

HOPE FOR QUICK SETTLEMENT OF RAILROAD STRIKE IS SEEN IN STATEMENT OF UNION LEADERS

Conciliatory Letter by Hopper
Brings Reply From Jewell
That Shopmen Are Ready
PRESENT DIFFERENCE
SAY WAY IS PAVED
FOR SETTLEMENT OF
Men Ready to Return When
Railroads Agree to Quit
Farming Out Work

Chicago, July 5.—Hope for the speedy settlement of the country-wide strike of the railway shopmen was seen tonight in statements issued by Ben. W. Hooper, chairman of the United States Railroad Labor Board, and B. M. Jewell, leader of the shop crafts, who ordered the walkout.

In a reply to a letter from Mr. Hooper, which was regarded as conciliatory, Mr. Jewell declared that the strikers were willing to "consider any negotiations with any one in authority for settlement of the strike."

"We are willing to confer with anybody authorized by the railroads to bring peace proposals to us," said Mr. Jewell. "I include or exclude nobody, but if the Labor Board, for instance, came to us with a definite proposition, we would not hesitate to consider it."

The tabulation showed only 94.7 per cent of the men had voted to strike on the question of wages, the heaviest vote for a strike being on the question of outside contract labor which polled 97.1 per cent of the vote cast. The ballot on rules came second with 96.2 for a strike. Union leaders said that the vote displayed the relative importance attached to the three points at issue by their membership.

Mr. Jewell made public the exact figures on the strike taken by the 400,000 members of the six crafts. The vote was divided into three separate ballots, the first one accepting a \$50,000,000 reduction in wages ordered by the labor board, the restoration of seven working rules altered by the board, and the third, the abolishment of outside contracting by the roads.

CONDITIONS MUCH BETTER IN NATION

Prosperity to be Evident Despite Coal and Railroad Strikes

(By International News.)

Washington, July 6.—Despite the nationwide coal strike, accompanying the labor difficulties of the railroads, the fundamental economic conditions of the United States are most favorable.

Business again present a picture of prosperity, the department of commerce declared in a comprehensive industrial survey completed this afternoon. Prices are fifty percent above the pre-war level and the financial situation is more favorable than in months.

MILLION PEOPLE IDLE IN AMERICA

Washington, July 6.—More than a million and a quarter people are idle in the United States at present time as result of strikes and other disorders, the department of labor estimated this afternoon.

NIGHT TRAINS ARE NOT TO BE TAKEN OFF IMMEDIATELY

Norfolk-Southern to Continue
Operation of Trains Nos. 3
and 4, it Was Said Today
TRAINS NOS. 17 AND 18
WILL BE REMOVED
FOR SHORT WHILE

Other Organizations Take In-
stant Action to Prevent Dis-
continuance of Service

Greenville and Pitt county people generally will be glad to learn that trains Nos. 3 and 4, operating between Greenville and Norfolk, will not be suspended on July 6th as announced through the columns of this paper yesterday, as the company has decided to let them continue on regular schedule until further notice.

This decision was followed by complaints filed with the Norfolk and Southern railroad company and the corporation commission, and from all indications other trains involved in the drastic orders of yesterday may also remain in operation.

However, it was announced this morning that trains Nos. 17 and 18, operating from Raleigh to Beihaven, which pass through Greenville at eight o'clock in the morning and return at six in the afternoon would be removed until further notice.

P. L. Clodfelter, president of the Pitt county chamber of commerce yesterday wired the corporation commission protesting against the removal of the trains, and immediately received the following reply:

"The taking off of trains by the Norfolk & Southern was without our knowledge or consent. We took the matter up with the railroad company immediately on hearing of it and they replied that it was caused by the strike and was only temporary. We succeeded in getting them to restore trains Nos. 3 and 4, but if they insist in taking these trains off we are powerless to prevent it, owing to the fact that they are interstate trains."

"The railroad people will appear before us tomorrow to show the necessity of this action while the strike is on." CORPORATION COMMISSION.

The strike has seriously demoralized both freight and passenger service on most of the important railway lines of the country, and the effort Norfolk & Southern is making to prevent discontinuance of its service in this section of the state will be greatly appreciated by the hundreds of people forced to use the trains from Raleigh to Norfolk. The night trains are used especially by business men desiring to make daily trips between the state capital and Virginia city, and curtailment of service would be a severe blow right at this time.

Chambers of commerce in all parts of the state affected are putting up a stiff fight to prevent demoralization of passenger train service, and if the strike should show the slightest improvement it is certain the railroad company will grant their request.

ASK FOR BIDS ON SHELMERDINE AND FALKLAND ROADS

County Highway Commission
Asks Contractors to Submit
Bids by Noon July 31st

CONTRACT OF BETHEL
HARD SURFACE ROAD
TO BE LET JULY 25TH

Paving of Road to Ayden Com-
pleted and Traffic to Begin
Within Two Weeks

The Pitt county highway commission is asking for bids from contractors for paving two county roads in Pitt county, from Greenville toward Falkland a distance of 5 miles extending to the west side of the Sams Branch hill, and also from Greenville towards Shelmerdine, a distance of 7 miles extending as far as Cox Mill. Both roads to be 16 feet in width and to be paved with concrete.

