considerable interest was manifested in this contest it was mild compared to the race for sheriff which affected every voter in Pitt county.

While the largest vote was polled at the Greenville box it is probably that Winterville gave Jackson the greatest majority. Farmville, however, rallied behind Corbett giving him a two hundred majority over Jackson. The vote was more equally divided in Greenville than any other precinct in the county considering the size of the precinct Jackson's majority being 53 votes.

While there wasn't as much interest manifested in the primary this time as last, the supporters of each candidate rallied their forces around the polls and did everything possible in their interest. The woman vote was a pretty big factor, especially in Greenville, and it is believed this was nearly as large as in the first race.

The hard time plea is going its
round in this section at the present
time and men who wouldn't be ex-
pected to stoop to such a thing are
pleading hard times more than any-
one. While conditions are probably
more serious among a certain class
of farmers than last year, they are
not as bad as some are trying to
picture. Goodness knows the scare
is had enough, and it is the duty of
everybody to make things look
brighter if they are dark as midnight.

The erection of potato storage
houses is receiving more than ordi-
nary consideration at present time
and it is probable the coming fall
will find one in each locality. That
this is as it should be is not to be
questioned. Thousands of dollars are
lost annually because of improper
preservation of the crop and the
farmer can't expect to realize proper
profit from the production of his
crops until this important matter is
considered.

Pitt county highways are as dan-
gerous today as ever and will con-
tinue to be unless danger signs are
placed at bad curves and some effort
made to check the speeding in pro-
gress daily on all hard surfaced
roads. Some may say it would be
impossible to try and curb this evil, but
it is not. If the county would place
two or three traffic cops in service
and let them secret themselves along
the various roads and report the
numbers it wouldn't be so very long
before even the worst road hounds
would be taking a more leisurely
look. Something should be done and
the sooner the county does it the bet-
ter everyone will feel when riding
over the hard surfaced roads.

The illicit whisky traffic is receiv-
ing proper attention in this section
at the present time and before many
years pass contraband whiskey will
be nearly scarce. People who drink
the slops manufactured by the dirt-
iest class of white and colored people
poisonize their lives every time they
swallow a swallow of the filthy
liquor, and the sooner they quit it
the sooner this country will be able
to take its proper place in every
branch of industry. No drinking man
is expected to be as efficient and ren-
der as satisfactory service as the
sober man, but they continue to
disregard the warnings of nature
against the vile stuff. This is a great
mistake, but it will never be as great
as it should until liquor has been
completely set aside.

The defeat of a number of Re-
publican candidates of late goes to
show what the public thinks of the
Republican administration. It is be-
lieved all over the country that
the party is not capable of fulfilling
the promises made during campaign
days, and after nearly two years
they can't expect to do anything in
the future. Conditions haven't im-
proved in the slightest extent since
the administration changed and any
improvement can't be expected in the
days to come.

The life saving corps of the Red
Cross should be of invaluable aid to
people who don't know how to swim
here and it is hoped everyone will
take advantage of it. The corps is
ready and willing to help anyone to
learn how to swim and all that is
needed is proper notification of
when the service of the swimmers is
needed. Everyone should know how
to swim as the time may come when
their life will depend upon such
knowledge.

That the railroad strike is not de-
scribed to be so serious is very ap-
parent by the reluctant way men are
leaving the shops in various parts of
the country. Although claiming to
be working for a principle these men
are doing so purely through selfish
interests. They are not willing to
assume their part of the responsi-
bility involved in the nation's return
to normalcy and plan to make condi-
tions even worse by paralyzing their
industry. Men who have no
interest in their profession than

to quit in face of a slight reduction
of wages under such conditions
should not be allowed to earn a liv-
ing in this country. The strike this
time is based on the most selfish
spirit the country has known and the
government should see to it that the
people do not have to put up with it.
There is a way of averting the serious
situation and the government alone
will be able to do it. It should not de-
lay in demanding a resumption of
work and if the union men do not
return then no union laborers should
be put on the job and allowed to
work under government supervision.
The country has no sympathy for the
railroad men in this instance and they
can't expect to receive any consider-
ation with such principles involved.

BLUE SOX BLANK

NEW BERN BEARS BY SCORE 4 TO 0

Thompson Pitched Locals to Victory Saturday Over Hard Hitters From Bear Town

With Thompson hurling an invincible brand of ball, the Blue Sox were enabled to blank the New Bern Bears at the Fair Grounds here Saturday afternoon by the score of 4 to 0. The Sox started their run getting in the second frame when Duncan, second man up, tripled to right center. He later scored on Doran's timely single. In the fifth Keating, second man up, was issued a free pass to first. He scored when Thompson tripled to right field. The side was retired without further scoring.

In the sixth White, first up, singled. He was caught at second on Smith's sacrifice. Smith advanced on Duncan's long fly to right field. He also advanced again on Doran's single and scored when Massey hit a grounder to McLean who made a wild throw to the plate. In the eighth the final tally of the game was sent across the rubber on White's single over first base and Duncan's splitting two base drive to right field.