Contractors are asked to submit bid on the work at noon July 31st, at the office of the Highway Commission in Greenville. The paving equipment of the commission will be used, and the county convict force will be used in the constructing of these roads.

The grading of the Falkland road is completed as far as the west side of Sams Branch hill, and this work was done by the county convict forces.

The grading on the road leading from Greenville to Cox Mill is now being carried on by the convict forces, and is expected to be completed within next five weeks.

It will be of interest to the people of Pitt county to know also that the state highway commission, has advertised for bids for the paving of the road from Greenville to Bethel, a distance of 14 miles, the contract to be let about the 25th of July and at the same time they are asking for bids to let by contract the bridge across Moccasin River at Grifton following the new route, crossing Contentnea creek or Moccasin river above the town of Grifton, and shortening the distance about a mile.

The convict forces of this county, made the long embankment across the low grounds approaching the new bridge site during the past winter, and graded, for paving, the connecting link between Grifton and Ayden, for the State highway commission.

The completion of the paving of the road from Greenville to Ayden was made last Friday, and that road will be open for traffic into the town of Ayden in a little over two weeks as soon as the concrete is hardened sufficient to turn traffic on it.

TWO BOYS KILLED BY AN AUTOMOBILE NEAR FARMVILLE

Nine and 12 Year Old Sons of
Dave Creech Were Killed
at Seven This Morning

ACCIDENT OCCURED
ABOUT 2 1-2 MILES
FROM FARMVILLE

Automobile Was Driven by
Man Named Hedgepath Who
Resides in Farmville

The nine and twelve year old sons of Dave Creech, who reside on the Mrs. Allen King farm, on the Farmville and Falkland road, about two and a half miles from Farmville, were killed this morning about seven o'clock when hit by a Studebaker automobile driven by a young man by the name of Hedgepath, who resides in the same community. While only one of the children were killed outright the other died a few minutes after he had been removed from the road to the home of his parents.

The accident is one of the most serious that has occurred in the Farmville section in several months and the entire community was keenly shocked at the details of the tragedy given out a few minutes later.

From all information that could be received by telephone this afternoon the killing of the children was purely accidental. They had gone to the farm of Kinsey Heath, who resides only a short distance from the Creech home to help him put in tobacco. They had not been at work very long when the boys were given charge of a mule and tobacco truck with which to haul a load of tobacco to barn.

As they were going along the side of the road the car drove up going in the direction of Farmville. As it drew nearer the mule became frightened and plunged across the road in front of the machine. The impact was so forceful that one of the boys was killed instantly. It was thought the other might be saved, but he died a short time after reaching home.

The consensus of opinion prevailing around Farmville this afternoon seemed to be that the accident could not be avoided. Hedgepath, while running at a comparatively fast rate, was not driving recklessly and made every effort to stop his car in time to prevent the accident.

The mule dashed across the road so suddenly, however, that all effort to avert the crash was impossible.

Mr. Sachse rendered efficient and satisfactory service during the two years he was a member of the faculty here, and his absence will be keenly regretted by the pupils to whom he endeared himself.

It has not been announced who will take his place, but it is probable Superintendent J. H. Rose will announce a successor within the next few weeks.

Mr. Sachse took an active part in the religious, social and educational development of the city while here, and his influence will be greatly missed. His many friends, however, will be glad to learn that he is preparing himself for a broader field of endeavor and will return to his educational work after completing studies at Columbia.

HOUSE WILL KILL NEW LOAN ISSUES

Washington, July 6.—Legislation to permit stockholders of National banks to get more than six percent on their investment is now before the House Banking committee and will be killed by committee when the House reconvenes, leaders of the House and the farm bloc asserted this afternoon.

It was declared that enactment of the measure would encourage bankers to increase interest of rates other than charges for the purpose of swelling their earnings and declaring heavier dividends.

BLUE SOX DEFEAT STUART'S BABIES IN FAST CONTEST

Hathaway Breaks Away From Bad Luck and Blanks Tar- boro by Score of 5 to 0

The Blue Sox continued their winning streak yesterday by defeating Tarboro on the Tarboro diamond by the score of 5 to 0. The game was one of the cleanest and best played probably witnessed on the Tarboro diamond this season, as Greenville played absolutely errorless ball and the Tar Babies had only one bobble checked up against them. The only feature, except the splendid mound work of Hathaway, was Smith's circuit clout in the fifth inning with no men on bases.

Hathaway broke away from the streak of hard luck which has followed him relentlessly the entire season and gave the Tar Babies one of the worst lickings they have had in many a day. While they succeeded in amassing a total of six hits off his delivery they were so well scattered that it was impossible for them to figure in scoring. Only two or three times did the Tar Babies threaten the rubber, but at each time Hathaway tightened up and positively declined to yield the slightest semblance of a hit.

He received perfect support of his teammates who played with such precision and accuracy that such thing as the Tar Babies getting an advantage was out of the question. There were no sensational fielding features particularly but each club showed more than ordinary brilliance in the field and handled the ball in a way that drew a constant stream of applause from the grandstand.

Crump, a former first baseman of Red Stewart's outfit, was sent to the mound for the afternoon, but lasted only two-thirds of an inning. During that time he issued five free passes to first, hit one batsman and forced in two runners. He was relieved by Firth at this juncture who forced one more runner in by issuing a free pass. This unfortunate work of the firing line sealed the game for the Blue Sox, but to show they were not willing to take things as they stood two, more runners were sent across in the fifth frame. The circuit clout by Smith followed by two rapid drives in succession sent the final runners over.

After this disastrous inning Firth settled down and absolutely declined to yield anything in the way of runs, although the Sox managed to find his delivery for five safeties during the game. Both pitchers breezed along nicely the remainder of the game, and found things decidedly easier than any game of the season.

The series between the two clubs will be concluded this afternoon at Tarboro and the Blue Sox will move over to the Highwaymen camp tomorrow. If they can take this afternoon's game and break even with the Highwaymen Saturday night should

find them much nearer second place than formerly.

The unexpected really happened yesterday when the Greenville hurler pulled away from a prolonged losing streak and staged a complete shutout against the Tar Babies.

The Farmers wanted to test their strength against the league leading Pamlico's, but Jupiter interfered as he has been trying to do in Washington the last two or three days.

The Highwaymen had an idea they were going to "skin" the Bears, but old Jupiter again flushed 'em.

That "hitting fool" Smith evidently means to establish a home run record for the league this season. He was credited with his fourth circuit clout against Firth, Tarboro ace, yesterday afternoon with no men on bases.

It was a pity the bases were not loaded when old "Smitty" drove the apple over the fence. If he had pulled the trick in the second frame with the bases full he would have returned to Greenville probably finding a wallet full of money waiting for him.

The first mound artist for the Tar Tar Babies issued five free passes and hit one batsman in the very first inning, yesterday which netted the Blue Sox a total of three runs without any more exertion than running around the bases. Firth, however, retired the side in excellent form and breezed along nicely until about the sixth when Smith's homer combined with a couple of more safeties netted two more runs.

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If Hathaway can keep the pace he established against the Tar Babies yesterday he has a permanent berth with the Sox. When he pitches a shutout against Red Stewart's hard hitting aggregation, it's something to be proud of, no doubt about that.

The entire league will probably sit up and take notice when it is learned that Hathaway blanked Tarboro, but when he pitches a while longer and really breaks away from the streak of bad luck they won't be so greatly surprised after all.

The Tar Babies should have done their best yesterday as they go up against old "Iron Man" Beall this afternoon in the final game of the series. If they permitted Hathaway to shut out them; then they are not due to reach first base on Beall.

With this excellent start we should be able to finish up the week in great form. In fact three more games in the won column would place us not so very far behind the Bears, in case Kinston happens to handle them in true Highwayman form.

There's no use talking, Greenville has the second fastest, if not the fastest club, in the league. Their showing against the hard hitting, smooth fielding Pamlico's, was all that could be expected, and to say that they are equal to the leaders is not going any too far at all. To tell the truth they have the edge on any club when it comes to field work, although it is probable they are somewhat weaker with the stick. But even at that, they pound the old pill unmercifully at times and show up the big ones in true form.

There is no doubt that Washington has the first half on ice, but if we can keep the pace we are going now the second half will be ours without question. Another hurler of the same class as Thompson and Beall and the firing line will be complete in every sense of the word.

Massey at first, White at Second, Doran at third, Stringfield at short and either Frazier, Keating or Carson behind the bat, is a combination that is bound to turn Greenville in high honors before the season comes to a close. Then Duncan, Smith, Leftwich or Carson in the field can handle anything coming in their territory. Things are working smoothly and what we want to do is keeping them working that way.

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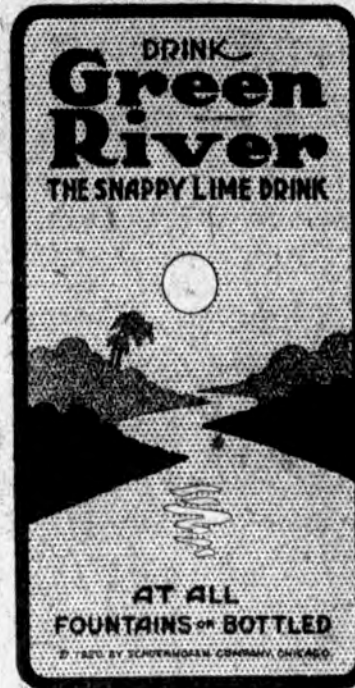
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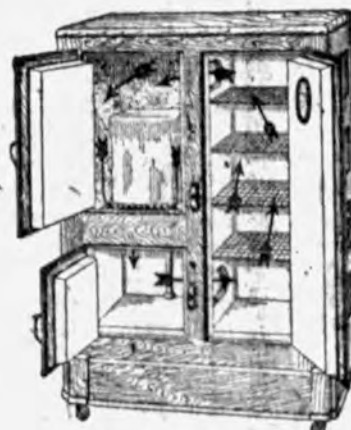
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
